Building Plan OK, Financing Not Set

Approval of preliminary plans for a three-story para-medical building for Cerritos was given October 5 by the board of trustees. Currently, however, there is no money available for the project.

The building, which would cost \$2.5 million, could be financed two ways, according to Joe Johnson, director of federal funding.

Money for the structure could come from a state-wide competitive bidding process, or from a bond issue.

Another possibility would be the state sharing cost of building with Cerritos. California would assume two-thirds of the structure's cost. Cerritos would absorb the remaining one-third of costs.

In order for the college to have responsibility for cost, a tax would be

levied on local property owners for a period of one year.

The state would not be able to assume payment now if it were to share costs with Cerritos. The money would have to be allocated from the state operating budget, Johnson says.

What if no money is found? That is the \$64,000 question, said Johnson. "It would be delayed until money could be found."

The building will cost a little less than the average building would cost in the state, said Johnson.

Building costs would run \$540 a square foot, including classroom facilities. There would be 30,000 sq. ft. in the building. Average costs for construction on state campuses is \$100 a square foot, without facilities.

If money is found, preliminary plans would have to be approved by the state. Actual working drawings would begin in 1972. Construction would begin in 1973, with completion due in 1974.

Once completed, the building would serve primarily the departments of dental hygiene, dental assistance, nursing, prosthetics, orthotics, and placement of missing limbs. It also would be used for economics, and nursing stewardess training.

Large lecture halls and conference rooms would be available for use on the floors for use by all departments on campus.

Classes now meeting in existing classrooms relating to the new building will be transferred upon its completion.

'Disease on Wheels' V.D. Hits All Levels

Venereal disease is the number one communicable disease in Bel Air as well as Southeast Los Angeles, according to Bob Lugar, Los Angeles County Health official.

The spread of the disease has increased to such a degree all over the country that it no longer is possible to pinpoint it to one social or economic group.

"Venereal disease is a disease on wheels," said Lugar. "A person can get it in one area and in the same day transport it someplace clear across the country. It is the number one communicable disease in every city in Los Angeles County."

In the age group through 29, reported Lugar, venereal disease is 75 per cent of the entire disease problem in this country. Sexual activity is greatest in this age group, consequently so is the disease.

Increase In Disease

The Bellflower division of the county health department reports that in its jurisdiction, which includes most cities served by Cerritos, there was a 160 per cent increase in venereal disease from 1968 through 1970.

"This number must be taken lightly. Only about one-fifth of venereal disease cases are reported in this area. Almost 75 per cent are treated by private physicians."

The bulk of individuals with syphilis come in for treatment as a result of something they have heard, read, or seen. Therefore, mass education is an

absolute necessity. "Whatever we can do to attract attention, that's all right," said Lugar.

The greatest present need, he asserted, is for new, more intensive education dealing with VD. "What we really need is prophylactic education," said Lugar.

For years the male had to assume

responsibility for birth control," he said. "In order to do this, prophylactic education is necessary."

The Pill

Before, with the advent of the birth control pill, the need for prophylactic education was not as great. For most people,

'72 Bond Passage Means Board Risk

In the conservative communities which make up the Cerritos College District, just mentioning property taxes brings a tirade. "Those lousy students we pay taxes for are busy tearing up (or down) the schools. They are going to school just to play," shouts the irate, vulnerable taxpayer. "Those damn commies are leading those stupid kids on. It's all a plot you know."

In this morass of uninformed but firmly believed opinion lies one of the major problems facing Cerritos' administration.

Those are the people the Board of Trustees must reach next year to raise taxes or approve a bond issue.

The Board of Trustees and other administrators must convince them somehow that they need to increase property taxes or approve a bond issue, so new buildings can be funded.

The task is one which the board, mindful of elections every few years, dreads. They know they may be blasted out of their positions by an explosive reaction to anything that sounds like a tax increase.

Cerritos' problem is finding these new sources of funds as soon as possible. The budget for this year reached the highest level ever, \$9.1 million. 1972-73 promises to produce an even higher budget. This year the board used up its last legal source of revenue by imposing the last available five cents of the adult education tax.

