Students, hassles decline

Spring 1984 enrollment's official count was 20,736, with a decrease of 2,481 students compared to Spring 1983, but from the viewpoint of Admissions and Records it was considered one of the smoothest registrations due to the changes in the appointment system.

According to James Fenningham, Assistant Director of Admissions and Records, "We had more days to register so we were able to spread the appointments over more days, which helped us out."

Not until a second report is sent to the Chancellor's Office by April 30, will the effect of the college's Average Daily Attendance (ADA) be known.

The first period ended January 15, and the second period ends April 30 for Spring enrollment.

"Then they can compute the figures we got last year," Fenningham said.

In the past, we have had more people than we were getting paid for. In the fall, it fell below the ADA cap.

"...we must enroll enough students."

"In the spring we must enroll enough people so that our ADA is at our funding cap," stated Fenningham.

Cerritos College's Office of Institutional Research did a survey to find out why there was a drop in enrollment in the fall.

According to Jan Dennis-Rounds, Director of Institutional Research and Development, the college had expected to drop slightly because of

Student Senate election ends tonight



LDSSA, VICA, jocks head up slate of 50

Some 50 students are vying for 36 seats in the Student Senate, as balloting continues today for the spring term. The elections opened yesterday.

All students (part-time included) with a valid ASCC card are eligible to vote.

The election booths will be open from 8:30 to 2:30 and from 5:00 until 9:00, and are located at the Elbow Room, Student Center, Technology Building, and in the Athletics area.

The Latter-Day Saints Students Association is the only group running a full slate of 10 candidates.

Other blocs which have nominated candidates are the combined Cosmetology and Vocational slate which has nine names on the ballot, and the Filipino Club which is running three people.

Clubs that are running two candidates are the Handicapped Students, and the Culture Club.

Kappa Tau Omega, and MECHA are each running one candidate.

The last ten candidates on the ballot, although listed as independents, are all members of the unofficial athletics slate.

A minor controversy brewed Tuesday morning, as it appeared that the candidates from Athletics had been set off from the rest of the ballot by a double line.

But according to Casey Rankin, Secretary of the Activities Office, the

reelection, claims that it is very difficult to get students to show an interest.

"Last election I probably talked to over 600 people in order to get 100 people to vote, and maybe 10 of them asked pertinent questions. A lot of people simply don't know that they can vote.

"Another thing is that it's amazing how many people run for the senate for the first time who have never been to a senate meeting," said Holland.

Senate politics

The Senate is the legislative body of the ASCC Government, which is patterned after the republican form of government used by the United States.

The other two branches of the student government are the Executive, which includes the President and the Vice President, and the Supreme Court, which is appointed by the Executive Branch.

Members of the Senate are elected at the beginning of both the Fall and Spring terms. The top 36 votegetters, out of this term's 50 candidates, will be seated when the Senate begins its new session next Wednesday.

\$50 fees cover all charges; parking - ASCC not included

The \$50 per semester "fees" full-time students will have to pay this fall gets rid of all the so-called instructional material fees charged this year.

The \$50 tuition tag goes straight to the state to be included as part of the total college budget allocation for the 1984-85 school year.

The \$3 per class material fees

collected this semester totalled \$564,707, with monies going toward purchasing instructional materials for the classrooms.

According to President Wilford Michael, some of the state apportionment will have to be used to buy classroom materials such as paper, duplicator fluid, staples, etc.

"Students will be expected to buy most of their own materials next fall semester," Dr. Michael said.

Parking fees and Associated Student Body fees are not included in the \$50 tuition.

The 83-84 fiscal year budget is over \$25 million. State apportionment pays 80 percent, while the rest comes from district taxes.

With the passage of the Katz (D-Sepulveda) Bill AB1XX, state funding monies will lower while district taxes and tuition fees are combined to cover the remaining 20 percent.

RTD Id's now available

Effective Feb. 25, RTD identification discount cards will be available to qualified students. The cards will be honored for discount bus fares through October.

