

# Early end to student voting

#### Garcia disqualified last minute for not meeting the ASCC election requirements for president

Election polls closed early Thursday night after one of the two candidates was found ineligible for election.

Tiffany Garcia was disqualified from the race after it was discovered that she was below the six minimum required units to run.

Her opponent, James Towns was made the new ASCC president upon confirmation of her ineligibility.

"It is still an unclear picture," Towns said of Garcia's removal. "I haven't been informed of the exact footsteps. I just know she was ineligible."

Election results have not been announced. Towns said he does not know what the results from the polls were.

Although there have been rumors that closing the elections early was in violation of the ASCC constitution, Jerry Ramos, acting chief justice pro tempore, said that the ASCC has received no official "judicial review." '

Ramos did say that he has advised one student on how to formally issue a complaint, but neither that issue nor any others regarding the election have been submitted to the judicial committee.

He stresses the importance of the fact that Garcia's ineligibility was simply a matter of fact and had nothing to do with any one person's feelings or power to make a decision.

Garcia was in violation of the ASCC code 2.862, which states, "A student

falling below five units shall be required to resign."

Ramos was informed about the incident Thursday night shortly after 7 p.m. "When I walked in I saw Tiffany and

Brian...they both looked sad," he said. He said it was unfortunate that the election had to end in this manner.

"Ideally, you would like to have a vote take place," he said.

Towns, however, points out the good that came out of the situation.

He explained that had Garcia been allowed to continue and had been elected, her eligibility may have been in question once the semester had started. This would, have meant a transition in student government similar to what the student body saw this spring.

For now, Towns is pleased to be back in office and is concentrating on next

He says that he will be focusing primarily on budget issues and how they are affecting campus life.

"Until we figure out what we have and where we stand, we can't do anything else," he said.

Additionally, Towns is looking to boost school spirit in the upcoming semester.

He would like to see students get involved and make their voice heard, and looks to make that one of his main objectives in the fall.

# First year

Learning communities new student project starts fall 2003

When you came to Cerritos College did you ever think about how you were going to make it through college? How would you adjust to college and that it would not be like high school anymore?

For many new students the adjustment can be both confusing and complicated. The pressures of being at a new school and taking classes that just don't fit for them can make students feel like they can't make it and end up increasing their probability of dropping out.

Cerritos College Learning Communities has created a pilot program called the First Year Program. This project is to help students adjust to college life and cul-

"Sometimes students get used to not going to class and drop out, so this program is design to help students stay in class and get adjusted to classes and campus," said Ana Torres-Bower, Philosophy teacher and coordinator of the First Year Program.

The program will begin in the fall of 2003. It is the third track of the Learning Communities program. The program will consist of two houses.

The reason for us calling it a house is due to the nature of the program. We feel that it will be like a support system for the students and a friendly family like environment for them to get support from," Torres-Bower said.

for such as taking placement testing, and signing a one-semester contract agreeing to complete the course track and commit their all to their classroom performance.

Two houses are within the program, House A and House B. Each house will require the students to take 12 units and complete. The

first house consisted of classes for English 20 and Math 20 students and the second house is for students that meet the English 52 and Math 60 requirements after taking the

assessment tests. Each house will have 40 students, for a total of 80 students for the whole pilot program. The 80 students will be

selected from the placement exam. The program will be a simulated model of a program

that was launched over 30 years ago at the University of South Carolina. "The First Year Experience will help orient the stu-

dents from high school to college," Torres-Bower said. The program is a part of the Learning communities program and the teachers that are in the FYE are already a

part of the Learning Communities classes here on campus. "The teachers already have experience working with other faculty to help students succeed in the classes and help the students with any thing they need," Torres-Bower

# The world according to Lyndon LaRouche

Presidential hopeful takes campaign to the campus

Democratic Presidential hopeful Lyndon LaRouche held a live Webcast April 24, in which student leaders and journalists from campuses across the country were invited to participate via telephone, including Cerritos College.

