Students Entertain

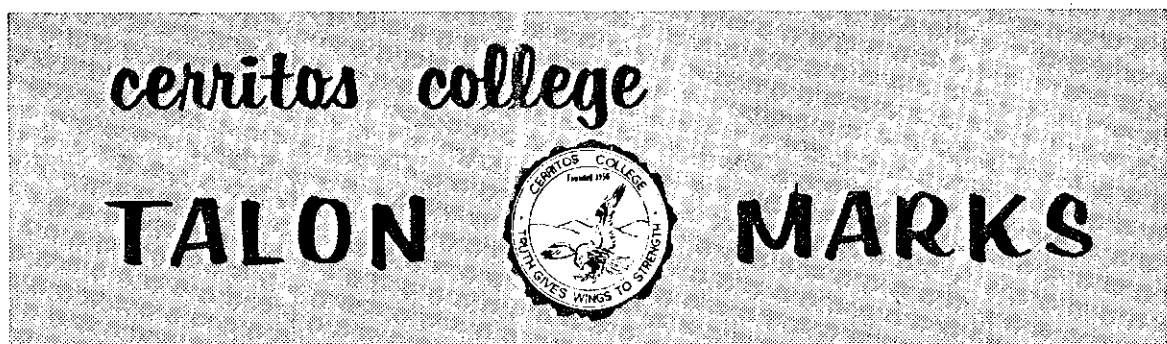

Bookstore In Final Location

The Student Store is now open for business in the new Student Center. The students who attended Cerritos last year may remember the old store which was only 11x33 square feet, a great contrast to the 1505 square feet which makes up the new store which also has a storage area 8x9 feet.

More Counters

There are three check-out counters to be used during the year, and two more counters that can be used during the beginning of the semester. With the many counters to serve students, the long waiting in line will be eliminated. Although the store is mainly self-service, there are a few items which must be asked for, though all items are on display somewhere throughout the store and can be easily reached. Displays are much better shown due to the enlargement of the store. The cost of equipment in the sales area alone is around \$11,000.

Increase In Business

Monday, December 21, was the day workmen moved out of the old store into the new facilities, at that time, Bob Beauchamp, manager, reported business was three times ahead of last year's figures with an increase expected to come when the complete inventory is completed. A loading ramp in the back makes it easy for workmen to unload supplies.

When moving into the new store, salesmen from various stationery stores came to help Mr. Beauchamp transport things into the new area.

Modern Design

The layout of the store is a result of careful study of other college bookstores, and the best features were considered. About twenty drawings were submitted before the best suitable one was found. The store is completely modern, having air-conditioning for the summer and piped-in music in the sales area as an added feature. There are over 275 different items in the store now, and this figure will rise to around 425 before the close of the school year in June.

New Campus Move Is Top 1959 News Story

Journalism students at Cerritos College selected the move to the new campus as the year's top news story. Balloting was held in three journalism classes to select the top stories for 1959.

Ranked as the second biggest story was the establishment of the award and honor systems to pick outstanding students at the conclusion of each college year and the growing interest in associated student body affairs.

The top news stories as Falcon journalists saw them:

TOP STORY FOR 1959—Started in September of 1959 and was the result of years of planning by college and community leaders. The move into the new college campus and the full-time day and night schedule offered new educational opportunities for hundreds of local students. The tremendous increase in enrollment because of the transition was highly indicative of the future that has been well planned for Cerritos. Although some phases of the campus are still under construction, college officials expect that the rapid three-year construction program that is ahead, will complete the campus and make it one of the most modern educational institutions in the nation.

STORY NUMBER TWO—The establishment of an award system for the most deserving and active Falcon students was set up in June. Selected as man of the year was Tarvin Clark, Falcon student body president at the time. Woman of the year honors went to Christine Lindstrom. The freshman man of the year award went to Dallas Moon, who turned right around and was elected student body president for the current school year. Freshman woman of the year was Donna Clark. Receiving the athlete of the year award was Frank Bilyev. An even more extensive award system is planned for the coming year.

STORY NUMBER THREE—The third top news story was an accumulation of athletic victories and championships that has gained the Falcons a national reputation. The year of 1959 could be summarized like this: January-February;

After a mediocre start, the Falcon basketball team whipped through five straight victories in WSC play and knocked one team out of championship contention; March-April: Cerritos' baseball team goes on one 11-game winning streak, picks up two tournament championships, then goes on to win the WSC co-championship title; May: Just started for the first time, the Falcon tennis team beats Compton twice and runs up a remarkable 5-7 season record; October-November: While Cerritos' cross country team is stunning Southern California opponents and nearly winning the WSC title, the Falcon football team moves to an 8-1-0 grid record and a three-way tie for the conference title. It is the third straight nationally ranked team for Cerritos; December: Cerritos' basketball team, already with the best pre-league record in its history, makes it to the finals of the Chaffey Tournament, the first such honor in Falcon cage history.

