REGISTRATION, CHANGES END FRIDAY, 23RD

The last day to make program changes, including adding classes, is Friday, Aug. 23.

Late registration also runs through this week.

Program changes which involve level changes in skill and performance classes such as shorthand, typing, math, music, and others may be made during the first two weeks of the semester.

Level changes after the first two weeks may be allowed with consent of both instructors and approval by the division associate dean.

Auditions for Greek comedy Aug. 19-20

Auditions for the season's first major theatre production will be held Monday and Tuesday, Aug. 19 and 20.

Director Camille Bokar is looking for up to 30 actors and actresses for the production of what has been called the first anti-war play, "Lysistrata."

Director Bokar said no previous acting experience is necessary.

Petitions available Monday, Sept. 2, for Fall Student Senate elections

Petitions for Fall Student Senate elections will be available Monday, Sept. 2, in the Student Activities Office.

Candidates have until Friday, Sept. 6, to turn in the petitions which must have signatures of 20 ASCC members who are attending this Fall.

Elections for the 30-31 seats are scheduled for Sept. 10 and 11.

Qualifications for freshman just entering Cerritos are a 2.0 GPA or better, and they must be currently enrolled here in a minimum of 10 units.

A third of the seats are reserved for frosh.

Returning students must have an overall GPA of 2.0, as well as a 2.0 (C) for the past semester in a minimum of 10 units.

They also must be currently taking 10 units or more.

Candidates should indicate whether they are representing a club or organization, with that group's consent, or be listed as "Independent."

Adviser Richard Robinson, the Associate Dean of Student Activities, emphasized that students have the responsibility for making sure they are eligible before they place their name on the official ballot. His office only verifies eligibility based on the official records on file in the Admissions and Records file.

Students who get enough votes to capture a seat will be disqualified if a check finds them ineligible. The next vote-getter in line will move up to the open seat.

Robinson joined ASCC President Dave Mittleman in encouraging interested students to get involved in Student Government. A major Senate

responsibility is administering the Associated Students' budget of well over \$300,000.

Mittleman also urged students interested in a variety of appointed commissioner and committee posts to contact him in the President's office in the Student Activities Building.

FALL SPORTS SCENE Football prepares for season opener

Cerritos College football kicks off Sept. 14 when the Falcons host San Diego Mesa.

The Falcons are looking to improve on last year's 6-4 record, and hope to win a berth in a post-season bowl game.

Coach Frank Mazzotta is very optimistic about this year's team, stating that this is one of the biggest and strongest teams he has had in years.

Women's volleyball sees its first action Sept. 13, with the Birds traveling to San Diego to take on San Diego Mesa in a scrimmage.

They then enter the Santa Ana Pool Play on Sept. 18.

Teams include Santa Ana, Long Beach City, San Diego Mesa and El Camino.

Coach Jeanine Prindle's spikers finished last year in the middle of the South Coast Conference, and hopes to move her squad to the top of the heap.

She will be without the services of some of her floor leaders from last year, including Marianne Merrill and Grace DeLeon.

Water polo takes a splash for the first time this season when they host Orange Coast on Sept. 17. Following that match, they then continue on to take part in the Cuesta Tournament, which will take place Sept. 20 and 21 at Cuesta.

Pat Tyne's poloists concluded a somewhat mediocre season last year, but hopes to come on strong early in an attempt to capture the South Coast Conference title.

Soccer laces up its cleats on Sept. 11 for the first time, when they take to the road to oppose the Cal State Fullerton JV team.

Palomar is the next site for coach Robert Flores' second place Falcons last year.

College trustees election offers four seats

Epple, Scotto, Steenhoek spots up for grabs for four years; Goul post on ballot for two

No candidates have yet filed for the Cerritos College Board of Trustees elections by press time, according to the Los Angeles County Registrar of Voters Office.

The Nov. 5 election will consist of two contests — the regularly scheduled election for the three

seats currently held by Bob Epple, Hazel Scotto, and Ada Steenhoek, the other to fill the final two years of Rich Goul's uncompleted term.

Goul resigned July 15 in order to pursue a scholarship at the Oxford University Law School in Great Britain.

The candidates deadline for filing for the election is August 15 at the Registrar's Office in the City of Commerce.

In the regular election, the top three finishers will be elected to four year terms.

In the special election to fill Goul's seat, the candidates will be contesting to fill the final two years of his term.

The Board of Trustees is composed of seven members elected by the voters of the district to four year terms. It meets on the second and fourth Mondays of each month at the Board Room.

The members decide on general policy and goals for the college which are then implemented by the administration.

