

CERRITOS STUDENT COUNCIL PREPS FOR CO-HOST ROLL IN STATE MEETING

Cerritos College's student council, the governing body of the Falcon student body, is working on preparations for its role in the coming California Junior College Student Government conference. Cerritos will be co-hosts of the affair with Long Beach City College and the event will be held at the Lafayette Hotel in Long Beach in the Spring.

The student conference is considered to be one of the most important student-participation meetings in the junior college picture. Students representing all of the junior colleges in the state attend the confab, serving on the numerous committees, workshops, and projects that have trained many jaysee leaders.

The Falcon council, in the role of co-host, plans to play a major part in insuring one of the best conventions of its type. A Fall Semester conference was staged at Bakersfield with Bakersfield College as the host.

PRE-REGISTRATION UNTIL JANUARY 30; STUDENTS URGED TO REGISTER EARLY

Pre-registration for the spring semester at Cerritos College is still going on and will continue until January 30, announced John R. Blakemore, dean of counseling and guidance.

Spring classes at Cerritos begin February 2. Tuition is free. Any high school graduate or person 18 years or older is eligible to apply for admission according to Miss Genevieve Emiston, dean of admissions.

First step for prospective students who have not attended Cerritos College before is to make application for admission at the college office of admissions, 16122 Studebaker, just south of Alondra, or by calling the office at UN 5-1514 between 8 a. m. and 4 p. m.

Second step for new students who plan to take one or more classes is to call for a pre-registration appointment at UN 5-1271 between 8 a. m. and 4 p. m. or UN 5-5221 after 4 p. m. Returning students should arrange their programs with their counselors.

More than 138 courses will be offered in the five divisions of the college. Largest division of the college is the technical and industrial division with 52 specialized course offerings in the area of auto mechanics, drafting, electronics, metal work, police science, supervision, and related technical instruction. The T&I division is the first division of the college already established on the new college campus at Alondra and Studebaker Rd. A limited number of physical and health classes are on the campus site. Most other classes will still be held at the Artesia High School between 4 p. m. and 10 p. m.

Business education division has 26 courses, four different offerings in accounting and bookkeeping, nine in general business, two in postal supervision and procedures, six in various areas of secretarial training, and five in merchandising.

The humanities division includes 35 courses. Within the four departments of the social science division is a selection of 21 courses. Science, engineering, and mathematics division will offer a span of 41 courses.

In the earth sciences there will be six courses covering physical anthropology, cultural anthropology, astronomy, physical geography, physical geology, and historical geology.

Exams will be given 2-4 p. m. for classes meeting 3 MWF or 3 daily.

Cerritos College will entertain two varsity sports on its new and budding campus this year, baseball and tennis. Tennis Coach Charlie Hall has announced that the courts will be ready for use in the immediate future and that varsity tennis practice sessions will be slated for that time.

Hall also announced that additional candidates for the squad should sign up for the team as soon as possible.

The new courts, set in from Alondra Blvd., near the eastern part of the campus, are fenced in and have been designed for top-flight tournament play. The playing surface of the courts is shaded in green, while the out-of-bound areas are shaded in brown.

The Falcons will be fielding their first tennis squad this Spring, thereby adding another activity to the list of varsity sport activities for men.

FALCON BASKETBALL TEAM MEETS PIERCE SATURDAY NIGHT AT NORWALK HIGH GYM

Cerritos College's basketball team will make its first home Western State Conference appearance this coming Saturday night. The Falcons will host potent Pierce College's Brahmas in the tilt that will get underway at 8 p.m.

It will be the second WSC contest for Cerritos. The Falcons dropped their opener to Compton by four points. Pierce lost to surprising Glendale in its opener and met Compton last night.

The Falcons sandwiched in between their first loop game and Saturday's battle, a road trip to the Modesto Tournament. Cerritos narrowly missed pulling off one of the biggest jaysee upsets of the year by almost tripping up San Francisco City College in the tourney's first game. SFCC won the affair last year and were co-favorites to repeat, boasting one of Northern California's best clubs. A second narrow loss to Sacramento on the following day ended Falcon hopes in the three-day event.

Next week, Coach John Caine's cagers will travel to Pasadena City College on Tuesday, January 20, and then will return home on Saturday, January 24, to entertain powerful Los Angeles City College.

Heading the lettermen list is last year's captain catcher Ed Rybold (.317). WSC first team infielder Al Bishop (.315), outfielder Frank Thornton, pitcher Craig Sheff (5-4), pitcher Jerry Breuer (2-2), second baseman Whitie Martin (.284), third baseman Bob Saylor (.358), and first baseman Dave Worsham (.274) complete the list.

The Falcon baseballers under Coach Wally Kincaid, will open with Mt. San Antonio College at Mt. SAC on Friday, February 13. Cerritos will inaugurate its home diamond on Tuesday, February 24 against Citrus College.