The purpose of the national teleconference, according to Deborah Freeman, moderator/national spokesman for the LaRouche campaign, was that, "He wanted to give campus news the opportunity to dialogue important issues."

After Freeman's opening remarks, LaRouche took the microphone for his opening statement.

He immediately dove into the current situation in Iraq. "There's no end to the war," said LaRouche. "I'm the only prospective candidate who is properly addressing the issue of this war."

Furthermore, he claimed, "In 40 years, I've never been wrong in my long term predictions."

As the floor was opened for questions, beginning with the East Coast, David from Baltimore asked LaRouche to explain why he is adopting a youth-oriented campaign strategy.

"We have the fastest-drawing youth movement in the United States," said LaRouche. He laid out his philosophy that the "baby-boomer" generation has become complaisant, politically, and that he appeals to young people for support because, "They will struggle to find the truth in any matter they confront."

He predicts that the parent generation will then become "inspired" by the youth movement, and become active again

A question from UCLA brought the discussion to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. LaRouche explained that, in his opinion, "The key to this is water. Water

is a symbol of life - water, energy, food, opportunities for expression, are necessary...and being deprived. If people can't live, they tend to fight."

Asked about the events of September 11, LaRouche responded with vicious partisan criticism. He said it represented a "Reichstag Fire event", which Cheney and his cohorts abused to push their aggressive foreign policy.

"The President was convinced, with his crazy Axis of Evil address in the State of the Union, that this policy was the way to go," said LaRouche, "This is a menace. It must be stopped."

In classic form, LaRouche compared and drew parallels between the Bush Administration's rise to power, and that of Hitler in the early 30s. He even touched on the idea that the events of Sept. 11 were possibly planned from within, by those like Dick Cheney, and other like minded "Children of Satan" and "chicken-

"This was a highly sophisticated operation. It could not have been run by a bunch of Arabs in the Middle-East. As President, I will get to the bottom of this," promised LaRouche.

LaRouche argued that his predictions are always right, and that without his leadership, he feels there will "not be much of a United States left to vote in 2008."

Politics aside, this conference gave student journalists around the nation an opportunity to gain some experience and insight into political journalism. This was not the first college teleconference planned by LaRouche, and will not be the

# Campus receives new ATMs

Cerritos College will soon see a new ATM on campus.

The old Bank of America ATM was removed last and is currently being worked on so that a new machine can be installed.

The new ATM will be owned by the Financial Partners Credit Union. Meanwhile, the Credit Union has

set up an ATM in the Student Center. This ATM is accessible from 7:30 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday through Thursday and from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Friday. For students who belong to a credit union in the CO-OP network, use of the ATMs will be free.

Few students, however, belong to the particular credit union the new machines are owned by and will still be charged a few to withdraw money, just like with the Bank of America ATM.

Students seem to be welcoming

"I think it's good that they are getting new ATMs. The old one sometimes didn't work," said Josie Paez, undecided major.

In addition to the new ATMs the smaller machines located next vendors will still be in use.

These machines are not quite the same as ATMs but act as a moneydispensing unit for students wanting to purchase food.



# Arms across America guns in the cockpit

Pilots who completed weapons training carry semi automatic weapons across the American skies

Recent events have brought to the spotlight the debate over guns in the cockpit. More specifically, the issue is allowing commercial airline pilots who have completed a firearms training course to carry weapons while flying, for use as a last resort in case of hijacking, to help prevent such catastrophe's as 9/11.

While many, including most pilots themselves, are firmly in support of this idea, seeing it as a logical way to deter and defeat would-be hijackers, bills to this effect have met stiff opposition. Not surprisingly, many of those same people who are opposed to guns in the cockpit are those very same individuals who make their voices heard in opposition to guns in the home, and anywhere else for that matter.

