Enrollment Drops Off As 4758 Register

After climbing to new heights and setting new records in the fall semester, the Cerritos College enrollment figures are expected to drop off about 300 for the spring.

With the total day and night enrollment at 4758 as of Monday of this week, no more than 200 more students were expected to report until today.

Today is the final day for registration which will be held in the student center from 9 a.m. to noon.

According to M. Edward Wagner, dean of admissions and records, it is a normal occurrence for college enrollments to fall somewhat during the second semester.

"Cerritos College, however, will not suffer as great a loss of enrollment as most schools, since it is so new," he said.

ASB Services At Cerritos Told By 'Marks'

For the benefit of new students and those continuing students who may have forgotten, student services are available on campus in the form of library, bookstore, college nurse, job placement, and student newspaper.

All members of the Associated Student are eligible for services rendered in these areas.

Library

The library, located in the technical arts building (see campus map on page 2), is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. daily and from 6 to 9 every evening with the exception of Friday.

Library facilities here are still somewhat limited, but the big move to the new building now under construction in the center of the campus is scheduled for March.

After the move an extensive purchase of books and equipment is expected to make the Cerritos Library one of the finest.

Bookstore

The student bookstore, open 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. daily and 6 to 9 every evening except Friday, is operated by the Associated Students and is a yearly part of the student body budget.

Authorized textbooks and equipment for all classes offered at Cerritos are available here and also used textbooks will be bought back at the end of the semester. It is located in the student center.

The college nurse's office is located in the physical education building and is open daily from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

All students who are absent because of illness or doctor or dentist appointment are required to secure a health excuse from the nurse. This is for securing funds from the state and for presenting to individual instructors.

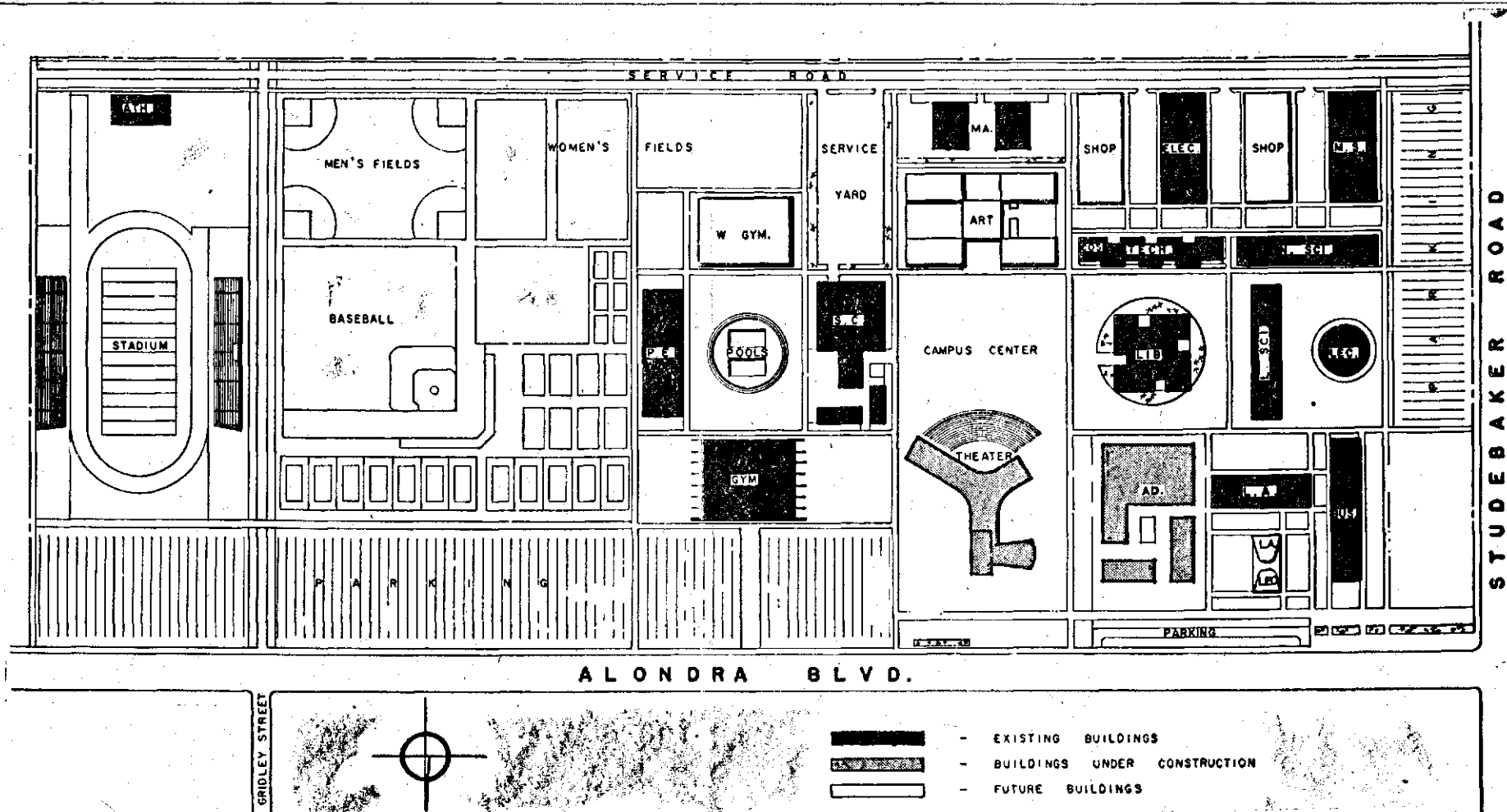
Evening students, however, must get their excuses from the admissions office, in the natural science building.

