Registration Surpasses All Previous Expectations

"Full? I've just got to get in that class! . . . Say, are you sure the bookstore is open, or have they gone home for the night and left us out here? . . . Some student is parked in my reserved space! . . . Hi Bill, what have you been doing all summer . . . Where did all these students come from? . . ."

These are a few of the comments heard on the Cerritos campus when classes opened Monday, September 11, with 5,394 full and part time students registered.

1,301 Late Registrations

Late registration was held in the west half of the gymnasium from Monday, September 11, till noon Friday for the 1,301 late registering students.

To those of you who were pre-registered, the final registration pickup was a painless and relatively fast process. To those who had not, the registration steps were long and arduous, and it seemed like the validation station might never appear. A word to the wise is sufficient, so next semester when pre-registration is announced just be reminded of what some have gone through the past few days.

Register 5.7 Per Minute

Thursday, September 7, the first day of final registration was also the busiest. During the first nine hours, 3,077 students were processed. This figure is equal to 342 per hour, or 5.7 students per minute.

In talking with Dean Wagner, College Dean of Admissions and Records, it was learned that of the 6,695 students, many of them are attending Cerritos for the first time.

John Blakemore, Dean of Counseling and Guidance, urges all students to avail themselves of the extensive counseling facilities at Cerritos College.

Students are urged to make an appointment to see a coun-

selor for the purpose of making academic plans for the future. Recent university studies have shown that those students who made decisions about their majors early attain greater success scholastically and financially.

Cerritos Hosts Forensic Meeting

Cerritos College will host the annual fall meeting of the Southern California Collegiate Forensic Association this Saturday, September 16. The group will meet at 8:30 a.m. in the college library. President of the association is Michael Schon of Loyola University. Representative of colleges in this area will be present, together with local junior colleges.

A buffet lunch will be served at noon, after which the group will re-convene for its afternoon meeting.

The major purpose of the meeting is to finalize speech tournament plans for the coming academic year, as well as establish policy affecting speech activities in member colleges.

The first formal meeting will be Tuesday, September 26, at 11 a.m. in room LA-31 to elect new officers.



Inauguration of New Pools Opens Fall Activity Calendar

Probably one of the most noticeable projects on campus and possibly the envy of students on many other campuses is Cerritos' new swimming pools. The pools, which opened to the public last July, will probably be kept open the year round.

Permanent starting blocks, deep racing gutters, turning targets, lane markers and solid lane lines help to make them two of the fastest pools in the country, according to Robert Horn, new Falcon swimming mentor.

"Among the Best"

"They are the finest I have

ever seen and probably rank among the best college pools in the country," added Horn.

The deep pool or water polo is 75 by 60 feet. It has eight lanes and is 10 to 12 feet deep. "Being as deep all round as it is, it makes a better water polo pool," Horn commented.

The instructional pool has all the same features as the big one, but is only three to five feet deep, twenty-five meters long, and twenty-five yards wide.

Underwater Speakers

Underwater speakers and the most adequate pool lighting system to date are two more features of the new facility.

Due to the fact that the temperature of both pools is kept at 80 degrees all the time, it will add to the pleasure of swimming the year round.

Anyone interested in seeing their first water polo game or continuing their interest in the sport can watch the Cerritos squad open the season against the Southern California Varsity squad in the Falcons first game of the season on September 27, at USC. The Falcons first home game will be against the Long Beach State varsity, October 11 at 3 p.m.

Tickets are now on sale at \$1.50 in the PE building office.



Hazing Defined In State Code

EDITOR'S NOTE: Due to the approaching pledging season, we feel it would be advantageous to print the laws pertaining to "hazing" from the California State Education Code.

ARTICLE 8 HAZING

"Hazing" Defined

As used in this article, "hazing" includes any method of initiation into a student organization or any pastime or amusement engaged in with respect to such an organization which causes, or is likely to cause bodily danger or physical harm to any student or other person attending any school, college, university or other educational institution in this state; but the term "hazing" does not include customary athletic events or other similar contest or competitions.

"Hazing Prohibited"

No student, or other person in attendance at any public, private, parochial, or military school, college, or other educational institution, shall conspire to engage in hazing, participate in hazing, or commit any act that injures, degrades, or disgraces, or tends to injure, degrade, or disgrace any fellow student or person attending the institution.

The violation of this section is a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not less than fifty dollars (\$50), nor more than five hundred dollars (\$500), or imprisonment in the county jail for not more than six months, or both.

and Jim Miller, who should provide the Falcon squad with the depth that a good cross country team must have.

Newcomers include Lynn Taylor, who was the top distance runner for Excelsior High School last year. He garnered a best time of 1:55.4, in the 880 while running track.

Experienced Line

Long Beach has hurdles to jump too. One is the experienced line of beef Cerritos has. Falcons Dan O'Malley, Leo Austin, and John Farris head the list of returnees. The Vikings lost most of their great line of last year plus their number one quarterback is gone too. Cerritos boasts of two top notch flingers battling it out for first team, Ricky Alvarado and Jerry Otterson.

Both teams have engaged in rough scrimmages against highly rated teams. Cerritos has faced Whittier College, powerhouse of its league, and San Bernardino College, which is rated top team in the Eastern League. Against Whittier, the Falcons were only on offense during the two hour scrimmage. Coach Hall said, "It was very beneficial for our ball club."

The Vikings paced themselves against Glendale College and Mt. San Antonio College. Glendale proved tough by holding Long Beach's offense to one score while adding one touchdown for its own cause. One reason for the Vikings poor showing was the fact that the three gunners Irvin, Andrews, and Martin were used sparingly during the clash. Cerritos won't be as fortunate.