STORY NUMBER FOUR—In October, Cerritos opened its doors to a record throng of the community, staging the first open house on the new campus. A series of educational displays in many of the academic divisions were highlighted by actual demonstrations and performances.

STORY NUMBER FIVE—Cerritos' second homecoming came in November and was the biggest and best yet. A parade around the new stadium field saw a number of top float entries. Homecoming Queen was Sylvia Besser, a sophomore student from Bellflower High. The Falcon's new 12,000 seat stadium was used for the first time and the Cerritos gridders made it a fine night by topping Los Angeles City College, 38-20, in a WSC game.

STORY NUMBER SIX—The sixth top story was a dramatic quick change of coaches in January. Following Earl Klapstein's two-year reign as head football coach, the appointment of Chief Assistant Walt Hackett was made in the early part of the month. Hackett, while at a coaching con-

Good Holiday Cage Results

The Cerritos basketball squad enjoyed the "Holidays" by participating in two tournaments and playing a single game two days after returning to school.

The results of these games have seen two major "firsts" accomplished by a Falcon cage squad: (1) Cerritos reached the finals of a tournament; (2) Prior to the Modesto Tourney which is the Falcon's last engagement before starting their conference race, Cerritos has established the best pre-conference record (2-5) of any other Falcon hoop team in history.

The tournaments include the Chaffey and Sam Barry Invationals. In the former, Cerritos whipped Citrus (58-51), upset Glendale (74-49), and highly seeded San Diego (68-61) before bowing out to powerful Fullerton (74-57) in the finals. Falcon Forward Jerry Dotson was selected on the All Tournament Team.

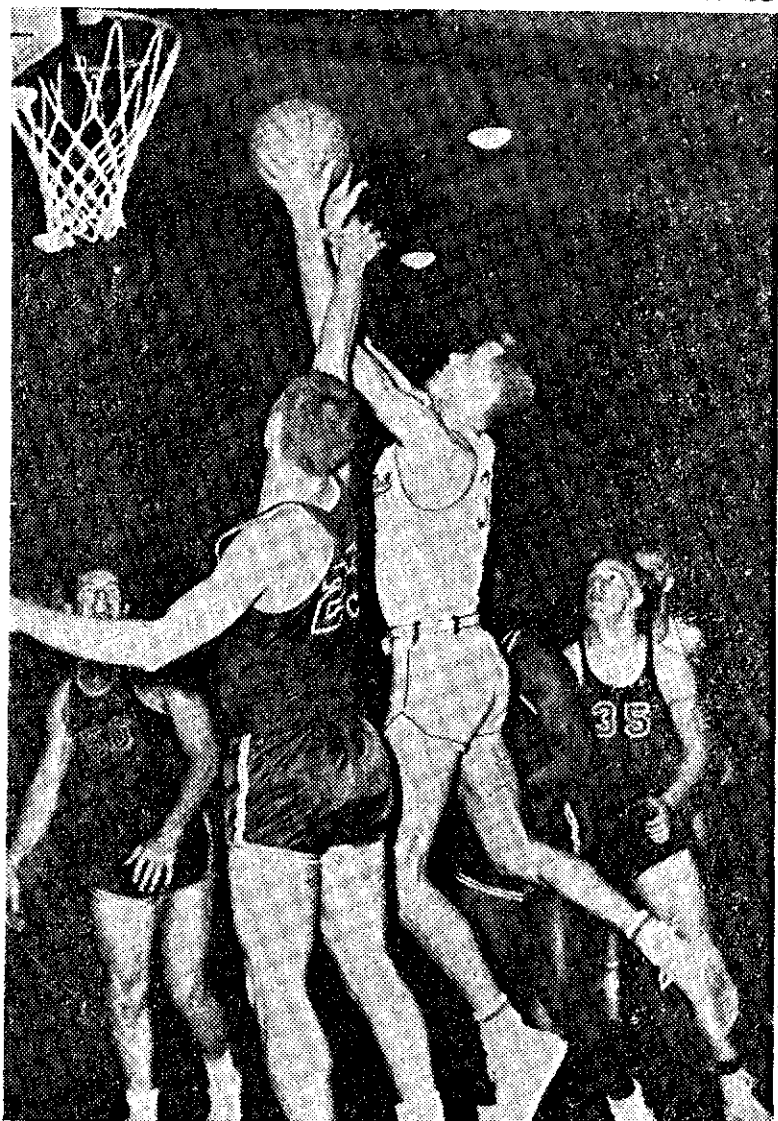
Cerritos' showing prompted one local sports writer to tab the Falcons as the "Cinderella" team of the tourney, a name which most Cerritos sports followers are familiar with concerning another sport.

