## Counseling Office Urges Early Filing for Petitions to Graduate

Students at Cerritos are advised to make an early counseling appointment for graduation in June. The last date to file for Commencement is April 1.

Graduation with the Associate in Arts Degree does not automatically take place. A student needs to submit a petition for graduation so that it can be reviewed by a counselor, checked for state requirements and verified by the evaluation clerk in the Admissions Office.

The office would like to call attention to the policy of waiving "Ds" and "Fs" outside of the major for the graduate. If a student has received "Ds" and "Fs" in a former major and has enough units and grade points to graduate in his current major, the "Ds" and "Fs" will be waived to let him receive the A.A. Degree. The "Ds" and "Fs" remain on the record but will be waived for graduation.

Commencement is held once a year in June, wherein a student may participate in the ceremony and receive his degree by marching with his fellow students. However, a student may graduate at any time—at the end of any semester or summer school—whenever he completes the requirements for graduation.

All panels will begin at 7:30 p.m. Admission is free.

## Reception To Be Held For Ceramic Exhibit

Response to the show, which will run through March 15, has far surpassed last year's showings, which attracted ceramic artists from all over California and 14 other states. This year Roland Shutt, gallery director, received 406 entries, 80 of which were from out of state.

The works now on exhibit are the 83 pieces the judges selected as the most outstanding. The works range from traditional pottery to contemporary sculpture and include such diverse pieces as a cookie jar (complete with cookies) by Vida Freeman, a ceramic brown bag (titled "Brown Bag") by W. C. Hilliard to a purely sculptural work like "New Citadel" by Frank Matranga.

### New Material Concepts

Director Shutt points out, "With today's artists working more and more with new materials and with changing concepts of the way to combine the elements of art, and even with the redefining of what art is, it is felt that the ancient art of the potter and his age-old material, clay, would limit the ceramic

Form, texture, color and space subjected to the fire continue to come out in exciting and innovative combinations in the hands of the artist-potter."

## Addeo Stops DeAnza; Musick Voted MVP

Coch Wally Kincaid's baseball team continued its winning ways in Santa Maria last week as it took all four games played there to capture the Allan Hancock Tournament championship.

On Wednesday, Feb. 19 the Falcons opened the tournament with a 4-2 win over Moorpark. In that game the Falcons fell behind as Moorpark put together three hits which were good for an early 2-0 lead.

Cerritos bounced back in the fourth, however, as it put together four hits including a double by outfielder Jack Tedesco to tie the score. The Falcons finally took the lead in the sixth inning as Frank Davies reached base on an error and eventually came around to score what proved to be the winning run.

### Addeo Shines

Sophomore Gary Addeo came on in the sixth inning in relief of Bob Edwards and picked up the win. Addeo threw but 24 pitches as he worked the final two innings of the game.

The Falcon's next game was against Hancock, and they went to work early scoring two runs on two hits in the first inning.

The two first-inning runs proved to be all that was needed as Dave Brunell, former Los Angeles City Player-of-the-Year from Bell High School, went all the way allowing just five hits while striking out 13 and walking but one batter. The one run that was scored against him was unearned, in the ninth inning.

Cerritos added its other two runs in the fifth without the use of a base hit. Rod Diggel went 0 for 4 and Tim Steele was 0 for 3, however, they each scored two runs to account for the Falcons' only scoring. Tedesco again supplied the hitting punch, as he collected two hits in three trips to the plate.

The victory over Hancock put Cerritos into the championship series of the eight-team tournament. The finals were

a best-of-three series against DeAnza, which also had a 2-0 tournament record.

### Stop DeAnza 8-0

The first game against DeAnza was played Friday night, and the Falcons ran away with it, 8-0, behind the brilliant two-hit pitching of Addeo.

Addeo pitched all nine innings, striking out nine batters and not allowing one base on balls. Both hits were singles, one coming in the third and the other in the seventh inning.

The win was Addeo's second in as many tries in the tournament and led to his being named the outstanding pitcher in the tournament. In his 11 innings of work on the mound he gave up a total of three hits and no runs.

