Commenting on the ICJC Tapia stated "The ICJC hopes to inspire appreciation of good music by giving musically interested and talented students the opportunity to be heard by both professionals and the general public."

Olson, Perez, Romero Lead Falcon Charge Against Orange Coast

Coach Smokey Cates takes his 1967 version of the Cerritos football squad into its first game-action Saturday evening with mixed reactions.

Cates will carry with him an injury list as long as Pete Valenzuela's belt and a mere handful of last year's Falcon stars.

Among the notables on the injury list are last season's all-conference defensive end, Jim Faulkner, a doubtful starter with a shoulder injury. Fullback Russ Tamblin and halfback Jim Baird are both hobbled with leg injuries, and reserve quarterback Paul Yoder is out with a separated shoulder.

Mike Olson, with a year's experience under his belt, gets the starting nod at quarterback, with some able-bodied receivers in returners Emmett White and Ed Romero.

Olson, injured from the start of last year's campaign, carries most of the Falcon's hopes for a successful season on his right arm. Inexperienced, and forced to play because Reid Braden was forced out with a broken hand, Olson's timing suffered and severely hampered his effectiveness.

"Mike's timing is vastly improved," smiled Cates. Experience made the big difference," said the Falcon coach, noting Mike's fine effort in the scrimmage against Mt. SAC. Gig Perez will start at left half

Many past members of the Jr. Neophonic are now performing with such big names as Stan Kenton, Woody Herman, Harry James, Ray Charles, Don Ellis, and with the Disneyland and Greek Theatre orchestras.

Students from all colleges audition every September, for acceptance into the Neophonic and, upon becoming a member, are given professional guidance by outstanding professionals in the field of music. They are also given a chance to perform as soloists.

Last year's group made many appearances, from Miami Beach, Florida, where they were the special attraction at the National Finals of the National Inter-Collegiate Jazz Festival, to a television appearance in Hollywood.

Board Accepts Ruling New Conference In '68

The Cerritos Athletic Department's recommendation to abide by the new statewide junior college conference realignment was unanimously accepted by the Board of Trustees in their meeting late Tuesday night.

The new conference alignment will be effective in 1968, with Cerritos competing in the South Conference. Other schools to compete in the new conference are Rio Hondo,

Mt. San Antonio, East LA, Pasadena, and Los Angeles City.

The alternative to joining the South Conference would have been to join what Hall termed a "maverick conference" consisting of Fullerton, Cypress, Orange Coast, Golden West, Santa Ana and Mt. SAC.

Hall said that if Cerritos had joined these Orange County schools, they might well have been barred from playing all other California junior colleges and from participating in the state playoffs held in most sports.

He further said that it was in consideration of this that the department chose to recommend complying with the new alignment. "Our first consideration," he said, "must be to give the athletes an opportunity to try for championships, all-conference teams, and state playoffs."

Hall cited three possible solutions to the problems arising from the realignment and the six schools that are protesting the CJC action.

First, the CJC might well decide to let the "maverick" conference go its own way. Second, the South might be partially reabsorbed into other conferences (with Cerritos possibly returning to the Metro) while the maverick schools joined the remainder of the South Conference. Third, the "mavericks" and the South might both remain in existence while jointly absorbing the four schools which comprise the Pacific Southwest Conference.

Howdy Hop Welcomes Students on Campus

A "Find the right partner" contest highlighted the Thursday night "Howdy Hop" held at the student center. The first dance of the fall semester has become a tradition at Cerritos and is held in order to help the students get acquainted with the influx of new arrivals. The hop was open to ASCC members only and admission was free to ASB card holders.

According to Eric Von Hurst, student body president, "College can be a lonely place. Having friends on campus is very important." Von Hurst added that "The Howdy Hop is one of the best ways to make friends."

Lively entertainment was provided by the Shivering Bones and the Hollywood Squares who were anything but square.

Many of the new students who attended the Thursday night bash expressed enthusiasm for the relaxed and informal atmosphere prevalent at Cerritos as well as the new and beautiful campus.

The adult treatment of recent high school students is a welcome change from the more strict regulation of their former school-social activities.

Bench-Student Barbecue Kicks Off Grid Year

For the first time in its long history, the annual Cerritos Bench Barbecue will be co-sponsored by the Associated Student Body this year, as the yearly event kicks off the Falcon football season at 5 p.m. Saturday afternoon.

Both student body members and the general public are invited to attend the all-you-can-eat affair, which precedes the opening of the 1967 Cerritos football season. The barbecue will last from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m., with kickoff time set for 8 p.m.

