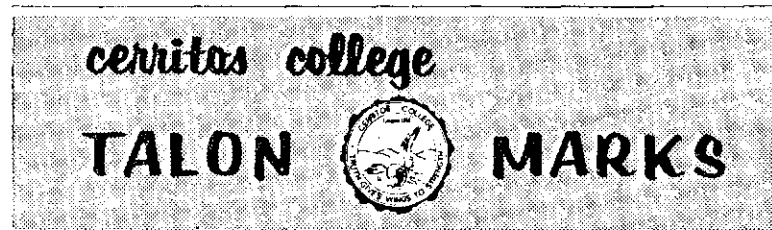

Delegates Leave For SC Government Workshop

Approximately 500 students from junior colleges in the Southern California area will meet at Glendale College tomorrow for the fall convention of the Southern California Junior College Student Government Association. Of this group, Cerritos will be represented by 10 delegates and three advisors.

The purpose of the convention is to prepare for a state convention in November. At approximately the same time the Southern California group meets, Northern and Central California Junior Colleges will also hold separate conventions. From the three sections, selected delegates will go to the State Convention at San Francisco in November.

Recommendations

A full day at Glendale is scheduled for the Southern California meeting. Lunch will be served at noon and a general meeting from 1:45 p.m. to 3:15 p.m. will conclude the days activities.

It is now up to the Talon Marks political committee and John Palmer and Wallace Cohen of the political science department to judge the two best pieces of literature as the winning campaign articles.

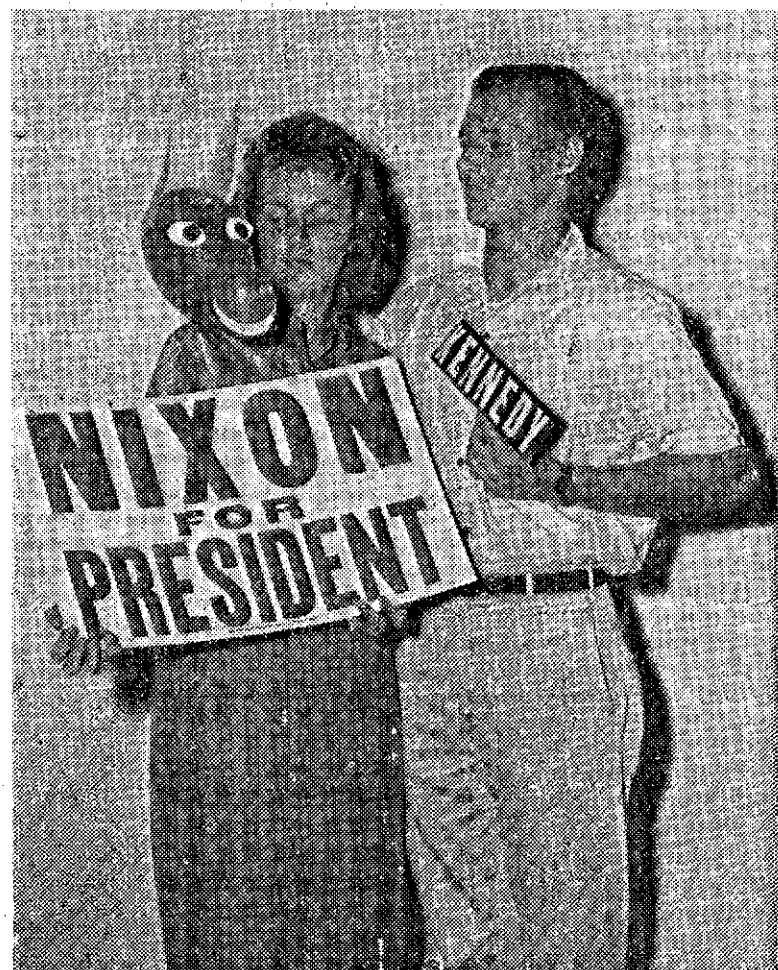
On the two days of the Cerritos election, polling places will be set up at the student center and near the lecture halls for the convenience of the politically-minded students.

Phoenix Win String Snapped With 28-19 Falcon Triumph

Cerritos College's football team kept its record intact of never falling to an out-of-state foe during the regular season. Keeping that record intact was almost secondary to the 28-19 football triumph that saw the Falcons stun a favored Phoenix College squad.

Phoenix lost its first game in two years, seeing a 20 Western States Conference lead go by the boards and send them into second place. Cerritos' Falcons are now tied with Glendale's surprising Vaqueros for first place in the WSC.

Halftime Deficit

It was no easy struggle for Cerritos, having to come from behind a 13-12 halftime deficit to overhaul the potent Bears.