### Ten Hits

The story was a bit different for the four DeAnza hurlers who were touched up for 10 hits and eight runs. The Falcons scored single runs in the first, second, fourth and fifth, adding a pair in both the third and seventh.

The hits were equally divided as eight of the Falcon starters contributed a hit with Musick and Diggel.

The win meant that Cerritos had to win one of the next two to capture the title.

They did it the easy way, as they knocked off DeAnza for the second straight time on Saturday by a score of 8-2.

The Falcons got off to another fast start with two runs in the second and then broke it open with four in the fourth inning. When the dust had cleared away, Cerritos had nine runs on 10 hits and was helped by 12 walks from five DeAnza pitchers.

Cliff Vaudreuil was the winning pitcher. He pitched the first five and one third innings before leaving for Mike Bryant.

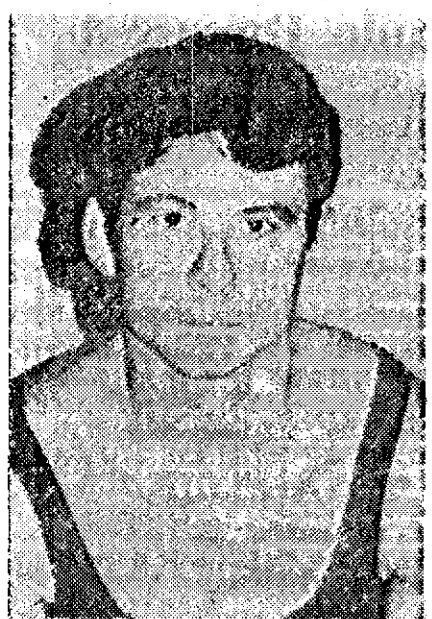
Cerritos picked up another award when freshman catcher Jim Musick was named Most Valuable Player.

unbeaten Roger Lee 9-2. Maddox is presently wrestling at 177-lbs., but will wrestle at 167-lbs. from now on.

Taking over at 177-lbs. will be Chester Boser. Boser was sidelined with a broken wrist following the Cal Poly (SLO) Tourney last month. He has had the cast removed and should be able to give anybody a good tussle.

### Byrge Wins 20

Mack Byrge, of "Mr. Dreamboat" fame, beat Dexter Prince by a whopping 20-7 score. Byrge is probably responsible for more trying moments for Simonek this year than any other two wrestlers combined. He is what they call a "hitter" in that he enjoys the contact and will not back off from anyone. His peil-mell style is exciting and so far very successful for the freshman from Arizona.

"Gentle" Ben Ohai was the recipient of a forfeit when he slammed Arnett Bramlett to the canvas. Bramlett pulled some legments and had to withdraw from the match.

Dave Campbell remained unbeaten in SCC action when he pinned Bill Schulte in four minutes and 58 seconds. Campbell has avenged his only loss of the year, that to Orange Coast's Dave Gleason. Campbell and Gleason will probably have a rubber match in the SCC meet.

## Tracksters Shine in SCC Relays; James Clears 6-8 in High Jump

After a good performance in the conference relays, Cerritos will open the South Coast Conference dual meet track season today at Mt. San Antonio College, with possibly the strongest team the Falcons will face this year.

"I don't think we can beat Mt. SAC right now," said Cerritos coach Dave Kamanski. "We've got a strong big meet team, with some good first place points, but Mt. SAC has great depth."

"They're very strong in the field events and hurdles, and they have good depth in the other events. Overall, they're the best dual meet team in the conference right now."

### Top Five Events

Cerritos won five events at the conference relays, the same number as Mt. SAC, but one of the wins came by forfeit when the Mounties were disqualified after finishing first in the 440 relay.

Other Falcon teams to win were the distance medley (Rubin Chappins, Mike Jerral, Curt Hain and Steve Knevelbaard—all freshmen), the high jump, the discus throw and the four mile (Chappins, Bernal, Hain and freshman Mike Mendez).