Dental Assistant Students Sink Their Teeth Into New Semester

"Look ma, no teeth!"

This statement does not hold true in room PS 16, for everywhere you look you can see teeth of all sizes and shapes. Making plaster casts of teeth, however, is only one of the many things the women there do in their preparation for becoming a dental assistant.

There are approximately 38 women enrolled in the dental assistant classes at Cerritos and the course may be taken in a one or two year period.

The one year course, preferred by the older students, has only classes in dental assisting, while the two year course has classes required for graduation and will give the students an A.A. degree upon completion.

As of October, 1960 the approved dental assistant programs in Junior Colleges are recognized by the American Dental Society. Cerritos has been named as one of the approved schools.

The curriculum for Dental Assisting is applied dental science, dental office management, operating room procedures and dental laboratory procedure.

In the applied dental science students learn dental anatomy, physiology, diet and nutrition, applied psychology, oral hygiene, emergency treatment, terminology, anesthesia and oral surgery, pedodontics and orthodontics.

Dental office management consists of records and filing, bookkeeping, ordering supplies, telephone techniques, reception room procedures, charting, secretarial duties, banking terminology, record systems and appointments.

Care of the operating room and equipment, housekeeping, chair-side procedure, instruments and their care, sterilization, general patient routine and tray set up are included in operating room procedure.

Students learn x-ray exposing, developing and mounting, impression materials, waxes and inlay carving, investing and casting procedures, pouring models, making dies, making face plates and safety rules in dental laboratory rules.

In all of these classes they

are trained to carry on any duties in the dental field so that they will be able to relieve the dentist of all non-professional duties.

The Dental Assistant extension course is offered for women that have had two or more years experience in an ethical dentist office and one years membership with the American Dental Assistants Association.

Another part of the course is the on the job practice the last semester of their schooling. After the offices have been approved, the Job Placement Office places a girl in each office. The students work no less than five hours a week.

Upon the completion of the day and night courses the stu-

dents will be qualified to take a National Certification Exam to become National Certified Dental Assistants.

Students also attend the monthly meetings of their local Dental Assistant Association as student members.

Instructors in the Dental Assistant classes are Dr. Werner Cline, and Mrs. Sonora Spencer. Mrs. Spencer has been a dental assistant since 1929 and taught at Fullerton eight years before coming to Cerritos.

Attention Falcons: Any students who would like to have their teeth x-rayed may make an appointment with Mrs. Spencer in PS 16. The students need more people to practice on.

knowledge of these interested in this field.

