



It only took half an hour for the Bookstore to sell its first 500 lottery tickets last Thursday.

And when the Bookstore closed seven and a half hours later, 1,511 tickets had been sold on the Cerritos College Campus.

"We've had a lot of people here," said encouraged Bookstore Manager Allan Beaulieu, "it's been very successful for us thus far."

Indeed it has, for 11 million tickets were sold on the first day.

Although it is not yet known if the cash register receipts have increased due to the Lottery, Beaulieu admitted that a sale held last week had gone "extremely well."

The Bookstore, however, has had no \$1000 or \$5000 vinners as of yet.

"We've had a lot of \$2 and \$5 winners, and last week there was a \$100 winner," commented Beaulieu.

"But the big ones are still out there."

Just ask Michael Robertson.

A student here at Cerritos, Robertson hit the big one, winning \$5000 last Friday

"When I won, I screamed so loud a little boy in the market got scared and started crying"

Robertson was cashing his check when he bought just \$5 worth of tickets.

What is he going to do with all that money?

After paying the Government their \$1000 share, he's going to send his parents to New York so that they can see his aunt win an award.

The rest will be used for spending money for a trip to Europe this summer.

"Who knows, I might even throw a party," replied Robertson.

The first game of the lottery is expected to last six or seven more weeks.

### SAT scores make record jump

The average of Scholastic Aptitude Test scores, which are taken by over a million high school students a year, has jumped a record nine points in 1985, announced the National Education Association in their latest report.

College Board President George Hanford has also noted that black student college enrollment is down some 2,000 from last year.

On the other hand, the nation's 9-17 year olds were reading better in 1984 than in 1971.

Also, in the tests given by the National Assessment Educational Progress, the same students who have been showing steady improvement on tests are the same who have contributed to the record SAT increase.

NEA President Mary Hatwood Futrell stressed the primary reason the black student college enrollment is down is due to federal cuts in college loans and elementary and secondary remedial programs. Futrell stated that the federal

education programs are "crucial" to minorities and disadvantaged youth.

According to Futrell, "The dramatic increase in the SAT scores is testimony that America's teachers have been doing an excellent job in the classroom."

It is true that teacher education candidates are scoring higher on SAT tests from a slight climb of 4.6 per cent in . 1984 to 4.7 percent in 1985.

"Seeds were planted a decade ago," noted the College Board, "years before the current two year old education reform."

A joint effort has been made on the part of the teachers and a concerned public.

The supportive public and a commitment to learning is what Futrell stated to be "clear evidence of a continual upturn in SAT scores," but she also stressed that to make greater progress we must make higher education more accessible.

# Parking on agenda for Senate today

Some major C-10 Parking Lot changes are on the ASCC Senate agenda today, along with a proposal to smooth out the traffic flow on Falcon Way.

Last week, in a dramatic about-face, the Senate decided to hire only members of the ASCC for non-skilled labor jobs within the student organization.

The vote was 20-5, with one abstention. Last week, the issue failed 6-18-1.

The Bill was sponsored by Party Whip Keith Estabrook and Senator Chris Schrater.

Senator Debbie Patton made the motion for the Bill to be reconsidered. David Nowell seconded the motion.

The opposition, led by Majority Leader Frank Seifert, questioned the fairness of the bill to those who cannot afford the \$8 ASCC membership fee.

David Mittleman, ASCC Student Body President, responded that payments can be deferred indefinately.

Another question raised by the opposition was the 'best man for the job' idea and the fact that there might not be an ASCC member qualified to complete the job properly.

Mittleman stated that all jobs provided through the job service program are non-skilled labor jobs.

### Falcons let El Camino slip by 34-27; Bakersfield next

Every football afficionado knows that it's the little things that can upset a team's momentum.

Oh, of course, fumbles, penalties, missed blocks and missed assignments also can contribute to a team's loss.

Well, Frank Mazzotta, Cerritos College football coach, knows first hand how these few things can aid a loss, as his Falcons fell to El Camino last Saturday, 34-27.

They will try to rebound this Saturday night, as they travel to Bakersfield, to take on the 4-0 Renegades.

With the game tied at 27, and 4:58 remaining in the

game, the Falcon's Anthony Drawhorn fumbled, as he returned a punt, with the Warriors' Dennis McConnaughy recovering the ball at the Falcon 30.

Seven plays later, quarterback Ron Barber (16-26 passing, 231 yards, 3 TD's) hit Calvin Gilroy from three yards out for the winning touchdown with 1:29 remaining.

"We never played against a team as good as Cerritos," said Warrior Coach John Featherstone. "We wanted to find out how tough we really were, and we did."

"This was probably the toughest week for the coaches and myself, trying to get the team back up after the win over Fullerton," said Mazzotta. "I'm not making excuses, El Camino played a good game, but I feel we played good enough to win."

The Falcons failed to capitalize on many opportunities, including, a missed extra point (the first in over two years), missed field goal and a fumble on the Warrior three yard line late in the third quarter. They also turned the ball over on downs on the Warrior six, with 1:06 remaining in the first half, and add on the fumble by Drawhorn, and it all adds up to a long evening.

