## Library To Feature Top Books, Lounge

Just a few years ago, Cerritos College existed of a big dream in the hearts of a few people; later it advanced to the drawing board stage, and today it is a looming reality covering 95 acres.

With eight buildings of the final plan completed, two under present construction and seven yet to come, Cerritos is expected to be completed by 1964.

Modern Unit
One of the buildings under present construction is the 27 . 000 sq . ft. library that will house 60,000 volumes. A large circular lounge will be in the circular of the modern-shaped building with four sections eminating from it for audio-visual, Reference, Periodicals and statistics:
Mosaic tile in shades of blue, brown and white, will provide the finishing outside touches.

Upon completion of the building, landscaping will begin in the immediate area between the library and the student Center. This quadrangle is said by many to be a highlight of one of the states most beautiful junior colleges.
The Fyrar construction company expects to have the in. brary completed and ready for use by March 1.

## Five: Enrollment

Excceding the anticipated enrollment by one, the final figure, including full a nd part times students, came to 5201 , for the fall semester of 1960-61. 262 students th the 262 students at this same time last year.
Broken down into full and part-lime students the figures 166 part-time students, as com. pared to 1,630 full-time and 3 . 571 part-time students this year. This is a 19 percent in. crease in overall enrollment and a 33 persent increase in full-time students.

Six: Homecoming

During their two day stay they examined and reviewed all areas of Cerritos educational offerings, including finances, instruction, administration and students.
Cerritos was eligible for a five-year accreditation this year and the results of the visit will be known some time in the spring.

Newly chosen swimming coach beginning next year, Bob Horn, says, "I have traveled to most all of the good pools throughout the nation and oth er parts of the world, and ou pools, when finished, w
The new pools will be built for all types of swimming. Everything necessary to make any type swimming more en joyable and convenient will be included in the design of the new pools.

Competition Pool
A competition pool will be the only eight lane width, 25 yard length pool in the nation to feature an all deep course. Each lane will be seven feet in width, and the depth of the pool will range from ten feet on ne end to 12 feet on the other
The deepness of this pool will The deepness of this pool will eliminate the advantage of a
shallow end for either team in a waterpolo match.

Swimming Pool
A second pool will be larger in surface area, but will only be three feet six inches to five This deep.
This pool will be used as a training pool and also for racing. Surface measurements will be 25 yards by 25 meters, and lane lines will run in both dito swim either meter races or yard races.

Fast Pools
Fast racing times will be easier to reach in these pools because of the way they are built. According to coach Horn, fast racing times depend on the flow system of the gutters and over flow system to take out the water, and good starting stands. The design of the new stands ine design of the new pools blocks for every racing lane.

Viewing Window
An added feature of the deep pool is an underwater viewing window. This will aid in watching for flaws in swimming strokes, in diving, and water ballet.
Diving boards for the new pool will be made of duraflex. This, as far as is known, is the best type for competition diving, and is the