In the Sam Barry tourney, Cerritos avenged an earlier loss to East Los Angeles by whipping the Huskies 60-57 in the first round. In the second round, the Falcons were edged by Long Beach, 64-59.

After the heavy holiday action, Cerritos returned to Norwalk Gym on Tuesday, Jan. 5 and trounced Long Beach Navy, 65-50. A cold first half found the Falcons leading only 27-24 but Cerritos came on strong in the second half and Coach John Caine emptied the bench in order to give all of his squad a workout before leaving for the Modesto Tournament.

Cerritos played a strong defensive game which accounted for Navy's low shooting percentage.

Guard Tony Rosales paced Falcon scorers with 14, followed closely by Forward Scott Iversen with 13.

Hall is a graduate of College of Pacific and was center and captain of Amos Stagg's last COP squad. Stagg was added to the advisory coaching staff at Stockton while Hall was a coach.

Hall's all-time coaching record is 41-13-4.

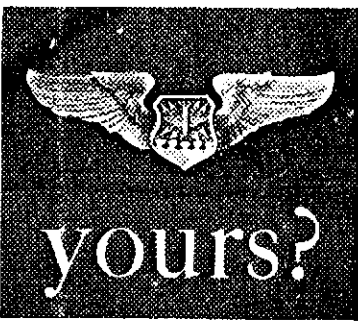
Intramurals Set For Top Event

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1960 Falcon Tracksters Face Biggest Schedule

The most extensive track and field schedule in Cerritos College's history has been announced by Gene Martin, Falcon athletic director. The 1960 schedule will send Cerritos trackmen into 10 dual meets and six relay events, in addition to the conference, Southern California and state meets.

Baseballers Get Nine Vets

Cerritos College opened its pre-season baseball training camp with 35 candidates hoping to make the squad that was co-Western States Conference champions last year. Among the baseballers that greeted Coach Wally Kincaid, were nine returning lettermen.

WSC Stars

Two first team All-WSC returnees are among the nine veterans that reported. Outfielder Dallas Moon, a .350 hitter in the regular season and a .388 hitter during the loop campaign, and Shortstop Lou Sanchez, a .371 hitter for the season, are the two first team members.

All three Falcon players that made the second team All-WSC squad are back and include Pitcher Dick Wantz (9-2), Second Baseman Ken Roberts (.317) and Third Baseman Jim Wolfberger (.307).

Veterans

Other vets include Pitcher Barney Sims (6-2), Pitcher Al Petrushkin (8-1), Outfielder Boyd Trimble (.333) and Outfielder Mike Kettle (.250).

The Falcons garnered a 26-8 record in 1959, winning two major baseball tournament championships, in addition to posting the 9-3 mark that won a share of the league crown.

Top Freshmen

A number of promising freshmen baseball prospects are included in the number of candidates. Outstanding prospects include Pitcher Dick Sauers (Montebello High), Pitcher Dick White (Sierra High), Pitcher Butch Hughes (Pius X High), Pitcher Rennie Simmons (Santa Fe High), Catcher Mike Carney (Bellflower High), Catcher Bob Olson (California High), Infielder Mike Pilcher (Mark Keppel High), Outfielder Joe Gibbs (Santa Fe High), Outfielder Larry Heathershaw (Bellflower High) and Outfielder-Infielder Gene Neri (Earl Warren High).

Time Trials

Dave Kamanski, Cerritos track and field coach, will put his team through time trials on Friday, February 19, then will open up against Long Beach City College in a dual meet on Friday, February 26.

Cerritos will host perennial national power Los Angeles City College on Friday, March 18, in the first home track meet.

WSC Host

A highlight of the 1960 schedule will be Cerritos' hosting of the Western States Conference preliminaries and finals on May 3 and May 6. It will be the first time a conference event of this magnitude has ever been held at Cerritos.

