Special awards, entertainment, guest speaker Frank Leahy, and door prizes highlighted the third annual Cerritos College Football Banquet held recently at the Disneyland Hotel.

Climaxing the 1959 grid season, the banquet paid special tribute to the Western States Champions. In the three-year history of their career, the Falcon gridgers have played twenty-eight games and have won twenty-four out of the twenty-eight. Each of the forty-three squad members was individually introduced and presented with a framed certificate showing the results of each game and containing a team picture.

### Special Honors

Outstanding awards were given to five of the players. The voting was done by the team, and the awards were presented by various service organizations of the surrounding areas. Harold Gray was chosen as outstanding lineman of the year and received his trophy from the Artesia Lions. Outstanding back award, presented by the Norwalk Kiwanis Club, was given to Mario Mendez. The Kiwanians also awarded a trophy to Warren Simmons, the most improved player on the Cerritos squad. Bob Lyons was selected by his teammates as the most inspirational player and received his trophy from the Lionettes of Hawaiian Gardens. The final trophy for the most outstanding all around player of the season was given to Dallas Moon by the Artesia Rotary Club.

A \$25 gift certificate from Denny's Toy Store, a wristwatch, car compass, and other items were the door prizes won by members of the overflow crowd of parents, friends, boosters, fans, and the pep squads who came to pay tribute to the conference champs.

### Speakers

Guest speaker was former Notre Dame and All-American Coach, Frank Leahy, who in his coaching days rolled up a total of 110 wins, 13 losses, and 10 ties and had the national champions and was coach of the year four times. His talk centered around his former college days as both played and coach, the greatness to make something of oneself, the outstandingness of the Falcon grid teams, plus humor and seriousness.

Current Bench president, Clarence Humphries and past presidents, Carlos Evans, '57 and Tommy Harris, '58 presented the current Cerritos quintette of coaches, Wally Kincaid, Charlie Hall, Smokey Cates, Gene Martin, and head coach, Don Hall.

## One, Two, Three—Plan to See the Play

First nighters attending the inauguration of Cerritos College's pocket-size Transistor Theatre (Electronics Bldg. Rm. 15) were treated to a delightful hour-and-thirty minutes of frolicking romance and comedy Tuesday night through the vehicle of "One, Two, Three...", a one-act drama written by Hungarian-born Ferenc Molnar (pronounced Fer'r-rents), who wrote much of his career about nearby Vienna and, in this one, about an oilionaire genius executive whose speeches one

would not find uncommon to discover perhaps even in Urbana U.S.A. as well as in the playwright's Heimstaat on the beautiful Blue Danube.

Operating under all of the physical and emotional handicaps that opening night invariably present to any theatre group, Director Lee Korf's spartan cast sparkled almost without exception to give the play a sharp, penetrating amazingly fast staccato that was like the rapid clatter of a machine gun, a quality which the audience clearly

recognized as necessary to its performance.

### Likeable Comedy

The comedy concerns a rather likeable, though unethical, Lothario-executive President Norrison played by William Stephens—who ward, Sylvia (Janet Parker), a pretty, young thing entrusted to his safe keeping for the purpose of "broadening her outlook" announces to him that she has been secretly married to a taxi-driver. Much to the ambitious executive's disliking but to prevent the disclosure to the

girl's family that Norrison has failed in a matter of most import to himself the latter undertakes to make the unsavory hack into one of Nature's noblemen, that is a man worthy of Sylvia's adulation. With a display of superhuman executive ability, Molnar's protagonist accomplishes in one hour's time what took Professor Higgins (Pygmalion) the span of several months to accomplish, and Sylvia's hack-driver husband is passed-off as an acceptable, if not an amazing, mate in the eyes

## Talkers Top Tournament

At least that's the tune Pasadena and three four-year colleges are echoing after the local college debate team defeated the debate teams from Pasadena City College, Occidental College, Pomona College and the University of California at Santa Barbara.

Nine competitors on coach Juliette Venitsky's 10-man speech team also talked their way into 14 certificate awards at the University of Southern California speech tournament Friday and Saturday.

Terry Folts won a Superior certificate and third place in extemporaneous speaking. He also won an Excellent certificate and was a finalist in Oral Interpretation.

Another Cerritos competitor, Jim Brown, won third place and an Excellent in Oratory. He also won an Excellent award and was a finalist in Oral Interpretation.

Billie Bradbury won an Excellent certificate and was a finalist speaker in Extemporaneous Speaking. She also won an Excellent certificate in Impromptu. John McLaughlin won Excellent certificates in Oratory and Oral Interpretation.

Dale Harrell won an Excellent Certificate in Impromptu.

Barbara Hoffman and Dolly Randall each won Excellent Certificates in Oratory.

Josie Mancuso won an excellent Certificate in Oral Interpretation.

