Ifoward Rumsey and his swing. ing sextet will entertain Cerritos terested in coming. The group, lerested in coming. The group, Hermosa Beach, have been going trong since 1949. The Lighthouse has had the unique'distinction of being the only place in the world in which a leader has kept his modern jazz group playing fiftywo weeks per year for over two years.

Howard Rumsey
Rumsey moved to Los Angeles in 1937, entered Los Angeles City College where he decided to study bass, having already studied piano and drums. A short time. later he was playing his first job as a bassist with a college band. Vido Musso's first big band The pianist was a fellow named Stan Kenton.
In 1939 Rumsey made his first nation-wide tour with Johnnie Scat" Davis, who had taken over Musso's band intact -with one
eption: Kenton decided to

step out on his own. Just two years later Rumsey joined Kenlon's band for the memorable Bater After a tour with Kement. draft having broken up the orig draft having broken up the orig. playing with the Jimmy Grier playing with the Jimmy Grier, vino Ray and Charlie Barnet bands. Finally, in May, 1949, he began his series of Lighthouse Jazz Concerts . . . and fortunately for all jazz lovers, he's been there since.

With first round Western States Conference baseball action coming swiftly to a close, we stop to ponder the current "race". In doing so we can only ask: "Who's gonna' stop Ventura?

The Pirates are resting comfortably atop the heap with a 5-1 record, while the remaining teams go at it tooth and nail for second best.

Between Ventura ard Pasadena (holding up the league at 1-5), not much daylight exists among the competitors. For the moment, Compton, Pierce, Cerritos, Los Angeles and Glendale, are bunched like bananas.

It was generally agreed before the season started that Ventura had a good ball culb and was rated as a dark horse challenger behind Cerritos, Los Angeles and Pierce. But who would have ventured to even suggest that the Pirates would be in their present position at the close of first round play?

Ventura's express train to first place has been sid tracked only by Cerritos, last Tuesday at Falcon Field.

## Close Games

In reviewing the Pirates' record we find that three of Ventura's conference victories have been won by a single run. It's true, the mark of a champion is the winning of close ones, but one gets the feeling that Ventura's luck may not hold up in second round struggling.

Take, for instance, the plight of the Chicago White Sox last year. After capturing some 35 games by one run, the Pale Hose managed to drop the World Series to the Dodgers (in some close contests).

## Road Games

Another factor that may contribute to the Pirate's downfall is the fact that the majority of their remaining conference games are to be played away from the friendly confines of their home field.

One may also wonder aloud: "What's wrong with Cerritos?" It's true, the Falcons are the only conference team holding a win over Ventura, but otherwise Cerritos' "foot-in-the-bucket" play has caused many an eyebrow to be raised in distain.

## Not Over

Certainly, the Falcons won't continue their lackadaisical play and the odds are against Ventura repeating their first round ledger. So, look up, Falcons, it isn't over yet!