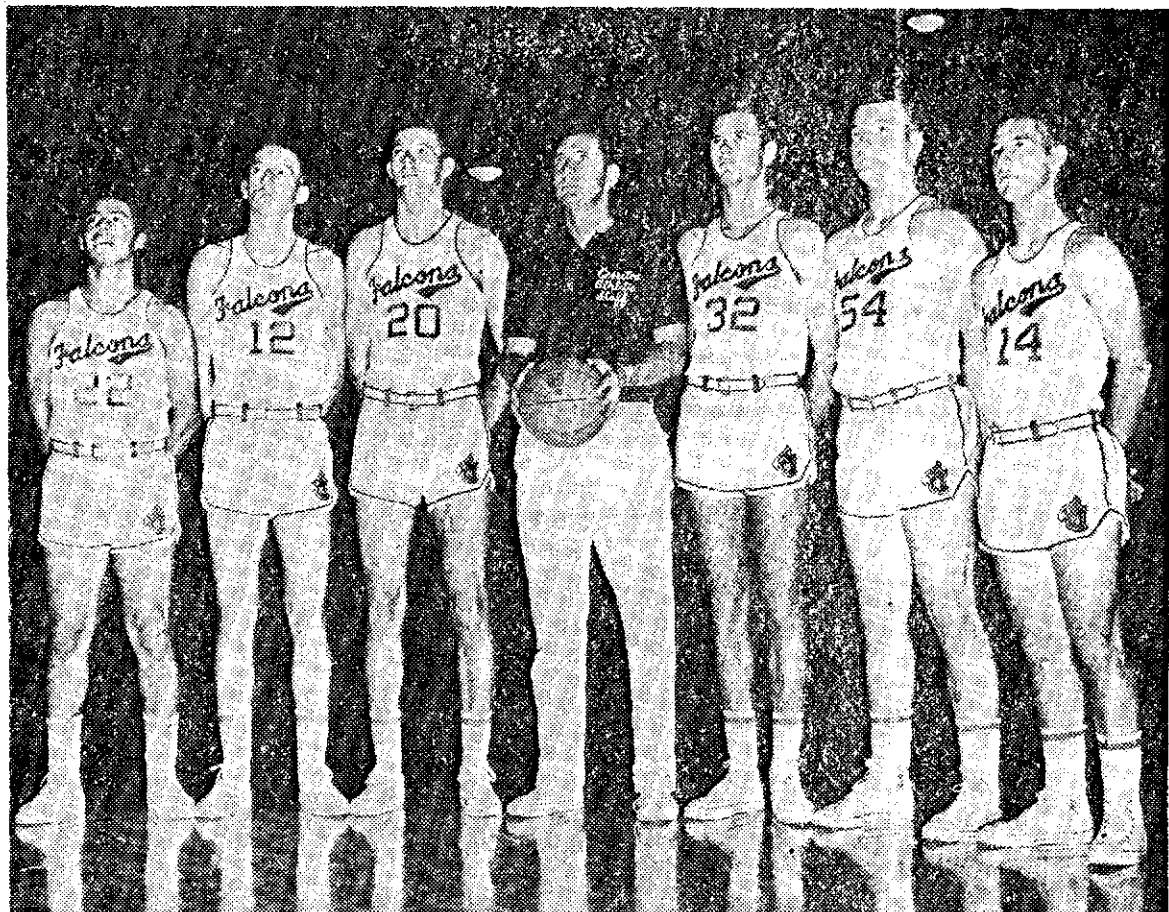
STORY NUMBER SEVEN—After the tragic death of a student in a hazing incident at a university, Falcon officials moved quickly to insure that Cerritos organizations were operating within the regulations of the college. The October news story was a big one all across the nation and brought into even closer harmony the working arrangements between organizations and the college's purpose.

STORY NUMBER EIGHT—Two student government conferences, one in the spring and the other in the fall, highlighted the most active year yet in Cerritos ASB circles. During the spring, the Falcons were a co-host to the statewide jaysee student government affair. During the fall, four Falcon student representatives flew to Berkeley, to participate in that event.

STORY NUMBER NINE—December's orphanage party, one in which Falcon hearts and donations went out to an orphanage in the Southland, was picked as the ninth best story. Falcon students played Santa Claus to a boy's orphanage in one of the most successful events ever staged.

STORY NUMBER TEN—Cerritos opened its summer school in July, allowing students to use the new campus facilities for the first time. The record enrollment exceeded all hopes and insured Cerritos of a top year-around program in the future. Classes were held just at night for the opening year of this program. The appointment of Marshall Treat as Dean of the Summer Session was part of the story.

Luckless Lancers Hit Soph Laden Falcons

Cerritos College's basketball team opens its home conference season on Saturday night, hosting Pasadena City College. The game will be played at Norwalk High's gymnasium, with tipoff planned for 8 p.m.

Both teams saw action in Tuesday games. Cerritos playing at Pierce and Pasadena entertaining Compton.

