All male students between the ages of 18 and 26 years of age who who did not receive the yellow "Request for Selective Service Form 109" form at the time of registration are urged to pick up a form as soon as possible in the Office of Admissions and Records.

Students who doubt the importance of filling out this request form immediately should be aware of the fact that the Selective Service Board has no way of classifying students correctly unless they receive a 109 Form (Student Deferment) directly from the school.

Deadline for turning in this request is October 1.

The Selective Service Board must receive the 109 Form from the college by October 15. For this reason it is imperative that the October 1 deadline for the request form be met.

Any student unable to meet this deadline due to delay in receiving his registration certificate card should complete the request form as soon as possible.

The office will complete the procedure and each student will receive a carbon copy of the completed 109 Form which was sent to the local

On campus jobs pay \$1.25 per hour and off campus jobs pay from \$1.25 per hour to \$4.00 per hour. These jobs require that you be a full time student (12 units or more) and have a declared major. It is not a requirement that you be skilled.

Job openings are listed on the bulletin board between the college bookstore and the coffee shop. They are also listed in front of the Student Job Placement Office.

Fourteen hundred students found jobs last year with the help of the Student Job Placement Office. This year they want to help you find work, but the first move must be yours. If you want work fill out an application and go for an interview at 8 a.m., 10 a.m., 1 p.m. or 3 p.m. at the Stu-Administration Building.



District Reduces Property Taxes

The 1966 tax situation is looking up for the fifth consecutive year taxes have decreased to bring the total to 22 cents in reduction over the last five years. With 1966 showing a reduction of 2-cents per \$100 assessed value.





While winning 19 of 23 games Cerritos racked up the Southern California Invitational Championship, placed fourth in the Southern Cal Championships, and was named third All-American in junior college ranks.