The other three members of the board, whose terms expire in 1987, are Harold Tredway, Katie Nordbak, and Dale Hardeman.

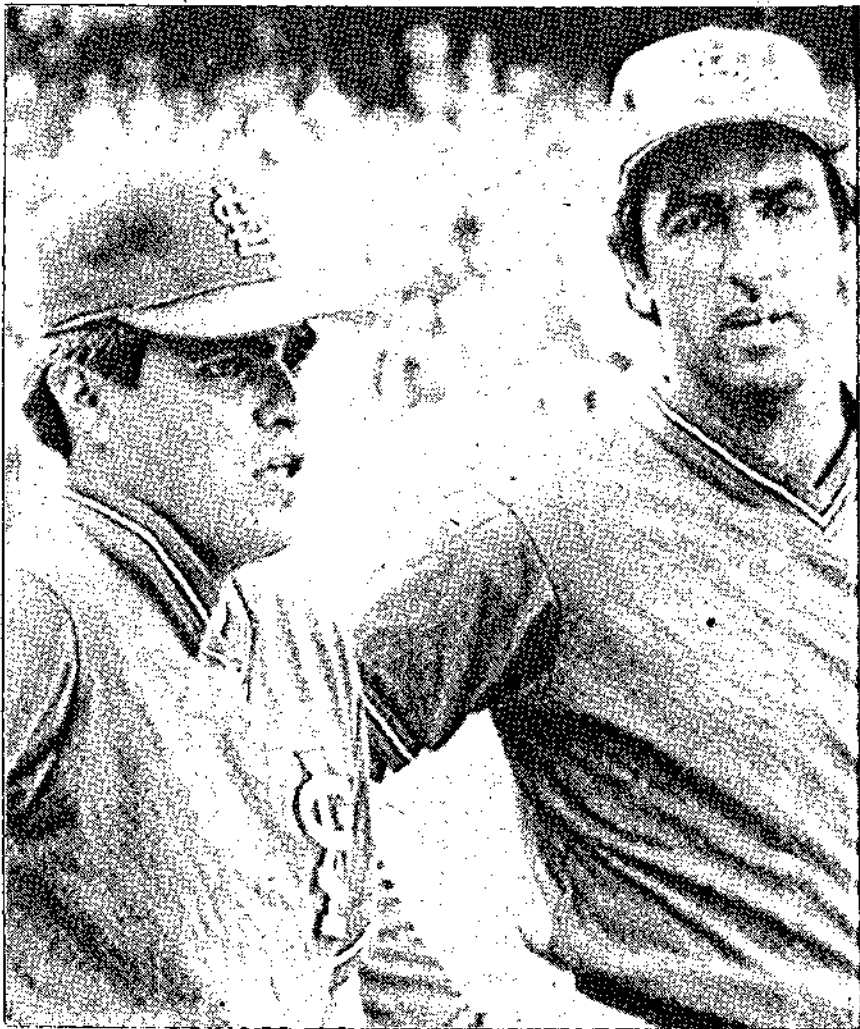

Former Falcon Nieto finds baseball future in the Cards

In an era where you find many professional athletes holding out for more money and making extra millions on the side, it's good to find an athlete who hasn't let the "star" image change him.

Former Cerritos College baseball catcher and current St. Louis Cardinal Tom Nieto is just that type of person.

Nieto, who has just taken over the starting position from injured veteran Darrell Porter, is batting around .240, while playing flawlessly on defense.

As a freshman out of Gahr High, Nieto led the Cerritos Falcons to the State Championship title in 1979.

In that year, Nieto batted .235, while anchoring a pitching staff that included Ed Hodge (Minnesota Twins), and concluded the year with a 7-2 decision over San Jose City College for the title.

"We started fairly slow that year (6-4)," said Nieto, "But we really came on strong in the second half, mainly due to our pitching."

The '79 team finished 32-8, which Nieto feels is "my most memorable experience at Cerritos College."

"We really wanted to win it for Wally," said Nieto, referring to Wally Kincaid the head coach at the time.

"Wally taught me how to play the game, the fundamentals of baseball."

Nieto decided to attend Cerritos, rather than a four-year school because, "coming out of high school, I wasn't really prepared. Besides, Cerritos is considered a step up. I would do it all over again if I could."

Noted for his defensive abilities, Nieto was drafted by the Twins in '79 and the Pittsburgh Pirates in

1980, but declined both offers because, "I knew I wasn't a complete ballplayer."

Nieto then moved on to Oral Roberts University, where he was named a First Team All-American.

Nieto chose Oral Roberts because, "they had everything I wanted."