More Taxes More State Aid

To find more revenue now, the board must rely on increased valuation of property in the district, not acceptable to the already thoroughly gouged property owners; or, rely more on state aid for larger enrollments.

Larger enrollments in the same number of classes means more state money, with only a small increase in cost to the district. Cerritos has been squeezing extra people into its classrooms for years and will probably increase class sizes even more.

The situation is aggravated by state rules which allow nearly anyone to enter a community college. The community colleges may not turn away anyone who qualifies. Cerritos cannot limit its growth.

Teacher salary increases have accounted for about \$350 thousand per year and still have not kept up with the cost of living.

Repayment of bond issues with their high interest rates will drive the budget higher each year. Finally, inflation will eat about four or five per cent per year.

Building Funds Needed

The 1972 election promises to be critical for Cerritos. The approval of a bond issue on that ballot is vital to sustain the viability of Cerritos. Without funds from this bond issue, the school will find it impossible to build the paramedical building which is slated for 1974.

Cerritos' Board members now have to come up with a strategy for winning the bond issue. So far they seem to be tip-toeing around the issue, not wishing to stir hostile voter feelings.

Placing the bond issue quietly on the ballot and hoping it will somehow slip through, is the easiest course of action. It is also most likely to fail.

Attacking the problems of Cerritos and presenting their cure, the bond issue, will be more successful if the college presents its urgent need while showing their excellent track record of community service and high quality educational performance.

A weak, fearful approach to the voters will probably fail, as it has for other districts who, for political reasons, soft pedaled their plea for voter approval. Cerritos needs more funding and new facilities more than the re-election of any one of its board members. If an aggressive approach is likely to be most successful then board members must risk their skins for the good of the college.

We as students, representing students yet to be served by Cerritos, expect that of the board. Each board member should risk defeat at the polls if that is necessary to insure bond issue approval.

Cops Not Gods, Same as Others

On Tuesday, October 5, Los Angeles' educational television station presented a ninety minute documentary which profiled the activities of the Kansas City Police Department. The program presented a one sided view of law enforcement selecting only incidents involving white policemen and black suspects. The special left the idea in ones mind that no white people are ever arrested in Kansas City, and police brutality runs rampant.

There's no doubt that today's image of law enforcement officers is somewhat tarnished, and this documentary does nothing to polish any of the tarnish off. Chief Ed Davis of the Los Angeles Police Department, says he thinks the image of today's policeman is confused. "I think our image is mixed, but with the majority of people the image of the police officer is somewhat that of a savior."

There's no doubt that police brutality does exist, and any law enforcement official who says it doesn't is taking an unrealistic look at his job. The one thing that most people forget when they accuse the police of brutality, is that cops are not gods. They're not perfect. They're subject to the same stress you and I are. They get mad, they get hurt, they laugh and they cry. They have families they go home to at night just like anyone else, the point being that only difference between a policeman and you or I is that he carries a gun and a badge and is sworn to protect us, even at the cost of his own life. Last week we had an example of that when a Montebello officer was shot and killed by a robbery suspect. The policeman held his fire, because the suspect was using a young girl as a hostage. He could have elected to take a chance and fire at the robber, and he might have been lucky and hit him, or he may have killed the hostage. He made a decision, and lost his life because of it. It's not easy to make such a decision, nor is it any easier to have kill someone. One experience that comes to mind is that of a young officer who responded to a family disturbance call. When a fellow officer got out of the patrol car two shots rang out, and moments later he was dead. The young officer was confronted with a man holding a gun. He ordered the man to drop the weapon. He answered by firing at the officer, who returned the fire, killing the man. Minutes later the man's six year old son, came up to the policeman sobbing "Why did you kill my father?" The officer had no answer, nor did he have an answer for the policeman's wife when she asked why.

Today's policeman does a dirty job for less money than a regular person with the same educational background. So it's apparent he isn't in it for the money. What is he in it for? Los Angeles County Deputy Sheriff Phil Smith said he became a policeman because he wanted to try and do something constructive. "It seemed that quite a few people talk about doing something so I just thought that getting into law enforcement was doing my small part to help society and set an example for my children."

