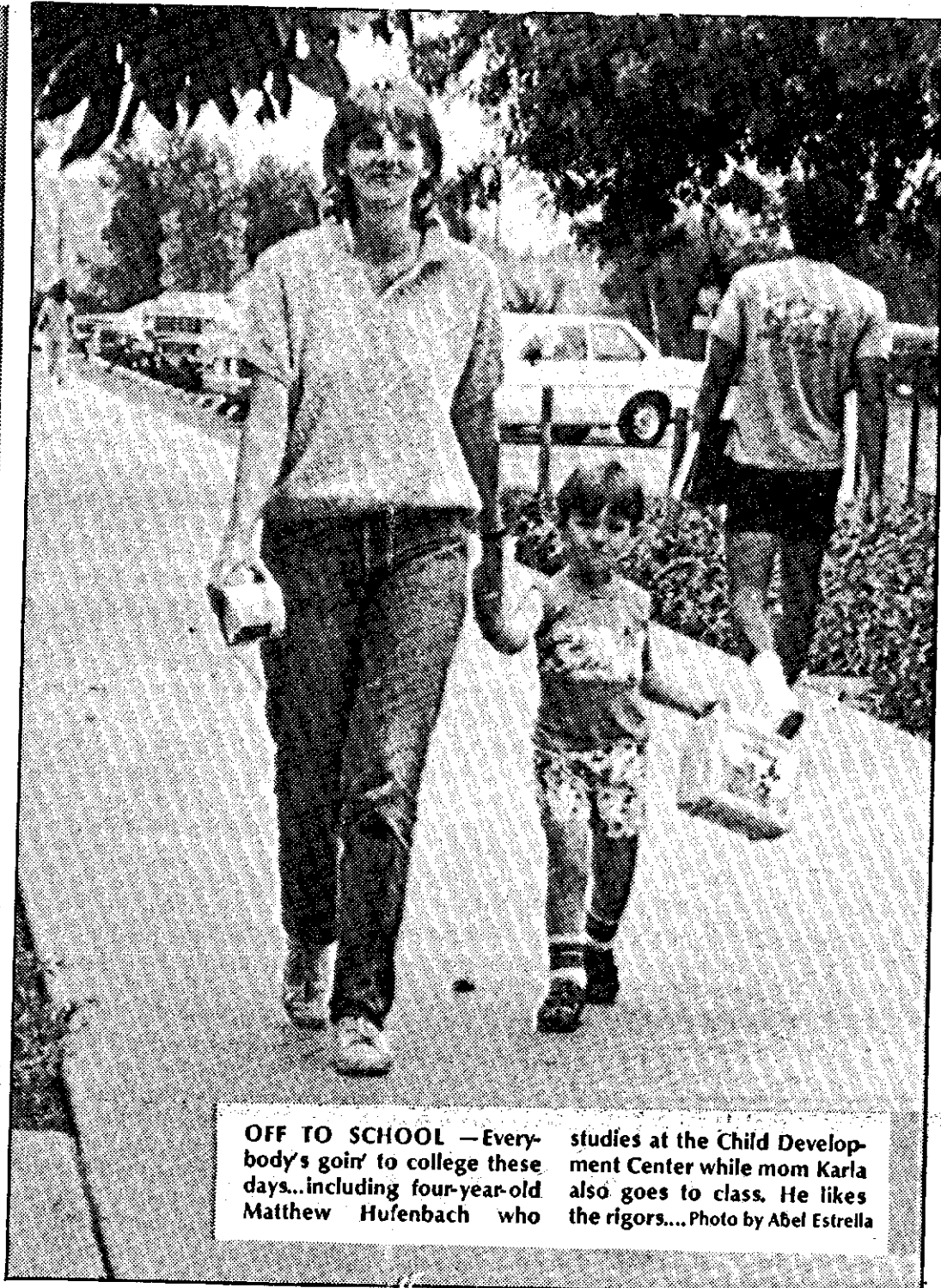

**Summer plays
open Thursday
with musical**

Murder and music will highlight the Theatre Department's Original Theatre Works second season which will be launched June 18 with "Irresistible Impulse."

The summer repertory group will open "Body Parts" June 25.

Both shows will run at scheduled times through July 26.

