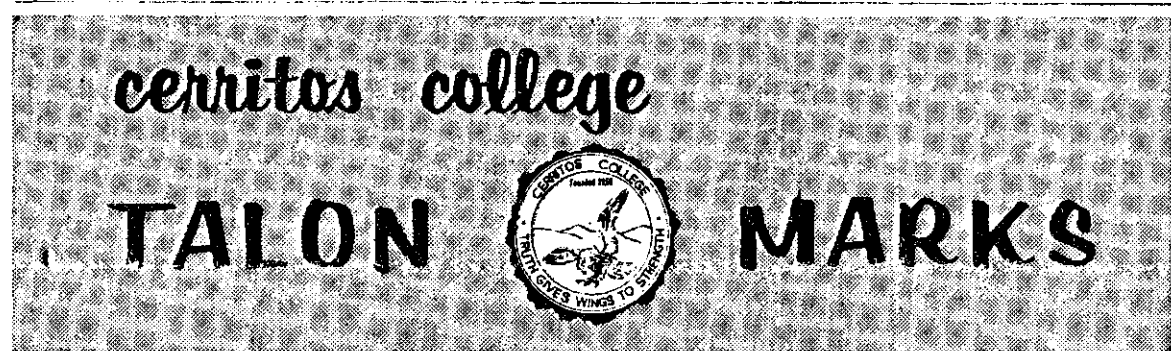


# Tomorrow Night Oriental Prom

## WSC Track Finals Slated Tonight In Home Stadium

This evening history will be made at the Cerritos College Stadium. The thirteenth Annual Western States Conference Track and Field Championships will be held. It is the first major collegiate track event staged in this area.

The Cerritos track underwent special preparation for this meet, although some of the nations fastest junior college times have already been recorded on it this year.

### Tuesday Prelims

Preliminary events held last Tuesday evening, saw Los Angeles City College, this years dual meet champion; Pierce College, Glendale College, Pasadena College, Ventura College, Compton College, Phoenix College and host Cerritos College, attempt to place as many men as possible in the qualifying heats.

This evening's finals should bring together the greatest aggregation of junior college track and field stars in the nation.

### Record Crowd

A record night crowd is expected at the new stadium. General Admission prices are \$1.50 and students .50c, with student body card. Field events will get under way at 6:30, the first running event at 7 p.m.

Although all eyes will be on the final team champion, individual duels will highlight what could be one of the greatest jaycee spectacles of all time.

## Adams Shoots For ASB Prexy

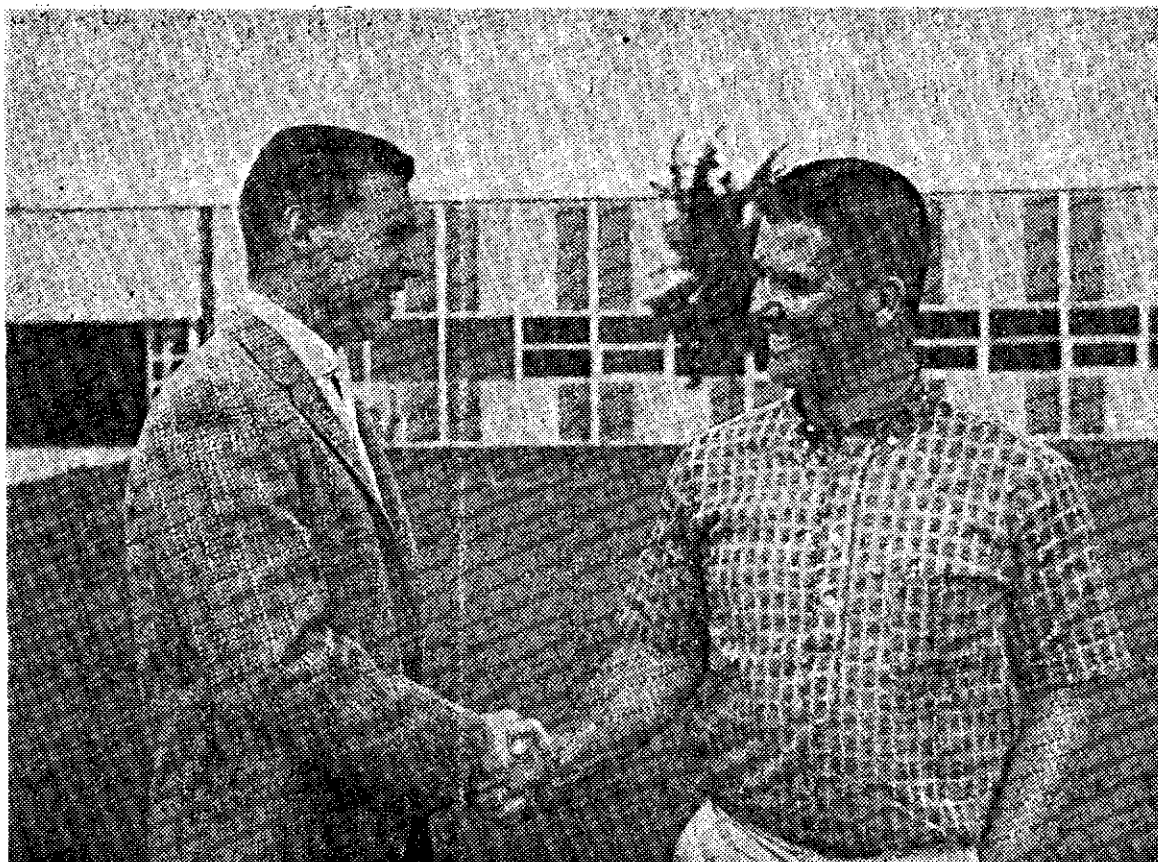
Barry Adams, running for his second Student Body Presidency, stands in favor of better relations and communication between the student council and the general student body.

