### Big push on as 62 hopefuls fight for 31 Senate seats

A last minute campaign push is expected to make a difference for several of the 62 candidates seeking spots on the spring Student Senate. Elections end tonight at 9.

Polls are open from 8:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. and open again at 6 p.m.

Up for grabs on the Associated Student of Cerritos College governing body are 31 seats.

Twelve incumbents are going for another term. Candidates for the other 19 positions range from freshman to students who have attended Cerritos several semesters.

Last semester 53 students ran for 32 Senate posts.

The only 10-member slate on the ballot is LDSSA (Latter-Day Saints Student Association).

Panhellenic organizations have a strong bloc on the ballot. Comprised of campus fraternities and sororities, the group is pushing to lower to six the minimum number of units required for full membership for clubs on campus.

Several VICA listings are on the ballot.

No athletic bloc is designated on

the roster, however, a large number of those listed as independents are athletes.

Next year's anticipated budget cut of as much as 20 percent is expected to prompt a number of political power plays among special interest groups as they vie for support.

The Senate must approve the budget committee recommendations.

Locations designated for polling places include the Health Science Building, North Elbow Room, Student Center, and the Cerritos Pool Area.

Students must show a current student I.D. with yellow sticker in order to cast their ballot.

Winners will be announced Thursday, January 31.

The new spring roster will take office as soon as eligibility checks are run on grades and unit totals.

Candidates must be enrolled in 10 units or more with a GPA of 2.0 or better.

Observers expect around 1000 members of the student body to participate in the election. The minimum number of votes to win a seat is expected to be 100, while the top vote getter is likely to climb to 300 or more.

### Used textbook pricing policies outlined; marketing sets rules

Bookstore pricing on textbooks is a somewhat touchy situation, especially to those who are purchasing them.

In response to a recent letter (see page 4) to the editor concerning textbook prices, Bookstore Manager Alan Beaulieu explained the process of textbook pricing.

Used book prices are based on market value, thus the price of a used book is always subject to increase.

Books bought from a used book company are bought for 50 percent of the current list price, which in turn is sold for 75 percent of the current price, which gives the bookstore a 25 percent gross profit.

When a used book is sold back to the Bookstore, a 50 percent sell-back price is guaranteed as long as the book is usable.

As far as new books go, the publisher controls the price of their texts.

When a book is no longer being used or an updated edition is printed, it cannot be returned for any amount because it cannot be resold.

"We maintain a less expensive margin than most other college bookstores," Beaulieu explained.

"The reason for this is that the student body cooperates and our operation requires less overhead."

The bookstore is down \$19,000 in gross sales compared to the same time last year.

"We'll continue to try to keep our prices lower," Beaulieu commented.

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### Board's five-year capital outlay proposal seeks \$14.5 in construction, improvements

Some \$14.5 million dollars was requested from the state by the Cerritos College Board of Trustees on a 5-1 vote, Monday night, this in their Five Year Capital Outlay Plan.

Capital outlays are funds set aside for improvement of existing buildings and the construction of new ones.

Trustee Dale Hardeman voted to oppose the request, while Board Vice-president Ada Steenhoeck was absent.

Dr. Wilford Michael, Cerritos College President, noted that because the state community college system has only a limited amount of money for capital outlays state-wide, most, if not all, of the college's requests will be denied.

Four of the nine construction requests were designated priority items by the Administration.

Heading the list of priority items was a request of \$1.68 million for enlarging the Business Education Facility. Dr. Michael stated that because of the high enrollment in that

area, many classes have been forced off campus and onto the satellite campus at Cabrillo Avenue School.

Other construction and improvements requested, along with the amount needed were (the first three were also listed as priority items):

1. Modification and Addition to the Student Services Areas — \$850,947
2. Expansion of the Learning Resource Center — \$2.1 million
3. Remodeling for efficient use of space — \$334,585
4. Assessment Center — \$298,252
5. Composite (Plastics) Equipment — \$1.05 million
6. Additional Racquetball Courts — \$334,556
7. Auto Tech Improvements — \$2.5 million
8. Construction of a second gym — \$5.36 million
9. Improvements on storage building — \$110,983
10. Removal of architectural barriers — \$65,000

Trustees Richard Goul, who later voted for the plan, and Hardeman questioned the public relations appearance of requesting new racquetball courts and a gymnasium in times of declining enrollment and decreasing funds, regardless of the chances of the state releasing the funds.