Present college-vocational discount cards will expire on March 31.

New cards will be effective on March 1.

To be eligible, a student must be enrolled in at least 12 units or 12 hours of classroom study per week, for a minimum of three months. Semester sessions meet the three-month requirement.

Identification card applications are available in the admissions office.

Discount cards may be obtained at any of the ten RTD Customer Service Centers by submitting an application, a 1 x 1-1/4" full-face photo, proof of eligibility (a computer printout of your schedule), and a \$1 processing fee. Mail-in applications will not be accepted.

Approved cards will be mailed approximately 20 days after submission.

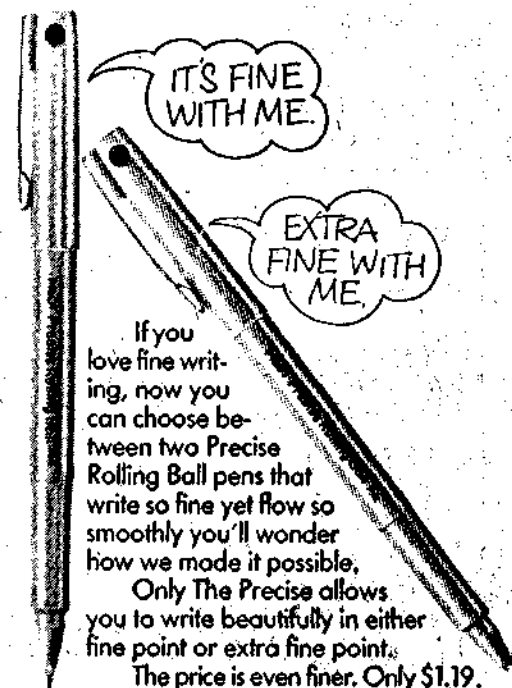

students going to another college because classes were full.

2.1% were lost because of the fees instituted in the fall.

1.7% dropped because of the rumors of tuition.

1.5% were people that could not make their appointments.

Dennis-Rounds explained further, "It is a statistical proration method of estimating. From the data we gathered on that survey we estimated the total through the statistical proration."

"I think it will help us in the future now that we know how many we lost and some of the reasons. This next fall we will be in a better position to estimate what will happen and take steps to protect ourselves from a dramatic decline in enrollment."

"We are trying to use a positive approach."

In addition to our changes in appointments for registering, the college now offers an assessment battery which was initiated last fall.

Dr. Fran Newman, Dean of Student Services said, "We encourage students to take this (test) before registering. It is offered on an on-going basis during registration."

"We sent out 1300 letters encouraging students to take the test. It will avoid classes that are not right for the student. We are trying to use a positive approach to the assessment battery."

Greer miracle shot saves 11-game win streak

Clutch shooter Andre Greer, the Falcon's most consistent player all year, sank a dramatic fade away 25 footer with no time remaining to hold off Santa Ana 58-56 and clinched at least a tie for first in the South Coast Conference title.

It is now 11 in a row for the 11-1 Falcons who can wrap up the title tonight against a tough Orange Coast team at 7:30 in the Falcon gym.

It was not easy for the Birds in the Santa Ana contest. They played with no intensity, and trailed by as many as seven points in the first half.

"They practiced lousy yesterday so I kicked them out of practice. The team was not pressured to play real well while Santa Ana had everything to gain and nothing to lose because they are still battling for a playoff position," said Head Coach Jack Bogdanovich.

Santa Ana started the game and played very aggressively with a tough zone defense that Cerritos had trouble breaking.

Joey Yezback and Greer had a hot hand at the start of the game, but cooled down later on in the half as each of them contributed eight first half points.

Two quick baskets in the closing minutes brought Cerritos within one point of the Dons for a 33-32 halftime score.

The Falcons continued at the same pace at the start of the second half hitting three straight buckets.

