

'Reich' Author Speaks on Berlin Crisis

Born in Chicago, raised in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and graduated from Coe College in 1925, William Shirer began his career as a foreign correspondent on the copy desk of the Paris edition of the Chicago Tribune.

Shirer moved to the home edition of the Chicago Tribune largely as a result of his coverage of Lindbergh's landing in 1927.

Other assignments were in Paris, London, Vienna, two years in India covering the rise of Gandhi, and various sojourns in Eastern Europe, the Balkans, Berlin, Rome, and in 1932, the Tribune fired Shirer. He took the next year off. The previous year he had married the Vien-

nese drama critic and painter, Theresa Stiberitz at a small fishing village on the coast of Spain.

The next year Shirer returned to work again, headquartered in Berlin, the start of his long association with Germany. In 1937 he joined the foreign correspondents staff of the Columbia Broadcasting System at the invitation of its European director, Edward R. Morrow.

In 1941 Shirer's famous "Berlin Diary" came out and was an immediate bestseller and a Book-of-the-Month Club selection.

He returned to England in 1943, to France in 1944, to Germany in 1945, and in the Spring of that year covered the birth

of the United Nations at San Francisco. He went back to Berlin in 1948 to cover the airlift and two years later made a prolonged survey of Europe which resulted in his book, "Midcentury Journey," a Literary Guild selection.

By 1950, Shirer attained the second part of his youthful ambition (to be a writer) by publishing his first novel, "The Traitor." Other books of Shirer are "The Challenge of Scandinavia," "End of a Berlin Diary," and another novel, "The Consul's Wife."

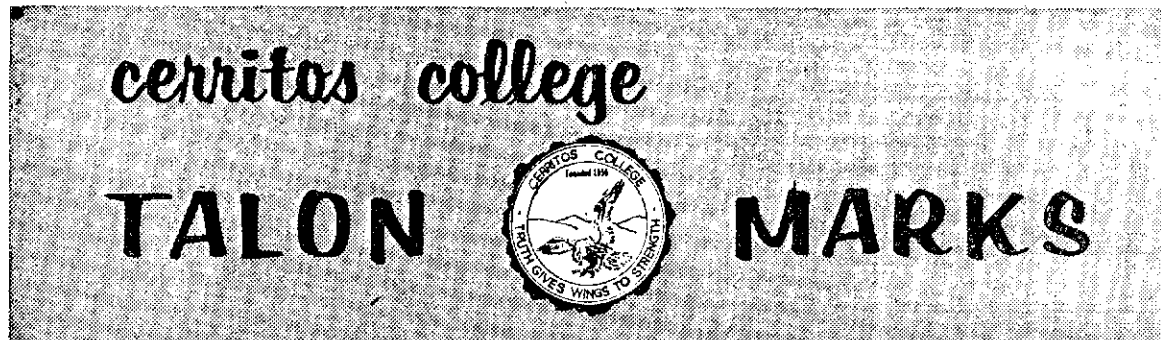
The fall of 1960 saw the publication of Shirer's monumental work, "The Rise and Fall of the Third Reich." It too was a Book-

of-the-Month selection. The author spent five and a half years sifting through the mountains of secret German documents captured by the Allies.

Shirer has been the recipient of many honors: The George Foster Peabody Award, radio's greatest prize; the Wendell Wilkie One World Award for his outstanding achievements in journalism; and the Legion of Honor from France.

Shirer will talk at Cerritos College November 8 at 8 p.m. in the Cerritos College Student Center.

This program is free and will be the first of seven international lectures presented by Cerritos College as a community service.