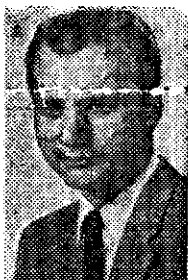
### Pre-Law Major

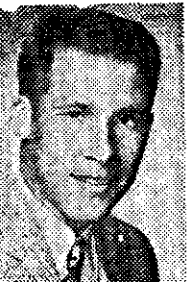

# Math Club Sponsors Prep 'Think' Meet

Plans for a novel Mathematics Field Day have been completed for May 13, according to Cerritos College's Mathematics and Engineering Club.

The newly organized group is sponsoring the event for 10 high schools in the local area. Included in the activities are Excelsior, Artesia, Bellflower, Norwalk, Downey, Mayfair, Earl Warren, El Rancho, Western and Sierra.

### Teams

Teams from each high school will include five-student groups from the junior and senior classes. Competitors may enter four events, planned to tax the brainpower of each entrant.

Contests include a Leap Frog Relay, which permits two-man teams to work separate problems and then exchange papers for a time limit checking; Slide Rule Competition, which will test for speed and accuracy in the use of the slide rule; Mad Hatter Marathon, a rapid computation and estimation contest; and finally, a Chalk Talk Derby, where a student chooses

a subject for presentation and then is graded on a point-basis for the speech performance in a mathematical area.

### Campus Tour

Visiting students will also tour the campus and be served dinner in the Student Center. The meet will be climaxed by a presentation of awards.

The newly organized club is sponsored by Jack Randall. The group's president is Nick Iammarino, with Ken Voak serving as vice-president and Penny Winters as secretary.

## Play On Tonight

Tonight is the last regularly scheduled night for the presentation of "The Adding Machine," Cerritos College's newest play. Director Lee Korf has indicated that tonight's performance has been sold out, but a possibility that the play may be extended for a longer run is being considered.