Santa Ana bounced back to tie and both teams exchanged baskets through the game.

Guard Kyle Spears got hot at the right time when the Falcons needed it the most in the final five minutes. He hit three consecutive shots from outside a la Freddie "Downtown" Brown.

At the 3:53 mark, Cerritos was leading 56-54 and tried to call a timeout, but the ball was being passed and went out of bounds for a crucial Falcon turnover.

Santa Ana tied the game at 56 and Cerritos quickly called timeout with over two minutes remaining.

The Falcons ran the clock down to

ten seconds and called another timeout.

The Birds had trouble getting the ball in and almost threw it away — then almost didn't get the last shot off.

"Andre was our second option. The intended play was a lob from (Cary) Kutzke to Bruce Hannan on the alley-oop slam dunk, but Kutzke didn't feel right about his timing," explained Bogdanovich on his late game strategy.

Greer led the Falcons with 17 points, five rebounds and six assists. It was an off night for the best field goal shooting team in the SCC which shot 48 percent from the field.

Falcons beat up Compton

In a bizarre game against Compton last week that saw four Compton players foul out and 33 team fouls for Compton alone, the Falcons managed to hold on to escape with an 89-80 victory.

The Falcons looked like world champions in the first seven minutes as they fast-broke the Tartars to death, and broke out on top to an early 21-8 lead at one point.

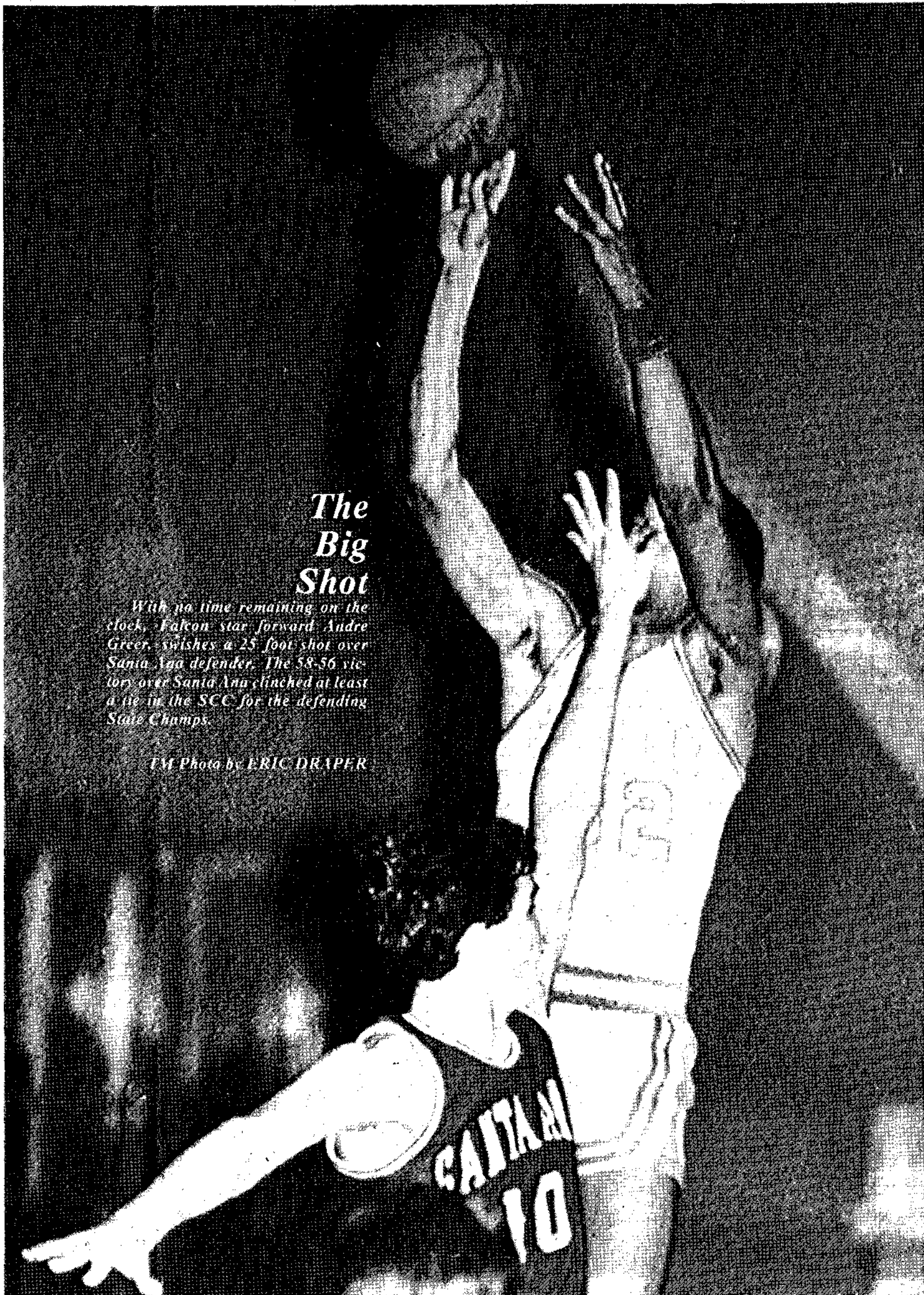
Spears hit a 17 footer at the buzzer to stake the Falcons to a 53-5 halftime lead.

