



Students 'Jazz' It Up At Festival

Falcons Take Honors At Invitational Meet

Topping 25 other junior colleges throughout the state, the Cerritos speech squad won six superior certificates and seven excellent certificates at the Long Beach Invitational Junior College Speech Tournament last Friday and Saturday.

Americo Azevedo received an excellent certificate in impromptu speaking. Bruce Booker won an excellent certificate in oratory.

Keith Gathercole scored an excellent rating in oratory also. Dan Houston won a superior certificate in debate.

Lindy LeVine, the only contestant in the event with a perfect cumulative score, won a superior certificate in oratory.

Stephanie Reins took home two certificates—a superior in debate and an excellent in impromptu.

John Schulte received three certificates, a superior in debate and excellent in oratory and impromptu.

Larry Spry also earned three—superior certificates in debate and extemp and an excellent certificate in extemp. Spry had a perfect cumulative score in extemp.

Superior certificates were given to the top 10% of the competitors in each event, while excellent certificates were awarded to the next 20%.

In two earlier junior college tournaments this year, the squad finished fourth and third. Although this was only a practice tournament, the squad won more awards than any other college.

Faculty Learns First Aid Facts

During the fall semester a committee has been working on up-dating emergency procedures on the campus. One of the recommendations of this committee was the need to acquaint more faculty and staff members with basic knowledge of first aid. Consequently, a series of first aid classes designed specifically for Cerritos faculty members is now being offered.

This class is designed to acquaint the staff members with the basic principals of first aid. The class will include lecture, demonstration, and practical application.

The instructor will be Mr. John Reece, a Police Science instructor, formerly with the Highway Patrol. He has a degree from USC and is an instructor with the Red Cross.

This is a 3-week series of classes beginning Tuesday, February 28. Classes will meet on Tuesday and Thursday of each week from 4:00 - 5:00 p.m. in the Arts and Crafts Building, Room 40.

Upon completion of the 10-hour class, staff members will receive a Standard Red Cross First Aid Certificate, which is issued by the American Red Cross. An additional 6-hour class will entitle you to the Advanced Certificate, but you must first complete the class for the Standard Certificate.

This class is limited to 25 registrants. Registration forms may be obtained at the Office of Community Services and must be returned to same prior to Friday, Feb. 24, if you plan to attend.

Cerritos College Hosts Western Jazz Festival

Play-offs for the Cerritos Jazz Festival will be in full swing next Friday and Saturday, according to the Cerritos Music Department.

A high school and community sponsored stage band festival is also scheduled for next Friday.

Twenty-two bands from the West Coast will compete in the festival which is directed by the head of the Music Department, Jack Wheaton.

College bands entered in the Cerritos festival include San Francisco State College, San Jose State College,

San Diego State College, Cal State at Long Beach, Sacramento State College, San Fernando State College and UCLA.

Other bands are from Redlands University, New Mexico State College, Los Angeles Conservatory, Arizona State, Arizona University, Duquesne University (Penn.), Los Angeles State College and USC.

Junior bands include L.A. Valley, L.A. City, Southwestern, Rio Hondo, Santa Monica, Foothills and Cerritos.

"These groups represent the finest college talent available in the jazz category in the West," commented Wheaton.

Jazz festival entrants will compete in the band, combo or vocal category. Contestants were selected by tape-recorded auditions from more than 50 submitted entries.

TICKETS AVAILABLE

Tickets for the daytime competition of college bands and for the high school and community sponsored part of the festival are \$1.50 general admission and \$1 with an Associated Student card.

Saturday evening program ticket rate is \$3 for reserved seats (main floor), \$2.50 general admission and \$2 with an ASCC discount.

The program, which takes place in the gym, features winning bands in each category, the Kenton Jr. Neophonic of Southern California and guest artists from the jazz world.

Students from Cerritos in the Jr. Neophonic include Bruce Emarine, lead alto; Jim Thomas, tenor; Pete Woodford, guitar and Mike Matthews, piano.

