Exams will be given 4-6 p.m. for classes meeting 4 p.m. MWF; 4 daily, or beginning at 4 on these days.

Exams will be given 6-8 p.m. for classes meeting 6 MWF; 6 daily; or 6-8 M or MW.

Exams will be given from 8-10 p.m. for classes meeting 7-9; 7-10 or 8-10 M, or MW, or MWF.

TUESDAY, JANUARY 27

Exams will be given from 2-4 p.m. to classes meeting 1-3 or 1-4 on Tuesday or Tuesday and Thursday.

Exams will be given from 4-6 p.m. to classes meeting 4 p.m. TTh, or 4 and 5 TTh, or beginning at 4 on these days.

FALCONS HOST POWERFUL LACC BASKETBALL TEAM
SATURDAY NIGHT ACTION SET FOR NORWALK HIGH

Cerritos College's luckless basketball team faces high-scoring and powerful Los Angeles City College this coming Saturday night. The action will be staged at Norwalk High's gymnasium and game time is set for 8 p.m.

The Falcons have continued to amaze themselves in the Western State Conference season, much as they have all the rest of the year. Dogged by close losses, Cerritos' cagers have missed the highest moments of glory by only the narrowest of margins. In the opening two WSC contests, the Falcons took two straight defeats, both of them by a combined margin of six points. In the last five Cerritos defeats, the total difference in points has been 19 points.

To cope with L.A.C.C.'s Cubs, Coach John Caine will have the services, once again, of Bob Robbins. Robbins, out of action last week, bucketed 21 points against Compton in the loop opener. Sophomore Center Frank Bilyew hit for 19 against Pierce last weekend.

Next week, Cerritos will tackle league-leading Ventura on Tuesday night. The Falcons will return home a week from Saturday night to end the first round of play with Glendale at Norwalk High.

COLLEGE BUILDING PROGRAM RUSHES ALONG; MANY STRUCTURES TO BE COMPLETED IN APRIL

Good news for Cerritos College's students and staff is the rapid finishing of much of the new campus construction. Much of the building program is scheduled for completion in April.

Tentative plans for moving call for the first Cerritos summer school session to be housed in the new campus. A regular day schedule of classes beginning in September has been assured.

Two buildings will be completed on April 1, the two-story Liberal Arts and the Drafting and Electronics building. By April 18, the Business Education wing, Lecture Hall, Science, and Shower and Locker Room will also be finished.

The new Student Center building, just now in the foundation stage, will be tentatively completed on August 5.

Cerritos' tennis courts are completed and need only the installation of the nets to allow that activity to start. The modern and professional-style baseball park, near the southeastern end of the campus, will be completed in time for the Falcon baseball team to play its first game on February 24. The backstop area is now being installed.

The new campus is bordered by Alondra Boulevard and Studebaker Road.

INTERNATIONAL TREATY GROUP ANNOUNCES ESSAY CONTEST FOR STUDENTS ON SECURITY

One of the world's foremost international treaty organizations, the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization, has announced an essay contest for college students.

The essay must be on "Collective Security in Southeast Asia," and must be in 3500 words or less. Entries must be sent to the Association of International Relations Clubs, 345 East 46th Street, New York 17, New York, postmarked no later than February 28, 1959.

The first prize in the contest is \$100 and a trip to Monterey Peninsula to receive the gift at the 12th annual meeting of the International Relations Clubs in April. A second prize of \$75, and third and fourth prizes of \$50 and \$25 respectively, are also being awarded.

To enter the contest students must be between the ages of 17-21 on January 1, 1959. They must be currently enrolled as an undergraduate in an American college or university. The student must also be an American citizen or a member of any of the SEATO nations (Australia, New Zealand, The Philippines, France, Pakistan, Thailand, and the United Kingdom).
