


Mosaic tile in shades of blue, brown and white, will provide the finishing outside touches.

## 'Illustrated' Twice As Big As First Issue

Cerritos College's newest publication, Campus Illustrated, makes its second appearance on the campus today.

Edited by Bob Pollock, the magazine features a four-page articlé on the inner-workings of the student council; a fourpage photography spread covering aerial pictures of the campus by Gary Tyner; a twopage photo essay taken by Pat O'Donnell of what a basketball coach is like during a game; an article on the college book store; a how-to-do-it article on final examinations by Pat Stewart, plus an activity calendar for the month of February.

Draws Acclaim

Illustrated made its first appearance in December and was declared an instant hit. Planned for monthly publication, the next issue is already in the planning stage and will be dis-tributed in late February.

The Cerritos student council has adopted the Illustrated as official magazine publica-

Designed as a magazine-supplement, Illustrated is the first major effort by a junior college to maintain a regular monthly magazine with its newspaper production.

Sixteen Pages

The first issue an eight page.

The first issue, an eight-page pioneer edition, drew critical rayes from a number of journalism authorities. The latest issue is a 16 page edition.

Plans are being readled for a special sports issue to come out near the end of the spring semester. Bound issues of the complete set of Illustrated's will be available at the end of the year.

Pollock, last semester's feature editor, is also editor of the 'Marks' sponsored "Campus Ill-ustrated," the recently intro-duced magazine which has won praise by faculty and students.

Before he attended Cerritos, Pollock attended Santa Fe High School and Long Beach State. Currently he is employed part-time by the Daily News.

#### Editors Named

Serving as associate editor will be Sara Middleton, who will be in charge of all Campus news. She held the position of assistant news editor first semester, which will no be filled by Sara Toscano.

Features will be handled by John LaRoche, as page two editor. LaRoche previously served as sports assistant.

Chris Van Houton will remain as organizations editor of page three, and the job of sports editor will again be held by Jim Ennis.

Pat O'Donnell has been named as photo editor, with Gary Tyner as assistant,


The Talon Marks has entered its fall issues in a national journalism contest and results should be announced soon.

# Top Ten News Stories for 1960 Selected By Staff

Around the first of the year most of the large daily and weekly newspapers run a list of the top ten news stories for the previous year. The Talon Marks staff not to be outdone, voted for the top ten news stories of Cerritos for 1960, which are listed below.

One: Dedication

1. The top news story selected by the staff is the Dedication of Cerritos College which took place on April 22. Dr. Ballentine Henley, president of the College of Osteopaths, Physicians, and Surgeons was the featured speaker at this event.

A dinner consored by the Cerritos Chizen's Advisory Committee and a program including the Falcon band playing for the first time in their new dress uniforms and the 45-voice Cerritos choir preceded the ceremonies.

Two: Potato Bowl

2. Western States Conference champions and with a nationally ranked football team, Cerritos' gridders received a bid to the Potato Bowl at Bakersfield.

Losing to host Bakersfield

College, the Falcons, with only a single regular season loss (that one to Long Beach City College, the national JC champion), posted one of the nation's best records.

Three: Illustrated

3. Campus Illustrated, Cerritos College's newest publication, ranked as the third best news maker. Making its appearance on December 2, an a supplement of Talon Marks, the copies were completely gone within two hours.

The new supplement will make a monthly appearance, the second issue being presented in today's issue of the paper.

This is the first effort by a junior college to publish a regular magazine supplement as part of the journalism program.

Four: Election

Balloting was held for two days, November 2 and 3, in the student Center. John F. Kennedy took a small lead the first day and continued to be victorious, just as in the national elections.

Five: Enrollment

Exceeding the anticipated enrollment by one, the final figure, including full and part times students, came to 5201, for the fall semester of 1960-61. This compares to a total of 4,-262 students at this same time last year.

