A knowledge of business education paid off for two Cerritos College sophomores recently, when college President Dr. Ralph F. Burnight announced that Kathie Lewis and Gary Holloway have been named winners of the 1960 Bank of America Junior College Business Awards.

Cash Awards

The two students, who hold A-minus grade point averages will each receive cash awards of \$100 plus a certificate of achievement.

The presentation of awards will be made at business awards banquet, honoring the winners on May 6 in the Beverly Hilton Hotel in Los Angeles.

Two Fields

Lewis was selected for her per-

formance in courses in secretarial and clerical studies, while Holloway was chosen for his performance in banking and business administration.

Students are selected for the awards on the basis of their performance in their major fields, over-all grade point average, business personality, and participation in school activities or outside employment.

Billie Bradbury won first place and a trophy in persuasive speaking on the subject, "The Role of Government in Dealing with Problems of Higher Education."

Second Trophy

A second trophy was won by Bradbury and partner Dale Harrell, in debate on the subject that congress should have the power to reverse supreme court decisions. The Cerritos debate team lost only to Arizona State College in six debates.

Viola Bouma won two second places in persuasive and extemporaneous speaking.

In elimination events Josie Mancuso won two excellent certificates before being ousted in the final rounds of impromptu and oral interpretation.

Cerritos College's Student Center will bounce to the rhythm of progressive jazz Thursday, April 21, at 3 p.m., when the Associated Student Body plays host to the famous Lighthouse All-Stars.

Howard Rumsey and his swinging sextet will entertain Cerritos students and all other people interested in coming. The group, who plays at the Lighthouse in Hermosa Beach, have been going strong since 1949. The Lighthouse has had the unique distinction of being the only place in the world in which a leader has kept his modern jazz group playing fifty-two weeks per year for over two years.

Howard Rumsey

Rumsey moved to Los Angeles in 1937, entered Los Angeles City College where he decided to study bass, having already studied piano and drums. A short time later he was playing his first job as a bassist with a college band. A year later he was working with Vido Musso's first big band. The pianist was a fellow named Stan Kenton.

In 1939 Rumsey made his first nation-wide tour with Johnnie "Scat" Davis, who had taken over Musso's band intact—with one exception: Kenton decided to

step out on his own. Just two years later Rumsey joined Kenton's band for the memorable Balboa Rendezvous engagement.

After a tour with Kenton, the draft having broken up the original crew, Rumsey found himself playing with the Jimmy Grier, Freddie Slack, Jimmy Dorsey, Alvino Ray and Charlie Barnet bands. Finally, in May, 1949, he began his series of Lighthouse Jazz Concerts... and fortunately for all jazz lovers, he's been there since.

Bob Cooper

The saxophone man for the All-Stars is the well-known Bob Cooper. Cooper was born in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and was introduced to the clarinet at 15 years of age. He followed with the tenor sax, oboe and English horn.

He has studied with Tristano, Greattinger, Rogers de Busscher, and Dedeco. He has recorded for Capitol and Contemporary, and is now under contract to Capitol. His debut at the Lighthouse was in 1952. Cooper's latest album is on Epic, "Shifting Winds."

Bud Shank

Dayton, Ohio, was the birthplace of this all-time horn man. He began playing the clarinet at

the early age of 10, the sax came next at 13, then the flute at 20. He is now under contract to Pacific Jazz, he's also recorded for Capitol and Contemporary.

Barnet, Rugolo, Kenton, Rogers, Kessel, Almeida Baker and Rumsey have all had Shank in some of their recordings. He began at the Lighthouse in 1953.

Conte Candoli

Conte Candoli has been at the trumpet since he was 13 years old he was introduced to it in his home town of Mishawaka, Indiana.

He has recorded with Kenton, Herman, Ventura, Jackson, Levey, Rugolo, Paich, Candoli and Rumsey. Candoli has also recorded for Capitol, Contemporary, Bethlehem and Atlantic, the lat-

ter with which he now is contracted. He started at the Lighthouse in 1955.

Frank Rosolino

Born in Detroit, Michigan, Rosolino was introduced to the trombone at 13 years of age. He is now under contract to Capitol, but has recorded for Contemporary and Bethlehem. He has made recordings with Auld, Mariano, Rugolo, Kenton and Rumsey. 1955 was the year he joined the All-Star group.

Stan Levey

Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, was also the birthplace of this well known drummer. Levey first began playing the drums at seven. He is now under contract to Bethlehem and has recorded for Contemporary and Capitol.

Pep Party Planned For Local Students

Cerritos College's band, choir, Falconettes, song leaders and yell leaders are sponsoring a "Pep Party" on Thursday night, April 21, at the Student Center.

The Falcon activity groups, playing host to the precedent-making event, have invited seniors, faculty and administrative personnel, from district and neighboring high schools. Party officials have also extended the invitation to students now at Cerritos.