If you doubt the toughness of a policeman's job, take a ride some evening in a police car.

Get a firsthand look at the abuse both verbal and physical today's police have to take and then I think you will agree that cops do give more than tickets.

Formalities Bog Senate Session

Two senators' failure in presenting a proposed bill properly, and three bills lacking "not urgent" delayed formal action on four bills including a deflection of one bill during Wednesday's senate meeting.

Senators Wayne Rather and Bob Hardin, proposed a bill stating that the centered surface of the quad area is inadequate when it becomes slick and hazardous while wet.

Others senators stated that the bill was passed by the senate last semester and they questioned the reason for the re passage this semester. One senator said that the bill did not pass the administrative council last year.

Confusion, however, when senator Jim Masters said that the bill was passed by the council and then was scheduled to be re-surfaced this past summer.

The "therefore" clause was not constructed properly thus requiring the senators to reaffirm their bill, and put to the senate on or next week according to Dean Robinson, student government advisor.

Senators Masters and Hardin proposed bill 900. Masters explained that the student government code states that there at least 1/3 of the senate be freshman but that there was no limit specified for the sophomore representation.

Masters and Hardin proposed that no less than 1/3 of senate be seated at

entered as section 24112 to the code. Vote for the bill was delayed until next Wednesday's senate meeting.

Bill 940 was concerned with the publicity code. According to senators Steve Moeller, and Hardin, there is no code this semester. Last semester's code came in, together with the administrative code. As a result a revision was made. Approval of the bill was also delayed until next week.

Beverly Stowell was recommended to be approved as Court Secretary. However the bill was delayed because she was not present at the meeting.

The final bill recommended that senator Moeller be elected as Party Whip, however, the approval was also put off until next Wednesday's meeting at 2 pm in the Boardroom.

Repeat Credits - Reprieve

A new policy is in effect at Cerritos this fall whereby a student can remove a grade lower than a "C" from the record by repeating the course and substituting that grade for the previous grade.

If any student has received a grade lower than "C" they can have it removed by repeating the course, then by petitioning have the most recent grade accepted and counted in computing the GPA.

Venerereal disease rates have skyrocketed, however.

Massive education is necessary to explain the importance of the prophylactic in the prevention of venerereal disease, stressed Lugar.

The birth control pill has created a number of problems that did not exist before it came into use, according to Lugar.

The pill has a tendency to create an alkaline condition in the vagina. This promotes the growth of gonorrhea.

Increased sexual permissiveness after the advent of the pill cannot be overlooked as another factor in the increase of venerereal disease, said Lugar.

Legislation

A bill that would have allowed sex education in schools, including venerereal disease, was recently vetoed by governor Reagan.

This, asserted Lugar, is an inconsistency on the part of the governor. In the past, he has signed a bill that would allow teenagers to be treated for VD by a physician without parental consent. He has also signed a bill that would allow display of prophylactics in public places, if accompanied by information literature.