Spears, according to Bogdanovich, is the Falcons best pure shooter, but Greer is most definitely their best all-around ball player as he knocked in 27 points.

Three other Falcons shot an unheard of 75 percent from the field, but also committed an alarming 27 turnovers, most of which came in the slowed-down second half.

Bogdanovich was happy with his team's performance. He stated, "They started out real intense, but once they broke out to the early lead they had a hard time keeping the intensity. When Compton got closer the team became more intense. This was probably the longest game I've been in."

Falcon Notes — Yezbak, Otis and Hannan are the top three field goal shooters in the SCC. Greer is the SCC's No. 3 scorer with a 16.8 average and the No. 1 free throw shooter. With two games remaining, it looks as though the Falcons will be making another trip to the State Playoffs. Orange Coast is 5-7 in conference and is vying for a playoff spot with Compton and Santa Ana.

FOUR ALL-LEAGUERS BACK Falcon hopes rest on hurlers Beck, Yamashita

Coach Gordie Douglas of the Falcon baseball team is looking forward to improving last year's second place finish as the Falcons have four returning All-leaguers.

"They played well during winter ball, and I have a good feeling going into the season," stated an optimistic Douglas.

Last year the Birds compiled a 24-11 record over-all, and an 18-10 record in conference which was good for a second place finish for the third straight season.

Pitchers Dion Beck and Dean Yamashita, as well as outfielders Alan Stankiewicz and Kevin Bootay, are the four returning All-league performers.

Beck, a 5'11" southpaw from Mayfair, had a misleading 4-3 record with a fine 2.63 ERA last year.

"Beck is probably one of the best pitchers I have coached at Cerritos. He is a finesse pitcher with a deceptive fastball," said Douglas.

Almost a carbon copy of Beck is the 5'7" right-hander Dean Yamashita from Maui, Hawaii.

Douglas is very high on Yamashita as Beck recently stated, "Yamashita is a complete pitcher. His best pitch is a forkball and he has developed a good slider. He also holds the runners well, and knows how to pitch in (tight) situations."

Yamashita had a perfect 4-0 record last year with a sparkling 1.41 ERA and three saves.

Beck and Yamashita are the top two Falcon starters with Freshmen Chris Garret of Artesia and Dave Berry of Loara vying for the third spot.

A number one draft pick in last year's amateur draft is centerfielder Bootay from Lynwood who was the Falcon's top hitter last season with a .411 average, and should be the heart of the Cerritos offense this year.