The Jr. Neophonic is under the supervision of Stan Kenton and is directed by Wheaton.

The Cerritos Jazz Festival will be hosted by Kenton, Billy May and possibly Henri Mancini, according to Wheaton.

Judges for the event are Dr. M. E. Hall, Ralph Pena, Don Rader, Bud Brisbois, Willie Maiden and Don Er-javec.

INTERCOLLEGIATE MUSIC FESTIVAL

Winners of the festival will be sent, expenses paid, to the Intercollegiate Music Festival in Miami Beach, Florida, to be held from May 4 through May 6.

Kenton serves as chief advisor for the non-profit collegiate event which provides recognition for outstanding accomplishments by young musicians and vocalists.

Two preliminary performances and the finals are scheduled to take place at the Miami Beach Auditorium stage.

The United States State Department will send the winners from Miami to Canada next July as the official United States representatives to the Canadian Exposition '67 in Montreal.

Cerritos Falcons Honored At Bank Of America Award Program

Four Cerritos students were recently singled out for their academic achievements at the Bank of America Junior College Awards program held at the Beverly-Hilton Hotel.

Cheryl Ingram of La Mirada and John Tagg of Norwalk were named the Cerritos College Candidates for the Bank of America Man and Woman of the Year Award.

Two Cerritos business students, Evangeline Briet of Bellflower and

Lorraine Davis of Norwalk won a \$300 cash award for their business achievements.

Miss Ingram and Tagg, both sophomores, were chosen by a committee on the basis of scholarship, college activities, community service, and a written statement of their aims and objectives upon completion of their formal education.

They will travel to Golden West College on Thursday, March 2 where

they will compete in an all-day screening. The screening will involve students from 12 other junior colleges in our area.

One man and one woman will be selected to represent our area in the final selection for the state at the State California Junior College Association meeting in Sacramento.

Each student participating in the area meeting will receive a certificate. The area winners will receive a cash award and the Man and Woman of the Year will be awarded \$1,000, a trophy and certificate.

Evangeline Briet, winner of the secretarial and clerical studies division and Lorraine Davis, winner of the banking and business administration studies division were chosen by members of the faculty to represent Cerritos at the awards.

Like Tagg and Miss Ingram they were also chosen on the basis of scholarship, activities, community service and statement of purpose.

Miss Briet and Miss Davis will both receive honor certificates presented by The President of Cerritos College Dr. Jack W. Mears later this semester. They will also have their names engraved on a plaque.

Campus Gallery Hosts Double Art Exhibits

Crowding the Cerritos College Art Gallery to capacity, Wednesday through March 19, will be objects from the "Renaissance and Baroque Medals" and "Rio Hondo Art Faculty Show."

In this double art attraction, the art faculty of Rio Hondo Junior College in Whittier will exhibit their paintings, graphics, sculpture, jewelry and ceramics.

Art gallery Director Roland Shutt commented "People have found our own Cerritos Faculty show should be interesting and offer variety."

The "Renaissance and Baroque Medals" exhibit is comprised of thirty-five large photographic plates from the Salton collection, organized by the Bowdoin College Museum of Art in Brunswick, Maine.

"The medals exhibit should be interesting to the history student as well as the art student," commented Shutt.

Antonio (Pisanello) Pisano, a famous painter of the Italian Quattrocento, produced the first Renaissance medal in 1438.

Two of his works are included in the exhibition. One medal portrays "Filippo Maria Visconti, Duke of Milan," on the front, and on the back "Visconti is shown in Armor on Horseback"; the other medal is "Lionello d'Este, Lord of Ferrara" and on the back is "Este Impresa."

The impresa was a reverse design on Italian 15th century medals, according to Mrs. Salton.

A portrait with an inscription giving the name and title of the person is usually on the front of medals, while the back has a allegorical, historical or heraldic design.

Italian artist Matteo de' Pasti develops a picture of "The Castle of Rimini" in his 1446 bronze medal.