Dr. Walter Magnuson, Vice-president of Business Services, explained to the Board that it is important to keep the requests on the list despite lack of funding available, because the projects will then receive a higher priority when the money becomes available.

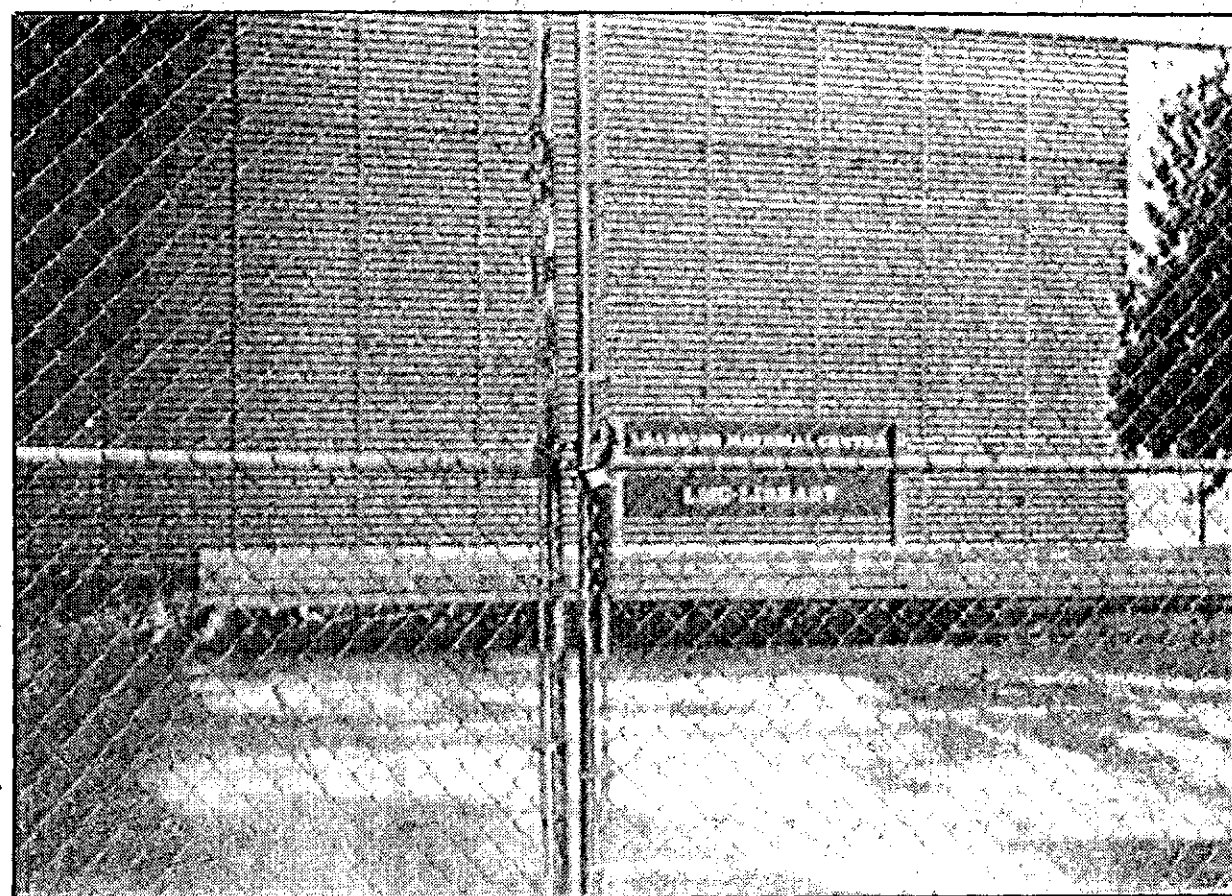
"Some of the items are ludicrous," said Hardeman, "a second gym because some intramurals have had to be rescheduled? Racquetball courts?

How do you justify that?"

Hardeman went on to say that the school has been attempting to receive funding for 15 years for the second gym, and should delete that item from its request.

