## In Alondra Blvd. Mishap

This could well be one of tomorrow's headlines if steps are not taken to provide safer crossing conditions near the college.

Recognizing this need, several Cerritos students have taken the initiative and have asked the Norwalk City Council to place a crosswaik on Aondra Boulevard between Studebaker Road and the other existing crosswalk at Gridley Avenue.
"Safety is the main objective of our proposal", spokesman Lee McDoniels said. He explained that students living across this street from the college and those who find it necessary to park on the north side of Alondra must, at present, use either the crosswalk on Studebaker or the one near the stadium.
"Crossing at any other point is considered jay-walking," he said, "and carries a minimum fine of $\$ 40$." Maximum fine under law for jay-walking is $\$ 500$.

The AS Council has passed a resolution endorsing the idea of a crosswalk. They have also asked for a traffic signal along with the crosswalk in the vicinity of the Administration Building.

However, the traffic signal proposal would undoubtedly hinder favorable action by the city council as a previous proposal for a signal in this area has already been turned down.

Many steps must be taken before the college can obtain crosswalk, but the first step is widespread student support. Write to the City Council.