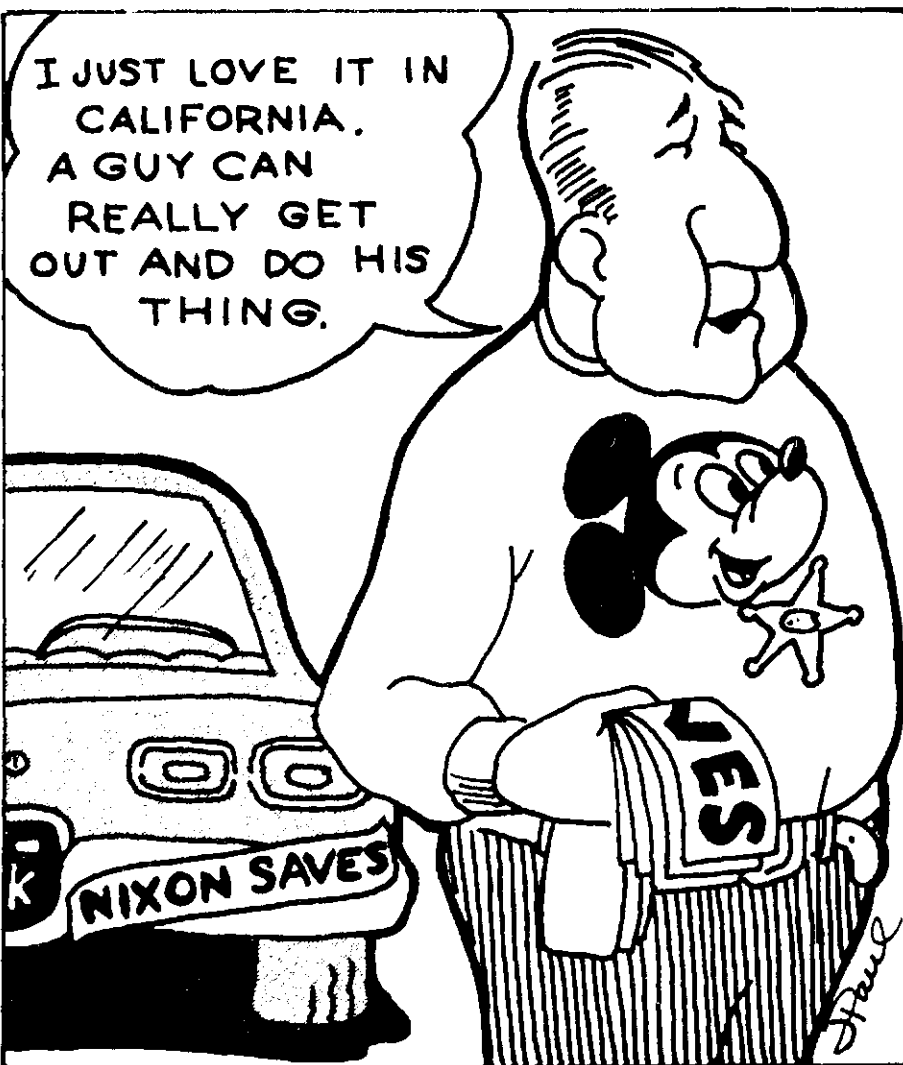
"There will be an override hearing concerning the vetoed sex education bill on October 19th," said Lugar. In this way, the bill may be passed.

Debaters Win

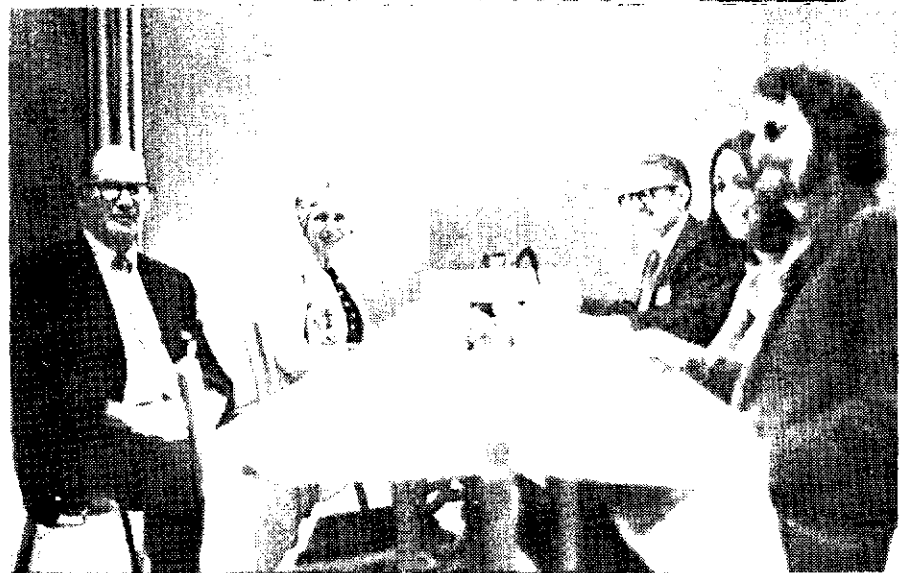
After winning six meets over teams from California and Arizona over the weekend, Cerritos debaters are heading for a full three days of debate today at Pullerton.