### Marks Go

Among the marks to go was the pass receiving mark, broken this season by End Bob Hicks with 10 catches for 280 yards and five touchdowns. Sophomore Quarterback Dallas Moon established a new pass interception mark with seven thefts for 80 yards. Freshman Halfback Mario Mendez set a new punt return mark, returning four kicks for 136 yards and a 34.0 average. Punting added a final record to the Falcon book, with Freshmen Ends Bruce Clauson and Earl Coleman setting marks. Clauson booted eight punts for 327 yards and a 40.9 average, while Coleman toed 10 punts for 401 yards and a 40.1 mark.

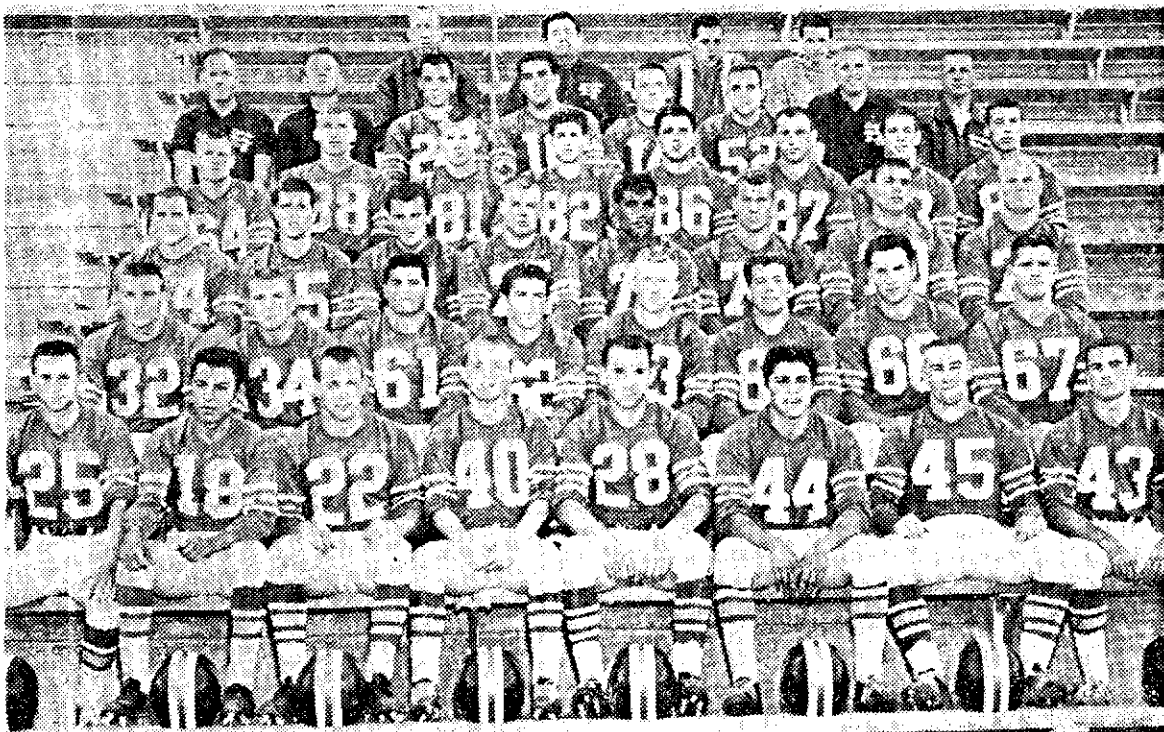
### Triple Crown

Mendez was a triple crown winner, winning the individual rushing title with 487 yards and a 7.17 average; winning the scoring with 62 points and the record-breaking punt return mark.

The passing title was won by Moon with 30 completions good for 449 yards and six touchdowns. Quarterback Ed Gentry topped the passers in scoring passes, throwing seven.

Freshman Halfback Bob McPhillips, a player that ranked high in almost every category, won the kickoff return totals with three carries for 117 yards and a 35.7 average.

As a team, Cerritos' football team set a new offensive passing record, running up more yardage via the air than any other Falcon squad.

Cerritos College's cross country team made its final showing of the season in another fine performance, placing third in the Orange Coast Cross Country Invitational. The Falcon runners placed behind Bakersfield and Orange Coast.

Chonito Perez was the top finisher for Cerritos, nabbing fifth in the meet with a three-mile time of 15:41. Other Falcon finishers included Delare Mannie (16:13), John Kosarich (16:20), Ernie Chadbourne, Tony Parra, Al Aragon and Darryl Taylor.

Perez' two-mile team was a creditable 10:21.

### Squad Praised

Cerritos Coach Dave Kamanski praised the squad that just narrowly missed winning the Western States Conference title. Kamanski pointed out the spirited team competition that greatly aided the Cerritos rise to the heights of junior college powers. A perpetual trophy that has been started this year for the team's outstanding performer, is shared by Perez and Kosarich. Both runners are ex-Excelsior High stars

and ran under Coach Jack Newman at the Pilot campus. Runner-up to the duo was ex-Santa Fe High runner Delare Mannie.

### Award Winners

Those winning athletic awards in cross country included Al Aragon, Ernie Chadbourne, John Kosarich, Elbie Lamb, Delare Mannie, Tony Parra, Chonito Perez, John Roberts, Darryl Taylor, Ron Willett.