"My vote was my way of saying that we should be giving the plan more serious thought and to come back next semester with a more realistic plan."

He noted that there is no doubt that the Business Division needs more classrooms and that he was in favor of that part of the plan.

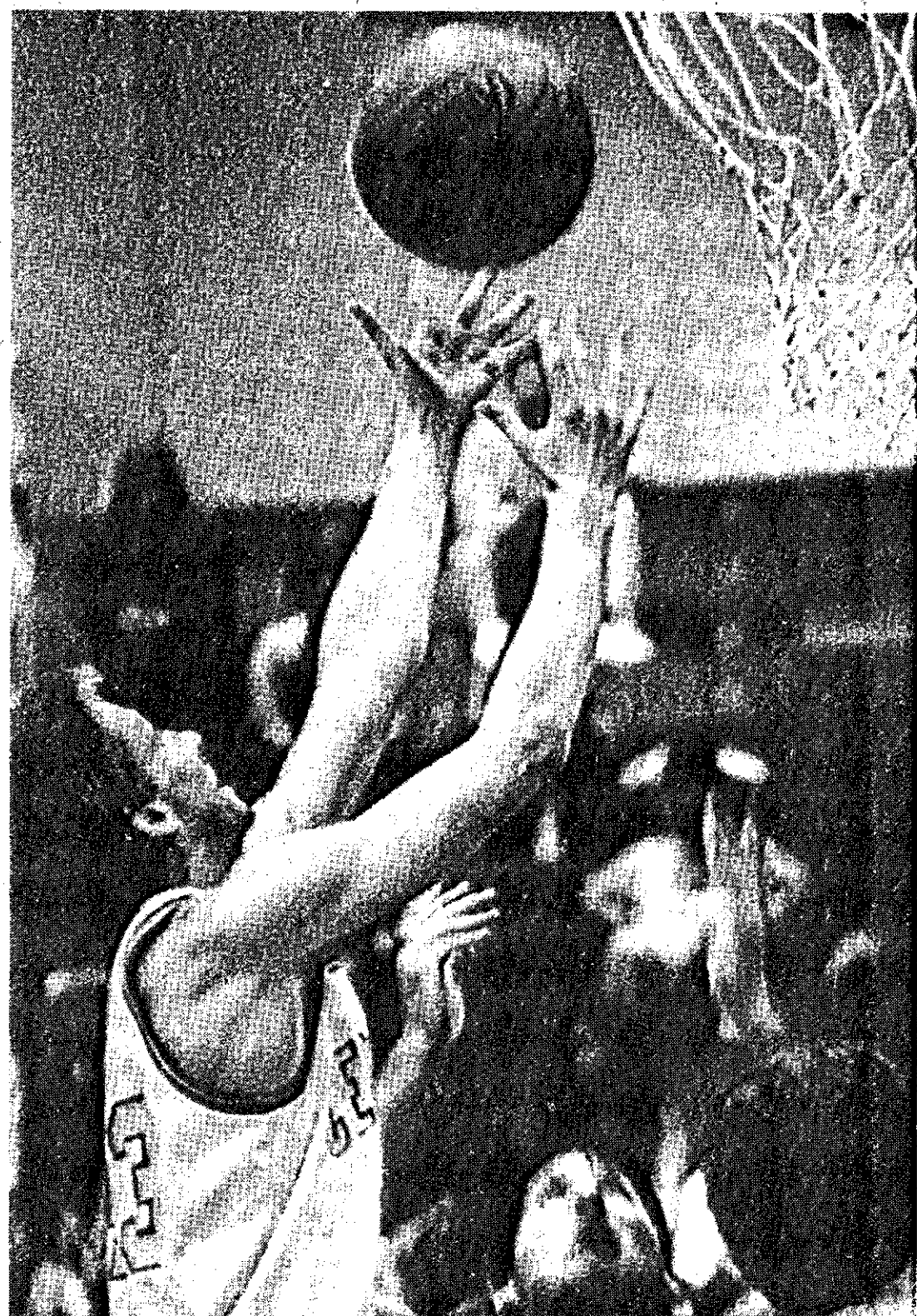

## Falcons remain unbeaten in SCC, defeating OCC; extend streak to 11

Every time Jack Bogdanovich's basketball team steps onto the court, they will be the target of each and every team.

