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REGISTRATION FOR FALL SETS NEW HIGH;  
OVER 2,200 BECOME FALCON STUDENTS

Cerritos College opened its doors for the Fall Semester registrations on August 25th.

Registrations were expected to be high, but they surpassed all expectations. As of September 23 over 2200 students had applied for entrance at Cerritos.

Compared to the Fall of '57 registrations have almost doubled. The majority of students are on a part time basis, the ratio being approximately 4 part time students to 1 full time (12 units or more). The girls may drool over the fact that there are 3 males to every female in the classrooms, but that marital status of the students has yet to be checked upon!

Under the direction of Mrs. Margaret Sanders a full IBM system was instituted to expedite the process of registrations. The offices, located on Studebaker Road, have been working full time to set up and operate this project efficiently. Last fall a Service Bureau in Long Beach was utilized for this purpose. This would have proven very inadequate this term due to the overwhelming influx of students.

At Cerritos the departments and courses are grouped under 8 major divisions as follows: Business Education, Health and Physical Education, Social Sciences, Humanities, Science, Engineering and Mathematics, and Technology and Industry.

To give you a slight understanding of the courses followed by the majority of Cerritos students the following figures have been made available to us: Science, Engineering and Mathematics had the largest enrollment, the foremost course registered for was Engineering (233); Social Sciences (Accounting 134); Technology and Industry (Electronics 124); Humanities (Education (University) 35) (Education (State) 100); Health and Physical Education (92) and Business Education. Most popular was Secretarial Training.

TALON MARKS NOT MUCH, BUT A START

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VOTING FOR ASB OFFICES TODAY AND  
TOMORROW; RECORD VOTE PREDICTED

Elections for offices involving Associated Women Students and Associated Men Students got off to a start the last two weeks. Petitions for offices were taken out September 15, and were turned in to the Student Personnel Office last week. Today and tomorrow, Falcon students will be given an opportunity to vote for the candidates of your choice. Many jobs are open to students who are willing to work on school activities.

The Freshman and Sophomore classes will each elect a president, vice-president, and secretary-treasurer to represent them. The Freshman class will have to decide between Pat Vigil and Darlene Bitter for the office of vice-president. Jeanette Batley is the only candidate for secretary-treasurer. Unopposed, Dallas Moon is running for Freshman Class president. Vying for Sophomore Class president are Joe Mehrbrodt and Ronald Dowd. No petitions were turned in for the other offices.

AWS offices open are president, vice-president, and secretary. Vice-president and secretary positions are the only AMS offices to be filled, as Taryn Clark was elected president last year. Margie Schlarman is the lone candidate for AWS president. Petitions for the other offices were not turned in.

Elected officers must carry a minimum of 10½ units of work, earn a passing grade in all courses, and maintain a "C" average during their term of office. Each candidate shall be responsible for removing his own posters by 10 p.m. each day, and permanently the night of elections. These regulations were set up by the Student Council last year, and must be complied with in order to be eligible for office.

Caine has 18 men out for the squad, a larger turnout than expected. The squad will be anchored by three returning lettermen. Cerritos has quite a crop of outstanding freshman also.

The cagers are now running with the cross country team. They will practice at Norwalk high school, where all their home games will be played. The scheduled opener is November 29 against Mt. San Antonio College.
