Dr. Henley is a man of many accomplishments. He has earned four academic and three honorary degrees. He is an attorney, doctor of science, doctor of letters, and doctor of humanities. He is acting dean in the school of government and director of coordination at the University of Southern California,

Active Citizen

Also active in community affairs, Dr. Henley has served the Community Chest for 15 years as chairman of speakers, and is past president of the Los Angeles Rotary Club. He is past president of the board of the Water ond Power Commission, and is now the commission's personnel chairman. He is also a member of the advisory board of the Los Angeles YMCA, and the Welfare Federation of Los Angeles.

Dynamic Program

As president of the College of Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons for the past 20 years, Dr. Henley has led a dynamic building and research program. His newest projects include a new \$10 million unit at the Los Angeles General Hospital and the Los Angeles Rehabilitation Center, which will be dedicated in May.

Falcon History Shows Growth, Greatness

Cerritos College is a two-year public junior college, operating under the jurisdiction of the Cerritos Junior College District, which is a separate junior college district. A five member Board of Trustees serves as the governing board of the college.

The district includes the Bellflower Unified District and the Excelsior Union High School District which is composed of the Artesia, Bloomfield, Carmenita, and Norwalk-La

Mirada elementary school districts.

The Cerritos Junior Colege District was established on June 10, 1955 when citizens comprising the Bellflower, Norwalk, Artesia, Carmenita, and Bloomfield elementary districts voted four to one in favor of forming a junior college district.

On September 27, 1955 an election, calling for a six million dollar bond issue with which to build the college,

again passed by a four to one margin.

The next step, that of acquiring a suitable site for the new college became a difficult one beset with many legal difficulties involving first, gaining ownership of the land and, second, securing proper zoning for the westerly portion of the site which amounted to about forty-acres of a total of ninety-five. On December 5, 1956, title to the proposed college site was finally acquired. It was not until July 22, 1957 that the city of Dairy Valley re-zoned that portion of the site in question so that construction could

Meanwhile, the Board of Trustees, realizing the long delays ahead, authorized the college to begin operation, A limited number of classes was offered and they began on September 11, 1956. Some two hundred students enrolled in the regular college classes which were held in the evening at Excelsior High School. In the 1957-58 school year, as well as the current year, most of the academic classes have been conducted at the Artesia High School, Beginning with this year almost all of the technical and industrial courses have been held on the Alondra campus in converted cottages and buildings on the site.

On January 14, 1958, the Board of Trustees changed the name of the college from Cerritos Junior College to

Cerritos College.

On October 21, 1958, the people of the Cerritos Junior College District approved a second bond issue amounting to eight million dollars by a four to one margin. These funds are to be used for the completion of the campus and the purchase of the necessary instructional equipment. The college plant, when completed, should accommodate about thirty-five hundred full-time day students and some five thousand in the extended day.


Prom

Student Council Has Major Job


Carrying out the important role of leaders in Ceritos' active student activity program are members of the Falcon Associated Student Council.


Cerritos—Tomorrow's College Today





environment for higher education." This is how Cerritos' campus was hailed by School Executive magazine, which awarded the first-year Falcon campus a national first place award for excellence in 1959.

The buildings that are now in use, include colorful decorations in browns, yellows, green, and blues that reach a deep purple. They were designed by Jen Lew of the Los Angeles architectural and engineering firm of Kistner, Wright & Wright.

New Facilities

Buildings that are now in use on the 95 acre campus are: The Field House, a spacious, wellfacilitated building located directly north of the new 12,000 seat Cerritos College Stadium. Men's and Women's physical education fields are to the west, just above Falcon Field, home of Cerritos' baseball team, and the tennis, volleyball and basketball courts. The P.E. Build-

both men and women students. The building also has faculty offices for physical education instructors. The Men's Gymnasium is now under construction to the direct right. The 33,925 sq. foot gym will accomodate 200 spectators for basketball games, and will include handball courts and a lobby, with a trophy case, as well as dressing rooms.

Extensive Building

· The Student Center houses food services, a lounge, a snack bar, book store, patio, dean's offices and student government offices. To the southwest part of campus is the Electronic Building with the Technology Building under that. Technical and Industrial Arts offices are located here. Cosmetology, added to the Cerritos curriculum this fall, is housed in the left side of the wing. The National Science Building is directly to the west of the Technology

> Below the Lecture Hall is the Business Education Building, which houses temporary counseling offices. To the immediate left tnd east of the Business Education Building, stands the only multi-storied construction on campus. The two-story Liberal Arts Building, which houses the Humanities, Social Science and fragments of other divisions. District admininstrative offices are located in the lower floor of this building.

Temprary Units

In addition to these permanent buildings, the college is using some temporary units for classrooms temporarily. These include units for Admissions and Registration, Art, Home Economics, Journalism, Welding, Auto Mechanics and Machine Shop.

Center of College Is Curriculum Planning

Because Cerritos is a new college, a strong emphasis must be placed on the curriculum and it's development, which is the heart of the college. The chief objective of Cerritos is to help the student understand himself and his phyical environment and cultural heritage; in addition, the college recognizes the importance of spiritual and moral values and will encourage the student to aim his goal toward enriching his life.

Types of Programs

- 1. Two year curricula which which are the equivalent of the freshman and sophomore years at the university or college in practically every field of professional specialization. These programs permit the student to transfer to the four-year institution with upper division standing.
- 2. Two-year curricula in preparation for immediate employment in a variety of semi-professional, industrial, business or technical areas. The course in this program are featured to. meet the employment needs of Los Angeles County and South. ern California.
- 3. A general education for semi-improvement and cultural development. Courses in this field will help the student to increase his own ability as a citizen, and will improve commun-
- 4. Courses designed to make up high school deficiencies permitting further education and training at the college level.
- 5. A program of guidance and orientation, making the individual aware of his special abilities and aptitudes so that he may make a wise choice of a vocational goal and secure the maximum benefits from his college experiences.
