BID FAILS TO LIMIT PRESIDENT

Senate bill called 'slap in exec's face'

"If you start taking away the power of the president, why should we even have one?" questioned ASCC President Alex Macksoud, addressing last Wednesday's poorly attended Student Senate.

Macksoud, speaking to the senate for the first time since welcoming them at the start of the semester, was strongly opposed to a bill he felt would put limits on presidential power.

The bill, co-authored by Ed McGinn and Mike Negrete, fell just short of passing by majority, failing on a 9-7 count after heated debate and after two amendments were added to it.

The ASCC Awards Committee, which is currently selected by the student body president, would have been subject to senate approval if the bill would have passed, but fell short by 2 votes.

The original bill wanted "majority senate approval" but was amended.

"If everybody I appointed to committees were to get approved by the senate, they would be there until four o'clock every Wednesday," said Macksoud.

One senator felt it a "slap in the president's face.

"Why should the senate question what the president does?" asked senator Eric Schlemmer.

"I feel Alex is doing a fine job," stated McGinn. "Alex is not going to be our president next year, though. By allowing the president to appoint an awards committee without Senate approval, we resign ourselves to the possibility of a presidential 'stacking'."

Later in the meeting, a bill co-authored by Negrete and McGinn that set stricter (Continued on Page 3)

Counselor Martin, career spans tenure of Cerritos

Director of Counseling Gene Martin is one of five of the original 38 faculty members who started Cerritos College in the Fall of 1957 with an enrollment of 300 students.

He describes the early years as tough, different and adventurous for both the faculty and students.

During the first two years, the college operated at Artesia High School from 4-

It took two bond issues and two years before facilities were built on the land now occupied by Cerritos College.

The football team of 1957, of which Martin was a coach, practiced at Bellflower High School from 12-2:30 p.m. everyday.

He was coach of the first track and field team in 1958.

Martin also served as Athletic Director from 1958-1962.

"We've had fine coaches, but we've also had solid support from the college administrative personnel."

"Cerritos College has always been a top contender in the many different sports we have participated in over the years," said

Martin received his Bachelor of Arts degree and his Masters of Art degree in Physical Education from Stanford University.

Martin was head coach of the 1962 footbal team, and has officiated football on both the high school and college level for 20

A physical education and health teacher, Martin decided to broaden his role at Cerritos College by becoming a counselor, where he could help students academicallly as well as physically.

He was Faculty President in 1965. On his 30 years here, Martin says "Many of our graduates have gone on to be very successful in their life's endeavors, and it has been a rewarding experience to be associated with the many students I have contacted in the past 30 years."

Martin is married with three daughters two sons, and three grandchildren.

All five of his children have attended Cerritos College.

He likes golf, tennis and handball, along with reading and attending athletic events.

grounds for dismissal of a Supreme Court Justice passed on a 14-2 vote in an effort to have tougher regulations for Court members on absences.

The bill deleted "the Court by a twothirds vote of all the remaining justices can publicly censure said Justice" from section 7.171 under the Judicial Code.

The section now reads "Any Supreme Court Justice absent without excuse from: a) two consecutive, or b) four yearly meetings of the Supreme Court, shall automatically cease to serve as a Justice member.

Cerritos closed the season with a 48-12 South Coast Conference stomping of Mt. San Antonio Nov. 21, marking its slate at 6-3-1 overall and 3-2-1 in the SCC.

Included in the "banged-up boys club" for Cerritos is premiere running back Andre Wooten. The 5-foot-11 195-pound All-American from Cerritos High rushed for 1,123 yards in only 7½ games.

Wooten missed the Mt. SAC contest because of a broken toe. Mazzotta said his sophomore runner wants to play and added, "When Andre wants to play, it's usually an indicator of a good performance."

Wide receiver Frank Mazzotta, Jr., who led the team with 40 receptions and a school record 692 yards, is likely to miss the Pony Bowl because of a fractured tibia.

Receiver Gary Burnett, who caught 10 passes for 183 yards, is out with a deep bruise in his side that has developed calcium deposits. Although starting center Keith Harrison (broken foot) has gotten the OK from doctors, he is questionable to play. Also question marks are offensive guard

Kevin Newton (sprained ankle) and tight Tickets to the Pony Bowl Classic Saturday night at Orange Coast College are \$5.

and six touchdowns. Still nursing a sprained ankle, All-Conference defensive back Eddie Stokes may not play. Stokes picked off four passes and also racked up 740 yards on punt and kickoff returns. The sophomore from Cerritos High led the defensive backs with 53 tackles.