"You can't yell at Anthony about the fumble," said Mazzota, "because he will make ten good plays to every one bad play, and I'll take those odds any day."

With the Warriors up 20-13 in the third, the Falcons drove 55 yards, with fullback Paul Backes going over from two. The drive was aided by a pass interference call against the Warriors Harry Curry, puting the ball at the 15.

The Warriors wasted no time (2:47, to be exact) in regaining the lead, when Chris Voegler scored from the one.

After the Warriors were unable to move the ball, this set up the costly fumble which El Camino's McConnaughy recovered.

"Everybody said they were one of the top teams," said Barber. "We have all the respect in the world for them. They're a hell of a team."

The Falcons could have been called "The Walking Wounded," as eight different members of the team had to sit out, or leave the game with various injuries.

The most frustrating of all must be offensive lineman Anthony Pena, who was all set to play, until he twisted his ankle in warm-ups and will probably sit out next week's game.

Running back Keith McCoy, who was injured before the game, had to leave for good, when he got kicked in the calf, and was admirably replaced by Lafayette Shelton (16 carries, 78 yards).

Defensive lineman Jim Zoeteway broke a bone in his hand, but is probable for the Bakersfield, while offensive lineman Mike Stephens was kneed by one of his own players.

"It's the little things in football that beat you," said Mazzotta.

### Grapplers go 2-0 in tourney

The Cerritos College wrestling team traveled to Bakersfield this past Saturday, and pinned two of the top teams that are expected to challenge for the State Championship.

The Falcons first defeated the Renegades of Bakersfield, 28-18, then toppled Cuesta 24-12, which opened the season for the Falcons.

Palomar, which is also in the running for the State title, was entered in the tourney, but did not compete against the Falcons.

The Falcon grapplers will get their chance against Palomar, as they are both in the vigorous South Coast Conference.

Winning both their matches for the Birds were: George Williams (118 lbs.), Pat Welch (158), Edwin Vann (167) and Tom Howell (190).

Coach Jeff Smith had David Stidham (heavyweight) forfeit against his 380-pound Bakersfield opponent, stating, "Stidham could have probably won, but I saw no reason to have him go through it."

Stidham followed that up with a 7-4 loss to last year's returning state champ from Cuesta.

"He (Stidham) did a good job against him," said Smith.
"Cuesta is extremely tough, because five of their guys are transfers from College of the Sequoias." Sequoias dropped their program this year after capturing the State Championship last year.

Overall, Smith was pleased, remarking, "It was a good performance by all, especially the lower weights. Of those who lost, it was a hard fight to the end. We made some first-of-the-year mistakes, but we'll correct those in practice."

The Falcons hosted Rio Hondo yesterday (score unavailable at press time) in the conference opener, and now prepare to travel to Cuesta this Friday, to partake in a two-day tournament against an estimated 20 teams.

## Women's X-Country running strong 5-1

Mario Zamarripa finished out the top five, as he finished in a time of 21:22.






DB Rick Castillo goes after ball carrier.

#### EDITORIAL: One veto calls for another...next election

You're still going to have to pay \$50 for six units

Thanks to a veto by the Governor.

The death of Assembly Bill 979 was a blow to community colleges throughout the state.

The bill would have allowed part-time students to take two three unit classes at a reduced fee, just as the state colleges and universities presently allow.

That reduced fee was in the form of \$5 per unit up to seven units:

Thus, six units would cost only \$30, instead of the big jump to \$50.

A lot of students took/take only three units since there are few two-unit classes — at a loss of a lot of revenue to the college.

The passage of this bill would have been beneficial to those students who find college costs pinching, if not prohibitive. It would have allowed them to take two classes per semester instead of one without having to pay the \$50 tuition fee now charged for the six units.

More importantly, the passage of AB 979 would have brought increased revenue to the community colleges, revenue lost with the decrease in part-time enrollment since the tuition fee was first imposed.

The bill got all the way through to Governor George Deukmejian's desk.

It received support from college trustees, teacher's associations, and college presidents. It was endorsed by 110 of the 120 legislators currently serving the people of California.

Editorials in favor of the bill appeared in community college newspapers; citizens wrote the governor urging him to give his support to the bill.

Yet with all this input, with all this support, Governor Deukmejian chose to ignore the plight of the community college system and exercise his veto power.

Was the Governor listening?

How long must part-time students be penalized with full-time costs?

We elect our public officials for the purpose of representing our needs. We give them our vote. In exchange, we expect fair representation.


Education is now a necessity and not the luxury it was in years gone by.

Through his veto, Governor Deukmejian has documented an alarming insensitivity to the problem.

Governor Deukmejian has not listened to the voices of those who know the effect of the present policy on both students and the colleges.

Governor Deukmejian has not lived up to the promise of fair representation that he made by deciding to seek the governorship.

We have received his message, sent in the form of a veto. Next election, he will receive our reply, sent in the form of a vote.
