The leading men include Doug Vasquez as the carefree hero Dick; Dexter Echiverri as Lucky, the savvy sailor who sweeps Joan off her feet, and Jeff Haas, who has double-duty as Hennesey the Stage Manager and the love-struck Captain.

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Crime rate dips on campus; two caught stealing

"We don't have that much crime on campus," said campus police chief Mike Gobec. "If we did, we would be in trouble."

Gobec was referring to a recent *Talon Marks* article which quoted "auto burglaries have been knocked off to only six where previously it was 10 a week."

Actually, according to Gobec, the stats are extremely lower.

Since Gobec has taken over in August of last year, auto burglaries (tape decks, etc.) and auto thefts have dropped.

Now the combination of the two crimes are down to between one and three a month from the original 10.

"We've lowered the crime rate considerably," Gobec said. "And I applaud the department on that. They're doing one heck of a job."

Recently, two students found that the old cliché "Crime doesn't pay," to be arrestingly true.

Gobec said the students were making off with two electronic scales from the Natural Sciences building, estimated at over \$400 apiece.

Both scales were recovered and the two suspects were arrested on campus.

As to the whereabouts of campus police's new and enlarged facility, Gobec said that the topic still has not been fully discussed, although he did mention the Assessment Center area as a possible location.

"I'm open to suggestions and for changes to better serve the public," says Gobec. "Put it this way, I'm flexible."

"I personally like this spot," Gobec said, adding that visibility of the department is a nice touch.

Invocation to have small 'g' in God and no Jesus

Thank God for commencement. For now. But now there's a question as to whose "god" and in which name.

In a meeting of the commencement committee, in which Dr. Stephen Helfgot, chair of the committee, called "too informal to take minutes," it was decided, after a heated debate, to follow tradition and continue with an invocation at the graduation ceremony.

The debate was centered around past problems with the invocation. The opinion expressed was that the prayers would often express a certain religious point of view instead of being something everyone could participate in.

Psychology instructor Bill Dunroe, a chief advocate of changing the invocation said, "Some faculty members have approached me and said that they were offended (by the past invocations)." Dunroe suggested instead, a moment of silence.

The committee finally reached a decision that would include an invocation, but would have no references to a particular God. It was also noted that the prayer should not contain the name of Jesus Christ.

Cerritos College student Gary Apodaca was chosen to give the invocation. Apodaca came highly recommended by ASCC President Keith Estabrook. Estabrook guaranteed Apodaca's prayer would be non-secular.

The committee decided that the finished prayer would be submitted to Dunroe and

music instructor Stan Porter for final approval.

Porter is one of the main supporters of what he termed, "a long tradition of having an invocation at commencement."

He felt that this was the first year there was any type of controversy over this subject and noted, "People expect us to be tolerant of their traditions, when they're not willing to be tolerant of ours."

Dunroe on the other hand said, "We want to express some sensitivity to certain groups. We do that for race, but we wouldn't do it for religion. Some people's Christianity has a tendency to be very less forgiving than the individual who started it."

Both Dunroe and Porter expressed approval of the committee's decision.

School records indicate whether students have to take the battery. Delaying will only make fall registration longer.

Baseball, softball squads enjoy penthouse stopover

A 6-5, 10-inning victory over Fullerton Saturday snapped a three game winless skid with their South Coast Conference rival, and propelled the Cerritos baseball to the sole position of first place.

The Falcons came in tied for the SCC lead with Fullerton, but now find themselves a full game in front with a 13-3 slate, 22-4 overall.

Cerritos was at Long Beach City yesterday (score not available at press time) and continue their road trip tomorrow with Golden West. Both games begin at 2:30.

The Falcons return home Saturday at noon for a contest with Mt. San Antonio.

The tenth inning saw textbook play by the Falcons against Fullerton.

Centerfielder Darrell Sherman opened the inning with his third infield hit of the day.

After Todd Guggianna bunted him over to second, Hornet reliever Craig Oden intentionally walked Brian Hunter and then unintentionally walked Rod Benjamin to load the bases for catcher Craig Wilson.

Wilson flied deep to right fielder Emmitt Cohick, whose attempt to throw out Sherman coming home was up the third base line.

Patrick Sweet went the distance against Fullerton and improved his record to 6-0 on the season.

Without some of the late inning fireworks however, Sweet may have suffered his first defeat.

Trailing 5-1 with two out and nobody on in the bottom of the seventh, the Falcons took advantage of two Fullerton errors to tie the game.

Perry Sanchez hit a routine grounder to second baseman Jon Rice, who missed it.

Wilson and Jeff Farrar then walked to

load the bases.

Hornet starter Mark Kiefer then made way for Brad Hoffer, who induced pinch hitter David Lozano to hit a pop foul between third and home which third baseman Brad Stroozas dropped for the second error of the inning.

Given a reprieve, Lozano lined another single through the middle for two runs. Ole Kohlstedt then lined another single to center to score Farrar and cut the lead to one.

Miguel Salas then replaced Hoffer and he walked both Bret Barbarie and Sherman and the score was tied. Oden then came in and struck out Guggianna to end the inning.

Earlier in the week, the Falcons had defeated Compton 16-4, but were upset by El Camino 10-7.