TV Censors Vs. 'Beasts' Adman Major Outlets Local Blackout

Producer Stanley Kramer and satirist Stan Freberg voiced their anger over the refusal of the TV networks to show the commercial made by Freberg to publicize Kramer's new film "Bless the Beasts and Children" at a press conference held last week at Columbia Studios.

Kramer said "a little censorship goes a long way." Freberg added "they're afraid a postcard will pour in." These comments are typical of the tone of a press conference at which Kramer and Freberg presented their case against the major local TV outlets.

Bleeding Hearts

The commercial, created by Freberg, shows buffalo being shot, with commentary by a fictitious representative of the American Gun Cult Association, who condemns the film as a vicious attack on the hunters of America by "bleeding hearts."

NBC said: "Not a regular type of advertisement—the buffalo scene was too violent for our people." CBS said: "Too violent." and the panel discussion made the spot appear like part of a news program. ABC said: "The spot is too violent and makes reference to a national gun association and KABC prefers not to make reference to private organizations."

Freberg wants to know why this commercial can be condemned when

"they have people riding in speedboats in your home toilet bowl."

Only in L.A.

Only in the Los Angeles area has this commercial been censored by the major networks. "Why has Los Angeles censored this commercial?" is the rhetorical question being asked by Kramer and Freberg.

The network censors of Los Angeles have condemned the commercials as "too violent," which led Kramer to remark: "I have made an anti-violence picture, yet they say you can't show violence. They seem to think if you ignore violence, maybe it will go away."

When Kramer was asked what he has done for publicity for the movie without the networks, his reply was "my commercials have been shown on the local TV networks and the scripts have been on radio." Kramer also took out a half-page ad in the Los Angeles Times when the film opened last week.

Keep a Job

Kramer has been called a "bambler" by gun enthusiasts for his film and the content. Kramer said he believes in compromise in his films and in the promotional material put out for his films. But on this issue he said he would not budge or be compromised simply because of a single individual whose goal in life is, as Freberg puts it, to "keep my job."

Students Failing, Tapes to Rescue

A self-paced learning situation has been created in Cerritos' preparatory Chemistry classes enabling students to learn basic concepts at their own speed.

Students were not learning enough of these principles when in regular, regular classroom atmosphere, and a change in presenting material to students was needed, according to Wanda Sterner, developer of the technique presently in use here. In presenting the material in regular classroom situations, an instructor would cover the information at a speed corresponding to the rate at which students grasped the main ideas.

There were, however, those students who grasped these concepts at a much slower rate, and those who learned quickly.

Explore, Learn

Unlike the regular chemistry classes, Sterner's technique allows students to explore the knowledge they don't know, and learn it on an individual basis.

The chemistry instructor began using the technique five years ago in her laboratory classes, while in her lecture courses she used the standardized method. The self-paced program is now used in her preparatory classes.

Students in lecture classes are pre-tested on each chapter. If they earn 85% or the pretest, they go to the succeeding chapter and so on, until they score below 85%.

If the students at anytime score below 85%, they read the chapter and perform the experiments. They must also

achieve 85% on chapter tests to proceed to the following chapter.

Explaining how the 85% is beneficial towards the student's learning, Sterner said, "I asked all our department people on what they thought the students should learn in the prep class."

As a result, she devised behavioral objectives and broke them down to correspond with each chapter in the book.