Broken down into full and part-time students the figures showed 1,096 full time and 3,-166 part-time students, as compared to 1,630 full-time and 3,-571 part-time students this year. This is a 19 percent increase in overall enrollment and a 33 persent increase in full-time students.

Six: Homecoming

6. Pretty Sharon Buckridge reigned over the Homecoming activities, as Cerritos' third homecoming queen. Although it was windy and rainy and the fotball field was muddy, a large crowd watched the football team beat LACC 14-9.

It was too muddy for the floats to be driven around the field, but they were on display under the bleachers on the visitors side. With a few pushes one float was able to be shown along with the queen and her

Phi Beta Lambda, the business club, won the sweepstakes trophy for the best float. After the game a reception was held for sophomores and alumni in the student center.

Seven: Accreditation

7. Cerritos was visited by an accreditation team, headed by Dr. Hubert Semons and assisted by Dr. Reed Buffington, Dr. Robert Haugh, Dr. W. H. Van Duke, Bert Williams and George Roehr on October 11

During their two day stay they examined and reviewed all areas of Cerritos' educational offerings, including finances, instruction, administration and students.

Cerritos was eligible for a five-year accreditation this year and the results of the visit will be known some time in the spring.

Eight: Winter Play

8. "Under Milk Wood," the Cerritos' dramatists first major production of the fall semester of 1960 rated as the number eight news story.

Although a very unique play, and not often presented on the college level, it has enjoyed a long run at Cerritos. Only 55

long run at Cerritos. Only 55 seats were available for each performance, and during all performances they were always

Nine: Top Jaysee

9. Rated as the ninth best story was the selection of Cerritos by Junior College Newsletter as the "Junior College of the Month".

As Junior College of the Month, Cerritos was given well rounded coverage. The story told how the college was ideally located, how Dr. Burnight visualized the need for a College in Norwalk, and how the enrollment has climbed in the past four years.

Ten: Student Center

10. The official opening of the Student Center and Coffee Shop was February 4, with the cafeteria and the staff dining room being opened February 8.

The first activity in the new Student Center was the AMS-AWS sponsored dance, to kick off the new semester.

## Falcon Pools To Be Ready By Next Year

Some time around June, the construction is due to be completed on the beautiful Falcon. swimming pools.

Both pools are located between the student center and the physical education building on campus and are about onethird of the way completed.

#### Top Facilities

Newly chosen swimming coach beginning next year, Bob Horn, says, "I have traveled to most all of the good pools throughout the nation and other parts of the world, and our pools, when finished, will rate with the best of them."

The new pools will be built for all types of swimming. Everything necessary to make any type swimming more enjoyable and convenient will be included in the design of the new pools.

Competition Pool

A competition pool will be the only eight lane width, 25 yard length pool in the nation to feature an all deep course. Each lane will be seven feet in width, and the depth of the pool will range from ten feet on one end to 12 feet on the other.

The deepness of this pool will eliminate the advantage of a shallow end for either team in a waterpolo match.

Swimming Pool

A second pool will be larger in surface area, but will only be three feet six inches to five feet deep.

This pool will be used as a training pool and also for racing. Surface measurements will be 25 yards by 25 meters, and lane lines will run in both directions. This will allow racers to swim either meter races or yard races.

**Fast Pools** 

Fast racing times will be easier to reach in these pools because of the way they are built.
According to coach Horn,

fast racing times depend on the ability of the gutters and overflow system to take out the waves caused by motion in the water, and good starting stands. The design of the new pools includes stationary starting blocks for every racing lane.

Viewing Window

An added feature of the deep pool is an underwater viewing window. This will aid in watching for flaws in swimming strokes, in diving, and water ballet.

Diving boards for the new pool will be made of duraflex. This, as far as is known, is the best type for competition diving, and is the type used for Olympic pools.

"The entire structure and design of both pools is arranged according to Olympic standards," states coach Horn.

### Grapplers Set For Road Trip


