Heading the basketball banquet this year for Coach John Caine's fine squad who garnered a seven won, five lost record in Western States Conference play, and a fine overall season record of 16-11, will be Coach Pete Newell from the University of California at Berkeley.

This year's event for the basketball team will be held in the new student center on Monday night, April 4. A fine affair will be served, plus the presentation of awards to this year's bas-ketball team, and a talk by Coach Newell.

Coach Newell is rated by many as one or the greatest defensive coach in college basketball. This year his squad is shooting for a second consecutive NCAA championship, and they look like a solid choice to repeat. In Coach Pete Newell, the Golden Bears from Berkeley have a man with a special touch for putting together fine teams. He guided the University of San Francisco Dons to a startling victory in the 1949 National Invitation Tournament. And his California teams won the championship of the now defunct Pacific Coast Conference the last three years, crowned by a surprising success in the NCAA tournament at Louisville, Ky., last March.

### Mr. Beachomber Contest



Athens, O.—(I.P.)—Pan-Hellenic Council on the campus of Ohio University recently set up a criteria which could be social events are to be held. lowa City, la.—(I.P.)—Colleges and universities in 14 states will embark this week on a new admissions, placement, scholarship and guidance testing program for college-bound high school seniors. The new venture, called the American College Testing (ACT) prgoram, was announced here by E.F. Lindquist, director of the lowa Testing Programs, and Ted McCarrel, registrar and director of admissions at the University of lowa.

Durham, N.H.—(I.P.)—The Special Committee on the Gifted Student at the University of New Hampshire has dran up a report which has been submitted to the Faculty of the College of Liberal Arts. Opinion is divided at present on some of the proposals. The general plan is as follows: All capable students would be identified in New Hampshire high schools. This would include all those who were doing exception work in high school and all those who had the ability but were not workingto capacity.

The first testing would be done in the sophomore year, according to the tentative plan. The top one per cent of these students would then be given either College Boards of their equivalent. This group would probably consist of about forty students with a mean IQ score of 140. Other tests would be given them later on campus.

Baltimore, Md.—(I.P.)—Unable to produce workable solutions to the fraternity housing problem, the presidents of the fourteen chapters on the Johns Hopkins University campus recently listened in silence to Dr. Milton Eisenhower's suggestion for a cooperative housing development to alleviate the crowded dormitory situation, and to apply more suitable fraternity quarters.

Washington, D.C.—(I.P.)—"The English in this paper in not acceptable." This statement will be appearing on many exam papers very shortly, according to Professor Robert Moore, head of the English Composition department. These warnings will be in the form of large orange stickers which will be placed on exam papers and blue books if the English in them in not acceptable.

Other warnings on the sticker may be checked off by the department professors who don't think the English is adequate on papers turned into them. These other warnings range from "your writing is careless," to "the writing is so poor that it has lowered your grade; take this paper to the College Office," and finally, "take this paper to the English department and return it to me with a note suggesting action within one week."

Bethlehem, Pa.—(I.P.)—Dr. Glenn J. Christensen, dean of the College of Arts and Science, Lehigh University, disagrees with the conclusions of the Ruml-Morrison report, Memo to a College Trustee: that the control of the curriculum be taken away from the faculty as a body and that faculty as such are incapable of coping with the problems confronting higher education today.

Dean Christensen based his position on the assumptions that (a) no drastic curriculum changes can succeed without faculty support, (b) efforts to inform will produce larger results from the faculty than from the trustees, and (c) that the proper role of academic deans isto "lead" not "order" the faculty.

# Just A Short Note

Don Costa dropped by the show the other night. Don has conducted the orchestra, during recording dates, for Steve Lawrence, Eydie Gorme and many other stars. Don and I talked for about an hour, after the show, about the business of pop records and the "trends" coming into view this year. Don had some good thoughts on the situation and I'd like to pass some of them along, best as I can recall

our conversation.

"The future of popular music is beginning to look bright once again. After languishing in the throes of musical primitivism for three or four years, the 11 to 14-years olds record devotee new appears to be demanding more musical substance for his time, interest and after-school dollars. This age group make up the "single" record buying audience. Late teen and adults are the ones buying the albums. To the delight of composers, arrangers, musicians, to gain acceptance on the strength of a pounding beat and the teen-ager is making is increasingly difficult for a record a honking tenor saxophone, accompanying a screaming vocalist.

"A comparison of the arrangements made five years ago and today would reveal the strides toward greater sophistication in musical content. To be sure, we are not returning to the popular music of the '30's and '40's in raditional dance band arrangements of the 'swing' era.

"The 'standards' of yesteryear are certainly far from gone. On the contrary, these great soongs are constantly revived for the current market, but with a new twist. More frequently than not, the contemporary arrangements exploit more complex musical ideas than the orginal versions of the song.

"Pop' music has always been a changing, dynamic music because if its requirments for 'something different.' Some of the devices used to achieve this include a different sound, unusual arrangement, a new vocal style,—in essence, a 'gimmick'. Make no mistake, the 'pop' fan often wants to hear what intrigued his ear during the last year, but he wants it fresh, original and more musically satisying. This is a difficult and often incompatible task, but it must be done.

"The 'big beat' of rock 'n' roll is not gone. It is, however, being incorporated into the new order of things. The excitement of the beat is being tempered with musical taste, to produce popular music on a more qualitative level. Whether a new 'golden age' of popular music will emerge is a moot point, but it is unquestionably on the upsurge. The worst is over."

Don has some good ideas on the subject, doesn't he?

Randy Sparks has been making the rounds, with me, lately for college assemblies and shows. This young man is going to be one of the hottest acts in the business. Currently making a move with Steve Allen, Randy is becoming a strong on-campus favorite. His songs and guitar style can't miss in the next few years.

Despite all the publicity poured out on the Winter Olympics, I have the feeling that the baseball-football-basketball fans just patiently waited in the aisle until this 11-day winter carnival was over.

Skiing, ice skating or what-have-you with snow are sports most generally thought of as being the participating kind. They're fun to do and the small groups or clubs the participating kind. They're run to do and the small groups or clubs the participants belong to are really the only ones who enjoy watching the goings on. Another thing that puzzles me is, "Why isn't basktball included in the Winter Olympics? It is a winter sport, not a summer sport. But instead it will be included in the Olympic program this summer when it is held in Rome.

I also doubt that the average sports fan, who are aware of the exploits of Charlie Neal and Jonny Unitas, ever heard of Penny Pitou or Adrien Duvillard. (They're skiers—I think?), or much less care what they do. A 40.3 record in a 500-meter ice skating race by Eugeni Grishin can hardly be thrilling to the millions of TV viewers who watched Abe Woodson return a kickoff 102 yards against the Rams.

Most sports fan don't understand the complicated Olympic scoring system for those snow frolics anyway. The Olympic Committee does not name a team winner. There is no such thing in its books. Medals are awarded individuals on a first, second andthird-place basis. And then there is always the problem of how the results are used. There is danger that they can be misused. Is it the intent of the Russians to show, with athletic victory, their superiority over the United States for political purposes? I believe that is their intent. Olympic athletes should compete for the love of sport and, when it's over, they should shake hands and be friends. I doubt that the love of sport is the Russian purpose.

The only over-all unofficial team winners declared are the result of some point system concocted by the various press organizations. And, here again, there's usually more confusion if you compare what the AP has to say with

what's printed in Pravda.

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