What makes Bogdanovich's team so special?

Well, they just extended their winning streak to 11 games, by defeating Orange Coast 62-59 last Saturday, to push their South Coast Conference record to 7-0 and 16-3 overall.

The Falcons will be on the road tonight at Cypress, and will be the guest of Fullerton Saturday. Both games start at 7:30.

Forward Russell Heicke led the well-balanced scoring attack with 16 points and six rebounds.

With a 12-point half-time lead under their belt, the Falcons fell into a dry spell and saw their lead dwindle down on some fine shooting by forward Shaughn Ryan, who finished with 23 points.

"We started playing hesitant and they took advantage of our youth," said Bogdanovich. "Other than our rebounding, our only weakness is our youth. We have enough players that if one is cold, we can sit him down and go to someone else."

Orange Coast had a chance to take the lead, but Ryan missed two free throws late in the game, and on the second, Brad Farmer was fouled going for the rebound.

He promptly missed the front end of the one-and-one situation, and the

Falcons moved down the court with Marlon Wadlington (five points) finishing off the score with a jump-shot with 39 seconds left in the game.

Guard Joe Yezbak, who was averaging 17.7 points coming into the game, was held to 10 points.

Center Brian Coleman added 14 points and eight rebounds.

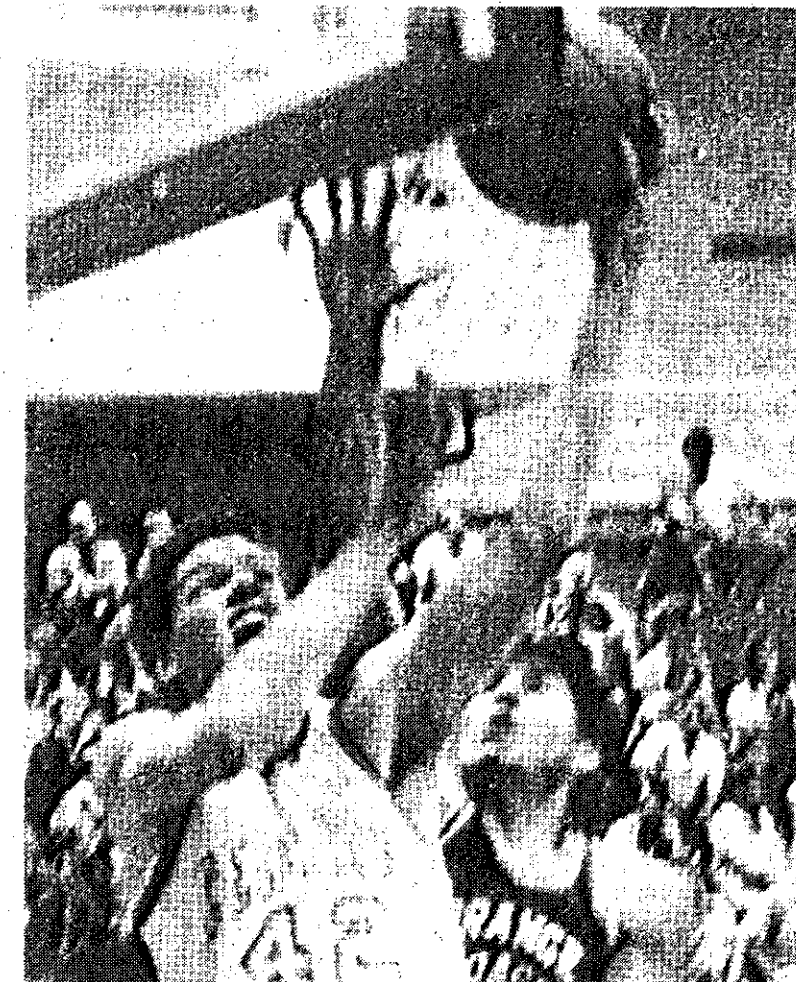
The 11-game win streak is three shy of Bogdanovich's record, and is

five short of the school record of 16, which was achieved in 1967.