Bootay is not only a good hitter, but he is an excellent baserunner as well, leading the Falcons with 21 stolen bases last year.

Stankiewicz, the other All-league outfielder, is a switch hitter from St. Paul who hit .339 last season with 33 runs batted in and had 11 extra base hits.

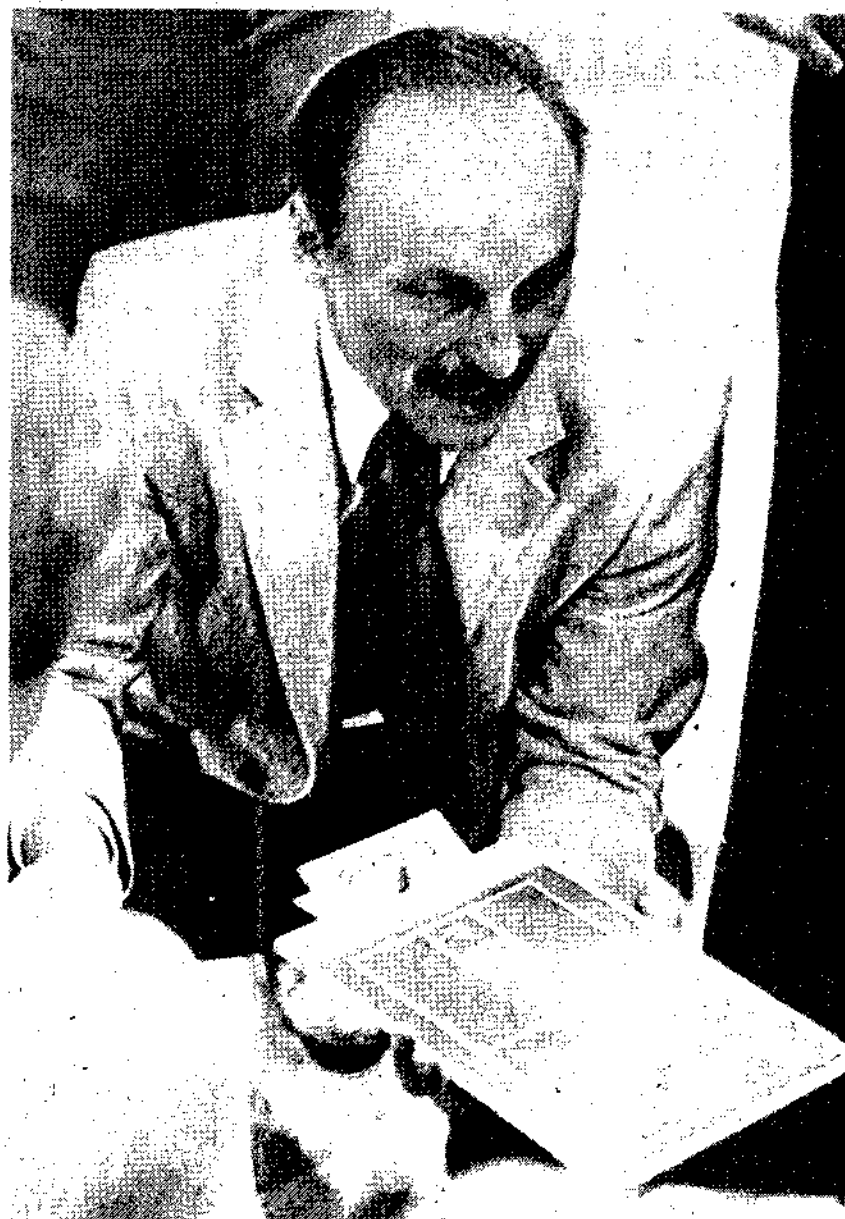
Kenny Williams, a sophomore out of Valley Christian, rounds out the starting outfield in left.

"This is the best defensive club on the infield in a long time. They are very mature for a freshman group," commented Douglas on his all-freshman infield.