With a damaged knee and a sore ankle, starting defensive end Gabriel Navarro will be knocked out.

Saddleback, an 8-2 finisher, is led by a 6foot-2, 210-pound quarterback by the name of Howard Gasser. The sophomore completed 148-of-254 passes for 2,264 yards and a school record 24 touchdowns.

Gasser threw only three interceptions, two of which occured in Saddleback's wild 45-34 victory over Rancho Santiago in the season finale.

"Gasser will probably be the best quarterback we've seen all year," said Mazzotta. "He doesn't have the best arm around, but he knows where to throw the ball, and he just gets the job done better than anyone else." Gasser's prime targets are Scott Miller

and Kelly Ryan. Miller caught 60 passes for a freshman record. The wide receiver accounted for 898 yards of real estate with nine touchdowns.

Sophomore Ryan pulled down 35 grabs for 684 yards and 12 touchdowns.

"These guys run fantastic patterns," said

Mazzotta. "If we can contain Gasser, it will neutralize Miller and Ryan."

Mazzotta said Gasser picks up on opposing blitzes well and that it is better to cover him tightly rather than to pressure him.

For Cerritos, Don Sabella (Warren) will get the starting role, but Mazzotta said Shane Norris (Downey) will get ample play-

"We have to threaten them with the run to open up our passing game," Mazzotta said. "I still feel if we're healthy, this could be the best team I have ever coached."

Sick shooters off to slow start

Losing two starters to the flu and another two being off the roster was not expected to help the Cerritos College basketball team going into Saturday night's non-conference game with undefeated Santa Monica.

The Corsairs (6-0) took advantage of its opponent's pitfalls, sending Cerritos on a sickly 109-81 roller coaster ride, almost tying a Cerritos record for lopsided defeats.

Friday night Cerritos set a more positive record, scoring the most points in school history in a 142-123 point show at East Los Angeles, Incidentally, 123 points is the most the Falcons have allowed.

Earlier last week, Rancho Santiago was able to come back and hand Cerritos an 80-

The loss to Santa Monica dropped the Falcons to 3-3, the worst start in Coach Jack Bogdanovich's six year career at Cerritos.


Because of academic ineligibility, sophomore Andre Edwards, a 6-foot-5 forward from Lynwood High, was lost. Another Sophomore, guard Walt Lauderdale, decided to redshirt this season. The absence of both these sophomores, along with starters Jim Taylor and Vern Johnson, ill, gave Santa Monica an easy coasting win Saturday night.

Guard Deshawn Pullard led all scorers, collecting 22 points, including three threepointers to open up the second half, which boosted the Corsairs' lead, 77-51, with 14:23 to play in the game.

The boards belonged to Santa Monica. The Corsairs outrebounded Cerritos, 54-30, getting multiple shots on several trips down the court.

The Falcons would never come closer than 21 points, losing by the second worst margin in school history. San Francisco City defeated Cerritos 106-74 in 1981.

Points were the least of Cerritos' problems Friday night with a run and gun style of play against East Los Angeles. The Falcons broke the 1968 school record for most points, routing East LA, 142-123. Cerritos scored 139 against El Camino in

As in the previous games, once the Falcons lost hold of the lead, composure and momentum were nowhere to be found.

The Raiders took advantage of the Cerritos lack of spirit, routing the Falcons in game four, 15-5. Moorpark clinched the match with a 15-7 game five win.

The Falcons most serious error in the match was the fact that they missed a total of

Warner hit five of 11 shot attempts and connected on 8-of-9 freethrows. She pulled down 11 boards and had one steal.

The Falcons finished the season as a 69th place. team with a 6-2 double dual meet record and third place ranking in the South Coast Conference.

Coach Hal Simonek was able to enter Chaney, Cerritos' top runner and fourth best in the SCC, and tenth SCC ranked Reynoso at the state competition.

Despite a chilling 33 degree temperature. Chaney clocked in at 19:09 for the five kilometer run. Chaney's time was good for 25th place overall.

Reynoso crossed over at 20:36 for

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