The Falcons are currently ranked third in the latest Southland poll, behind El Camino and Taft. They are also ranked fourth in the state.

"The fact that we are ranked so high is going to be a factor, but it keeps our guys on their toes," said Bogdanovich.

"This is where I wanted us to be at the beginning of the season."

## Bowcutt scores 30 in 85-64 loss

Despite a season-high 30-point performance by Shelly Bowcutt, the Falcon women's basketball team was no match for co-conference leader Orange Coast, as they emerged with an 85-64 win at OCC Friday night.

Bowcutt shot 50% (14-28) from the field and also contributed four rebounds.

The Falcons fell to 4-4 (10-10 overall) in the South Coast Conference, while Coast upped its record to 7-1.

"Orange Coast is a very good team. Our downfall was that we gave up too many easy baskets on their fast break," stated coach Karen Peterson.

Also contributing fine performances were Renee Madrigal (eight points, six rebounds), B.J. McCree with 11 points to go along with five rebounds, and coming back off of an injury, Becky Sorenson, who added seven rebounds.

Point guard Jowana Yates once again led the team with 10 assists.

Last Monday, the Falcons snuck away with a 50-48 win over Mt. SAC.

Leading the way again was Bowcutt who had 24 points and five rebounds.

"The key to this game, was that we made our free throws (14-18) when we had to," said Peterson.

McCree, who added 10 points, also led the way with 10 rebounds.

The Mounties were led by Janice Bonner, who scored 18 points and had an impressive 20 rebounds.

Bowcutt continues to lead the team with a 20.2 points per game average. She is also averaging 4.6 rebounds per game, while shooting 49% from the field.

Eunice Walker is second on the team averaging 10.4 points per outing. Walker also averages 6.5 rebounds per game.

Yates continues to lead the Falcons dishing out 6.5 assists per game.

The Falcons attempt to break over the .500 barrier, as they travel to Cypress tonight at 7:30.

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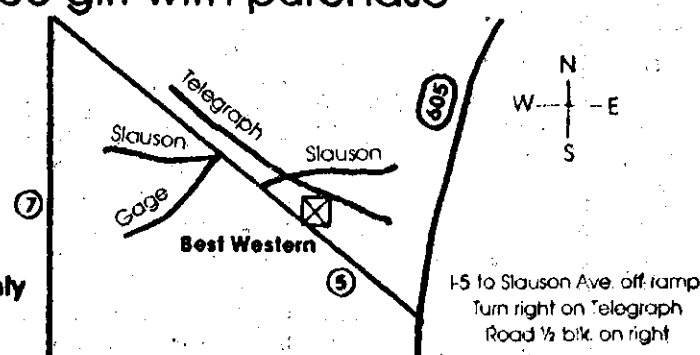
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## EDITORIALS

## Cook counsels with charisma and self-confidence

Trying to describe her in one word is impossible.

Impossible, because when you think of Pat Cook a lot of descriptions come to mind.

Dynamic. Confident. Motivated. Articulate. Sensitive. Charismatic. Professional. Funny. Intelligent and inspirational.

She is a complex woman who possesses a powerful combination of enviable attributes. Knowing what she wants out of life and owning the abilities to achieve it give her the aura of a competent and completely satisfied lady, independent of anyone else to define her or give her life a purpose.

A real inspiration.

Is she the reweave heroine out of some paperback making it's way up the bestseller list?

No. But, she is a very real heroine to a lot of people, young and old, who are lucky enough to have the chance to know her.

Pat Cook has been a Career Counselor at Cerritos College for the last 12 years, also conducting career workshops and teaching career development classes at different times.

Her office, located inside the Job Placement Office, has long been a refuge for many confused and undecided college students trying to get a grip on their future.

Sometimes they come to take aptitude tests, sometimes they come to talk, and sometimes they just come to cry.

Only one thing is certain. In Pat Cook's office there will always be a sympathetic ear, a reassuring word or two, and a box of Kleenex.

But, a person can't stay down for too long around Cook because her energy and attitudes are contagious.

Growing up in a tiny fishing village in the southern region of Maine, she once dreamed of being a lawyer, saving people with a determined sense of justice for all.

Somehow, her plans of becoming a high school teacher and working on a law degree through graduate studies were never realized as she moved to California in the sixties with her new husband to raise their family.