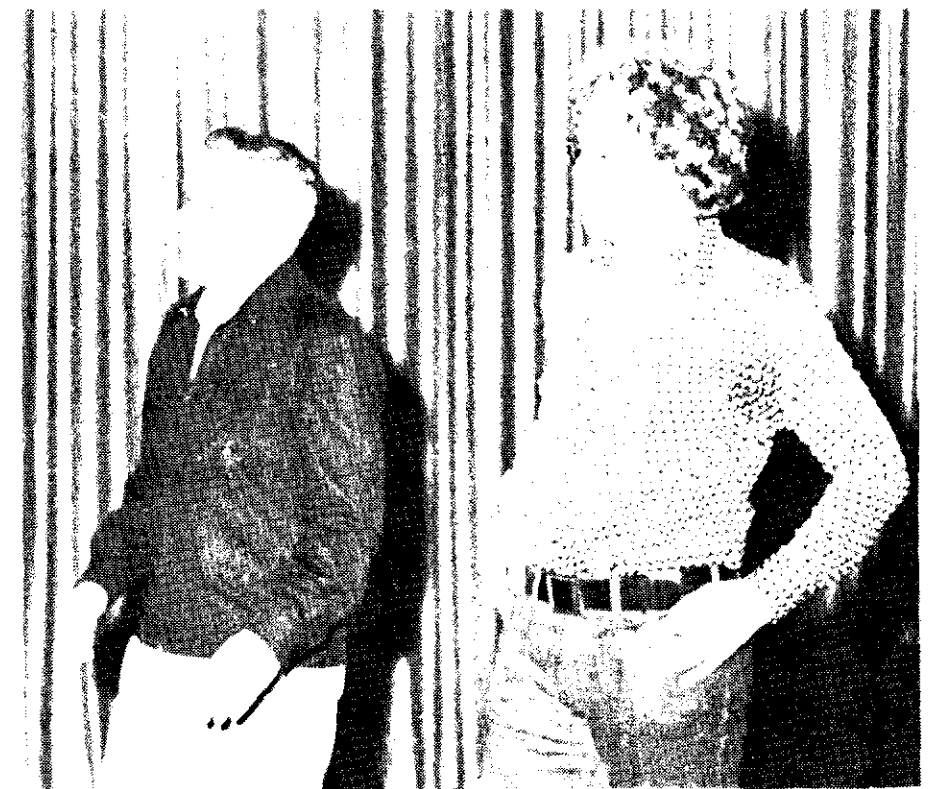
Students evaluate themselves to find out if Sterner's objectives are being met. The results have shown that students are comprehending at least 85% of the concepts utilizing the new technique.

Students earning a C in the labs are passing with 85% of the knowledge needed to receive full credit, reports the chemistry teacher.

Unique

The lecture is a freely organized classroom situation, again a unique situation at which students take tests, read the material, prepare for the experiments and ask questions. Tests are taken on an individual basis when the students feel they are ready to take the test.

In the laboratory taught by Sterner, tapes are prepared for each experiment. Students do the experiment and compare results with the taped remarks.

Comic Heroes Versus Drugs

Even comic books have taken on a moral consciousness. This summer DC Comics published a two-issue story disclaiming the use of drugs in an attempt at "educating our young people to the dangers of drug abuse."

Starting those emerald gladiators, the Green Lantern and the Green Arrow, these comic books are a far cry from the law-enforcing Dick Tracy or the crusading Superman.

DC Comics have dealt frankly with the world of pushers and speed freaks.

The comics, which are the only ones dealing with drugs approved by the Comics Codes, attempt to deal with a volatile subject matter in a credible way.

As the story begins we find the Green Lantern and the Green Arrow attempting to thwart the use of drugs.

The action rises as the Green Arrow finds out his trusted ward, a slightly named Speedy, is a junkie.

A vivid picture of the drug world is painted throughout the book. Drugs are described as "chemicals polluting the blood," "slavering, hungry, monstrosities," "more deadly than the atom bomb."

As one character takes a hit he says, "Don't need food... don't need girls... just of mama spike into the mainline."

Both issues are winners of the comic book world's Academy Award for Best Comic and have received a positive response from the Mayor of New York, John Lindsay, who wrote:

"Your undertaking to impart the horrors of narcotics to our youngsters deserves applause. With the drug epidemic spreading throughout the country, the need for effective campaigns of prevention is ever increasing."

Basically, comic books haven't

changed. There's still the ads for the free giant life size monster and the Mr. America secret muscle building tools "to carve your body into muscular shape."

There's still the harrowing escapades with the heroes emerging victorious. But somehow, whether the Katzenjammer Kids get caught stealing a pie or whether Archie and Jughead make the football team seem like trivial subject matter when compared to this DC project.