The Falcons led off with a score. Quarterback Grant Owen tossing to Mario Mendez on a 13 yard pass in the first quarter. A two-point conversion try failed, with Phoenix bouncing back for a short running score and a kicked conversion to take the lead.

Mendez changed pitchers and gave the Falcons another short-lived lead in the second period, gathering in a Rick Alvarado toss good for 25 yards. Again, the two-point conversion effort failed.

The Bears took the lead again,

this time for the rest of the first half, with a 52 yard scoring run by Dick Haywood.

Cerritos Dominates

After that, it was all Cerritos. In the third quarter, the Falcons controlled the ball for all but five plays, rolling to another touchdown, Mendez scoring from four yards out, his tenth t.d. effort in four games. Halfback Paul Sallinger gathered in Alvarado's two-point conversion pass.

The domination continued into the fourth period, End Earl Coleman taking a 24 yard pass from Owen to add the final Cerritos touchdown, Alvarado running the two-point conversion over to add the final points.

A desperation Bear pass in the closing minute clicked for 70 yards, but the damage had been done.

Outdistanced

Cerritos out-statisticed the heavily favored Phoenix team, 360-294 in total offensive yards, completing 10 of 14 passes for 139 yards. Phoenix completed only two or nine throws, with the alert Falcons picking off two

for interceptions.

Phoenix had gone through four straight opponents, two of them in conference games, before running into Cerritos. For Bear Coach Shanty Hogan, it was his first loss at the Arizona institution.

Following the game, Cerritos' Bench selected Owen and Guard John Tjaarda as back and line-man of the week. Both players are sophomores.

Damp Field

The game was played in the Bear's campus stadium, on a field just dampened by passing morning showers. Nearly 6,000 people flocked into the over-crowded bleachers to witness the clash, billed as the Phoenix homecoming.

For the Bears, the future still failed to look much brighter, as Glendale looms on the horizon as another team to beat. Both Glendale and the Falcons moved into a tie for WSC honors with their weekend victories. Phoenix and Glendale meet on November 4, at Phoenix.

Remaining undefeated, Cerritos College's cross country team knocked off two more teams last Friday as they took top honors in a tri-meet with Pierce and Compton. The race ran over the Pierce course was scored Cerritos 23, Pierce 41, Compton 67.

Gurule Again

Gene Gurule of Cerritos held the individual spotlight by setting a new course record with a time of 15:03. Jim Connolly of Pierce, who finished second to Gurule in the meet, held the old record of 15:16 which he set last year.

Cerritos ran 15 men and placed them all in the first 25 finishers. Pierce had seven men in this bracket while Compton managed only three.

Five Lead

With the top five from each team accounting for the scoring, Cerritos gathered its winning 28 points in this fashion. Gene Gurule (1) 15:03; John Kosarich (5) 15:50; Darryl Taylor (6) 15:33; Delare Mannie (7) 16:04; Art Pittman (9) at 16:16.

Sportraits

On a dank, dismal night in Arizona's capital city, a football team named Cerritos made a 400-mile trip worthwhile as they shackled the vaunted Bears of Phoenix College.

Excepting the site, an unknowing spectator could just as well as interpreted the fanfare as a regular home contest for the Falcons.

Complete with yell leaders, mascots, band and a mess of hysterical fans, Cerritos no doubt left quite an indelible impression on Phoenix.

For one thing, our local heroes rudely interrupted quite a string of victories for a junior college team—14, to be exact. Another memory no doubt left lingering in Bear fans is the fact that their homecoming wasn't exactly their most successful in history.

In pre-season releases, Phoenix advertised a certain All-American halfback by the name of Dennis Keith. From our angle, a gross act of misrepresentation most certainly took place down on the field. Instead, a party by the name of Richard (Hop-scotch) Haywood cavorted like he owned the real estate he was performing on. Though perhaps not possessing the speed of Long Beach's Dee Andrews, he most certainly wouldn't come out second best in a dodging contest (if there is such a thing) with the Viking phenom.

"Hop-scotch" was seemingly the Bears' whole offensive salvo, save for a big end who snatched a slant-in pass and romped more than half the field for a touchdown in the waning seconds of the game.

While not wishing to disrupt the tranquil sweetness of victory, the officiating wasn't exactly the greatest this observer has witnessed. The calls themselves aren't specifically what we're referring to, but rather the actual signalling of the violation itself.

For instance, Falcon Guard Kenny Reed was booted out of the game for reasons obviously known only by the officials and coaches, not to mention Reed himself.

Another incident recalled is when Mario Mendez bulled his way into the end zone. Not until the scoreboard acknowledged the fact did the fans know for certain whether or not he had scored.

A particular hazard in coaching junior college football, is the case of Ray Bishop, mentor of Pierce's defending WSC champs. The Brahmas last year were predominantly a freshman squad, with no doubt an eye on this season.