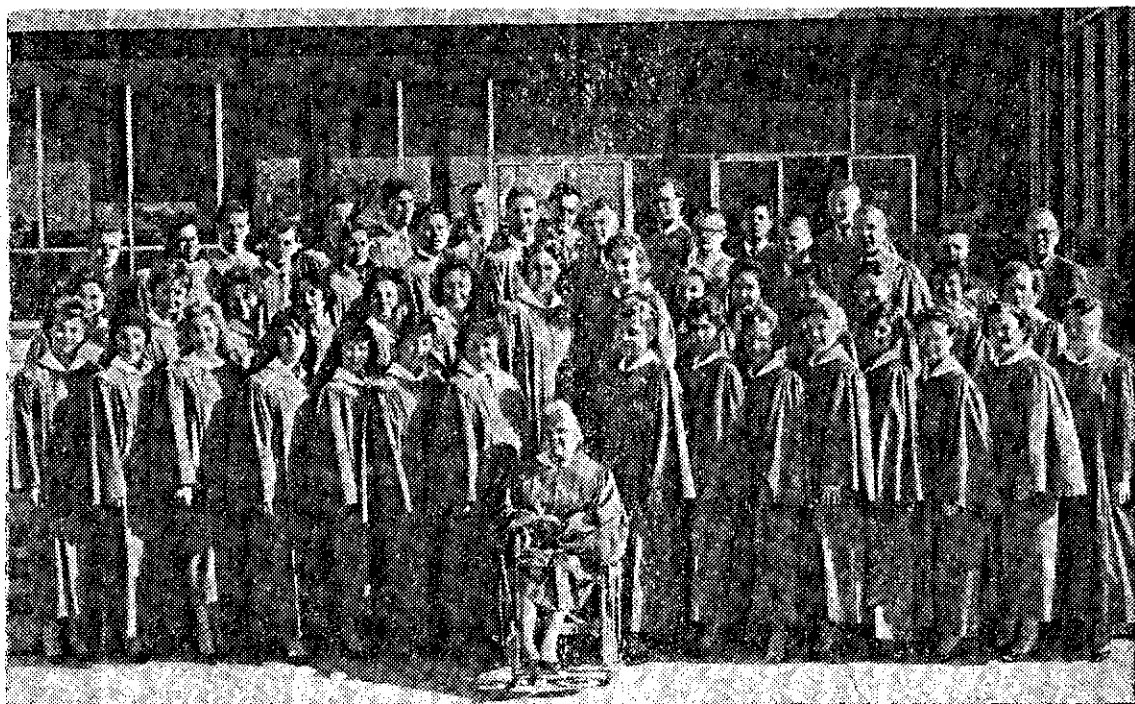
Newman Club

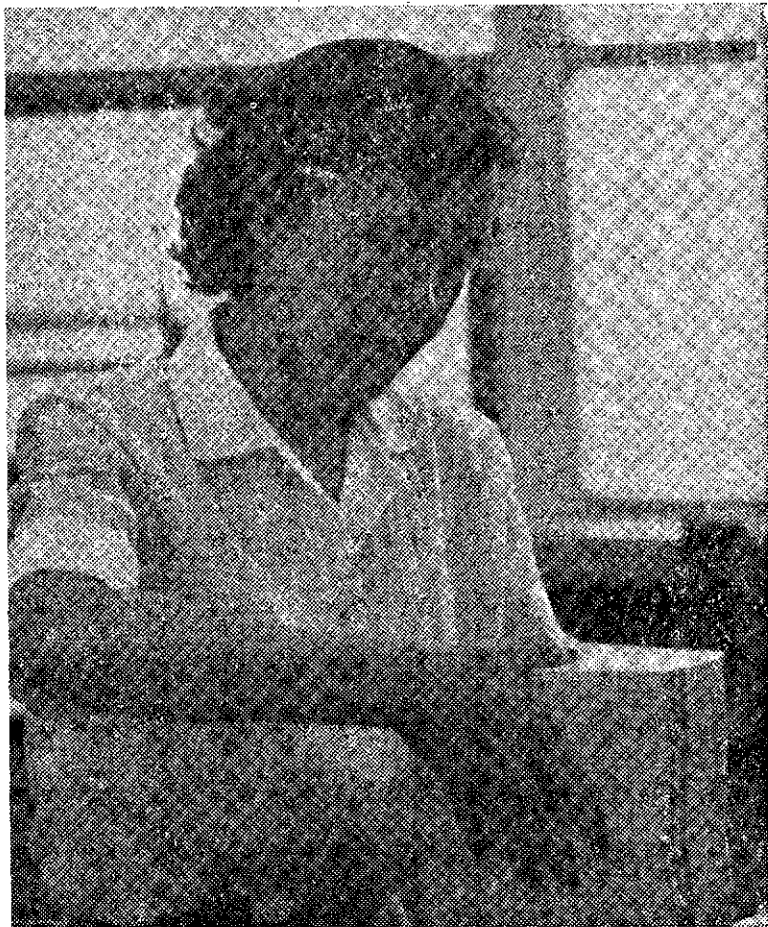

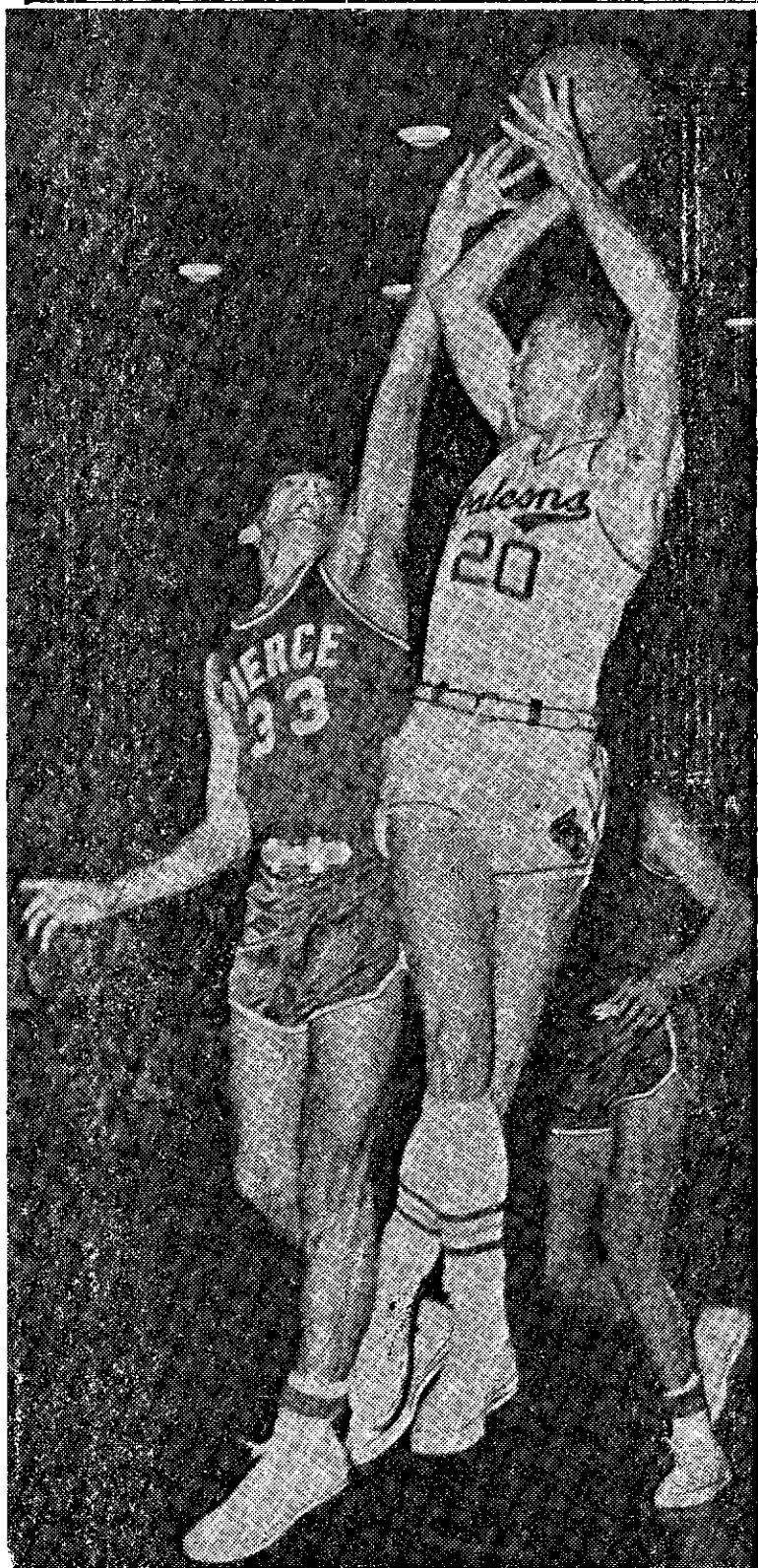

Crucial Cage Series in Phoenix Weekend Action

Cerritos College's underdog bid to remain in the running for the Western States Conference basketball title, depends on a two-game series in Phoenix, Arizona.