Tickets are on sale at the college box office priced at \$1.25 for adults, \$1 for children, and 50 cents for ASCC card holders.

Student chairman for the event, Monte Gualtiere anticipates a large turnout for the event. "We set aside \$1,000 in the ASCC budget for the barbecue, but I've been able to secure donations, and so far it hasn't cost the student body a cent. All the money we bring in will be clear profit."

Monte also expressed the desire that the students turn out for the event. "The Bench has been staging the barbecue for years, and this is the first year they invited the students to help. If we don't support it, they may decide to make it a Bench-only affair again."

The box office is located in the Student Center and is open from 10 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. and from 5 to 8 p.m.

SS Extends Law Revisions Made

The draft has been extended for a period of four years. The new law contains a few basic changes in the draft process. There are several modifications that will affect the past and present members of the Peace Corps, as well as those who seek Volunteer service in the future.

The new law also arbitrates the requirement that members of the ready reserves satisfactorily participate in a unit or face a call to active duty. This requirement, as specifically implemented by a recent Department of Defense directive, threatens the continued service of an undetermined number of volunteers.

Negotiations between the Peace Corps and the Department of Defense on this issue are continuing and special instructions are expected to be sent to the field soon.

The new law grants a virtually automatic deferment to any draft registrant who is "satisfactorily pursuing a fulltime course of instruction at a college, university or similar institution of learning" until he gains his baccalaureate degree, fails to pursue his studies satisfactorily or becomes 24 years of age.