With the sense of moral consciousness beginning to blaze we might well be faced with Little Orphan Annie's abortion escapade or Bambi and Dagwood Bumstead's fight to teach their dog, Dinky, the secret of zero population growth.

Dennis the Menace

We might see Dennis the Menace in juvenile jail because he tried to sell Margaret and Joey a marijuana cigarette (in actuality it was only one parsley rolled in toilet paper).

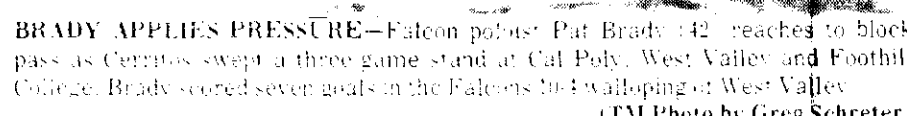

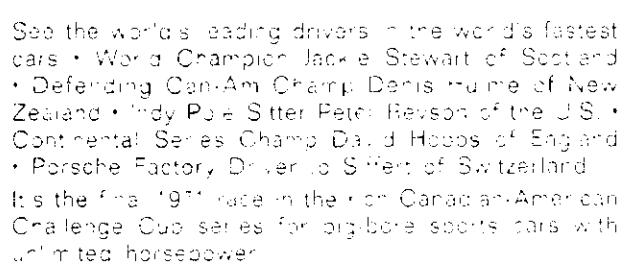

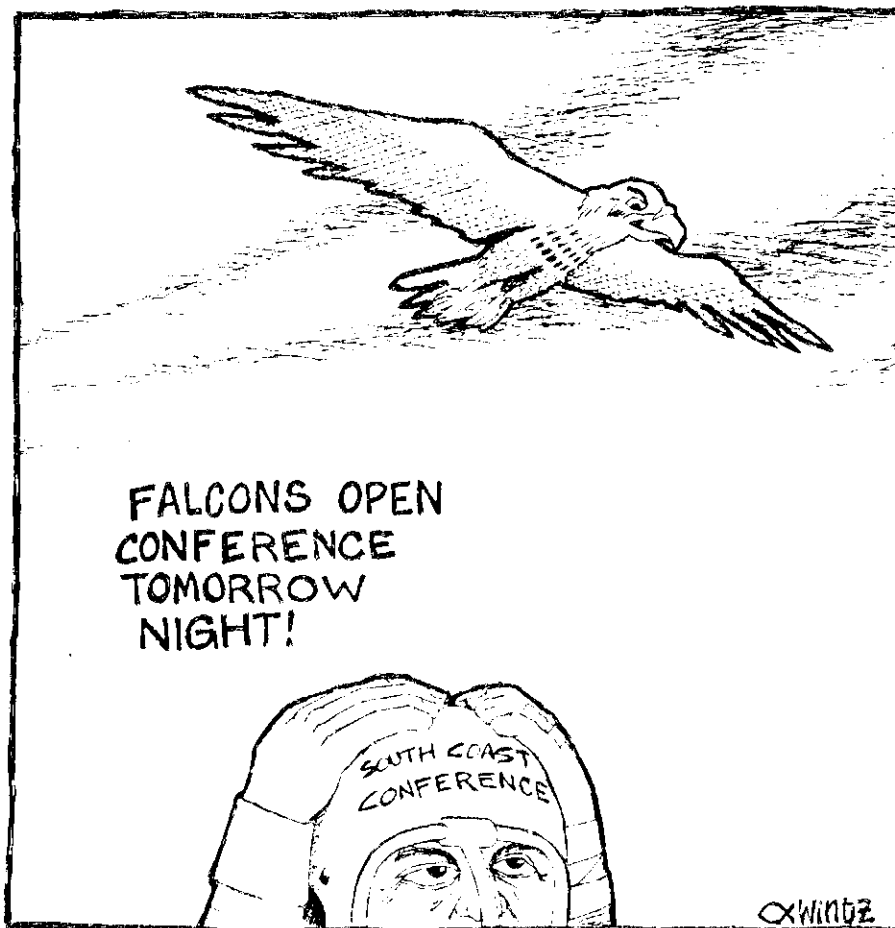
