Cerritos College's student council neared the conclusion of its planning for the student body elections set for early May. **FALCON BASEBALLERS SEARCH FOR REVENGE IN GLENDALE CONFERENCE GAME FRIDAY**

Revenge will be the foremost thought when the Falcon baseball team meets Glendale College this Friday afternoon at 3 p.m. at the Falcon Field. The important WSC game will be a rematch of a contest played between the two clubs earlier this season in the Azusa baseball tournament. Glendale's Vaqueros snapped a long Falcon win streak, 2-1, in a 10-inning marathon.

For the critical league game, Cerritos Coach Wally Kincaid has named either freshman left hander pitcher Barney Sims (5-2) or sophomore pitcher Craig Sheff (2-1) to go against the Vaqs. Glendale will counter with its ace hurler and the conqueror of Cerritos in the tourney game, Ken Lawrence. Lawrence and Sheff battled each other through nine scoreless innings before both teams broke out in scoring bursts in the first extra-inning at Azusa.

Cerritos College won its fourth Western States Conference game by defeating Ventura 12-5 Tuesday at Ventura. Pitcher Dick Wantz went the distance to gain his 7th win. Third baseman Jim Wolfsberger hit a 385 ft. home run to spark the victory.

For Cerritos, the game represents a very important step in staying in the Western State Conference race. In a torrid pennant race the Falcons need the victory to stay in the front division and complete the first-round of loop play in good position.

Glendale's lone league win in its first four games came against potent Pasadena City college. The Vaqs dropped other contests to Pierce, Ventura and Los Angeles. Cerritos dropped a 4-2 tilt to Pasadena's Lancers.

Last year the Falcons swept both games of a two-game series with the Vaqueros. Sheff placed his name on the WSC's all-time honor list with a sparkling, 2-0, no-hit, no-run game against Glendale. Cerritos took a wild 26-10 contest in the other game.

The conclusion of this week will set the stage for next Tuesday's titanic. The Falcons will host powerful Compton College in a game that could decide the eventual conference champion. Kincaid announced that one of three of his ace righthanders will go against the Tartars, Dick Wantz (6-1), Al Petrushkin (5-1) or Sheff. All three have seen action against Compton in two meetings this year. Petrushkin got credit for the win in the opening league game at Compton, when the Falcons humiliated the Tartars, 15-6. Wantz started against Compton in the Fullerton Easter Tournament and failed to gain a decision when a series of errors hurt an otherwise fine performance. Sheff hurled excellent relief against the Tartars in the Easter tourney and may get the starting nod off of that performance.

**FALCON BASEBALLERS STUN LOS ANGELES IN IMPORTANT WSC VICTORY - 8 - 2**

Cerritos College's baseball team stung Los Angeles City College, 8-2, in an important Western State Conference game last Friday afternoon. The Falcons defeated the winner of the Azusa baseball tournament at Falcon Field, Cerritos' home park.

Winner of the critical league game was hulking right-hander Al Petrushkin. The ex-Montebello High ace went the distance in racking up his fifth win of the year, his second in WSC play. Petrushkin gave up only two hits, both in the third inning. The freshman hurler survived a shaky first four innings, then came on strong, facing only 18 batters in the last five frames.

The Cerritos victory kept the Falcons in the top part of the loop race, only one-half game behind Compton. Both the Falcons and Los Angeles were tied for second place going into the afternoon's contest. The Cub loss was their second consecutive defeat and damaged a strong bid to stay in pennant contention.

**PIERCE FALLS TO CERRITOS TENNIS SQUAD IN AMAZING 5-4 WIN; DOUBLES IS MARGIN**

Cerritos College's amazing tennis team, behind brilliant courtwork in doubles matches, defeated Pierce College, 5-4, at the loser's courts last Friday afternoon.

Trailing in match score, 2-4, after completion of singles play, the Falcon netters came back to win all three doubles matches in straight sets.

Heroes of the doubles triumphs were Ty Lavery's and Glenn Payne's 6-2, 6-3 victory, Gerald Dry's and Bob Robbins 6-4, 6-2 win, and Sandy Kerr's and Scott Iverson's 6-3, 6-3 performance.

Payne and Robbins also came through in top style to win singles matches. Payne took 11-9, 6-1 set wins, while Robbins notched 6-3, 2-6, 6-4 victories.

The Cerritos squad tackles mighty Los Angeles City College on Friday at Griffith Park. The Falcons met Pasadena at Cerritos' home courts on Tuesday.

**TRIO OF CRITICAL WSC DIAMOND GAMES FOR FRIDAY PLAY; LEADERSHIP IN DOUBT**

Friday afternoon's three 3 p.m. games will complete the first round of play in a torrid WSC baseball pennant race. LACC Cubs will meet Pasadena at the Pasadena campus diamond; Glendale will play Cerritos at the Falcon Field; and Ventura College will be at Pierce's campus park. Compton draws a bye Friday.

Interest is centered in all three of the tilts as teams are trying to get position for the second-round's home stretch drive. With the loop season nearly half-over, not a single conference team has been eliminated from the race.
