...If the 1958 Cerritos grid team keeps up its tremendous offensive pace, it will be assured of rewriting the Falcon record book set by last year's JRB team. The footballers are running ahead of marks set in scoring, running offense, and passing offense.

...Defensively, the Falcons are just slightly behind the record, although the great brick wall defense of Cerritos is running ahead of the rushing defensive mark set in '57.

....Halfback Bob Bagwell is running neck-and-neck with Ray Adermann's mark in rushing and scoring.

...By hitting eight of nine attempts on conversions last weekend against Ventura, the Falcons are batting .542 for extra-point attempts, the highest mark they have had all season. Cerritos has connected on seven of 10 kicking conversions for 70%.

...In their first four games, the Falcons have rolled up 1.535 yards and 163 points. Last year, Cerritos had gained only 853 yards and scored 110 points.

FALCONS FLY TO EASTERN ARIZONA FOR BIG INTERSECTIONAL CONTEST: SEEK FOURTH WIN

Cerritos College's football team leaves Friday morning by Western Air Lines in the first stage of their journey to Thatcher, Arizona, where they will meet Eastern Arizona on Saturday night. The Falcons will be shooting for their fourth straight win of the '58 season in the intersectional titanic.

The Cerritos grid team will leave Los Angeles International Airport at 6 a.m. on Flight 484, arriving in Phoenix at 9:20 a.m. A special bus will take them to Safford where they will stay during the three-day trip. Coach Earl Klapstein and his staff have scheduled an evening workout at the Eastern Arizona stadium Friday night. Following the game on Saturday night, the Falcons will return to Safford, leaving Sunday, again by Western Air Lines, arriving in Los Angeles at 5:20 p.m. on Flight 209.

Eastern Arizona's Monsters, a team that has in years past lived up to that name, is being taken quite seriously by the Falcon staff. A tough team to beat in their own backyard, the Monsters have wallowed through what up to now has been a bot-and-cold season. In an era from 1946 to 1957, Eastern Arizona teams have rung up a record of 14 wins, 3 losses, and 1 tie against California jaysee teams.

Opposing the "Arizona jinx" will be one of the nation's greatest junior college offensive machines. Cerritos, winner of three of four games, is averaging 383.8 yards per game running and passing. The Falcons are also averaging 40.7 points per game and have allowed only two touchdowns in their last three games.

Coach Klapstein will start a backfield that has tallied 98 points, grounded out 15 touchdowns, and has piled up a fantastic 1,154 yards in total offense. The quartet includes Quarterback Bill Nelsen, Halfbacks Bob Bagwell and Dave Godwin, and Fullback Bob Lyons. The Falcon forward wall, which in two games has allowed opponents only 33.0 yards per game on the ground, is shooting for a new defensive record. The brick wall defense has allowed four '58 opponents an average of 103.0 yards per game running, a mark running well ahead of the '57 record of 123.9 yards per contest.

Cerritos, whose only blot came in a stunning 28-27 upset to Riverside in the season opener, obviously is aiming for a return to the nation's top ten jaysee grid teams. A double bye in the schedule has delayed the move, but even with that handicap, Cerritos has romped in its last two outings.

A press box observer at Ventura last weekend, ranked this year's Cerritos team as one of the truly all-time best two-year teams, a consideration that has usually been reserved for later in the season. Klapstein, no optimist about the job that is ahead, stated, 'We have a real job to do. We have five straight ball games ahead of us, three of them on the road, and they are going to get tougher as we go along."

The Falcon mentor also warned about Eastern Arizona, reminding that, This has been a real tough year for our conference in non league games." Klapstein was referring to the fact that Western State Conference teams have dropped 5 of 17 games played so far this season.

SEVEN CONFERENCE GRID TEAMS GO INTO ACTION THIS WEEKEND: SECOND-PLACE IN QUESTION

Three Western State Conference games and one nonconference contest will be features of this week's junior college football action.

League action will get underway Friday night at Glendale High School, when once-beaten Los Angeles City College meets winless Glendale College. Kickoff time is 8 p.m.

Saturday night Western State Conference games will see Pasadena City College fighting it out with vastly improved Pierce College at Reseda High School; Ventura College traveling to Compton College for a game at Ramsaur Stadium; and conference-leading Cerritos College taking on an intersectional foe at Eastern Arizona. Kickoff times for all Saturday games will be 8 p.m.

In last weekend's action, Cerritos' Falcons improved their league standings with a crushing 66-6 win over Ventura, Los Angeles' Cubs swept to a 38-8 win over Pasadena's Lancers; the Pierce Brahmas rallied for a second-half 34-14 win over Glendale; and rapidly improving Compton, missed a near upset over nationally ranked Boise, Idaho in the Bronco's own backyard, 21-8.

CERRITOS GRIDDERS PUT TEETH BACK INTO EXTRA-POINT: EIGHT FOR NINE AGAINST VENTURA

By hitting on 8 of 9 conversion attempts against Ventura last weekend, Cerritos is batting .542 for the extra-point attempts. The Falcons have gone for the two-point conversion 54.2% of the time, relying on the traditional place-kick the remainder. Under collegiate rules this year, a team may elect to run or pass the ball after a touchdown for a possible two-points, or kick for the single point.

Of the 14 two points attempts, Cerritos has connected on six for a 42.9%. The Falcons have a 70% average on kicks, hitting 7 out of 10. The two-pointers have been divided evenly among running and passing, three apiece.