She has since divorced and instead of high school students, became involved with students at the college level employing her capacities for compassion and service as a counselor in the career center. It is a job, by her own admission, which is ideally suited to her.

"Working with students has been a wonderful experience," Cook stated. "It keeps you updated. You don't stagnate. It's pretty hard not to always be looking for creative ways to deal with people's problems. The problems are usually the same, but the people are different."

Reaching a time in her life when most people begin to question their goals with a degree of disappointment, Cook reflects a rare vitality and exuberance for living. Undaunted by social stigma, she freely admits her age is 44 and one is somehow assured that she has never been happier or more involved in her own life. She knows her weaknesses as well as her strengths and apologizes for neither.

Her children are nearly grown and now, having more personal time, she is looking forward to traveling and experiencing different cultures. Cook asserts, "You know, everyone needs to think, what's a new thing I can do this year? It's always easier to settle for comfortable and be satisfied with what you have, but I'm always wondering, what's over here?"

When asked how she unfailingly maintains a constant level of spark and enthusiasm, Cook revealed that taking care of herself is the key. Physically and mentally. She works out regularly and attends dance classes to keep her body fit.

To keep her psyche healthy she surrounds herself with lots of positive people and claims, "I treat myself as worthy as I treat other people." Adding, "I just think you have to make a conscious choice to go over to the positive side. I'm really committed to being a positive influence in others lives and I get as much reinforcement

from them as they get from me." Does she ever have bad days? To that question she simply replies, "Of course."

Going on, she explains "But I just tell myself, this too will pass. We really have a lot more control over our lives than we give ourselves credit for. I believe you have to take advantage of your reality. Enjoy all the benefits and don't dwell on the bad."

For the past two years, Fenningham has helped to make sure these two words remain separated.

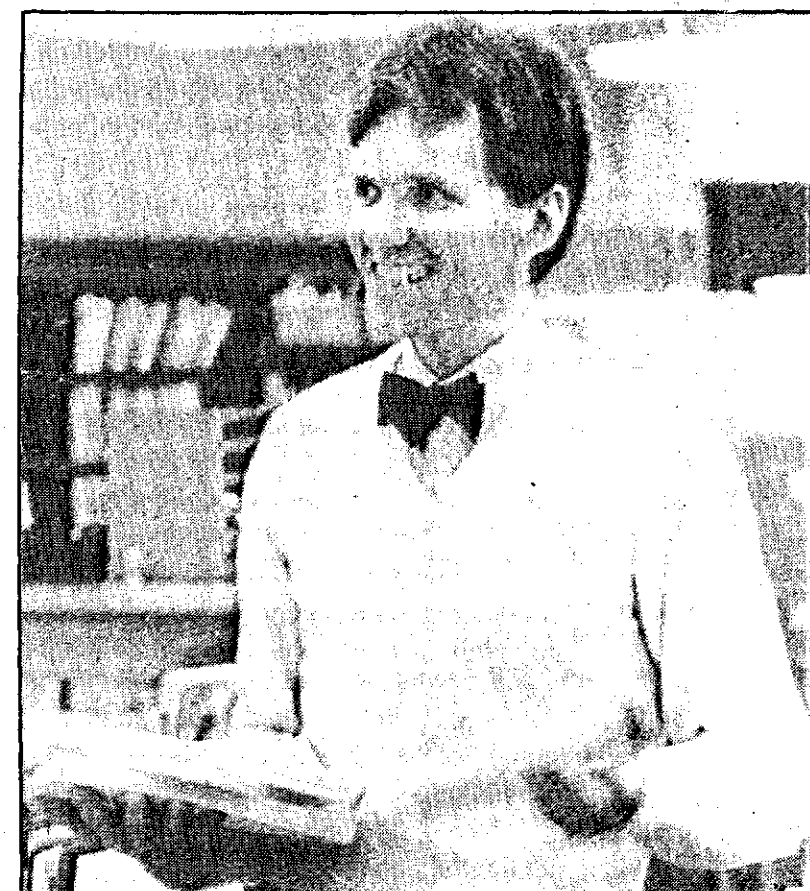
Now, he's giving up his assistant
