














Campaigns open today for top jobs

The offices of President and Vice-President of the student body for next year are on the line next Wednesday and Thursday.

Three states will be vying for the offices with campaigning officially starting today.

Phone registration, a new tool in serving continuing students at Cerritos College, is still in the testing stages of its implementation.

Over 90 students were invited to test the call in class registration systems for the current spring semester.

The students had to make their calls from phones located in the Admissions

The test was a success for the volunteers.

For the fall semester 1990, the Admissions Office is seeking 500 continuing students to volunteer to register by phone, from any touch-tone phone anywhere.

This will be the second major test of the new system and will simulate more accurately what the service will sound like when it is fully implemented,

According to Rudy Rozier, director of the Cullinary Arts program, which is now providing fresh sandwiches, the Elbow Room is a supplement to the cafeteria.

Beaulieu stressed that the improved facility will not be another coffee shop.

"It's going to be a 10 minute break place with the friendliest staff on campus,"


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

As the Southern California preliminaries draw even closer, the men's and women's track and field team are performing exceptionally better since the beginning of the season.

Tomorrow the teams are at Mt. San Antonio College for the Mt. SAC relays at while Kirk Ayers placed fourth at 53.75 in

Recently, at the Fresno Relays, the quartet of Ramelle Roberts, Tiffany South, team of Ayers, Anthony, Charlie Angel Patrice Hall and Nikki Swanson ran the 1600 relay in a time of 4:06.4 which

became the fifth fastest time in Southern California.

Earlier in the season at the Southern California Heptathlon, South etched herself into the record books with 3,434 points which put her second on the all-time Falcon list.

On the men's side, John Anthony placed second in the long jump at 23' 8", the 400 meter hurdles.

Continuing to shine, the sprint medley and Blaine Stephenson finished fifth in a time of 3:34.50.

Sluggers clinch SCC title; next look to go undefeated

Having already cinched up their fourth straight conference championship, the Falcons are on a mission to become the first team to ever get through the South Coast Conference unbeaten.

The last time a Falcon team accomplished this feat was 24-years ago when they went 18-0 under Coach Wally Kincaid in the Metropolitan conference.

Cerritos (14-0 SCC, 28-4 overall) continues their trek towards greatness with a three-game conference homestand starting Saturday against the Warriors of El Camino. The first pitch is set for 1

The Birds are hoping to get back on track after coming within one game of grabbing the Allan Hancock Tournament title in non-conference play.

Yesterday, the Falcons met league foe Pasadena with results unavailable at press

Victories over Taft (9-3), and San Jose City (19-4), brightened hopes of the Birds grabbing their fourth Hancock Tournament championship in the last five

But in the finals, Cerritos was struck by a bolt of Cypress Charger lightning

Starting pitcher Dan Naulty, in a rare bad outing, was rocked for eight runs in only four and two-thirds inning of work.

By giving up eight runs, he had, by far, his worst outing of the year.

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The lone bright spot for the Birds was Joe Arredondo's fourth homerun of the

Against San Jose, the Falcons recorded 12 hits with four of them coming in the form of round-trippers.

Arredondo went 2 for 3 with four-RBI's and a HR, Craig Fairbrother went 2 for 4, one of those hits being a three-run shot, on the day he collected five RBI's. Shawn Nugent finished the day 2 for 3 with a two run shot, and Robbie Grubbs recorded two RBI's going 2 for 3.

All this support brought Jason Kerr his fourth victory of the year.

In the game against Taft, the sluggers slugged 17 hits, only one came in the form of an extra-base hit.

On the basepaths the Birds committed nine thefts of bases.

Two-weeks ago, Cerritos clinched the SCC title by defeating Long Beach City

The combination of Kerr and Naulty combined to allow the Vikings to just one hit in the contest.

Earlier in that week the baseballers defeated Mount San Antonio College 4-3, and El Camino 11-3.

The lady netters are number two with Janet Tamango undefeated in conference. Travel to Marymount Thursday.

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
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

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


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EDITORIAL
