The students were shown the bridge, the navigational steering, radar system, chartroom and the manner in which courses are plotted. Received by the captain in the lounge, each student was given a beautiful white and gold ashtray with the ship's monogram by Kapitan Gewandt.

FALCON BASEBALL TEAM OPENS '59 SEASON WITH 9-2 WIN OVER MT. SAN ANTONIO

Cerritos college opened its 1959 basettall season Friday with a creditable 9-2 victory over Mt. San Antonio college s Mountaineers. The game was played at Welsh Park in Pomona. Cerritos' Falcons combined some outstanding pitching performances with a deadly grouped barrage of hits to grab the win. Lefthanded Pitcher Barney Sims was credit with the victory. Sims toiled the first three innings, pitching no-hit, no-run ball. He was followed by Righthanders Al Petrushkin and Dick Wantz. Petrushkin was tagged for both of the Mountaineer runs, though one was unearned. The three Falcon hurlers gave up only six hits to the potent Mt. SAC squad.

Monday's baseball game with Santa Ana has been rescheduled for either Thursday or Saturday, after being rained out. The Falcons will play Fullerton on Wednesday, Long Beach on Friday. All three games are scheduled as away contests.

Cerritos' baseballers started to work early on one of the four opposing throwers. In the second inning, the Falcons tallied three times to grab a lead they never relinquished. Four more runs in the third inning and a pair in the seventh completed the job.

RED-HOT FALCON BASKETBALLERS HAVE CHANCE TO WIND UP SEASON IN BIGGEST FLASH OF GLORY

Cerritos' basketball team has been eliminated from the WSC championship by simple arithmetic...but the Falcons have a chance to decide the winner of the title.

A Saturday night game with Ventura's hopeful Pirates and a following Tuesday night contest with Glendale gives the Falcon squad a chance pull at a twin-upset. The stage was set for the possibility, when Ventura sent the league into a tie with a 68-64 win over Glendale's Vaqueros.

The Falcons under Coach John Caine were plagued by narrow losses in the first-round, winning only one of six contests. They bounced back from those debacles to wallop Compton, stun Pierce in a double-overtime, then easily get by Pasadena, 69-53, last weekend.

The triple set of wins over teams that had previously toppled Cerritos gave the Falcons a good chance to finish in the first division.

Cerritos won its 4th straight WSC basketball game Tuesday by defeating Los Angeles 80-78 in an overtime game. Guard Steve Casey grabbed game high-point honors with 22. The victory put the Falcons in a 3rd-place tie.

Both Ventura and Glendale tagged Cerritos with losses earlier in the loop season, but both were narrow squeaks. Ventura slipped by Cerritos by two points, and Glendale by seven.

This Saturday night, the Falcons will host Ventura at Norwalk High School. The game will get underway at 8:00 p.m. On Tuesday, the game action will take place at Glendale College's floor beginning at 8:00 p.m.
