
Tomorrow Night Oriental Prom


Barry Adams, running for his second Student Body Presidency, stands in favor of better relations and communication between the student council and the general student body.




Visiting students will also tour the campus and be served dinner in the Student Center. The meet will be climaxed by a presentation of awards.

Tonight's performance begins at 7:30 p.m. in the group's Transistor Theatre.






Pierce Win