"I was all set on going to Cal State Fullerton, until I visited Oral Roberts," said Nieto. "After that, I knew OR was the school for me."

Nieto was drafted in the second round the next year, signed, and reported to Double A ball in Arkansas, where he hit .179 his first year, and .242 his second.

Skipping Rookie and Single A is a tough step, and Nieto felt the most significant adjustment he had to make was to hit a good breaking ball.

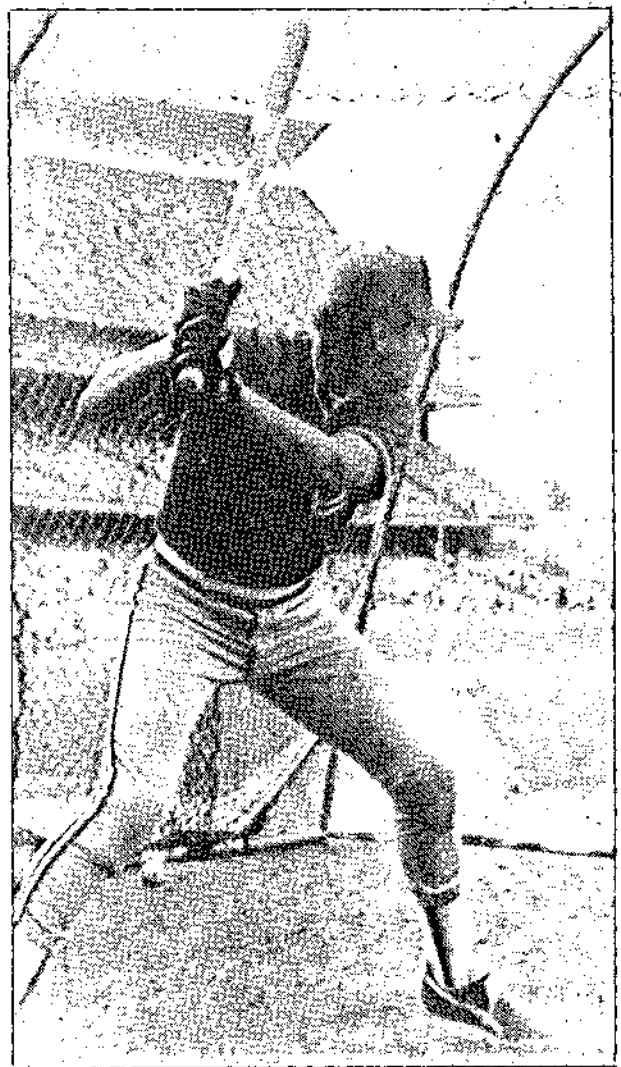
Nieto then played a year and a half at Louisville (Triple A), and when he was called up to the big leagues for the first time on May 19, 1984, Nieto's first reaction was "complete shock."

"I remember I had a night game in Louisville, and I had to be in St. Louis the next day."

Cardinal manager Whitey Herzog has been pleased with Nieto's progress, stating that, "Tom has come up with some timely hits for us. He's a hard-nosed kid who handles the pitchers well, and will be out starting catcher as long as he continues to do so."

"I just want to be known as a guy who went out every night and gave 100%, just like Wally taught me."

There just may be a few more men like Tom Nieto out there who feel that their baseball career is more important than whether or not he will get that incentive bonus in his contract.

Financial Aid — Go for it

Cerritos College students may apply for a number of state and Federal Financial Aid programs and local scholarships through the college Financial Aid Office.

Students who turn in their applications after the priority deadline May 10 will be reviewed after the priority students, and their loan will be determined on a first-come first-serve basis.

The processing of all applications, except for fee waivers and fee credit, will take from six to eight weeks and an additional four weeks for each correction if an error is found. For this reason, it is advisable to plan ahead, according to the Financial Aid Office.

Three new Financial Aid assistance programs that the Chancellor's Office of the California Community Colleges created to help low income students are, 1) Fee Waivers, 2) Fee Credits and 3) Board of Governors Grant (BOGG). Applications for these programs may be turned in just prior to registration in the Financial Aid office.

Also offered are five Federal aid programs: 1) Pell Grants, 2) Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants (SEOG), 3) College Work Study (CWS), 4) National Direct Student Loans

(NDSL), and 5) Guaranteed Students Loans/Plus Loans (GSL).

These programs involve a variety of different things. Grants do not have to be paid back. Loans are low interest and need to be paid back six months after finishing school or when a student discontinues classes, whichever comes first. Local scholarships are offered throughout the year. The glass bulletin board by the Financial Aid office will contain information on scholarships that are available.