John James, a talented freshman

from Bellflower, turned in the outstanding mark of the day when he cleared 6-8 in the high jump. It was his career best, and he had several good jumps at 6-10 said Kamanski.

### Hard-Working Jumper

"He's the hardest working high jumper we've had," Kamanski said of his star pupil. "He's very dedicated, and he worked all fall and during the off season." Kamanski thinks James can go higher than 6-8. "But how much higher I don't know."

The Cerritos coach was also pleased with the running of Chappins, who was the high school state champion in the two-mile run as a junior and senior at Excelsior High School. Chappins ran 4:18 and 4:21 in the while competing in two relay events.

Kamanski said that ace sprinter Bob Ballard, the defending Southern California champ in the 100-yard dash, looked rusty after a layoff to cure a sore groin muscle. "He just needs a little conditioning," said Kamanski.

Competitors were hampered by a strong wind although discus thrower Kevin Johnson managed a toss of 149-2, best of the day.

It was the final game as a Falcon for Smiler and the all-time Cerritos assists man came through with seven more to lead the cagers in that category.

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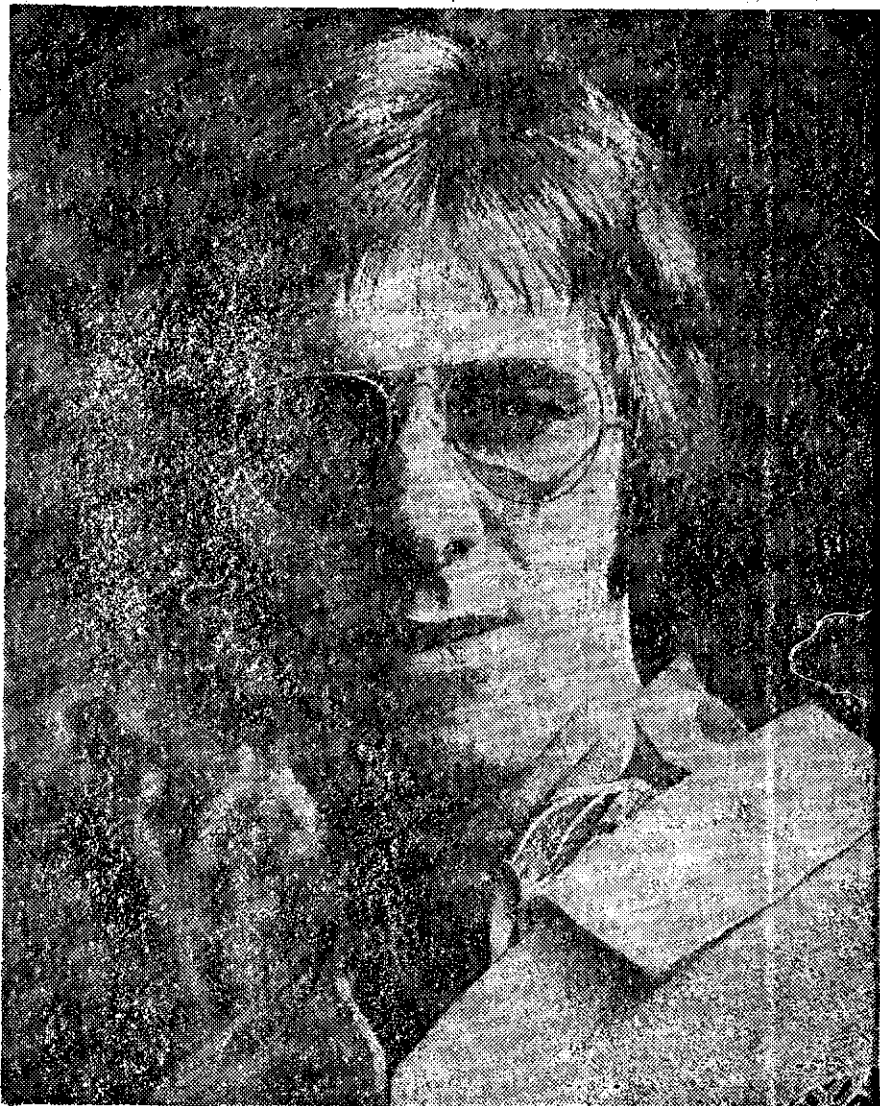

A public reception will be held tonight from 7-9 p.m. in the Art Gallery in conjunction with the second annual Cerritos Ceramic Show.

