The counci, in ruesay's regu far meeting, transfcrred the $\$ 800$ depleting that reserve to nothing.

Money had been available to the newspaper to publish papers up to Easter vacation, b but not afterward. The council action added an additional four issues following the vacation.

## No Campus Illustrated

It was stipulated by the council that their funds could not be used to publish any further is the magazine supplement that has been printed twice this year.
Talon Marks, published off campus at Approved Printing in Long Beach, has already pub-
lished 20 issues, as many as were lished 20 issues, as many as were
put out during all of last year.

The newspaper budget for the current year was originally $\$ 6723$, just enough for 33 issues of Talon Marks.
This figure, however, also had to be used for supplies, contest entries, special issues, Campus
Illustrated, etc. and was cut down considerably by these expenses.
Journalism purchase orders for photography expenses were ap-
proved as a part of, the $\$ 800$ proved aspar allocation.

We noted with interest Cerritos' final basketball statistics released last week by head coach John Caine.

On looking at them, one, in particular, caught our eye. This was field goal accuracy, about as important to a oasketball player as a pitcher's earned run average. Leading this particular category was Bill Crow, a substitute who, at one time or another this year, managed to play every position for the Falcons.

For the season, Bill, far and away the best substitute in the conference this year, hit an amazing 49 per cent of his shots. This startling figure was achieved on 114 field goals out of 235 attempts.

## A First

This statistic no doubt helped sway the people who picked the all conference team as Crow was placed on honorable mention. This action must certainly have set some kind of precedent. Never have we heard of a nonstarter making any part of any part of an all-league team

Crow's position on the Falcon squad reminds us of that of Sam Jones who, along with teammate Frank Ramsey, must be the best second-stringer in basketball. Like Jones, the inserting of Crow in the lincup seemed to give the team a lift that was many time reflected in the final score.

In the Sam Barry Tournament, for instance, Crow came off the bench against San Diego and hit for 24 points which paved the way for, at the time, one of the season's big upsets. You'll recall Cerritos went on to win the tourney.

Back to the statistics: In conference play, Guard Verl Pearce led Cerritos in scoring with almost a 13 point average. Rebounding, where games are won and lost, was dominated by Jerry Atkins with 65 retrieves while Gary Stewart led in defensive rebounds with 47 . For the entire year, Pearce led the Falcons in scoring, rebounding, assists and jump balls.
