Three presidential slates may force run-off election

Voting begins today.

The result, however, may be the beginning of another election — a run-off.

It is a possibility that with three slates, two official and one write-in, the needed 50 per cent may not be garnered by one set of candidates.

If a run-off occurs, it will take place next Wed. and Thurs.

Issues that top the list for all three are better representation of night students and campus safety.

Voting booths are located at the Coffee Shop/Student Center, SS Elbow Room and the Health Science building.

The polls are open today and tomorrow 8:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. and 6 p.m. to 9 p.m.

At press time the Rincon/Parks campaign platform was not available to *Talon Marks*.

Their campaign literature states they are the "right choice" but gives no reasons.

The answers given at last week's press conference are as follows: Cabinet members should not have their votes recorded.

"...as a cabinet member you must have privacy of voting," said Rincon.

"The Senate must know what they are voting on, they need to understand the bills," said Parks. "They are a check and balance for the Cabinet."

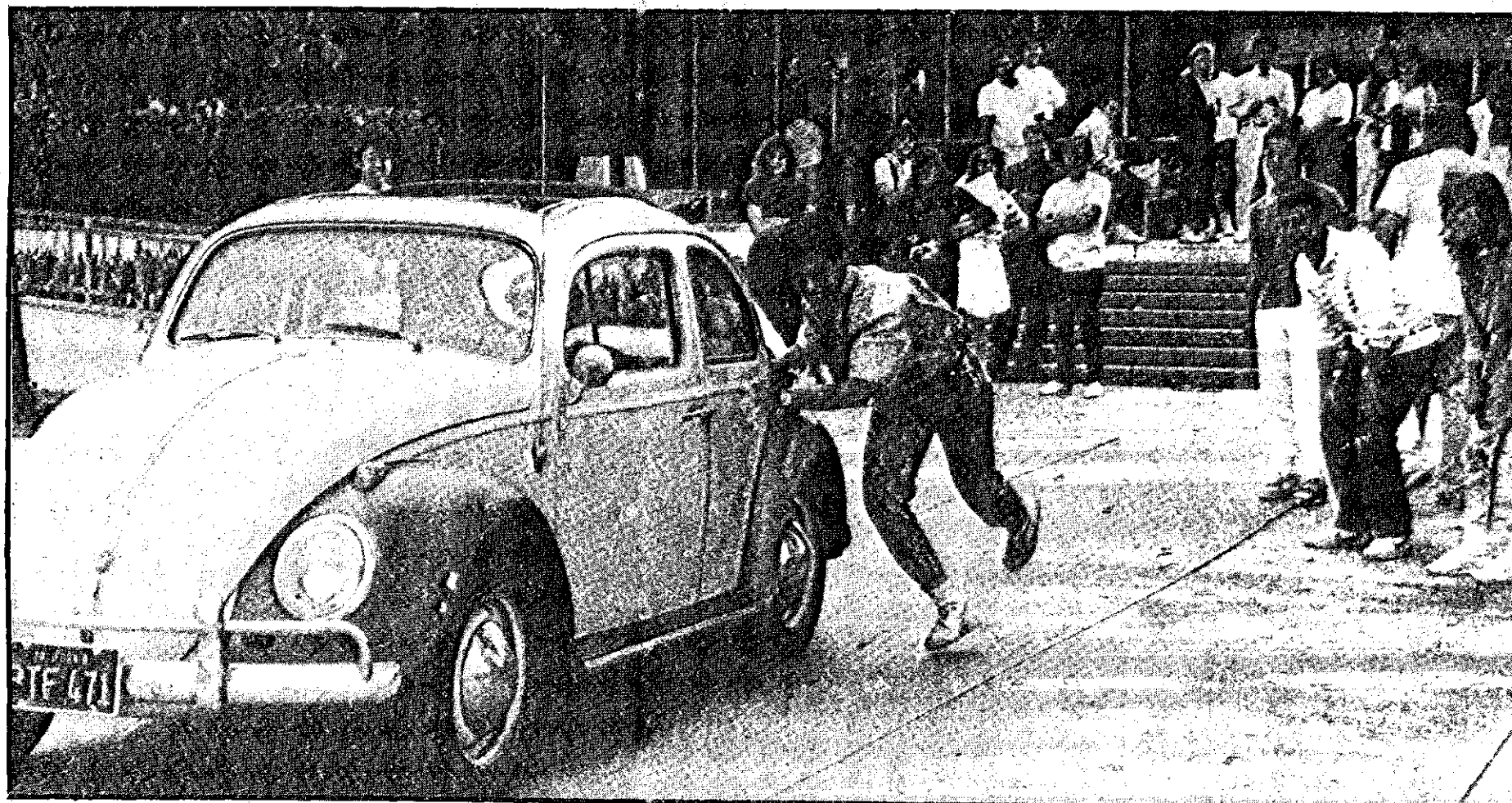

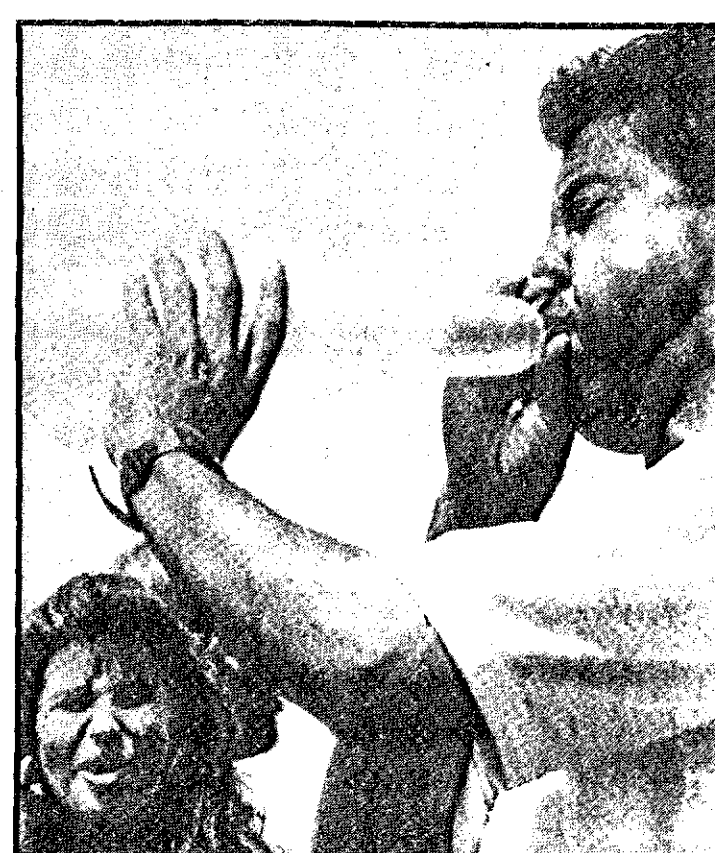
