Fall Semester brings major changes in early calendar, first-time tution

The early calender and the \$50 tuition fee are two major changes that Cerritos College students will face as registration and the 1984 Fall semester begin.

School will begin August 20, nearly four weeks earlier than usual. According to Assistant Director of Admissions and Records James Fenningham, "The early calender may have an effect on enrollment due to the fact that many people may wait until too late to turn in applications due to misinformation."

Registration will begin August 7 for disabled students, and continue on August 8-10, 13-15 for students with

appointment cards; August 16, 17, 20-24 for students without appointment cards. The last day to register for classes is August 24.

Students carrying six units or more will be charged \$50 per semester, while those carrying under six units or less will pay \$5 per unit.

Expenses other than enrollment will include an \$8 student body membership fee, which finances many instructional programs as well as extra-curricular activities, and a \$10 parking fee, which pays for security and maintenance of the parking lots.

Textbooks, supplies and equipment costs will vary depending on the type and number of classes taken.

"It is hard for anyone to say what

effect tuition will have on enrollment, the few extra dollars may really make a difference to somebody who doesn't have it," said Fenningham.


Students wishing to drop classes after the first two weeks of school will be required to pay a state-mandated \$10 drop fee to drop one class, and \$20 to drop two or more classes, in order to discourage high drop rates. Failure to officially withdraw from a class may result in an "F" grade.


The last day to officially withdraw from a class is Oct. 4.


Refund requests will be takenfrom September 10 to 21, for students who withdraw from classes early, requests after September will not be honored.

#### **DISCOUNT PROGRAM**

All students who purchase a student body sticker are eligible for a 10% discount on textbooks purchased at the Bookstore. Books that qualify for this program are marked with a yellow price tag. In orger to qualify for the discount the following criteria must be met:

- 1. The ASCC card must be presented to the store cashier at the time of purchase.
- 2. The card must be valid for the current semester.

Beginning August 7, only Fall '84 ASCC cards will be considered valid cards.

During registration, we will have a table in the evening, for example, set up in the administration building. Drop by, and let's get aquainted.



As students, we're all here to take fullest advantage of both.





## Football team ready for tough season in new conference

Following one of the best football seasons ever for Cerritos College, the Falcons have a hard act to follow, especially now that they have been placed in the best conference in the nation.

The new South Coast Conference (SCC) is a combination of five teams of the Metro Conference, including Taft, who has played for the national championships the last two years, and four teams from the old SCC, including this year's national champ Fullerton.

According to Cerritos Head Coach Frank Mazzotta, the new league is trying to

create some interest again at the junior college level.

"The guys behind the new league want to see the best team play the best," says

because of it. It forces you as a staff and as a team to work harder. The winner of the league isn't necessarily going to be the dominant team. It's just who stays the healthiest and who has the best luck," says Mazzotta,

One disadvantage is the prospect of the conference champion having two or three losses. This will spoil the chances of the conference champions becoming national champions.

This year's squad is solid up and down the line. The players lost from last year will not hurt the team, and as a group, there will not be any "holes to fill."

According to Mazzotta, "This year's team will be bigger and quicker and is probably the best athletic group we have ever had. The key to the league is depth. We are good 22 players — last year we knew we only had 16 players."

The leading candidate for quarterback is Andy Movesesian who was the back-up quarterback last season.

In the back field, Mazzotta is very high on newcomers Reggie Nettles and Keith-McCoy.

At wide receiver, the Falcons have Wen-

dell Peoples, the most sought after wide receiver in the nation which Mazzotta refers to as the "class of the country."

Leading the defense is last year's All-Conference defensive back Fred Payton. "We have seven of the best defensive backs that Cerritos has ever had," says Mazzotta.

"It's been a real good summer for us. We are right where we want to be," says Mazzotta.

On the season, Mazzotta feels the schedule will force the team to be fired up every week.

"If you're on the top side, it will be great, but if you're on the back, it's going to be a killer."



Nelson says that the groundwork for success in journalism-related areas such as public relations, communications, reporting, editing, and photography can begin and grow by signing up for Beginning Newswriting and Reporting, and joining the Newspaper and Magazine production classes.

Nelson maintains that two years' experience on the college publication Talon Marks is a foot in the door in the job market, transferring to four-year schools, or for scholarship and grant considerations.

The department has visual display terminals and computerized typesetting equipment which the staff members learn to use. Lay-out skills are acquired, and general news and feature writing is emphasized.

### Vets must run the paper chase

Veterans may initiate the paperwork necessarry for them to claim their education benefits on the day they register for college, according to the Office of Veterans Affairs.

GI Bill benefits start at \$342 per month for a single vet and \$407 for marrieds, plus \$29 per dependant, for a student with 12 or more units.

Eligibility is based on enlistment in the service before Jan. 1, 1977, and the veteran must use his benefits within 10 years of his discharge, unless he was unable to use them due to a medical problem or if he has been un or under employed for the last six months.

Any veteran wishing to collect benefits after a six month break in his education must have dependency documents (marriage, divorce, and children's birth certifacates)

Veterans seeking information on the program should contact the Office of Veterans Affairs at ext. 327 or vist the Veterans Desk in the Administration Building between 8 a.m. and 9 p.m, Monday through Thursday, and from 8 a.m to 4:30 p.m. on Friday.