Pierce Tops Cerritos, 62-51

Cerritos College's basketball team lost its opening Western States Conference game, 62-51, losing to Pierce College on the winner's court last Tuesday.

Pierce Hot

The Falcons, after two brilliant game performances at Modesto the weekend before, failed to play up to their defensive reputation. Pierce's Brahmas, victors in only one of 15 games prior to Tuesday's match, hit 49% the first half, then came back with a second half performance that nearly matched the first period. Cerritos, suffering one of its coldest nights yet, was outshot 28-20 in the field goal department.

Best Record

Cerritos' Falcons go into the Western States Conference season with their best record in history. Following the Modesto Tournament over last weekend, the Falcons boasted a 9-6 mark and won the respect of the state's top jaycee teams with a splendid two-game performance in the tourney.

Good Showing

Not figured to be a match for the traditionally strong Northern California squads, Cerritos manhandled the Big Eight Conference's San Mateo in a tight defensive game. Going up against Allan Hancock in the second contest, Cerritos kept the pressure on the eventual tourney winner for the entire contest, losing in the last seconds on a stolen ball by a single point.

Pasadena, still in the throes of rebuilding a sagging basketball power, has been able to pick up only a single win this year.

Series History

The all-time series between the two clubs stands at 2-2. The Lancers will be fighting a jinx that has seen them fail to win a game on the Falcon home court. In Cerritos' first cage season, the teams split three-point victories, Pasadena winning the opener, 76-73, then having the Falcons come back to win the second game, 50-47. Last year, Pasadena snapped a long losing streak by upsetting Cerritos, 65-60, in the first match, but the Falcons manhandled the Lancers, 69-53, in the most decisive win in the series.

Falcon Coach John Caine will probably stick with his all-sophomore starting lineup of Forwards Scott Iverson and Jerry Dotson, Center Dick Roche, Guards Tony Rosales and Bill Bogdanoff.

Stumbling Along In Sports

The fair city of Modesto, which played a very congenial role as host to our basketball squad last week at the 22nd annual Modesto tournament, is to be congratulated for their fine tournament, and even more, for the excellent support they gave to the entrants through their attendance.

After performing in front of such dismal crowds as those who watch the Falcon cagers at Norwalk High, it is inspiring and gratifying to play in a basketball-minded city like Modesto. The people not only came in throngs to see their own jaycee team in action (although Modesto JC has won only three games this year it still performs in front of a large, vigorous packed house), but also turns out in good numbers to view every game from 10 a.m. up to the finale at nine that night. They didn't show just for the winners either, but supported the consolation and poorer teams as well.

When the Cerritos cagers played Hancock in the quarterfinals, they played before the largest gathering to witness them this year, and the approximate 50 percent who rooted for the Falcons was probably twice as many as have ever supported the team at Norwalk. And we weren't even their hometowners!!!

As far as I'm concerned Cerritos actually outscored Hancock in the 56-55 loss, 55-54. I can honestly say that the referees ruling that Keith Lindley was guilty of goaltending was the worst call I ever saw. The ball had clearly bounced away from the bucket when Lindley slapped it away after a whistle had blown indicating a foul committed on the shooter. Seconds later the Hancock coach came rushing to the referee yelling that the basket should count. After consultation with the other referee two points were allowed to Hancock. That may not necessarily be the reason Cerritos lost, but if you were looking for one it wouldn't do badly for a start.

Speaking of basketball support at Cerritos—it stinks. Any high school with a thousand students gives better support to their team than does Cerritos with around 2000. It's kind of embarrassing to the team and should be to the student body. This year's team is by no means a bad one either. As of now, its record is 9-6 and the team rates as a definite challenger to the league championship. At most schools the home team is conceded a few points just for playing on their home floor, but this is certainly not true at Cerritos. Why not try to get out and see a few games? Most of the people that I have seen seem to be enjoying themselves in a gym where there is a least a tiny bit of spirit.

2. Examinations, except for physical education activity classes (see supplementary room schedule for physical education activity sections), will be held in the rooms used for the regular class meetings.

3. Classes which regularly meet for a double period one day and a single period another day—e.g., 8-1 Tuesday and 9 Thursday—will take the final examination scheduled for that hour on which the class meets both days—for above example, 9 Tuesday - Thursday.

4. Students who are unable, because of personal illness, to take examinations as scheduled must make individual arrangements with instructors involved. Notification of such illness should be made promptly to the office of admissions in order to avoid receiving a failing grade. EXTENDED DAY CLASSES (6 p.m. or after) will meet for final examinations for two hours on the last regularly scheduled evening of the class (week of January 25-29), except for classes which meet Friday only, which will hold examinations on Friday, January 22.
