The Falconettes, Cerritos' flag-twirling drill team, is under the direction of Joan Schutz, advisor, and leader, Jackie Widener.



Kirsch said that he sees the Southern California of today as the place for a Renaissance. "The London of Shakespeare's time was much like Los Angeles is today. London too was growing out in all directions and was concerned with smog."

Commenting on the magazine, Dowden said that "No definite format for the Illustrated has been established as yet. We are still experimenting with possibilities of magazine and photo feature style."

"Culture consists of two elements: artist and audience. Without an audience there is no art, there is no culture. And we in Southern California have a vitality, a need, a hunger for cultural experience," Kirsch

He referred to Los Angeles as "a laboratory city, a place where hundreds of different activities in hundreds of different stages are going on. We are trying to create a culture which reflects this laboratory city.'

Kirsch said that any thinking writer concerns himself with "whether the world around him is worth writing about. If he is given the opportunity to create, then the place where he lives is an important center of art.'



### Polomen Cop Third Place


The Cerritos College Water Polo team finished third in the Southern California tournament held last week in the Falcon pool.

## Jay-Seeing Sports

The 1961 football season is over for the Cerritos Falcons, but there is still one game left to play for one person on the Falcon squad: sophomore Leo Austin.

On December 2, in Albuquerque, New Mexico, the 6-2, 215-pound center will play in the annual All-American Bowl Game.

This honor is a great tribute to the Bellflower High graduate, who was seriously injured in an automobile accident last summer. At one time, doctors said that he would never again be able to play football.

Although Austin isn't the fastest man in the world, he gained a worthy reputation for being the first player down field when the Falcons punted, and when an opponent stopped to look at the ball roll dead, Pow!, he was picking himself off the ground.

Considering that he had to get the ball to the punter on a perfect line before he went down field to cover the punt, that was a well-guarded reputation.

Cerritos College has never had a dominate passing attack until this season, in which quarterback Jerry Otterson set a new Falcon record for yards passing.

His total of 1355 yards, was the second highest total in Junior Colleges in the nation this year. Only Don Castleman of Pearl River, Mississippi, had more yards.

Otterson was having a great dual with Santa Monica's Rand Carter for the runerup spot, but the 6-0, 200 pounder passed the Corsair aerial artist last week, as Otterson hit for 154 yards against Bakerfield.

Although both their respective teams lost, Cerritos 26-12 and Santa Monica 38-26; these two passers did a remarkable job all season.

Carter completed 16 of 36 against the powerful Renegades, while Otterson hit on 12 of 16 for the Falcons against the Vaqueros.

Otterson has made a remarkable recovery from a back injury which paralyzed him from the waist down, in 1959

up in Washington. When Otterson regains the power he had while quarterbacking at Paramount High in 1958, there will be no doubt about his ability to some day play professional