These anti-gun types main concern appears to be, as usual, that guns in the cockpit could only add to the potential for disaster, rather than diminish it. While I appreciate their concern, and acknowledge that their motives are

pure, this way of thinking is simply erroneous. It was once said and often repeated, that "God created men, but Samuel Colt made them equal." An aircraft is one of the few places that law enforcement could really take advantage of the firearm, as with proper screening, any potential hijackers should not be armed with guns. In other words, a gun may give a pilot that crucial upper hand in a crisis situation.

I cannot deny that there is a potential for something to go wrong while a pilot is attempting to subdue an attacker with a firearm, but by the time this scenario would have the opportunity to play out, something is already terribly

I am not advocating gun toting cowboys at the controls of all our aircrast. These are responsible people flying commercial jetliners. Most of them are ex-military. If anywhere there is the necessity to have a weapon for the purpose of defending innocent lives, the enclosed and vulnerable atmosphere of an airplane is it.

I can only speculate that had there been a gun aboard those planes hijacked that fateful day by small groups of men with box-cutters. the result may not have been the same.

The idea that the fewer guns we have on the streets, and anywhere else, the safer we will be

is ludicrous. The fact of the matter is, the guns. are out there. They are in the hands of bad people whether we like it or not. Passing legislation to, "get guns off the street" may stop responsible, hard-working, law-abiding citizens from obtaining a firearm with which to, defend themselves, but criminal low-lives who are already in the business of committing violent crimes are not likely to throw away their. guns when they hear that a new gun-control bill' has passed.

Law- abiding citizens obey the law, gun toting criminals break it. All the gun-control laws in the world can't stop any gang member who wants one from buying a gun.

An aircraft, however, levels the playing field. Passenger pass through security, metal. detectors, and other such screening before being permitted to board an airplane, If the screeners are doing their job, one can fairly assume that there should be no guns on board. Weapons, maybe, but not guns. The ability for the pilot to possess the solitary firearm on the aircraft is a prospect that makes me feel safer getting on an airplane.





# MAINTAIN YOUR ANGER

Anger Management 'manages' to amuse, but falls short of expectations. This latest installation in the big name team up films brings together Adam

Sandler and Jack Nicholson. Visions of the after affects of smylex gas dance in one's head, perhaps I expect too much?

Sandler is Dave Buznick, basically a nice guy who lets people walk all over him. This tendency to swallow pride and bottle his rage has him popping at all the wrong moments, much to the chagrin of a stewardess, a cocktail waitress and his girlfriend Linda (Marisa Tomei). A night out gone bad lands Buznick in court for the second time in twenty minutes (That would be real time, not film time.)

Enter Buddy Rydell, Nicholson's ' somewhat eccentric anger management therapist, and his step program. The first step: moving in with Sandler. It would seem that Rydell's program consists mostly of pissing Buznick off and expecting him to somehow deal with these outlandish situations he's stuck in. From singing excerpts of West Side Story on a crowded bridge in an unmoving car as drivers curse and honk, to a trip to a monastery for a confrontation with a childhood bully, the ups and downs leave you guessing at Rydell's

Throughout this seemingly useless therapy, the hapless Buznick develops a rapport with Rydell, talking about his inability to express the deep feelings he holds for Linda. He goes so far as to tell Rydell his plan for proposal, which Rydell promptly steals, along with Linda. Left with nothing to lose and a looming court sentence Buznick learns to channel his anger, finding the Linda how he really feels in a mostly predictable fashion that still brings a little smile to one's face.

Literally an all star cast, with cameos from Heather Graham, Rudy Giuliani, John McEnroe, Woody Harrelson and others, one wonders why this film isn't quite the comic caliber of Happy Gilmore, Billy Madison or As Good As It Gets.

Both Sandler and Nicholson turn in par performances and yet Management still falls short. Dorfman's script may be to blame here; funny moments are almost painful as we watch Buznick stumble about in situations where most of us would die of embarrassment. Segal's average style leaves nothing memorable, forcing the film to stand squarely on the actor's shoulders.

Expect less, get more with Anger Management. The film will make you smile, but there is a distinct lack of chemistry that makes it less watchable. courage to stand up to his boss and tell. Hit the matinee or wait for the video on


