**FALCON THURSDAY NIGHT CLASSES WILL GET
FIRST PEEK AT MODERN NEW ALONDRA CAMPUS**

Class meeting on Thursday, April 30, will have an opportunity to get the first official look at the new Cerritos College campus. Only classes meeting at 6 p.m. or earlier will go ahead as regularly scheduled at the Artesia High campus.

The program at the new college is in co-operation with Artesia High, which is holding its annual open house in commemoration of Public Schools Week.

Falcon students are to report to Alondra campus at 7 p.m. for a two-hour program. Parking has been provided for visitors along Studebaker Road and Alondra.

Students will meet in four groups. Math and engineering groups will meet in room 2 of the Liberal Arts Building; Social Science in room 4 of the Liberal Arts Building; Humanities and Business Education in room 2 of the Business Education Building; Science and HPER sections in room 15 of the Business Education Building.

The Liberal Arts Building is the college's only two-story building and runs parallel to Alondra near the northwest corner of the grounds. The Business Education Building is located in the northwest corner of the campus and runs parallel to Studebaker Road.

Both students and faculty are set to participate, with plans for four different areas to be covered. Included in the discussion areas will be a peek at the complete building plans, plans for new courses, distribution of fall schedules, explanation of the summer program and the college's student activities program. Student Council members and the Falconettes, women's service organization, will act as guides. Instructors will accompany each group to answer questions and attendance is to be taken.

Practices for students interested in trying out for song leaders and yell leaders will be held three times in May; all three practice sessions will be in preparation for the main judging that will take place on May 14 in the Artesia High gym.

Practice sessions will be held on Saturday, May 2, 9-11 a.m. at Cerritos Athletic Office, Alondra; Thursday, May 7, 7-9 p.m. at the Cerritos Field House; Saturday, May 9, 9-11 a.m. at the Athletic Office.

Students interested in either of the pep groups must fill out and return an information sheet to Miss Dozier, faculty supervisor for the event. Deadline for returning form is May 9; forms are available at the Student Activity Office at Artesia High.

Students at Cerritos must have a C average and carry at least 10½ units next fall with membership in the associated student body to be eligible to try out. Students entering Cerritos as freshmen next fall must have had a C average in the junior and senior years of high school and plan to carry at least 10½ units of work in addition to being members of the student body.

FALCON NINE UNLEASHES 18 HIT ATTACK TO DOWN PIERCE, 12-6

Cerritos College's baseball team unleashed an 18 hit attack to crush Pierce College yesterday at the loser's diamond. The Falcons swamped four Brahma hurlers in the 12-6 victory that kept them on top of the WSC.

Cerritos' Al Petrushkin was given credit for the win, his third in loop play without a loss, but needed relief help from Barney Sims in the seventh inning.

The game was as wild as the score might indicate. The Falcons scored in the first inning, only to see Pierce come right back to tie it up. Cerritos went ahead with two in the second, again seeing the Brahmas tie the score. A 3-3 deadlock existed until the sixth, when the Falcons broke loose for two runs, adding another pair in the seventh. Pierce came back strong in the seventh, narrowly missing a chance to knot the game again with three tallies. The Falcons added insurance runs in the eighth and ninth, with a single score in the eighth, four in the final frame.

The Falcon defense, although making five errors, also came up with four sterling double plays in the long encounter. The twin killings killed Pierce rallies on each occasion. The Brahmas, last year's WSC champions, got 12 hits.

Five Cerritos batters combined to get two or more hits in the game. Catcher Eddie Rybold led the parade with four in five plate appearances. Outfielder Boyd Trimble and Shortstop Lou Sanchez both got three, while Outfielder Al Bishop and Petrushkin collected a pair.

FALCONS HOST PASADENA NINE ON FRIDAY IN IMPORTANT CONFERENCE BASEBALL GAME

Cerritos College's high-flying baseball team can take an important step closer to the Western State Conference pennant Friday afternoon when they host Pasadena City College in a game of critical importance to both clubs.

Pasadena's Lancers defeated Cerritos in first round play, handing the Falcons the only WSC loss of the round. The Lancers picked up a pair of losses in the first round, one to Glendale and the other to Compton.

The important contest will be played at Falcon Field at 3 p.m.

Friday's game will also be a rubber contest between the two clubs this season. Cerritos topped Pasadena 11-1 in an opening game of the Pierce Invitational Tournament. The Lancers grabbed the single loop tilt, 4-2, rallying for both of the winning runs in a late-inning surge. The two teams split in WSC results last season.

Coach Wally Kincaid of Cerritos will probably send either Dick Wantz (8-1) or Barney Sims (6-2) against Pasadena. Sims has picked up both of the Lancer decisions this season, both games included as excellent pitching performances.

Pasadena will counter with either of its ace duo, Righthander Henry Perez or Lefthander Herb Hippauf. Hippauf won the league game against Cerritos while Perez was a victim of a loss to the Falcons in '58.

Cerritos has played two of its second round games, ripping Compton by a 9-5 score in the opener and meeting Pierce this Tuesday. Pasadena reversed a first round loss to Glendale, 6-2 last week, and met Compton on Tuesday.

Pasadena will be up against a major Falcon jinx. Cerritos has been very close to unbeatable at home, mustering a 13-2 record at the Falcon's new ballpark. Cerritos has not lost a league game at home.

The Lancers got off to a slow start in both season play and conference action, picking up steam after a mediocre beginning. Pasadena's major non-conference exploit was reaching the championship finals of the Azusa Tournament. The Lancers lost the final game to Los Angeles.

Cerritos by adding two major tournament titles this season and an outstanding win-loss record has become the first Falcon varsity team other than football to win a major championship. At one point the Falcons won 11 straight games.

TRIO OF IMPORTANT LEAGUE GAMES ON FRIDAY FOR WSC PENNANT RACE

Three top-ranking WSC baseball teams will see action Friday in crucial league contests. All Friday games will get underway at 3 p.m.

The day's most important game will be between Cerritos and Pasadena at Falcon Field. Pasadena handed the Falcons their only first round loss of the conference race.

LACC will play at Compton and Ventura will meet Glendale at Glendale.