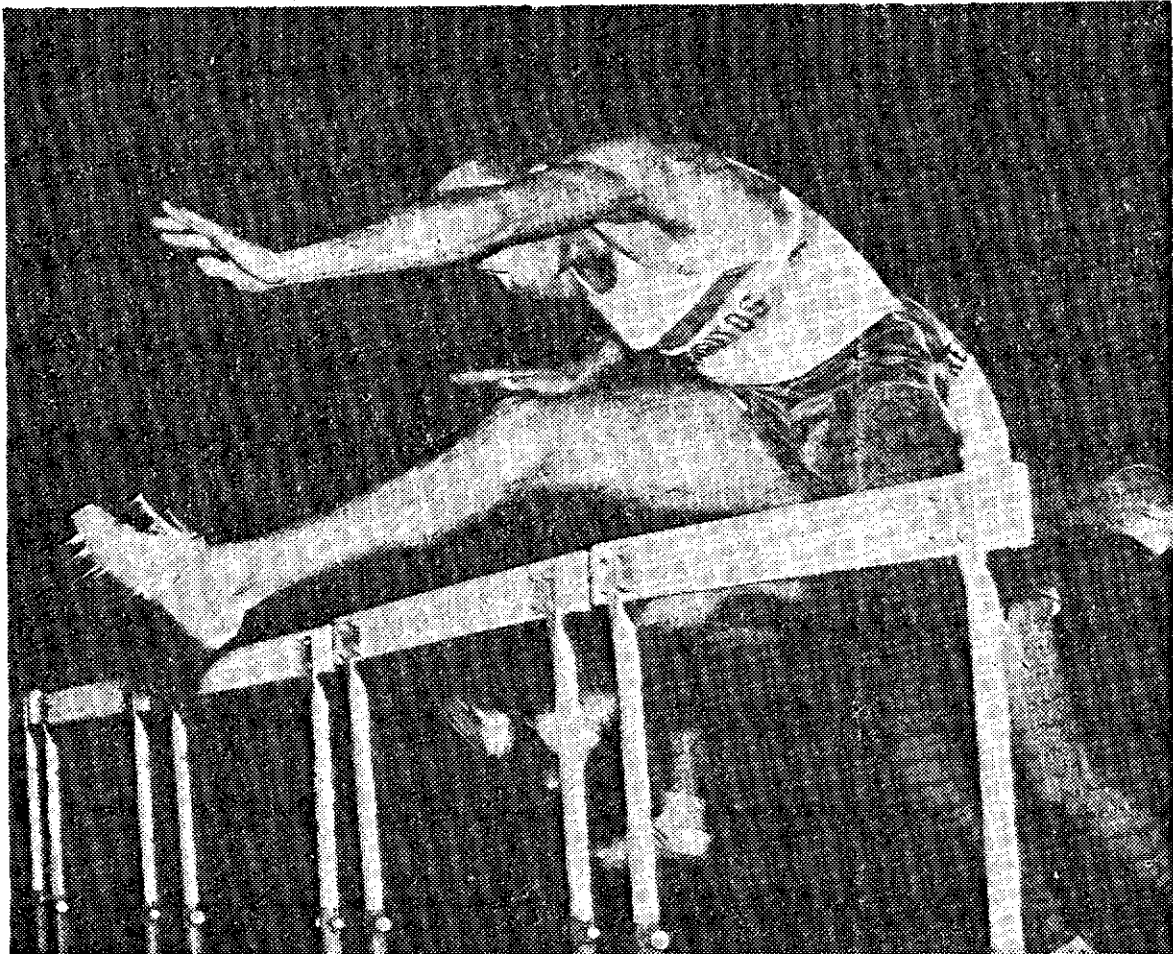

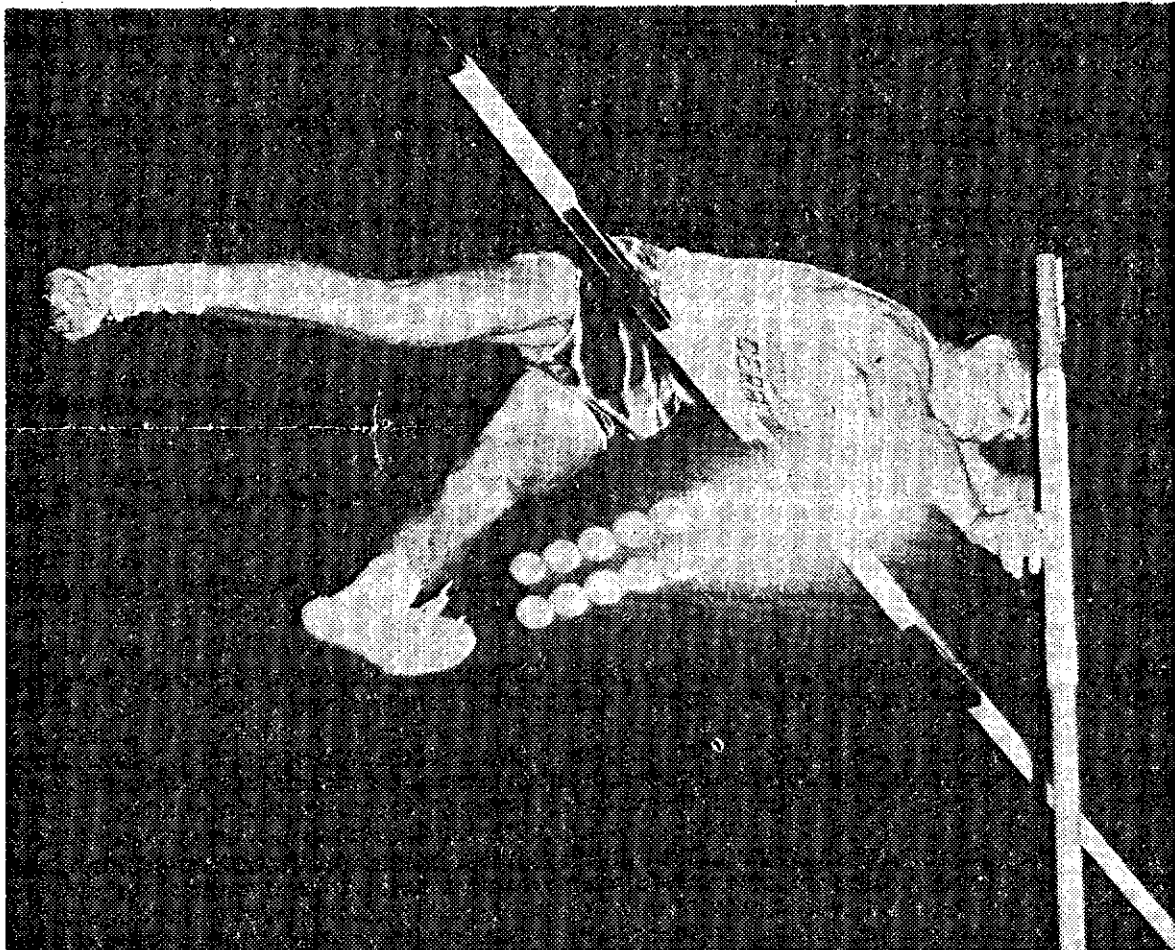

### Pierce Win

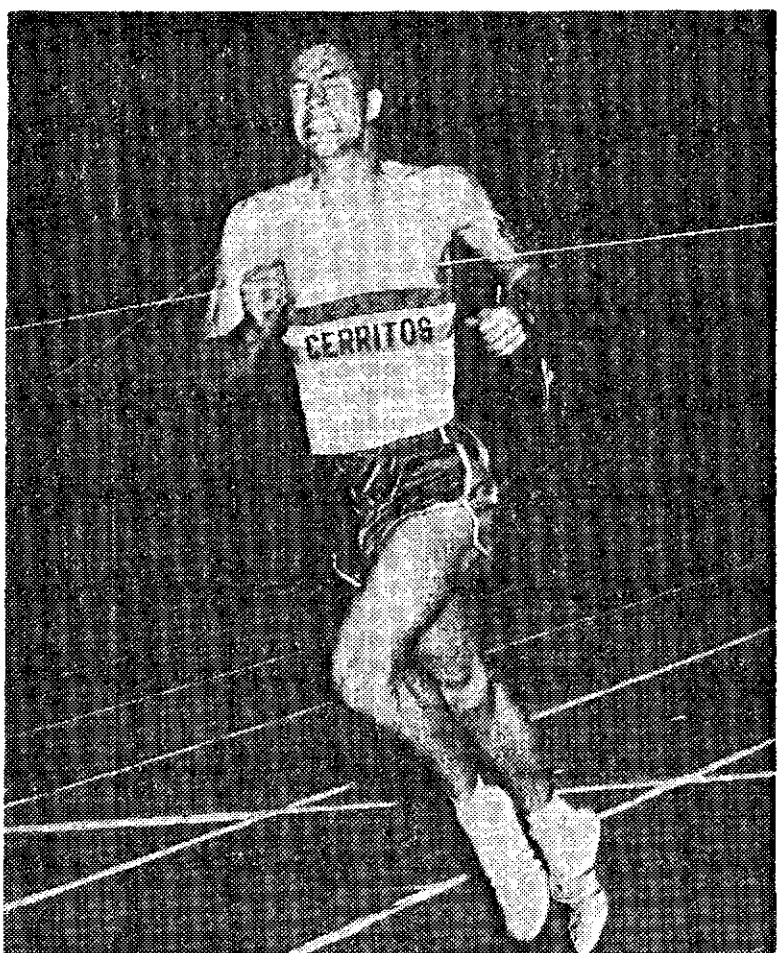

Los Angeles, behind the pitching of Al Reynoso, stopped the Falcons in another first round game.

Cerritos met Pasadena City College on Tuesday in another WSC contest.

### Ventura Leads

Ventura College's surprising nine continues to be the front-runner and a shoo-in for the loop title. Only a single loss to Cerritos remains as a blot on the team mark. The Falcons, Compton or Pierce, would have to see Ventura lose all three of its remaining games to have a chance for a tie, while all three of those clubs would have to stay unbeaten.