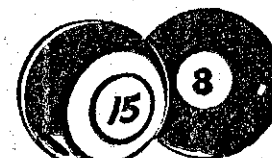

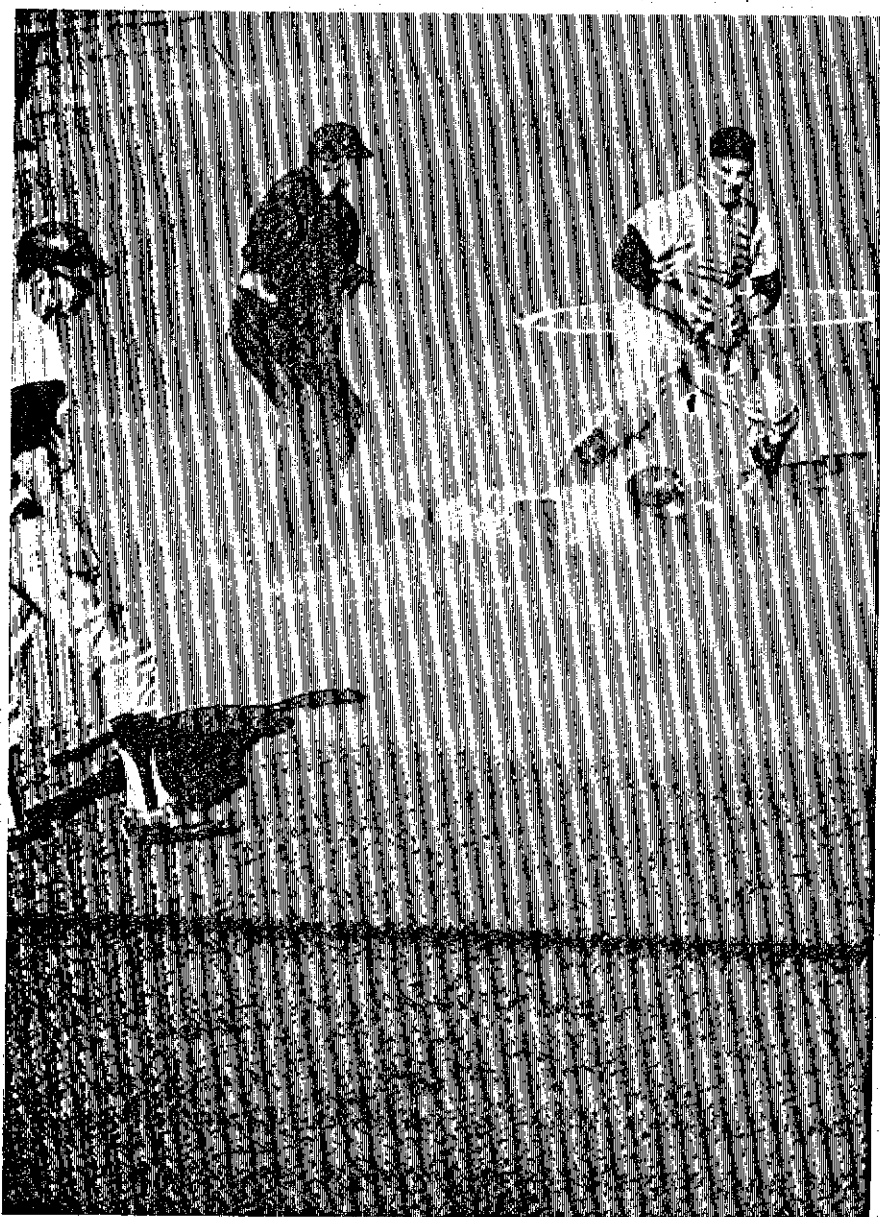

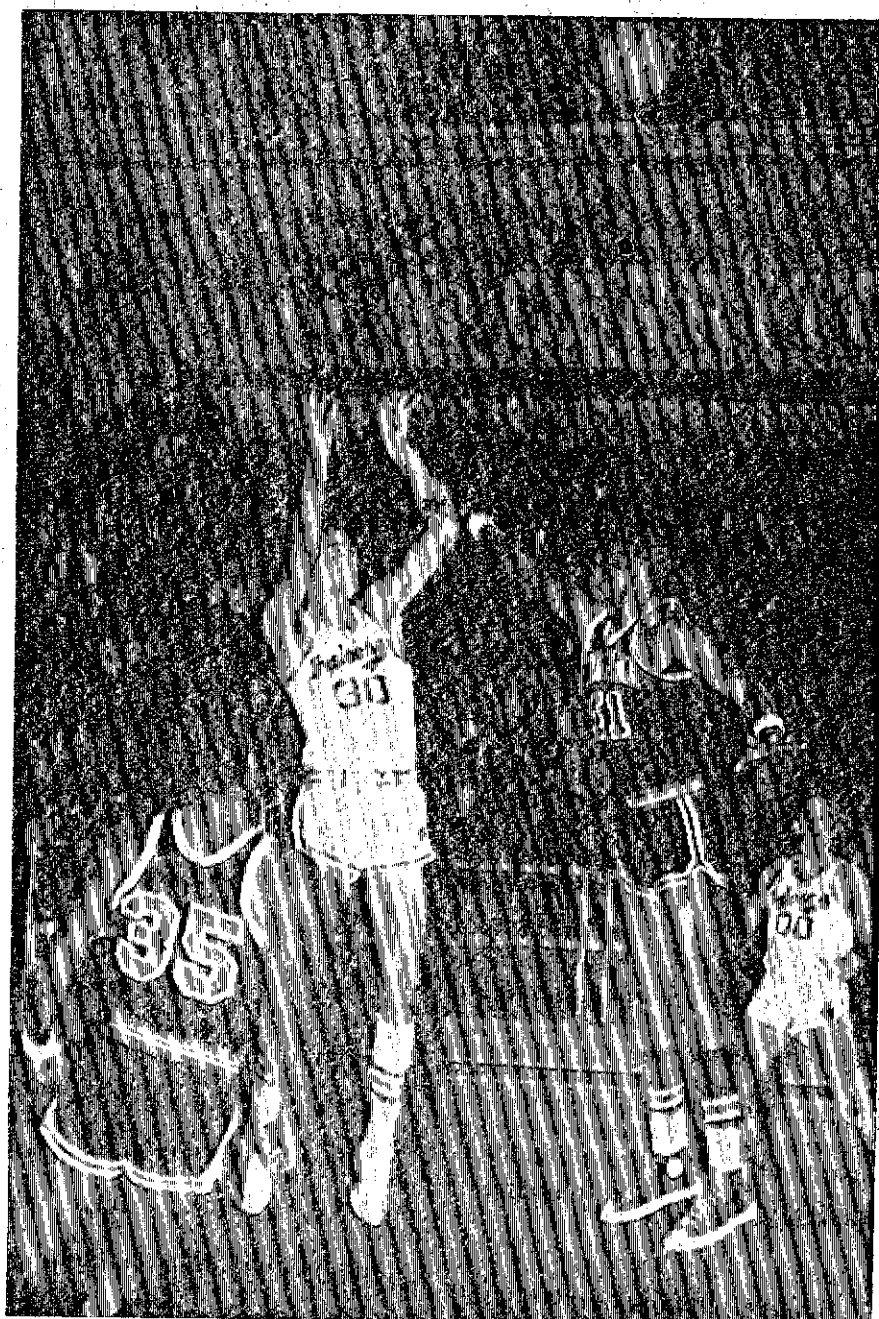