However, several key lettermen failed to return to the fold for various reasons, and Pierce consequently is struggling for a break-even season.

If you recall, this corner picked the Brahmas to finish optimism was, of course, based on the presumption that second in the Western States Conference this year. This Bishop would have at his disposal at least a majority of returnees from last season's 7-2 squad. Of course, the race is far from over, and Pierce did whip Compton last weekend, but that seems to be the fad this year, anyway.

BACK TO NUMBER ONE

Revenge Tilt Pits Pierce Versus Falcons

Cerritos College, with their finger in the first-place pie, takes on Pierce's Brahmas tomorrow night as the former returns to the friendly confines of their home stadium. Kickoff time is 8 p.m.

As for the Falcons, they must be wondering whether they can get "up" for their third consecutive game. And "up" they'll have to be as the Brahmas have apparently jelled after much early-season sputtering.

After three straight losses, Pierce finally found the winning formula in a 15-14 upset of Compton's Tartars which atoned for last year's Compton win, throwing the Western States Conference into a three-way tie.

Pierce, as a pre-season pick, was supposed to be right near the top. However, the Brahmas have done nothing to indicate they are anywhere near as strong as they were a season ago. Losses have come at the hands of East Los Angeles (18-7), Riverside (33-13) and Glendale (22-13).

Cerritos is fresh off of three straight convincing victories. After losing their opener to undefeated Long Beach, the Falcons have recorded high-scoring triumphs over Fullerton, Compton and Phoenix.

Veteran Backs

Two All-City performers plus a pair of veteran halfbacks make up Pierce's backfield. The former duo finds Hal Bedsole at quarterback and Steve Ogden at the fullback slot. At the halves are returnees Paul Lewis and Mike Genne.

Attesting to Glendale's strength, the Brahmas received numerous injuries from that contest, among them 240 pound tackle Emil Iwansky, end Richard Hamilton, guard Jack White, end John Nottingham, tackle Tom Steele and center Richard Huffman.

Pierce, coached by Ray Bishop, last year upset Cerritos in one of the nation's major jaysee upsets, 20-14.

The Falcons hold a 2-1 edge in the series, whipping the Brahmas in convincing style both in 1957-58.

Spanish Club

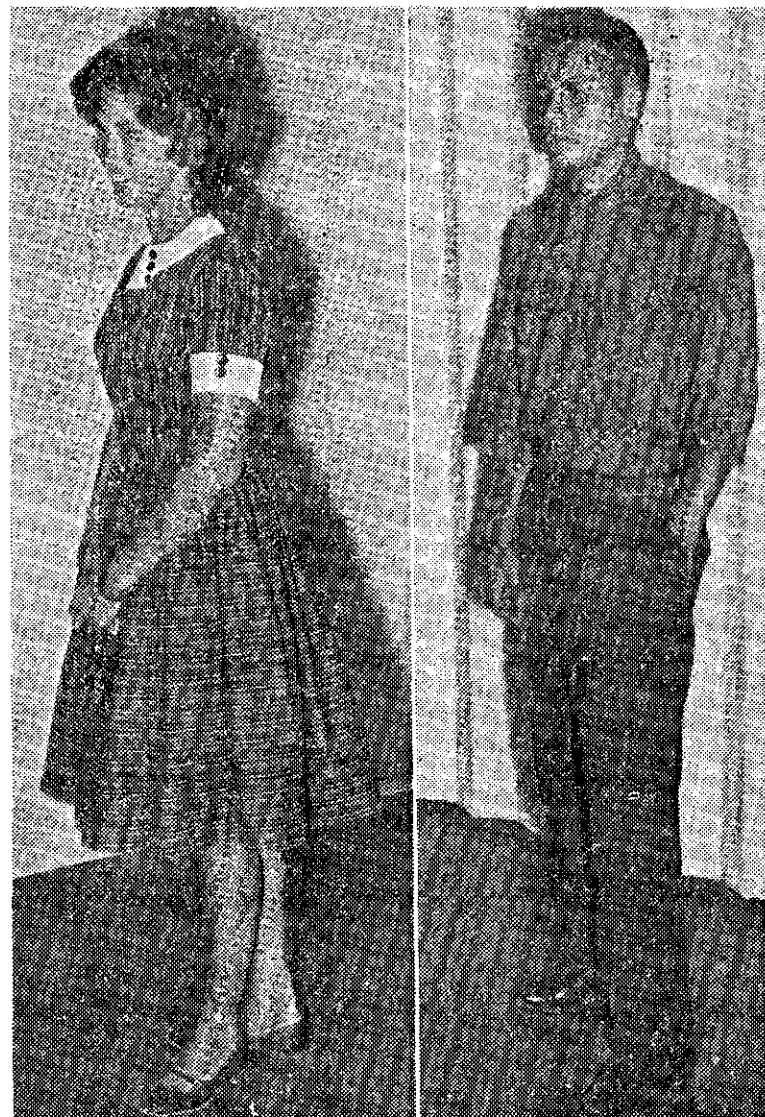
Officers for the recently organized Spanish Club were elected during their recent meeting.

