Reserve Funds Boost Failing 'Marks Budget

Allocation of \$800 by the student council to the newspaper fund has given a new life to what could have been a dead Talon Marks.

The council, in Tuesday's regular meeting, transferred the \$800 from their undistributed reserve, depleting that reserve to nothing.

Money had been available to the newspaper to publish papers up to Easter vacation, but not afterward. The council action added an additional four issues following the vacation.

No Campus Illustrated

It was stipulated by the council that their funds could not be used to publish any further issucs of "Campus Illustrated," the magazine supplement that has been printed twice this year.

Talon Marks, published off campus at Approved Printing in Long Beach, has already published 20 issues, as many as were put out during all of last year.

The newspaper budget for the current year was originally \$6723, just enough for 33 issues of Talon Marks.

This figure, however, also had to be used for supplies, contest entries, special issues, Campus Illustrated, etc. and was cut down considerably by these expenses.

Journalism purchase orders for photography expenses were approved as a part of the \$800 newspaper allocation.

Other Action

Other action of the council this week saw Kirk Dolan take office as freshman class president, making the sixth new council member this semester, and the third at his post.

John LaRoche, former president of the freshman class, has dropped out of school because of serious illness.

The council also voted that clubs who participated in the Midwinter Festival will receive 100 per cent of their total profits.

It had been previously suggested that the Associated Students take 30 per cent for the student body fund.

In view of the depletion of the undistributed reserve, Commis-sioner of Activities Yvonne Brower moved to dispense with the allocation of \$200 for the spring formal. 'The necessary funds can be picked up from other accounts," she said.

Speech Squad Wins Ratings **At State Meet**

Falcon speechsters returned home last Monday from the state championship rounds in Bakersfield, bringing with them a second place rating in oratory and several superior and excellent ratings,

Members Rate High

Forensic member Dale Harrell was awarded a second place (statewide) for his work in oratory, and Carol Kuwada reached the final rounds of extemporancous and oratorical speaking to earn superior ratings.

The two debate teams of Carey-Woolery and Folts-Harrell reached the quarter finals, competing against some very strong teams. Unofficially, the Cerritos teams gained fifth place, defeating many of the northern college squads which were considered to be strong competition.

Palomar Takes First

Excellent ratings were awarded the two debate teams, and to Sue Wiseman for oral interprelation.

Sweepstakes prize, awarded to the school with the highest total points, went to Palomar College, with Pasadena winning second place. "This proved that the southern section schools are top competition," commented speech advisor Juliette Venitsky. "Though the northern schools were considered stronger.'

Plans for the near future include a novice tournament and the extensive national Phi Rho Pi-sponsored championship meet.

Bakersfield Campus

The state-wide tournament was held on the Bakersfield college campus and hosted by El Camino college. Climaxing the two-day tournament was a banquet for all participants, and awards were given out to winners. Trophies were awarded to all first place winners and certificates were given to participants placing in other ranks.

Falcon representatives to the tourney were Dale Harrell, Carol Kuwada, Sue Wiseman, Terry Folts, Tom Carey, Bob Woolery and Barbara Chester.

Some of these names may be remembered for their notable performances in "Under Milk Wood," the dramatists' presentation of last fall.


Rehearsals Begin





Prizes, music, and refreshments will highlight the library's moving day which is slated for next Wednesday from 1:00 'till about 4:00 in the afternoon.

"The entire moving should take only a few hours, because of the short distance. The maintenance men will handle the moving of the heavy equipment. This will be a good chance ti have the students to participate in an in-tellectual and muscular activity," stated Carl Johnson, head librarian.

60,000 Book Capacity

The new library will house an eventual 60,000 books. The present library contains approximately 12,000 books to interest all students. The new facility can boast of 27,000 square feet.

Among the new additions in the library will be conference and typing rooms for the students. It will also contain ten carrells (individual desks) for student usage. The reading and study space will also be increased. Another new feature will be the student browsing circle.

Hours Unchanged

Library hours for the new building will remain the same as in the past: 8:00 a.m. until 4:30 p.m., and 6:00 p.m.-9:00 p.m. on Mondays through Thursdays. On Fridays, the library will not be open in the evening.

Also, the library will feature the Notable Books of 1960. 

Cerritos College's spirited wrestling squad placed sixth in the state tournament at El Camino last Friday and Saturday.

The Falcon team was represented by Ken Skow, Chuck Booth, Dave Young, Jim Har-rington and Buddy Cox in the tournament.

#### **Two Eliminated**


In the first day of competition Harrington and Eox were eliminated early with Dave Young lasting until later on when he was finally defeated. Skow and Booth were still in the top four at the end of the day.

At the end of the second day defending state champion Chuck Booth came through with a fourth place in what Coach Joe Incorvaia termed the toughest weight class of the tournament. As Incorvaia said "Chuck went down fighting in a rugged match."

### Skow Third

In probably the biggest surprise of the day, Ken Skow took a third place in the finals to put Cerritos in sixth place as a team.

Coach Joe Incorvaia thought the competition was extremely good in the state tournament and was well satisfied with the performances by the men that represented the Falcon team, but not too surprised.



We noted with interest Cerritos' final basketball statistics released last week by head coach John Caine.

On looking at them, one, in particular, caught our eye. This was field goal accuracy, about as important to a basketball player as a pitcher's earned run average. Leading this particular category was Bill Crow, a substitute who, at one time or another this year, managed to play every position for the Falcons.

For the season, Bill, far and away the best substitute in the conference this year, hit an amazing 49 per cent of his shots. This startling figure was achieved on 114 field goals out of 235 attempts.