At first base is Lakewood's All-CIF left-hand hitter Ron Ewart while at second base is Bellflower's Mike Benjamin.

Shortstop Ever Magalanes from Bell and third baseman Craig Worthington out of Cantwell fill out the left side of the Cerritos infield.

Other players to watch for are: Soph catcher Chad Squires from Gahr, third baseman Tony Trevino from Glenn; and possible designated hitters Kevin Evert of Mayfair, Quinn Mack from Gahr, and La Mirada's Don Kretschmar.

Coaching style wins in high fashion

Being head coach on the junior college level is an especially difficult and time consuming job, but it can be very rewarding as evidenced by Bogdanovich's short stint thus far as Cerritos' head basketball coach.

In his first round as head man last year, Bogdanovich steered the Falcons to a 32-3 season that climaxed with their championship victory over Pasadena City College in the State playoffs.

This year the Falcons are sitting on top of the South Coast Conference with an 11-1 record and a 23-5 mark overall.

An assistant for 11 years, Bogdanovich took over the top spot when former head coach Bob Foerster was stricken with the rare and debilitating Guillain-Barre Disease.

Bogdanovich breaks the string of Bob's as head coach at Cerritos — Bob Dye, Bob Bland, and Bob Foerster. Before becoming a basketball

coach, Bogdanovich was a baseball coach at Artesia in 1965 for three weeks, but Gahr High's opening led to a faculty cutback.

"I always thought I was a better baseball coach than a basketball coach," quipped Bogdanovich.

Bogdanovich was even considered for the Cerritos College head baseball coach job when Wally Kincaid stepped down, but he declined the position.

"Baseball is too boring to fans. Basketball is more exciting because of the bigger crowds and more involvement," he said.

A San Pedro High graduate, Bogdanovich is 42 years old and resides in Cypress with his wife Millie and daughters Holly and Kari.

"Millie is very supportive. She attends all the games and makes it part of her social life," he said.

The coach helps his wife run her antique shop and pushes her to do more. He remarked, "Millie is an artist. She is a painter and teachers others her craft. I try to help her out as much as I can."

A Health Sciences major from Long Beach State, Bogdanovich was very active in sports, lettering in both baseball and basketball four years in college.

He was All LA City 1959 along with the famous UCLA star Jack Hirsch who he played against in basketball at San Pedro High. He was an excellent baseball player, but passed an opportunity to sign with the Milwaukee Braves when he was 17 years old and opted to go to school.

Bogdanovich started his coaching career at Artesia High as the "B" coach. From there, he went to Bellflower as JV coach three years and varsity two years.

At Bellflower, he was 13-12 his first year as head coach. In his second year, he took his 25-8 squad to the CIF finals only to lose the championship game.

It was at Bellflower where he established his coaching skills under Coach Foerster.

Bogdanovich's coaching style parallels Foerster's in many ways, as might be expected from his working under the latter some 15 years. The key attitude he picked up was Foerster's organization.

"My teams are usually very aggressive and attack the other teams," Bogdanovich remarked about his coaching style. "Our pace is usually up tempo and very open." This team has led the scoring the last two years.

Bogdanovich is not a loud or boisterous coach and has a conservative personality, although he knows how to make a point.

He emphasizes his role as coach in limited terms. "You coach during the week, and you let the players play during the game. I am a teacher and I love to help the ballplayers in all aspects of the game."

Bogdanovich is very happy at Cerritos and has no desire to coach on the four-year level. "There is no job security on that level, and the stress would not be worth it to me," he said, adding, "I like Cerritos."

Mason, Suh head Bird tennis team

Cerritos will be competing again March 3 in the Long Beach Relays at 2:30 PM.

Does anybody really know when it'll stop? Does anybody really care? Does anybody really know what time it is?

