For the first time in the history of Cerritos College's Freshman Class, the students will have a field of 32 from which to choose their officers.

Frosh elections will be held next Monday, during which time the approximately 1600 freshman students will poll votes for president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer.

The polling booths, which were obtained from the Los Angeles County Registrar of Voters, will remain open from 8:30 a.m. until 2 p.m. They will reopen again at 6 p.m. and close at 7 p.m. This is the first time

Booth Locations Given


Voting booths will be placed at various points around the campus, with two being stationed in the vicinity of the Lecture Hall, and three in the student

mittee of the California Junior College Faculty Association which has introduced the plan to the Cerritos faculty. The Association hopes for eventual acceptance of the plan at Cerritos and all Junior Colleges in California.

Under this system the instructor will be granted a title according to his experience and academic work. One example would be in degrees of professorship. A master's degree and four years of teaching in the same college would entitle an instructor to become an assistant professor. The title, professor, would be granted to an instructor holding a Ph.D., or 56 units above the bachelor's degree, or earned doctorate and 12 years of teaching.

When an instructor fulfills these requirements the members of his division may recommend school and the school board for the school and the school board for the final decision. Each Jr. College will handle it separately. although it is hoped the titles will eventually be transferrable.

The plan is based on the idea that academic rank titles will provide increased status, greater community prestige and im-

ASB Card Abuser Must Pay Penalty

Cerritos' recent howdy hop was attended by many students, anxious to get acquainted and renew past friendships.

There were a few who were very anxious, indeed. So anxious they passed their student body cards to

friends who were non-Cerritos students. These card-loaners were obviously in the wrong, whe-

ther their actions were or were not purposely defiant.

This incident and any like abuse of a college student body card is subject to college judgement.

Strengthening the precedent set by previous council

action, the current student cabinet has as its right a review of the offense. First-time card abusers are subject to suspension of

their card for two weeks and must pay the admission price of the activity at which the card was illegally used.

Violating the use of the card more than once can result in its permanent loss.

It only seems reasonable that a student who spends \$15 on a card would respect the rules. (It states "nontransferable" on the card.)

For the full-time price, the holder has access to games and other activities as a member of the Associated Students.


It would seem foolish to be voluntarily deprived of these

For the benefit of Cerritos College students wishing to attend the various dances scheduled throughout the school year, the following rules have been released by the Student Personnel Office regarding these activities:

Admission: Full time Cerritos College ASB card holders admitted free. Dates of full time Cerritos College card holders will also be admitted free of charge. Part time Cerritos College ASB card holders will have to pay 25c admission charge as will their dates. All guests will be charged 50c and only one guest permitted per ASB card. Once you leave the dance, you may not re-enter.

Any student who uses alcoholfor beverage purposes on school premises shall be liable to dismissal. No student that has been drinking an alcoholic beverage shall be permitted to enter a school activity.

International Relations Club held the fifth in a series of "International Affairs Luncheons" yesterday in the student center.

Guest speaker was Dr. Milton W. Meyer, Assistant Professor of History at L.A.S.C.

Dr. Meyer, who is a specialist in Asian international relations, on "Misunderstanding Asia", dealing with common Western misconceptions of the Far East.

His extreme knowledge of the Far East is based on first hand experience, having been born and raised by missionary parents, in the Philippines. He remained in the East until World War II when he became an active member of the armed forces. On completion of his tour of duty, he resumed his studies, receiving degrees at Yale, Columbia, and Stanford.

Then entering foreign service, he was stationed in China, India, and Burma for a total of five years. He is presently teaching classes on the history of China,

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

Gaining experience with each tilt, Cerritos managed to take one of three skirmishes last week. Against highly touted University of Southern California, the Falcons fell 17-5. Head Coach Bob Horn stated "The score isn't indictitive in how well the team played. The team

Tartars Invade Falcon Field for League Opener The Cerritos College Falcons go into their third game of the current season Saturday

The Cerritos College Falcons go into their third game of the current season Saturday night against a much improved Compton College squad under new head coach Charles Williams. The Falcons lost to a powerful Long Beach City College eleven 44-30, and then traveled to Fullerton Saturday to face an explosive Hornet squad.