A medal by Dutch artist O. Wouter Muler depicts Admiral Martin Harpertzoon Tromp on the obverse and a naval engagement on the reverse of a 1653 silver repoussé medal.

Jean Warin's "A Chariot With France Driven by Fame" and Joachim Deschler's, portrait of Nurnberg church-warden, Hieronymus Paumgartner are also among some of the medals.

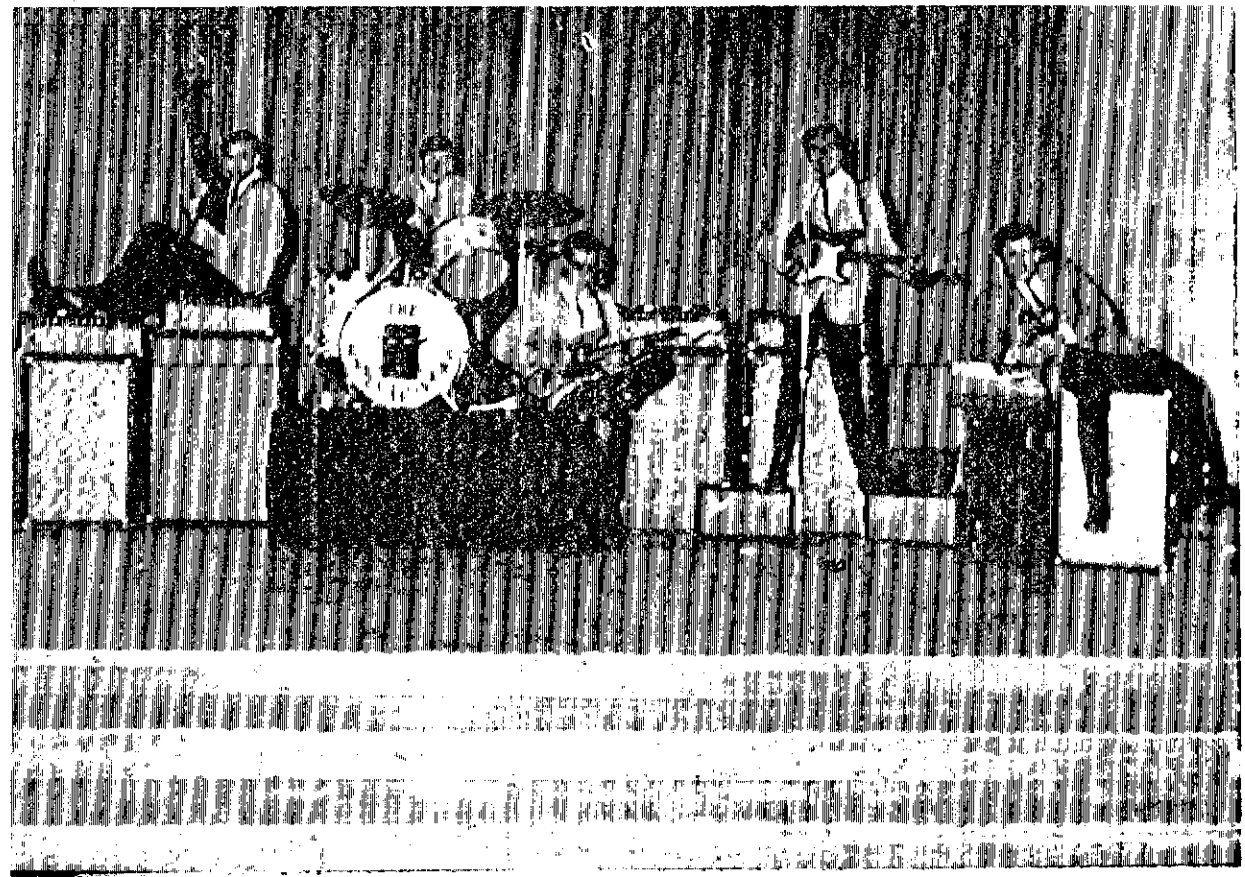
The special tickets, which go on sale 48 hours before each concert, are being offered for \$2. Only a limited number are available for each performance.