Response to the show, which will run through March 15, has far surpassed last year's showings, which attracted ceramic artists from all over California and 14 other states. This year Roland Shuff, gallery director, received 406 entries, 80 of which were from out of state.

The works now on exhibit are the 83 pieces the judges selected as the most outstanding. The works range from traditional pottery to contemporary sculpture and include such diverse pieces as a cookie jar (complete with cookies) by Vida Freeman, a ceramic brown bag (titled "Brown Bag") by W. C. Hilliard to a purely sculptural work like "New Citizen" by Frank Matranga.

### New Material Concepts

Director Shuff points out, "With today's artists working more and more with new materials and with changing concepts of the way to combine the elements of art, and even with the redefining of what art is, it is felt that the ancient art of the potter and his age-old material, clay, would limit the ceramic

artist. This exhibition provides an answer to the contrary.

Form, texture, color and space subjected to the fire continue to come out in exciting and innovative combinations in the hands of the artist-potter."

### Fine Tradition

With the exhibit the Art Gallery continues its fine tradition of presenting fascinating, informative and well-mounted shows that contribute to and illuminate the current art scene.

Gallery hours for the show, which will continue until March 15, are Monday through Thursday from 12 to 4:30 and 6 to 9 p.m. and Friday and Sunday from 12 to 4:30 p.m.

## Counseling Office Urges Early Filing for Petitions to Graduate

Students at Cerritos are advised to make an early counseling appointment for graduation in June. The last date to file for Commencement is April 1.

Graduation with the Associate in Arts Degree does not automatically take place. A student needs to submit a petition for graduation so that it can be reviewed by a counselor, checked for state requirements and verified by the evaluation clerk in the Admissions Office.

The office would like to call attention to the policy of waiving "Ds" and "Fs" outside of the major for the graduate. If a student has received "Ds" and "Fs" in a former major and has enough units and grade points to graduate in his current major, the "Ds" and "Fs" will be waived to let him receive the A.A. Degree. The "Ds" and "Fs" remain on the record but will be waived for graduation.

Commencement is held once a year in June, wherein a student may participate in the ceremony and receive his degree by marching with his fellow students. However, a student may graduate at any time—at the end of any semester or summer school—whenever he completes the requirements for graduation.