To qualify for financial aid, a student must meet the following criteria: 1) demonstrate financial need, 2) be enrolled in six units or more, 3) be a U.S. citizen or eligible non-resident, and 4) maintain a satisfactory progress in a degree certificate or transfer program to four year college.

Items considered to be educational expenses are registration fee, books, uniforms, equipment, transportation to and from school, portions of lunches on campus, portions of room and board, and portions of personal and recreational cost while attending school. Students who are independent and have children, can consider child care cost, cost of clothing and additional cost of food.

For further information, contact the Financial Aid office located by the Student Center.

● **Office of Student Activities** — We have one of the finest Student Activities Programs in the country. If your interests range from student government to clubs to any number of college related activities, drop by.

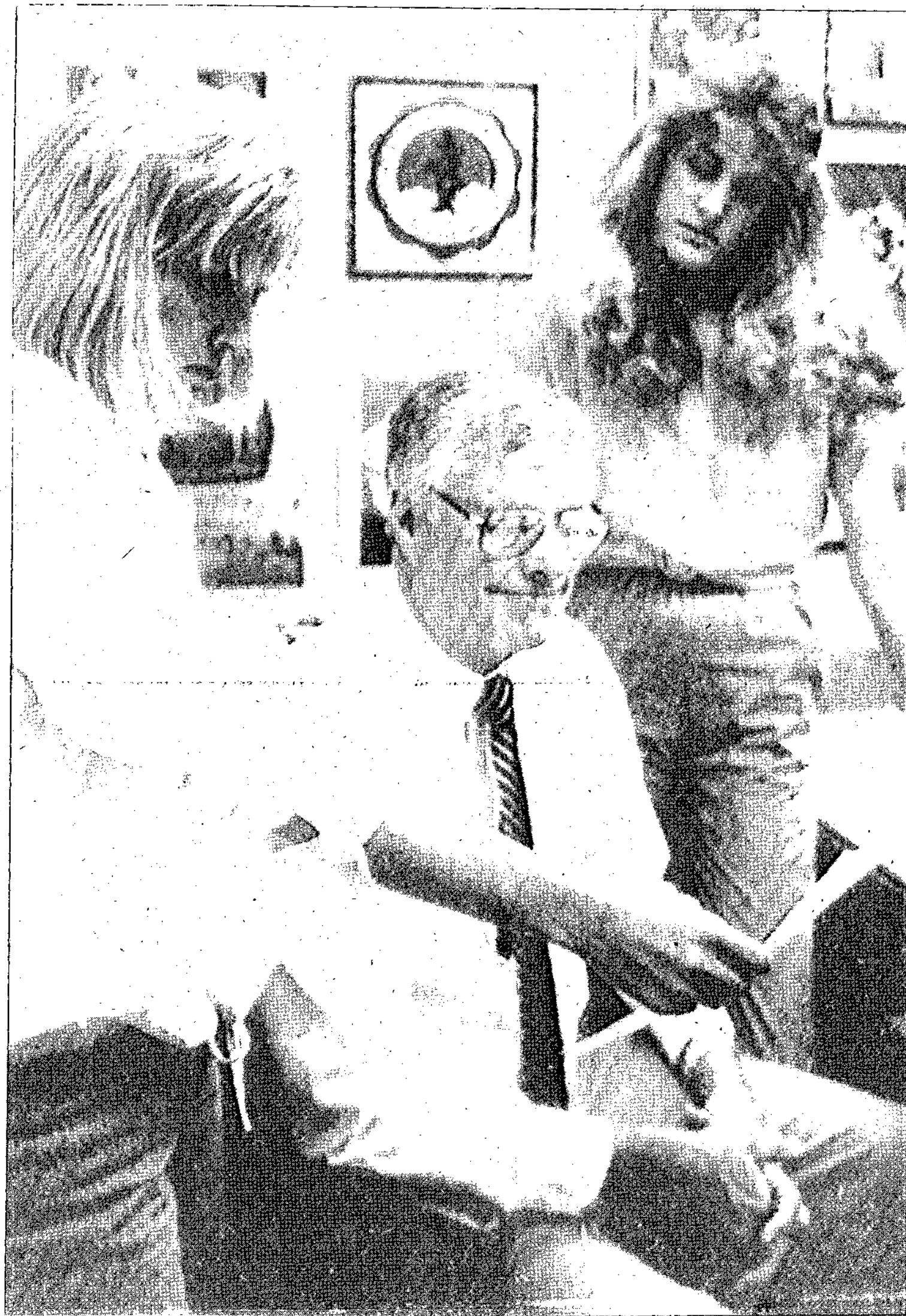
