Nobody 'paying' for \$221K ATM hits

No suspects were in custody as of press time for the second robbery within a month at the Security Pacific automatic teller machine (ATM) on the Cerritos College campus.

Some \$160,000 was taken from two armed Brink's guards who were overpowered early in the morning on July 14 by a man with a metal bar.

The first theft of \$60,-800 occurred at 3 a.m. on June 18, according to Sheriff's robbery division reports. Officials said no arrests have been made for this.

The bank said it has no plans to close the ATM

which opened last September just north of the C-2 parking lot.

At 2:41 a.m. Friday, July 14, two guards left the Brink's armored truck with a canvas bag. In line with company policy, one guard stayed in the vehicle.

One guard had her gun drawn at the scene as the second reached for his keys to unlock the rear door of the ATM. According to official reports, the female guard noticed a shadow moving behind them just before the assailant struck • her male counterpart unconscious with the metal bar and knocked her to the ground with his forearm.

The man took the canvas bag and ran in a northwest direction, towards lot C-3, reports said. The robber was described as a black man with a mustache, about six feet tall, with a stocky build. He wore a ski mask.


The metal bar was found eight yards from the ATM, while the canvas bag and a ski mask were left in front of Burnight Center.

The wounded guard

was taken to Pioneer
Hospital in Artesia and
treated for lacerations on
the front and back of his
head.

Deputies, aided by a police dog, searched the campus but no suspects were found.

Cerritos president Dr. Ernest Martinez stressed the college has no business affiliation with the ATM operation which is located on campus for the convenience of the students.

Four Trustees seek to keep seats

All four incumbents will vie to retain their seats on the Board of Trustees at the upcoming Nov. 7 elections.

Deadline for filing for the College governing body, whose actions are coming under increasing public scrutiny, is Aug. 11.

Three seats are four year terms. The seat appointee John Moore now holds will be opened up for two years.

President Mark Durant and members Ada Steenhoek, and Joseph P. Stits, who was recently appointed to fill the unexpired term of now Assemblyman Robert Epple, are four year term holders.

At least a half dozen others are expected to declare candidacy.

Reservations were expressed by Durant, "in light of recent events."

He underscored this at the July 11 special meeting by asking, in a highly unusual move, Dr. Walter Magnuson, vice president for business services, to furnish each Board member with a list of appropriation transfers from contingencies, and an explanation for each one.

In a post meeting interview Durant indicated a new position created within the president's

office, and paid for through the contingency fund, was voted down by the Board at a prior meeting.

A proposal by college admiministration to close evening childcare services on campus came under tire at the July 18 Board meeting.

The primary reason for the recommendation was the lack of attendance which resulted in the program's consistant failure to generate enough funding to support staff salaries.

"I just can't believe we can't market ourselves well enough to make a profit," said Steenhoek.

The matter was tabled for discussion at a future meeting.

An agenda item considering approval of employment of Dean of Institutional Advancement was moved to closed session and returned without a motion being raised.

The Board approved advertising of two instructor positions in mathematics.

Only one of three open positions could be filled for the upcoming school year. Interim Vice President for Instructional Services Dean Paige stated that by announcing the positions now a large pool of qualified applicants may be attracted for screening this February.

In other business, the Board honored Shirley Dallas as employee of the month for June and for her retirement after 25 years as division clerk for Fine Arts and Communications.

A surprisingly strong summer enrollment of over 9,800 this year for all sessions is up some 800 more than last year.


The figures include the first six and eight week sessions, the eight week intrasession, and the second six week offerings, according to Mary Iwami, assistant director of admissions.

Open sign-ups, with no appointment cards needed, run from Aug. 17 -28.


Classes begin Aug. 21.

ASCC eyes travel fund budget cuts

"We have developed an excellence, and now we can't afford it," said Associate Dean of Student Activities Phillip Houseman.

That excellence in the form of state and national competitions cost the ASCC \$38,-000 last year, out of an account that was budgeted for \$20,000.

The account (3C1/Contingency Fund) is now up for a rebudgeting effort forced by the new plans for a student center remodel depleting the reserves used for overdraft.

A faculty/student committee including Houseman, ASCC President Manuel Rincon, budget commissioner Denise Trapp, and representatives of the groups utilizing the account have met this summer to form recommendations for account usage.

The committee will meet early in the semester to make its final recommendations. Those recommendations will then go to the account advisors, and then through the ASCC approval process of ASCC Cabinet and Senate.

Currently, funding is granted on a first-come, first-served basis with clubs presenting requests to the ASCC Senate for approval.

The suggestion of changing the account structure to line item, with each organization having a specific amount to spend, seemed to draw a favorable response from those present. However, no one wants to take a cut in their programs.

The areas that will be affected are Athletics, Cosmetology, LAE, Journalism, VICA, Business Club, Forensics, and AGS.

"A line item has worked in the past, I'm not sure why it was ever changed," said C.T. Nelson, Journalism Chairman.

"There is no easy answer, but there are two alternatives," said Houseman.
"Either a reduction in the programs, or an increase in the income."