The Falcons oppose Phoenix College tonight and tomorrow night. Phoenix' Bears, leading the loop until last weekend, are in a must-win situation also. A double-loss to Los Angeles City College by the Bears, pushed the Arizona team into third-place, trailing the unbeaten LACC club and once beaten Cerritos.

Overcome Jinx?

The big question for Cerritos' John Caine, is will the Falcons be able to snap a jinx that has plagued every California ball club that has travelled to Arizona. The Bears have made short work of three WSC squads, Glendale, Compton and Ventura, in winning their first six contests.

The lone Falcon loss, to Los Angeles, could easily mean the early decision as to the eventual conference titlist.

The high-scoring Bears, averaging just over 90-points a game, were hauled back to earth by Los Angeles, 86-84 and 85-76.

Weekend Sweep

Cerritos failed to lose any ground, however, sweeping a weekend pair against Glendale, 68-64, and Ventura. The Falcon victory over Ventura's Pirates was the first in history for Cerritos.

Caine's hopes are for a split in the pair, indicating, "It would really be tough to win both."

Some tab the Falcons as a possible surprise to the Bears. Sporting five wins in the first round of league play, Cerritos also picked up the Sam Barry Tournament title and have become a "how-do-they-do-it?" club.

Falcons Underdogs

Although Phoenix has its back to the wall, the LACC series disaster might soften up the Bears for a weekend killing. In spite of hopes, however, the Falcons go into both games as decided 10-point underdogs.

Conjecture rules supreme, with "ifs" the big thing for the future. If Cerritos could make a sweep of the Phoenix series, then the Falcons could face Los Angeles at home in the final meeting between the two.

Split Possibility

A split at Phoenix would put the Bears back another full game, still in third place ... although Cerritos would lose a game and remain in second.

A Phoenix sweep would give the Bears some life, putting them in second place, a game behind LACC, while the Falcons would bounce to a precarious third.

Regardless of the outcome, the WSC race is still a three-team battle. The only major problem seems to be: Who will knock off Los Angeles?

The Cubs romped at will in the second half and easily handed Cerritos their first conference loss, 87-70.

It now appears to be all over but the shouting in the Western States Conference race. Los Angeles all but clinched their second straight title by twice downing Phoenix last weekend.

Any championship aspirations the Falcons may possess lie at the end of a tough road to how. And we mean "road" literally. Cerritos must yet travel to Phoenix to meet the Bears twice (tonight and tomorrow night) and to Los Angeles, where a win by a visiting team is news.

So, as you can see, schedule-wise the Falcons aren't exactly in a commanding position. Impeccable road play is the by-word, along with a slip by the Cubs.

Have you heard the rags-to-riches story about Stanford Patton, high-scoring LACC center? Seems Patton, who, by the way, used to play high school basketball with Oscar Robertson, was a lowly P.E. player when Coach Glen Berry, obviously hard up for a few more players, plucked him out and issued him a suit. What occurred after that should happen only to John Caine.

The moral of this story seems to be that these high-pressure recruiters would perhaps do well to have a look in their own back yard.

Golf was added to the Cerritos athletic curriculum this spring ... that becomes the eighth varsity sport for the Falcon campus. The spring sports calendar will really be booming with the tail-end of basketball and wrestling on tap, then a full schedule of baseball, track and field, tennis and the newest addition.

The sports scene will really be crowded next year. The Falcons will add water polo in the fall, with swimming making its appearance in the spring.

Full Tennis, Golf Slate Announced

Athletic Director Gene Martin announced the official playing schedules for Falcon tennis and golf teams this week.

A 15-match golf slate will establish the sport for the first time on the Cerritos campus. Coached by Don Hall, the link team will hold six of their matches at Candlewood Country Club in Whittier, site of all Falcon home matches.

Martin himself will coach the Cerritos tennis squad. The net team has scheduled 16 matches, eight of them at the Falcon campus courts.

The Falcon golfers opened their season on Monday with Fullerton and will open their Western States Conference match play against Ventura next Monday, at the Pirate home course.

Cerritos tennis members will go into action for the first time next Thursday, meeting Fullerton at the Hornet campus.