Groups On Tap

The affair is scheduled to get underway at 7 p.m. and will highlight a display by Cerritos' yell leaders, the college's choir in a short offering, routines by the song leaders, a display of flag twirling techniques by the Falconettes, some song renditions by the college band, finished off with some community singing of college and novelty songs. Refreshments will complete the evening.

Also set for activity groups, are tryouts for song leaders, yell leaders and Falconettes. The date for final tryout has been set for Thursday, May 5, at 7 p.m. in the Student Center. All students who are trying out must file an application with the advisor by Monday, May 1.

Practice Hours

Practice sessions for the three groups have been set aside for Saturday, April 23, from 9-11 a.m. Tuesday, April 25, from 3-5 p.m.; Saturday, April 30, from 9-11 a.m. All sessions will be held in the Physical Education Building.

Judges will include members of the faculty, ASB officers, former song and yell leaders, former Falconettes, plus advisors.

For song and yell leaders,

judging is done on a five-point scale. Factors taken into account include rhythm, voice, poise and showmanship, personality, enthusiasm and appearance.

For the Falconettes, judging will be based on factors in marching, appearance, posture, carriage and flag-twirling. Two basic twirls will be taught to students who presently do not know how to twirl the double flags.

Cerritos College's baseball team snapped Ventura College's long Western States Conference win streak on Tuesday. The Falcon nine using the long ball and some fine relief pitching by Al Petrushkin, stunned the league leading Pirates, 9-4.

The Clincher

It was Cerritos all the way in the contest, jumping off to a 2-0 lead in the first inning with Bob Beckner's fourth home run of the season, a 355-foot shot over the left field fence.

The icing runs came in a four-run Falcon outburst in the third inning, when Ken Roberts belted a 375-foot three-run homer that sent Cerritos out in front, 6-1.

Cerritos starter Dick Wantz got credit for the win, his third against one loss this year, but had to give way to Petrushkin in the fifth inning.

The win put Cerritos back into pennant contention, only two games off the pace. The second round of loop play will get underway following Easter vacation.

Pete Newell Hits At Winning, Olympic Choice

"The whole purpose of athletics is lost, if one team wins all the time." The speaker was Pete Newell and the event was the First Annual Cerritos Beach Dessert Party honoring the 1959-60 Cerritos basketball team Monday night.

These words seem strange coming from a man who is known for his winning records and championship teams.

Olympic Trials

Newell's speech centered around the recent US Olympic Basketball trials in which he led the NCAA University All-Stars to a smashing triumph.

The mentor stressed the importance of the Olympic Trials, which will produce a 12-member team to represent the US at Rome this summer. He seemed

perturbed at the present way in which members are chosen.

At present, the winning team places at least five and perhaps seven players on the squad, while the remaining Olympians are picked from the other seven teams in the tourney. Therefore, if the best team is upset, the most representable players will not necessarily be chosen because of the obligation to the winning squad.

Newell added that he felt "like a carpetbagger in Holy Land," referring to Denver, stomping-grounds of the AAU teams.

Entertainment

Some fine entertainment provided by Jack Wheaton and his Falcon Dance Band, preceded the ceremonies. Also featured were vocalist Nancy Brown; David Pinto, pianist and the Mayfair Mariners, an all-girls glee club from Mayfair High School.

After dessert was served, the team awards were given out. The winners were: Most Improved Player, Bill Bogdanoff; Most Inspirational, Jerry Dotson; Most Valuable, Scott Iverson; and Named as Honorary Team Captain was Dick Roche.

Caine Reviews

John Caine, Cerritos head basketball coach, then gave a review of the season before introducing Newell.

The greying, affable coach, who will bow out as Cal's head coach after this year to become the Bear's athletic director, was asked after the banquet how important junior colleges were in supplying talent to universities.

"Many of our greatest players, Bill McClintock for example, came from junior colleges."

Jaysee Approach

When asked if Cal had their eye on any particular local jay-see players the mentor chuckled, then replied: "You'll have to ask the local junior college coaches about that."

Since Newell has played against, and coached Jerry West and Oscar Robertson, he was asked his opinion as to which was the greater player. After pondering the question a moment, Newell stated: "They are equally great, each with a different style."

Cerritos Track Team Ready For Dual Clash

Cerritos' track and field forces finish up the Western States Conference dual meet schedule today, meeting Pasadena City College and Glendale College in a double dual meet at favored Glendale's track at 3 p.m.

The Falcon's biggest foe will be Glendale College, who last week tied with dual leader, Pierce College.

Falcons Romp

Last week the Falcon's dumped Ventura 99-23 and Phoenix College 91 1/2-29 1/2. Chonito Perez and Darryl Taylor crossed the mile finish line side-by-side in 4:35.3 which marked the second dead-heat in two weeks, the previous one being between Larry Canova and Taylor in the 880-yard run.