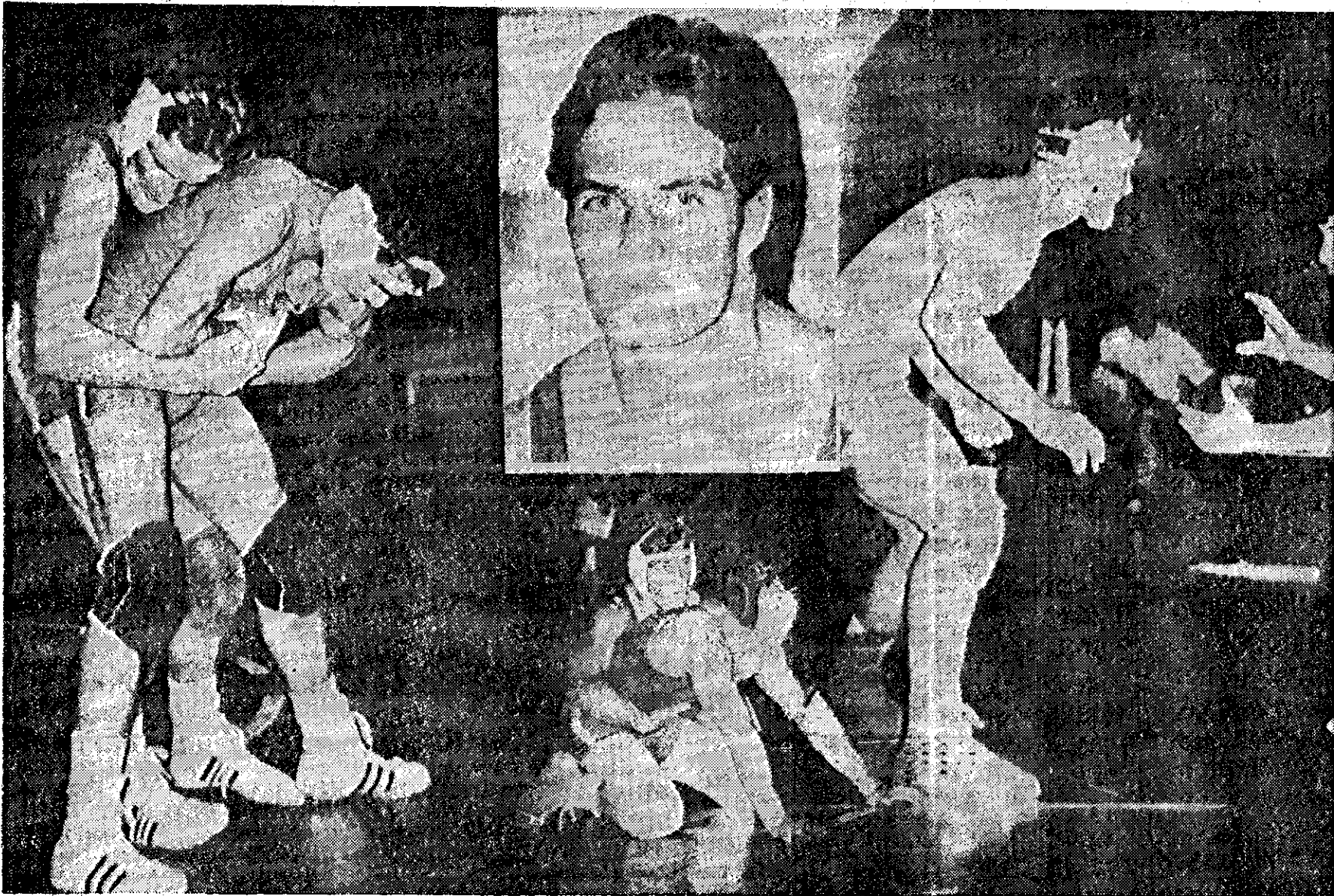

## Addeo Stops DeAnza; Musick Voted MVP

Couch Wally Kincaid's baseball team continued its winning ways in Santa Maria last week as it took all four games played there to capture the Allan Hancock Tournament championship.

On Wednesday, Feb. 19 the Falcons opened the tournament with a 4-2 win over Moorpark. In that game the Falcons fell behind as Moorpark put together three hits which were good for an early 2-0 lead.

Cerritos bounced back in the fourth, however, as it put together four hits including a double by outfielder Jack Tedesco to tie the score. The Falcons finally took the lead in the sixth inning as Frank Davies reached base on an error and eventually came around to score what proved to be the winning run.

### Addeo Shines

Sophomore Gary Addeo came on in the sixth inning in relief of Bob Edwards and picked up the win. Addeo threw but 24 pitches as he worked the final two innings of the game.

The Falcon's next game was against Hancock, and they went to work early scoring two runs on two hits in the first inning.

The two first-inning runs proved to be all that was needed as Dave Brunell, former Los Angeles City Player-of-the-Year from Bell High School, went all the way allowing just five hits while striking out 13 and walking but one batter. The one run that was scored against him was unearned, in the ninth inning.

Cerritos added its other two runs in the fifth without the use of a base hit.

Rod Diggle went 0 for 4 and Tim Steele was 0 for 3, however, they each scored two runs to account for the Falcons only scoring. Tedesco again supplied the hitting punch, as he collected two hits in three trips to the plate.

The victory over Hancock put Cerritos into the championship series of the eight-team tournament. The finals were

a best-of-three series against DeAnza, which also had a 2-0 tournament record.

