## 'Thinking Man'Only . $1 \%$

Of the millions of students now attending college in the United States approximately $99.9 \%$ will never have an original idea in their lives.

The remaining $.1 \%$ may have an idea some time, but it will undoubtedly frighten them out of their wits, and they will bury it where it will never be heard from again.

Under these circumstances it would seem that the many instructors who now spend their days attempting to teach students to think are merely wasting their time.

How much more profitable it would be if the instructors could spend their days conditioning students in a manner similar to that which Pavlov used on his dogs. They could be taught in such a way that their reflexes would give the impression of sound ideas, though they had them not.

Teachers will protest that if their methods induce one single member of the $.1 \%$ to recognize his original idea when it comes their labor has not been in vain. I submit that there is more danger in $99.9 \%$ of the population who can't think walking around believing they can, than in . $1 \%$ who can think believing they cannot.

The great philosopher Ambrose Bierce has defined "understanding" as "A cerebral secretion that enables one having it to know a house from a horse by the roof on the house. Its nature and laws have been exhaustively expounded by Locke, who rode a house, and Kant, who lived in a horse."

The fact of understanding then, is unimportant-it is the appearance of understanding that really counts. In four years of intensive conditioning even the most stupid could be taught to respond in a socially suitable manner to any stimulus.

It may be that the present sorry state of the world is due to a social attitude which forces those incapable of thought into giving the impression they are thinking. The effort involved in maintaining this hypocrisy leaves them frustrated, and they take their frustration out on society.
if only an automatic response to stimuli was required, they could be carefree and happy, and the world situation would immediately improve.

Even if the change didn't improve the situation, it certainly couldn't make it any worse.

The Cerritos swim team is currently in a tie for first place with Pierce, followed by Glendale and Pasadena with identical 0-1 marks.

Coach Horn's aqua boys faced Pierce last Friday, and the winner is riding atop the conference standings.

Pierce is leading the tennis standings with a 3-0 mark, followed by LACC (2-0), Pasadena (1-0), Cerritos (1-2), Glendale (1-3), Ventura ( $0-1$ ), and Compton ( $0-2$ ).

The Falcon's lone win was over Compton, on the Falcon's courts last week.

Coach Don Hall's golfers are currently in the conference cellar with a 0-5 mark, while Pasadena is on the other end of the standings. Glendale is second with a $2-0$ record, followed by LACC and Phoenix with $\mathbf{2}-1$ records.

The Cerritos baseball team is currently atop the league standings with a 3-0 record, and Coach Kincaid's hitting crew is favored to capture the title.

Cerritos ripped Pierce last Friday, to avenge an earlier setback at the bats of the Brahmas, 10-7. That encounter was in the finals of the Western States Conference Tournament.

Cerritos is leading the conference in track also, as the Falcons have defeated four league foes already, with the most recent two being Pierce and Glendale at Cerritos last Friday afternoon.

Cerritos will host the Southern California JJunior College Relays on April 19, with the first event being scheduled to get underway at 11 a.m.

The Falcons will also host the Western States Conference Prelims on May 1, and the finals on May 4. On both nights the field events are slated to get underway at 6:30

On May 15, the Falcons will host the Southern California Junior College Prelims, with first field event slated to start at 6:30 p.m.

The Southern California Junior College Finals will be at Cerritos on May 19, with the same starting time as in the Prelims.

The California State Junior College meet will be held at Modesto on May 26. The field events will get underway at 5 p.m., with the runnings events starting at 7 p.m.

Since Cerritos is hosting the majority of the biggest junior college meets in the state this year, Because the Falcons have depth in all events, we should walk off with top honors in the state this year, barring any injuries.

Paul Stuber high-jumped 6-101/4 and Gary Ordway threw the discus 164-1, to lead the Cerritos College track team to a stunning 99-33-29 victory over the University of Southern California Freshmen and LACC in a triangular track fest on the winner's cinderpath Friday afternoon.

Ordway's discus mark is the second best recorded by any junior college athlete in the nation. It also set a new stadium and school record.

Trobabe ace Doug Cahoun held on to a slim lead to edge the Falcon's Gene Gurule in the mile run. Calhoun's time was a blazing 4:16.5. This also was a new stadium mark.
Gurule's second place time of 4:18.4, was good enough for a new school record, breaking his own record of 4:21.1 set in 1961. Art Pitman finished third in the mile in 4:22.5, and Lynn Tay* lor was fourth for the Falcons with a time of $4: 33.6$.
Rick Alvarado was victorious in both sprints, capturing the century in 10.3, and the 220 in 22.5 . Both sprints were run directly into a strong wind.