Fullerton Foils Falcons Future

With several Cerritos starters sidelined for one reason or another, the hustling Fullerton Hornets scored one of the biggest upsets of the year, downing the Falcons 20-14, at Fullerotn.

Leading the Hornets was freshman quarterback Brig Owens, who several times slipped through persuing Falcons for large gains, while also passing for a touchdown.

Ronnie Hales, freshman halfback for the Falcons, gave the visiting rooters something to yell about, when he returned the opening kickoff 32 yards to the Falcon 47 yard line.

Hornets Score First

There the Falcons were stopped, and the Hornets marched to their first score, with the tally coming on a one yard smash by fullback Jim Miller. Owens kicked the conversion.

After intercepting a Falcon pass late in the first period, the Hornets once aagin marched for another score, with Owens sweeping his own right end for the tally early in the second quarter. Falcon tackle John Farris blocked Owen's conversion attempt.

Quarterback Jerry Otterson put the sputtering Falcons on the scoreboard late in the second period, when he threw a 52 yard pass to left end Gary Taylor.

Otterson's pass on the conversion attempt was dropped, and the Hornets left the field at halftime with a 13-6 lead.

Cerritos Takes Lead
The Falcons pulled ahead in
the game late in the third stanza, on a 12 yard pass from
Otterson to halfback Art Delyaux.

While seeing only limited action durign the game due to an infected hand, fullback Dick Dega nwas called on by Coach Hall to run the conversion over, to give the Falcons a 14-13 lead.

Midway through the fourth quarter, the Hornets intercepted another Falcon pass, and five plays later, Owens pitched a 23

Poloman Top Athlete

Falcon of the Week falls into the skillful hands of Dennis Luttrell, varsity goalie for Cerritos water polo team. Luttrell, 6'2' 152 lb. freshman, comes from Whittier High School where he was chosen honorable mention on the All CIF water polo team.

Luttrell, last week against Long Beach City College, made a 'million saves' at his goalie position. Head Coach Bob Horn stated. "Luttrel held the score down by his presence." Six of the seven starters fouled out and Luttrell wa sthe seventh man. Long Beach defeated Cerritos, 10-9.

Santa Monica had trouble with Luttrell too. The goalie held them to only three goals while his teammates scored nine times. The score ended at a 17-5 count favor of the Falcons.

Dave Ashleigh, General of the team, also played well. Coach Horn said. "When the opponents have a keyma nto guard Ashleigh usually guards him." When the team needs points Ashleigh is around also. Against Southern California, he led all teammates in scoring with two of the five goals registered by Cerritos. SC won 17-5.

First Home Game

This will be the first home game of the season for the Falcons, who hold a 3-1 series lead over the once powerful Tartars. Last year the Falcons bounced their cross-town rival 42-20, and the year before they bombed them 40-6.

Compton has 10 returning lettermen, headed by fullback Dale Plasch, who averaged 4.69 yards a carry, and tackle Tom Wil liams, a 6.1, 235 pound bruiser.

Also returning is guard Bob Miller (5-8, 195), halfbacks Mike Taylor and Woody Prude, quarterback Roger Lenberg, and end Dick Nolan.

Quarterbacks Jerry Otterson and Rich Alvarado will lead the Falcon attack, with the former being an outstanding passer, as was exhibited during the Falcons' first two games.

Standout

Alvarado, a 9.8 sprinter in track, is a standout on defense, as is teammate Dick Degan, who will return to action this week, after missing the Fullerton contest with an infected hand.

Both squads will have a number of big linemen, with the Falcon line being anchored by 6-3, 225 pound John Farris, 6-3, 235 pound Sheldon Moomaw and 5-11, 215 pound Ken Mize.

The Falcons will go with their same starting line-up as in the previous encounters with the exception of left end Jack Daniels, who will be replaced by freshman Eldon Taylor.

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