First of the two world premiere events runs Thursday through Sunday. Shows are at 8 p.m., with a Sunday staging at 2:30.

Founded to provide a forum for the works of new playwrights, the Original Theatre Works is producing two world premieres: one original drama and one musical revue.

This compelling play was chosen from over 75 entries as the winner of the 1987 Lee Korf Playwriting award.

"Irresistible Impulse" is about people getting away with murder and the people who are in and out of control.

For musical lovers the Theatre Works will bring "Body Parts, a wacky, witty musical revue from the people who brought last fall's popular hit "It's About Time."

Old time favorite tunes such as, "I've Got You Under My Skin," and "Smoke Gets In Your Eyes," promises an evening of great music, and all

Hardeman resigns from Trustees

**FOUR MONTH GAP LEFT
WITH JULY 1 DEPARTURE;
APPOINT OR LEAVE OPEN?**

The question of what to do about President Dale Hardeman's resignation from the Cerritos College Board of Trustees may or may not be settled at the meeting Tuesday night, June 16.

It's not an official agenda listing, but could surface as an action item.

The Board can replace him with an appointment, or they can leave the seat empty until the regular November elections.

A special election is out of the question, since his resignation becomes effective July 1, which is too late to qualify for extra balloting.

Hardeman, who is completing his first four-year term, shocked observers when he made the announcement June 2 that he was leaving his elected post.

He cited health reasons, claiming that the doctor has advised him to curtail his activities. He expressed his concern with hypertension and heart problems.

He served as legislative aide for defeated Republican Assemblyman Wayne Grisham, and served as a campaign executive in Grisham's intense run-off fight with Norwalk councilman Cecil Green.

He did not indicate specifically what his future plans are, or that his actions were for any other but health reasons.

Hardeman is in his second term as Board president.

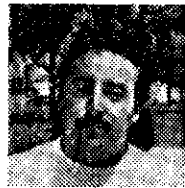

Custer is probably still somewhat remorseful over the last stand he took on June 25 in '76. Wonder if he thinks it was worth it?

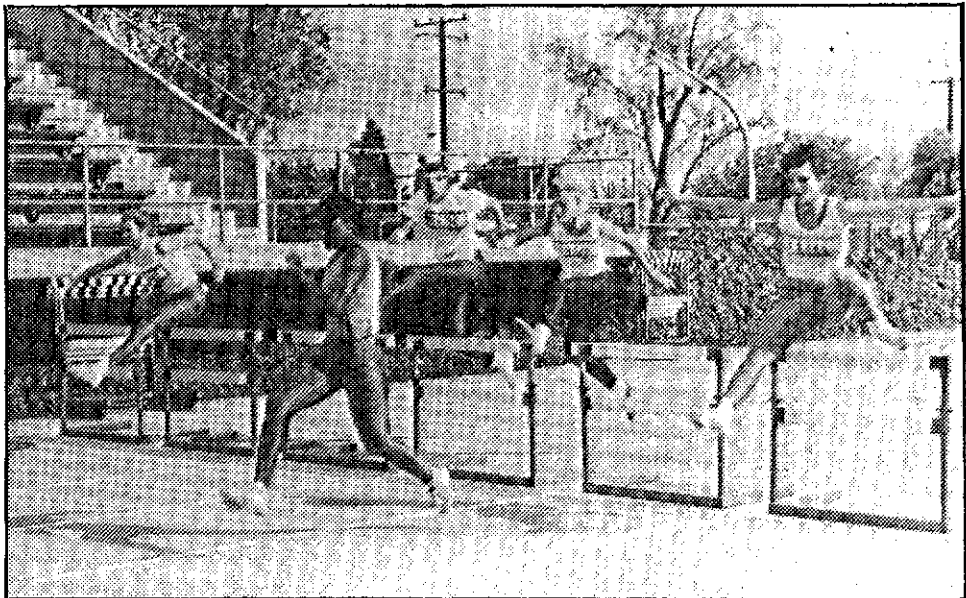

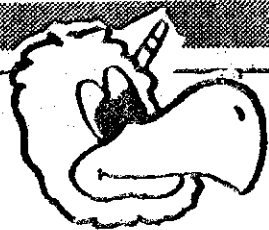
Somehow, there always seems to be major developments during the May to August stretch that affect the body politic.