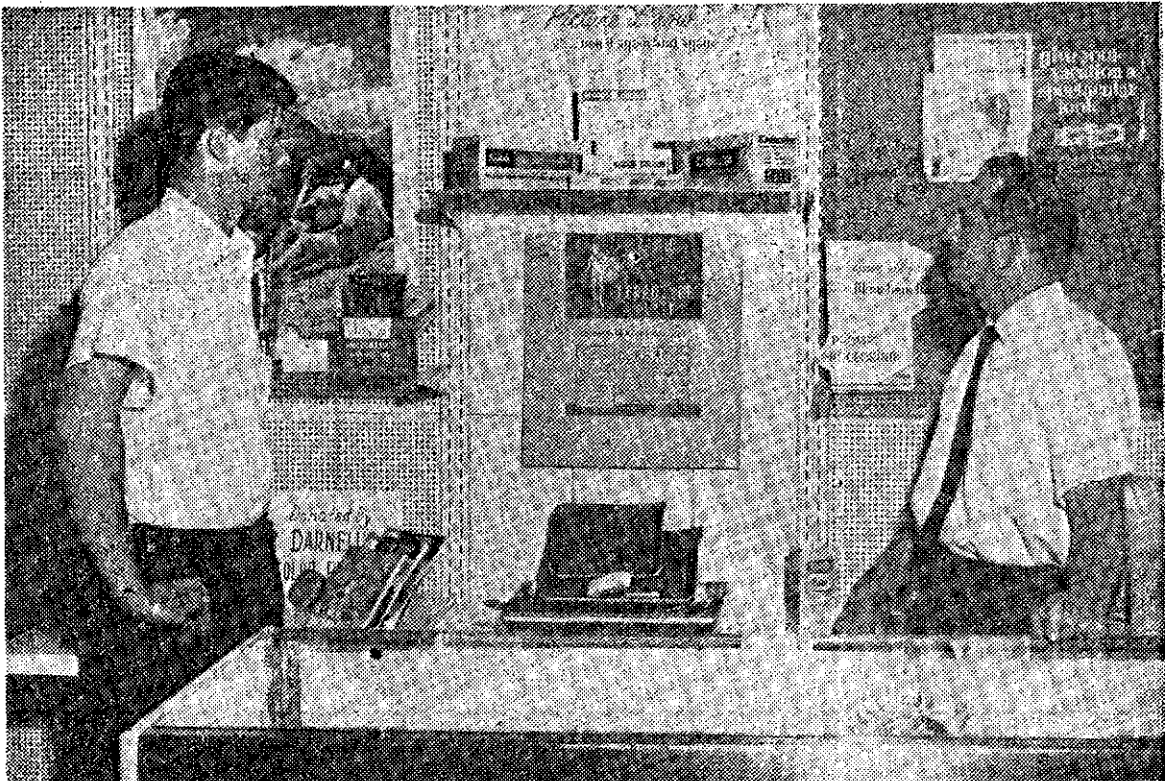

Distributive Ed. Class 'Minds Its Business'

Approaching the Cerritos campus from Studebaker Road, and coming through the Business Building breezeway, brings you past a large display window presently showing fall fashions from the Bobbie Lynn Shop of Bellflower.

This display arrangement and also those found in room eight of the business building are there through the efforts of Joseph Incorvaia's Distributive class. Room eight itself has been arranged to accommodate numerous methods of merchandise display, giving students an opportunity to work with variety of goods. One such approach is a table setting being shown in a shadow box window, complete with linen, silver and carafe.

Student Planning

The goods used to create these displays are provided through loans to the class from area merchants. The ideas and work involved in planning and putting together all displays come from the students and is part of class curriculum.

Distribution is anything that happens to a product from the time it leaves the farmer or manufacturer until it reaches the consumer. Distributive education is the training of students in the field of selling, merchandising, retailing, and advertising these goods.

Part-Time Role

In order to provide thorough training in this process of dispensing goods and services, the students in addition to enrollment in the merchandising class, must either be already employed or be willing to accept part-time employment in a related distributive occupation.

This type of program gives the student an opportunity to integrate classroom instruction with actual daily application of basic skills. With a program such as this, where college and community share in the responsibility of teaching and helping student; school and community are brought closer together.