### Stop DeAnza 8-0

The first game against DeAnza was played Friday night, and the Falcons ran away with it, 8-0, behind the brilliant two-hit pitching of Addeo.

Addeo pitched all nine innings, striking out nine batters and not allowing one base on balls. Both hits were singles, one coming in the third and the other in the seventh inning.

The win was Addeo's second in as many tries in the tournament and led to his being named the outstanding pitcher in the tournament. In his 11 innings of work on the mound he gave up a total of three hits and no runs.

### Ted Hits

The story was a bit different for the four DeAnza hurlers who were touched up for 10 hits and eight runs. The Falcons scored single runs in the first, second, fourth and fifth, adding a pair in both the third and seventh.

The hits were equally divided as eight of the Falcon starters contributed a hit with Musick and Diggle.

The win meant that Cerritos had to win one of the next two to capture the title.

They did it the easy way, as they knocked off DeAnza for the second straight time on Saturday by a score of 9-2.

The Falcons got off to another fast start with two runs in the second and then broke it open with four in the fourth inning. When the dust had cleared away, Cerritos had nine runs on 10 hits and was helped by 12 walks from five DeAnza pitchers.

Cliff Vaudreuil was the winning pitcher. He pitched the first five and one third innings before leaving for Mike Bryant.

Cerritos picked up another award when freshman catcher Jim Musick was named Most Valuable Player.

## Wrestlers Drop San Diego City, Prepare For Tough Tournaments

The Falcons have undergone a mild revamping as they prep for the final three tournaments. An injury to Felipe Vargas at 132-lbs. has provided an opportunity for seldom-used Ken Richardson to wrestle. Richardson responded with a pin over Gary Wood in four minutes.

Simonek is pleased with the showing of Richardson so far. "The injury to Felipe hurt, but so far Keith has done all we've asked of him and is doing a fine job."

Captain Ken Turner also remains optimistic about the team's outlook. "We showed a lot of people we're for real this year, and I sincerely believe we have a great shot at the State." Turner himself has to be the pro-

tagonist favorite, including the state, but will have his hands full with El Camino's Alex Verdoso and Bakersfield's Eugene Walker. "They're all tough, but I think barring an upset, which can happen, it will hold down to us three," said Turner.

Turner was awarded a forfeit from San Diego.

Stacy Cody also was awarded a forfeit and remained undefeated in SCC competition. Cody also has a good shot at State honors.

Jordan will try to avenge his only loss in SCC action when he probably will face Mt. SAC's Larry Watanabe in the finals. Both wrestlers have a bag full of moves and are extremely quick.

Jarrett "Deacon" Williams pinned Mike Boyd in four minutes and 37 seconds using a "cradle." Williams also is expected to pull in a bushel of points in all three tournaments.

George Maddox defeated previously

unbeaten Roger Lee, 9-2. Maddox is presently wrestling at 177-lbs., but will wrestle at 167-lbs. from now on.

Taking over at 177-lbs. will be Chester Bossek. Bossek was sidelined with a broken wrist following the Cal Poly (SLO) Tourney last month. He has had the cast removed and should be able to give anybody a good tussle.

**Byrge Wins 20**  
Mack Byrge, of "Mr. Dreamboat" fame, beat Dexter Prince by a whopping 30-7 score. Byrge is probably responsible for more trying moments for Simonek this year than any other two wrestlers combined. He is what they call a "hitter" in that he enjoys the contact and will not back off from anyone. His pell-mell style is exciting and so far very successful for the freshman from Arizona.

"Gentle" Ben Ohal was the recipient of a forfeit when he slammed Arnett Bramlett to the canvas. Bramlett pulled some legmen's and had to withdraw from the match.

Dave Campbell remained unbeaten in SCC action when he pinned Bill Schulte in four minutes and 56 seconds. Campbell has avenged his only loss of the year, that to Orange Coast's Dave Gleason. Campbell and Gleason will probably have a rubber match in the SCC meet.

