## RTICLE 8 HAZING

## 'Hazing" Defined

As used in this article, "hazing" includes any method of initiation into a student organization or any pastime or amusement engaged in with respec causes, or is likely to cause bodily danger or physical harm to any student or other person university or other educationa institution in this state but the term "hazing", does not include customary athletic not include er similar contest or competi tions.

## "Hazing Prohibited"

## o student, or other person

 n attendance at any public, pri vate, parochial, or military school, college, or other educa tional institution, shall conspire to engage in hazing, participate in hazing, or commit any act that injures, degrades, or disgraces or tends to injure, degrade, or disgrace any fellow student andThe violation of this section is a misdeameanor, punishable by a fine of not less than fifty dol. ars ( 50 ), nor more than five hundred dollars ( $\$ 500$ ), or im. prisionment in the county jail or both.

The purpose of the fraternity as stated in the national charter, is to further the professionaliz ation of police officers. It will also be a service organization on campus for such activities as dances, etc