SOFTBALL: SIX-AND-OUT

The South Coast Conference leading Cerritos softballers, 22-7 overall and 6-0 in the SCC, are home today to face El Camino while traveling to Fullerton Friday.

Both contests begin at 3.

In Cerritos' last two softball games, the

Falcons have hammered out 29 hits and produced 15 runs, while allowing a meager four hits and one unearned run.

Cerritos topped Pasadena 11-0, on a one-hitter by Estela Gutierrez, while also downing non-conference foe Riverside, 4-1.

In the 11-0 rout of Pasadena on Wednesday, six Falcon batters enjoyed multiple hit games as Gutierrez recorded her ninth shutout and sixth one hitter.

Gutierrez, who is 16-4 overall, has won all six of the Falcons conference games. The sophomore has only allowed one unearned run and a measly 12 hits in the SCC.

Cerritos' 4-1 win over Riverside saw Mada allow three hits, while her teammates accounted for 10.

The Tigers only run off Mada came as a result of an error and was unearned.

Mada is now 6-3 on the season.

Jennifer Merino led the Cerritos bats with an exceptional 6-for-9 plate performance in the two games.

Five Falcons are hitting over .400: Gutierrez (.550), Sandy Barbarie (.444), Binky Callahan (.438), Audra Jesolva (.411) and Lisa Goldman (.400).

Men women trekkers finish SCC action

In readying themselves for the Mt. San Antonio Relays tomorrow and the South Coast Conference Prelims next Tuesday, Cerritos saw both its men's and women's track and field teams close out the South Coast Conference season Friday.

The women, finishing at 5-2 in the SCC, picked up both wins in their double dual meet romp of Pasadena, 114-9, and victory over Fullerton, 97-38.

However, the men split their contests, knocking off Fullerton 83-61 but losing to Pasadena 77-63. The Falcon men finished at 3-4 in conference play.

Tennis loses first; swing back for win

The men's tennis team, had its 10-0 unblemished SCC mark scuffed up last Tuesday, losing to Long Beach City, 6-3.

Two days later, the Falcon netters rebounded for a 7-2 win over Pasadena.

The team was at El Camino yesterday (score not available at press time) to close out the conference season.

Overconfidence resulted from a winning attitude that dates back to Cerritos' first meeting with Long Beach.

This proved to be the reason for the Falcons first SCC defeat of the season.

"This attitude developed into overconfidence which caused our players to forget how good Long Beach City really is," said coach Tom Spence.

Upcoming action for the net squad will be the Ojai Tournament, held April 23-26.

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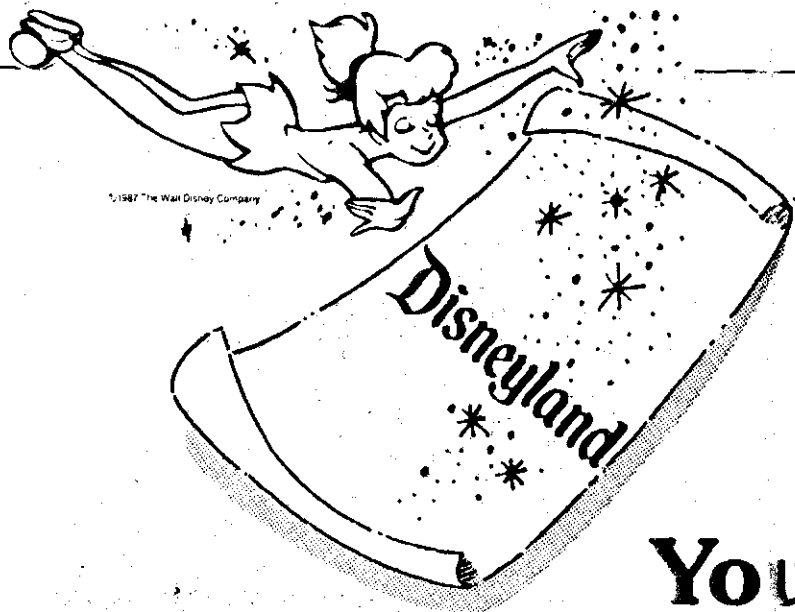

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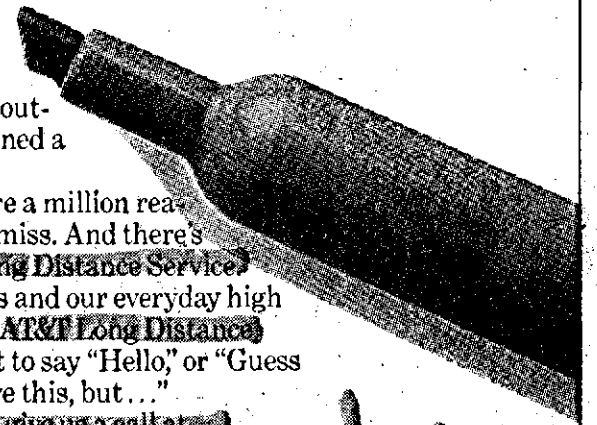
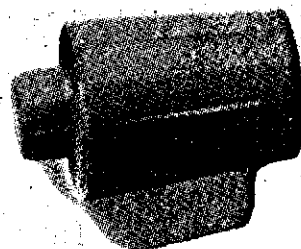
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