The Festival's National Advisory Board serves in an advisory capacity, assisting festival personnel in technical and administrative areas.

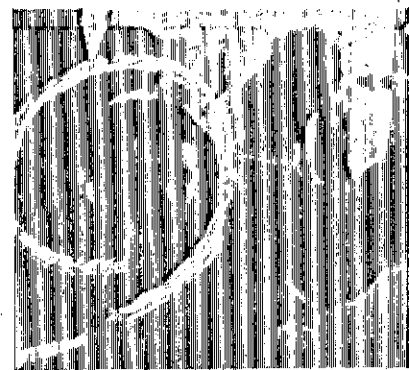
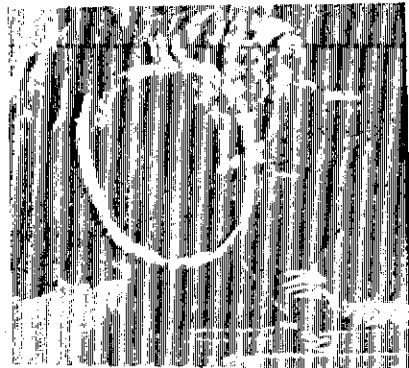

Alzada Krickbocker of Knoxville, Tennessee—in the plaid dress—returned from the study-travel semester to complete her senior year in English at Radcliffe College.

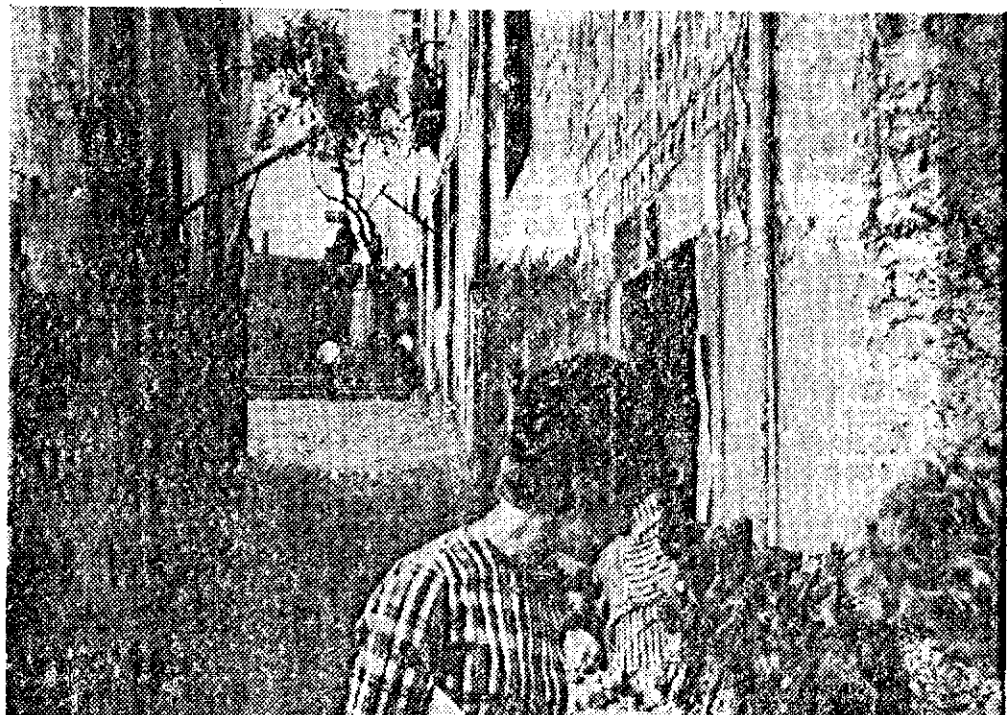