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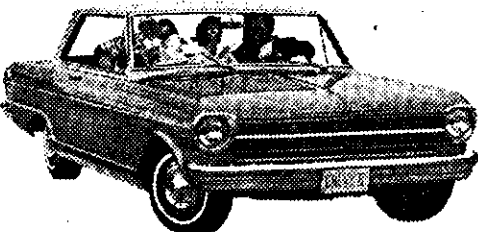
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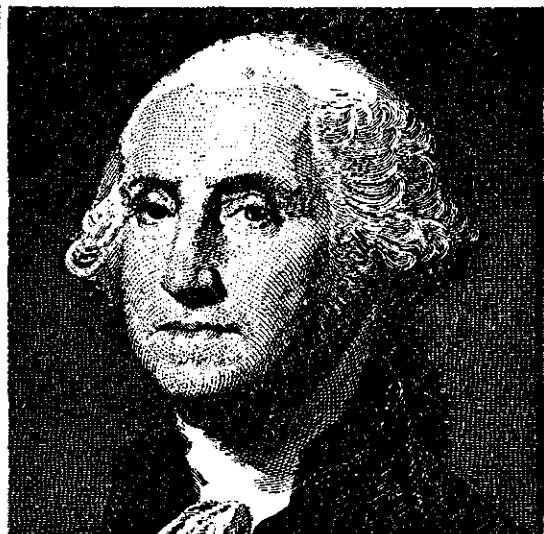
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American, Russian Embassy To Be Constructed for Play

and Romanoffs have arranged a spectacular affair, depicting the events of the romance, so that all Americans may learn the true story.



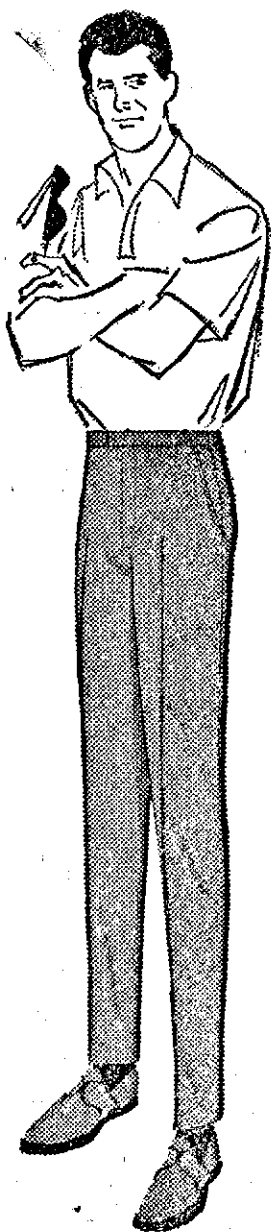

Hales Runs Wild; Third League Win

Halfback Ronnie Hales scored three touchdowns to lead Cerritos College to an impressive 26-0 victory over Pasadena Saturday night.

The win kept the Falcons just a half game behind first place Glendale in the Western States Conference standings.

This was the third straight loss for the Lancers. The first two came at the hands of Glendale 18-0, and Compton 20-6.

Hales Moves

Hales gained over a 100 yards for the second successive week, and he also gained over 75 yards in pass receptions, one of which was good for 38 yards and a touchdown in the fourth quarter.

The Falcon's first tally came on a one-foot plunge by Hales, with 1334 left in the second period. Eddie Mendez's kick on he conversion attempt was good.

On the 52 yard drive Hales gained 26 yards, while right halfback Joe Badillo also garnered 26 yards.

After leading 7-0 at halftime, the Falcons put on another drive, this one was good for 63 yards.

Otterson Clicks

Spearheading the drive was quarterback Jerry Otterson, who faked his way out of the hands of the Lancer defenders twice, to complete passes of 10 and 14 yards to left Mendez.

Hales again plunged over from the one yard line for the score. Mendez then kicked his second conversion and the Falcons were ahead 14-0.

The Falcon's third touchdown came on an 11 yard pass from Otterson to Mendez, late in the third period. The conversion attempt was blocked.

Otterson completed 10 of 16 passes for 168 yards, with Mendez and Hales being his main targets.

This was only the second time this season that the improved Lancers were held scoreless.

LACC Next Foe

Next Friday night, the Falcons travel to Los Angeles City College, to face an improved Cub squad, which was nosed out by Glendale 38-30.

The Cubs pulled a big upset last week, as they blanked a strong Compton crew 8-0.

Heading the Falcon attack will be halfbacks Hales and Badillo, and tackles John Farris and Ken Mize.

Behind Cerritos' fourth place finish came San Diego, Mt. San Antonio, Orange Coast, Pierce, Glendale, L.A. Valley and Fullerton took tenth. In all, 28 teams took part in the meet with over 200 runners competing.

Aztec Meet Next

Next Friday the team travels to San Diego for the Aztec Invitational where they will compete against many of the same teams. Last year they finished second at the Aztec meet and fifth at the Mt. Sac Invitational before winning the Southern Cal crown.
