



C. Dean Paige moved into the office of Interim Vice President of Instruction today following the abrupt reassignment of Dr. George Melican.

In an action that set the campus abuzz, the Board of Trustees voted 5-1 not to renew Melican's contract that runs through June 30, 1990. He is now in Community Services working on special projects.

Melican is the second member of the new three-man team to be removed from his post by new president Dr. Ernest Martinez and the Board. Dr. Stephen Helfgot was removed as Vice-president of Student Services in December. He is now a full time counselor.

Helfgot arrived in July 86, preceding Martinez by some six months and Melican by a year.

Adamantly opposing Melican's ouster is Board president Mark Durant, who pulled no punches in his support of Melican.

"I find it (Melican's non-renewal) a repugnant act of cowardice," Durant said with the presidential gavel in his hand at the time of the announcement following a closed board session.

Durant termed the action "an injustice."

He confirmed reports that Melican had gotten outstanding reviews the last two years, asking,

"How can you do that and then not renew a man's contract?"

"In effect we have destroyed his career," the Board president said.

The Trustees followed Dr. Martinez recommendation, following the surprising release of the action as an agenda item circulated well before the Board meeting and vote.

When contacted by the Talon Marks, Dr.

Martinez declined to comment about the action.

Faculty Senate president Connie Mantz said she had received calls from faculty members "who are concerned at the dismissal of another vice president."

"One of my greatest concerns is the stability of the institution," she said. "I believe we are fortunate to have a man like Dean Paige to step in. He has been a faculty member, Chairman of the Faculty Association, a division dean, as well as Dean of Extended Day. I believe his leadership will help provide stability in the year ahead."

Dr. Fran Newman was given a three-year contract as the permanent Vice-President of Student Services. She had been in the post on an interim basis.

Jim Peter takes over Paige's spot as SEM Division head for the next year.

Durant stressed, "I stood by what I said in closed session," regarding the controversial personnel change.

No details were made public as to the reasons for Melican's reassignment. The official college position to inquiries by the public and the press is a "No Comment."

The issue is expected to be raised again in the Fall when the Faculty Senate convenes.





ASCC Fall Senate elections big item when school opens

Student political hopefuls can pick up applications for the ASCC Senate race in Student Activities on Aug. 21, the first day of the Fall semester.

"Serving on the Student Senate is an excellent way to serve the college and develop leadership skills," says Associate Dean of Student Activities Phillip Houseman.

Of the available seats, only one third are reserved for sophomores. Chances for newcomers to make the Senate are wide open, according to ASCC President Manuel Rincon who urges students who might be interested to check into the possibilities.

In addition to collecting the signatures of 20 ASCC cardholders on a petition by the Sept. 8 deadline, Senatorial aspirants must meet various other criteria. Among these is a GPA of 2.0 and current ASCC membership.

At least 10 units must be carried throughout the semester to maintain elgibility.

Candidates may run as an independent, or represent a club or campus organization, or a special interest group. Ballots will indicate affiliations.

A minimum of 30 seats will be filled, with one extra seat added for every 500 full-time students registered above the 4,000 mark.

An orientation session will be held for qualified candidates in Student Activities on Monday, Sept. 11.

Completion of 84 units of college work or six semesters as an ASCC government officer disqualifies students from running for Senate.

Senators must be able to attend regular meetings held each Wednesday at 2 p.m.

Elections are scheduled for Wednesday and Thursday, Sept. 13 and 14, from 8:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., and 6 to 9 p.m. Polling booths will be located outside the Coffee Shop, near the Social Science patio and the Health Science Building.

Last semester's election saw 57 candidates vying for 30 open seats, with a total of some 450 votes cast. The turnout is expected top run higher this Fall on the heals of the enthusiasm generated by the ASCC presidential contest at the end of last semester which saw over 1,000 vote. It took a run-off to determine the winners.

Special interest groups represented on the spring Senate include AHORA with seven members, MEChA with six, and four from Alpha Gamma Sigma.

The duties of the student Senate include overseeing the Associated Students budget of nearly \$500,000, making rules for student government interests and activities, ratifying ASCC Cabinet members appointed by the president and approving programs for raising revenue.
