The law requires that these cards be filled out and submitted before January 31 of each year.

Withdrawals One of Major Problems

Although it does not seem very apparent to many Falcons, there is a certain procedure one must take before dropping a class. One goes through so many procedures for a most evrything one does it is not understandable why so many people just stop attending classes without going through the proper procedure of dropping out.

One would not think of washing dishes before he runs the water, or putting on his shoes before putting on his socks, or eating an orange before peeling it, then where do people get the idea they can just stop attending a class before they go to the Counseling office and officially check out

Steps to Drop

On registration day every person is given a sheet of paper stating in detail the steps to be taken when registering for a class and also when dropping a class. The subject is also discussed in the Student Handbook which is available in the Student Personnel Office.

It must be that these sheets and books were completely ignored and not read at all or that the context of them did not seep into the minds of the students.

Last year in the Spring Semester, 34% of the student body dropped out of college. Only 18% of these drop-outs were legal. The other 16% of the students received an F for each class they were enrolled in.

Many Reasons

There are many reasons that students drop college and most of them seem valid and good at the time. Example A is the girl who cannot wait to finish school to get married. She has set the date so she just stops coming to school.

Another example is the boy who is having trouble making his car and insurance payments. His boss informs him that there is an opening for a full-time worker. So instead of coming back to school to check out he starts working full time the following week and never gives school another thought.

The F received for not attending a class is the same as an F for not doing passing work in a class. It is put on the permanent record sheet which is asked for many times for references.

Poor Records

Later in life many of these students realize what they have passed up and decide to go back to college. So many times they are not admitted to a college because of their poor records from previous years. It seems so foolish to them then why they did not take time to check out of classes officially.

Stated M. Edward Wagner, dean of admissions and records, "There are certain procedures to register and be in a class and there are also certain procedures that must be done to withdraw. This office does not like to record an F because a student has failed to obtain an official withdrawal, but they must be recorded the same as an F for failing work in a class."

How to Withdraw

For the benefit of the students we are running the complete information below on how to withdraw from a class. It is hoped that it will be read thoroughly and that students will take heed to follow the instructions.

To withdraw from a class, see you counselor and secure an official "Petition To Change Program" notice and take it to the Admissions office. If you are in good standing in class and voluntarily drop within the first 16 weeks of the semester you will not be penalized.

To withdraw from college see your counselor and secure a "Petion For Withdrawal From College."


The band plans to purchase blazers out of its own account. Plans call for the new jackets to be on hand before the end of the college year.


In more recent ASB action, outlines of the plan for the Mid-Winter Festival were given by Dean of Women Amy Dozier. The festival is scheduled for February.

In between football seasons thre seems to be a couple of sports here at Cerritos that occupy somewhat less than a popular position. They are, namely, basketball and baseball.

Football, not too far removed from the sports scene, just produced a record gate for Cerritos, with 35,000 heads counted for the five home games. Employing our mathematical wizardy, we find this to be an average of 7,000 a

It's safe to say this figure is probably second in the nation, behind Bakersfield, a hotbed for football.

Attendance Low

First year infielders included: Dick Neel first baseman, El Rancho; Willy Reaney second baseman, Downey: third basemen Bob Durazzo from Downey and Ron Meints from Artesia; and shortstop Dick Snyder, just out of the service.

Rounding out the list of new prospects were outfielders Jim Kobzeff, Downey; Tom Bentley, Montebello; Len Patinsky, Warren; Pat Drohan, St. Paul; and Dave Ostebo, Whittier.

Nicklas, 6'4", 245, was an All-American tackle in 1958 for Cerritos before going on to Baylor.

Frongillo, an All-American end in 1958, was the Falcons' outstanding lineman that year. He's 6'4", 225, and also hails from Baylor.

Best

Lane, who made All-American in 1957 while making only second team all-conference, is a 6'2" end who also played basketball for Cerritos. Rated by Ram scouts as the best pass-catcher in the Southwest Conference, Lane, too, played for Baylor.

First Team

Gregory, an all-around athlete for the Falcons in 1957, set a NAIA record this year by catching 63 passes. This figure also led the nation. The 6'2" Little All-American also had the same distinction at Cerritos. He was also a standout basketball player on Cerritos' first cage team.