## Cagers Down Knights Place Second in SCC

Cerritos College cagers closed out the season with a easy 84-56 win over the San Diego College Knights at San Diego.

Most of the damage was done early in the first half as the Falcons fed their big men who enjoyed a rather sizable height advantage over the smaller Knights. If this did not work the guards simply drove the lane for easy lay-ins.

### Big E. Cat Shines

Everett "The Big E" Fopina and Ron Cat Ballou combined for 33 points with most of them coming in the first half. Fopina hit six of his seven shots in the first half and finished with 14 points. Ballou turned in a fine performance to end his career at Cerritos, as he pumped in 19 points and grabbed seven rebounds.

Ballou, who was one of the most consistent of the starting quintet throughout the season, finished the year as the second leading rebounder and one of the top point getters.

Rick Merrill closed out his cager career with an exhibition of shooting that was proof that the "Machine" was still able to get the points when they were needed. He hit on eight of 13 shots and added two free throws for a total of 18.

Eric Smiler and Randy Craig each

scored 10 points as all the Falcon starters hit in double figures. "Eric and Randy continued to make some big plays and some great assists into Ev and Ron," said Coach Forester. "It was the final game as a Falcon for Smiler and the all-time Cerritos assists man came through with seven more to lead the cagers in that category."

Craig, who now hopes to help the Falcon basketball team to a South Coast Conference championship, finished the evening with six assists.

### Lose Three

Jim Killingsworth will lose only three members of his starters but they will have to be replaced. Smiler, Merrill and Ballou each were vital parts of the Killingsworth machine. It can easily be said that the Falcons could not have gotten as far as they did if it were not for the role that these men played.

Killingsworth will welcome back Ev Fopina, the team's leading scorer and rebounder and their playmaker Craig. Craig could get some help next year from Gary Woolery or newcomer John Sprague.

But that is next season and this season the Falcons finished in second place in the SCC. The Falcon's hopes of getting into the State playoffs sank with Fullerton's 114-96 win over San Diego Mesa Wednesday night.

The win over SD left the cagers with a 12-2 mark in the conference and a 20-5 record overall which was good enough to have the JC Grid Wire rank them No. 10 in the State.

## Tracksters Shine in SCC Relays; James Clears 6-8 in High Jump

After a good performance in the conference relays, Cerritos will open the South Coast Conference dual meet track season today at Mt. San Antonio College, with possibly the strongest team the Falcons will face this year.

"I don't think we can beat Mt. SAC right now," said Cerritos coach Dave Kamanski. "We've got a strong big meet team, with some good first place points, but Mt. SAC has great depth."

"They're very strong in the field events and hurdles, and they have good depth in the other events. Overall, they're the best dual meet team in the conference right now."

### Top Five Events

Cerritos won five events at the conference relays, the same number as Mt. SAC, but one of the wins came by forfeit when the Mounties were disqualified after finishing first in the 440 relay.

Other Falcon teams to win were the distance medley (Rubin Chappins, Mike Bernal, Curt Haini and Steve Knevelbaard—all freshmen), the high jump, the discus throw and the four mile (Chappins, Bernal, Haini and freshman Mike Mendez).

John James, a talented freshman

from Bellflower, turned in the outstanding mark of the day when he cleared 6-8 in the high jump. It was his career best, and he had several good jumps at 6-10 said Kamanski.

### Hard-Working Jumper

"He's the hardest working high jumper we've had," Kamanski said of his star pupil. "He's very dedicated, and he worked all fall and during the off season." Kamanski thinks James can go higher than 6-8. "But how much higher I don't know."

The Cerritos coach was also pleased with the running of Chappins, who was the high school state champion in the two-mile run as a junior and senior at Excelsior High School. Chappins ran 4:13 and 4:21 in the while competing in two relay events.

Kamanski said that ace sprinter Bob Ballard, the defending Southern California champ in the 100-yard dash, looked rusty after a layoff to cure a sore groin muscle. "He just needs a little conditioning," said Kamanski.

Competitors were hampered by a strong wind although discus thrower Kevin Johnson managed a toss of 149-2, best of the day.