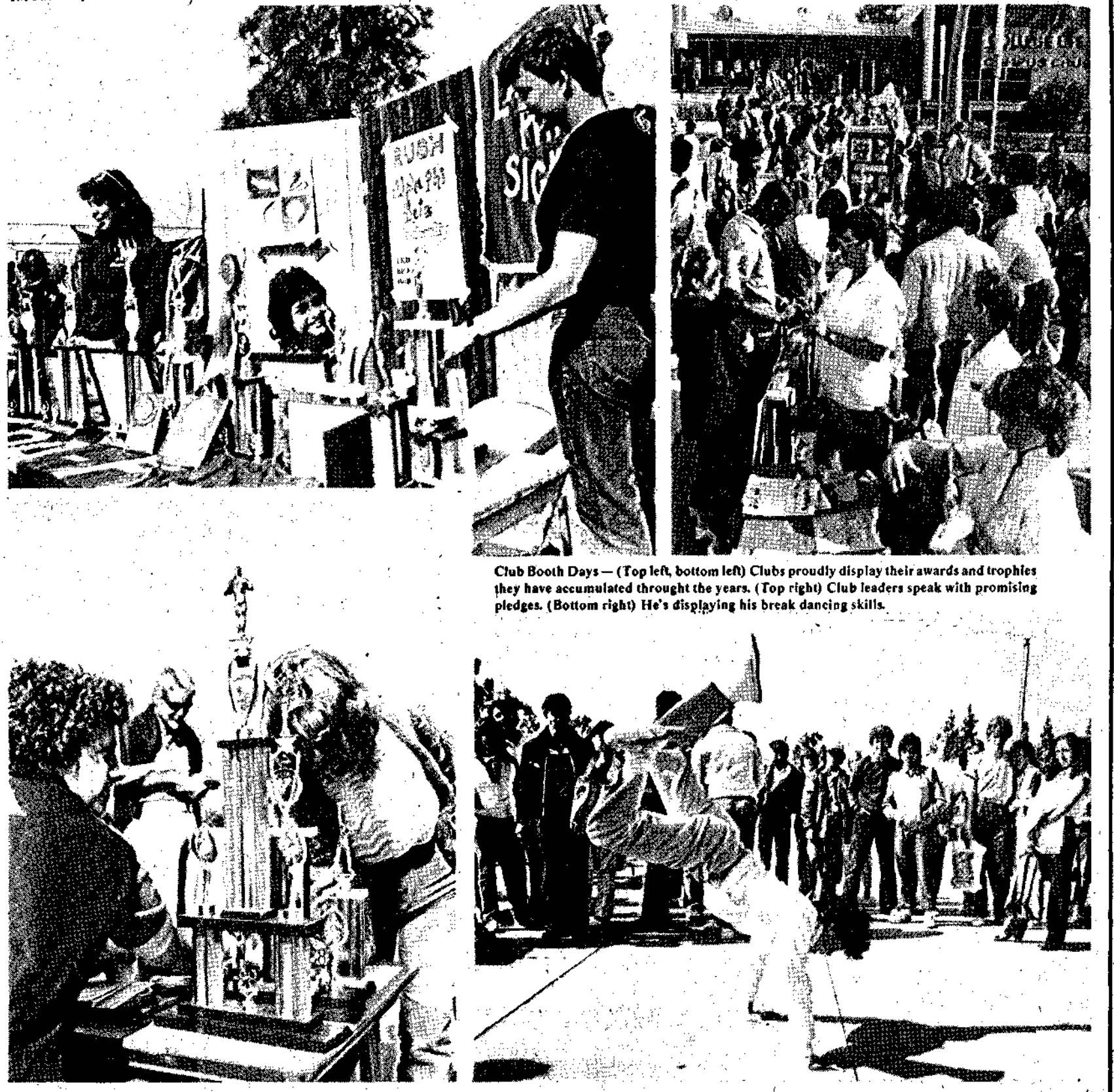
And you see, all this is campus related, that's why I can write about it. But like I said earlier, that's my job.