Cerritos College's cross country team jolted most of the traditional powers of Southern California and finished third in the

Southern California Junior College Cross Country Championship run.

The Falcon runners picked up their first trophy for the fine showing, finishing behind Santa Ana and Bakersfield. Cerritos had just finished coming close to upsetting Pierce for the Western States Conference crown last week, but avenged that loss by outrunning all of the other WSC entrants and most of the top southland powers.

### Team Effort

Once again it was a story of

tremendous team effort in the grueling sport. Running on the hilly three-mile Glendale course, freshman Chonito Perez led the way for the closely grouped Falcons. The meet's individual winner was Santa Ana's Dale Story, who set a new record of 14:58.

Perez placed eighteenth and was followed by other Cerritos runners John Kosarich (20th), Ernie Chadbourne (35th), Delare Mannie (40th), Darryl Taylor (51st), Tony Parra (63rd) and Al Aragon (64th). Twenty-one teams and over 150 runners participated in the annual event.

Harbor built up a 5-0 lead after four minutes before Dick Roche hit for Cerritos. Cerritos went ahead 12-10 on Scott Iverson's jumper and the Falcons never trailed again.

With Jerry Dotson, Tony Rosales and Bill Bogdanoff leading the way, the Falcons built up a 42-28 halftime lead.

## Falcons Soar To Third Win, 69-62

Through the use of outstanding rebounding, and a deliberate offense by Cerritos' basketball team, the Falcons picked up their third win five starts, upending tightly touted El Camino Warriors on the losers court, 69-62.

The game was nip and tuck all the way until, with about six minutes left in the game, the winners built up a lead that the fast-breaking hosts were unable to overcome. The Falcons led at halftime, 22-21.

### Deliberate Attack

The usually high scoring El Camino quint was held in check by Coach John Caine's crew by the use of a special deliberate style of play, taking away El Camino's running game and fast break.

The score changed hands many times in the contest and saw the Warriors holding a one point lead with eight minutes remaining in the game, until a barrage of Falcon free throws and the sharp shooting of guards Bill Bogdanoff and Tony Rosales gave the visitors a lead they never relinquished.

### Bogdanoff High

Cerritos' scoring attack was very well balanced as all five starters hit in double figures, led by Bogdanoff's 18, and 15 by Rosales. Jerry Dotson, Dick Roche, Scot Iverson, and Keith Lindley combined talents to give Cerritos board control throughout most of the game.

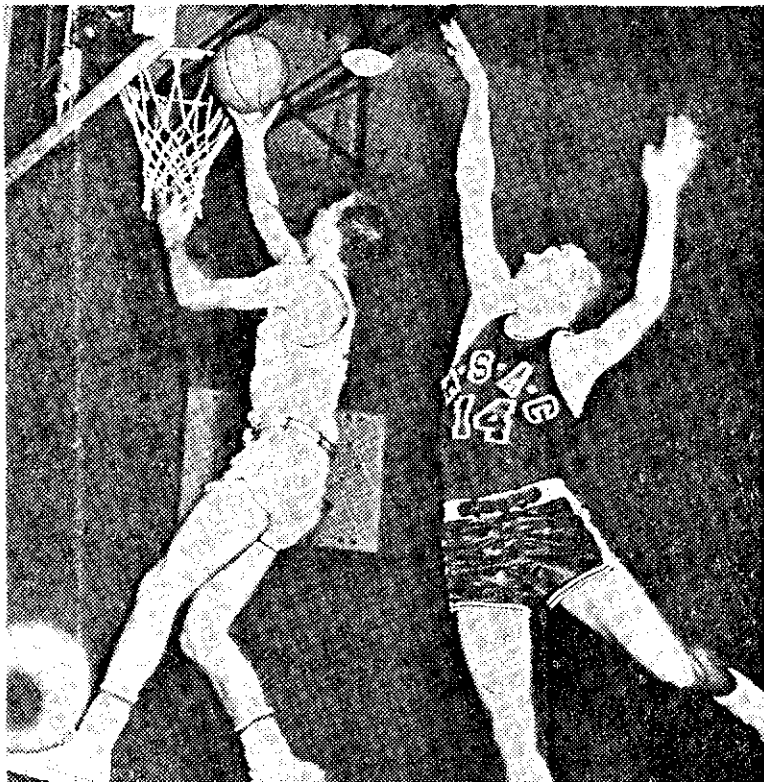
### Rosales Hits 16

### '57 Regular

Ross was a regular on the 1957 Cerritos team that won eight of nine regular season games and then went on to become the Western representative to the Junior Rose Bowl. An outstanding pass catcher, Ross was a unanimous selection to the All-Western State Conference team and was selected on a number of jaysee All-American teams.

Ross graduated from California High in Whittier. He lettered in both football and track, becoming, in 1958, the first Cerritos athlete to represent the Falcons in the California State JC Track meet.
