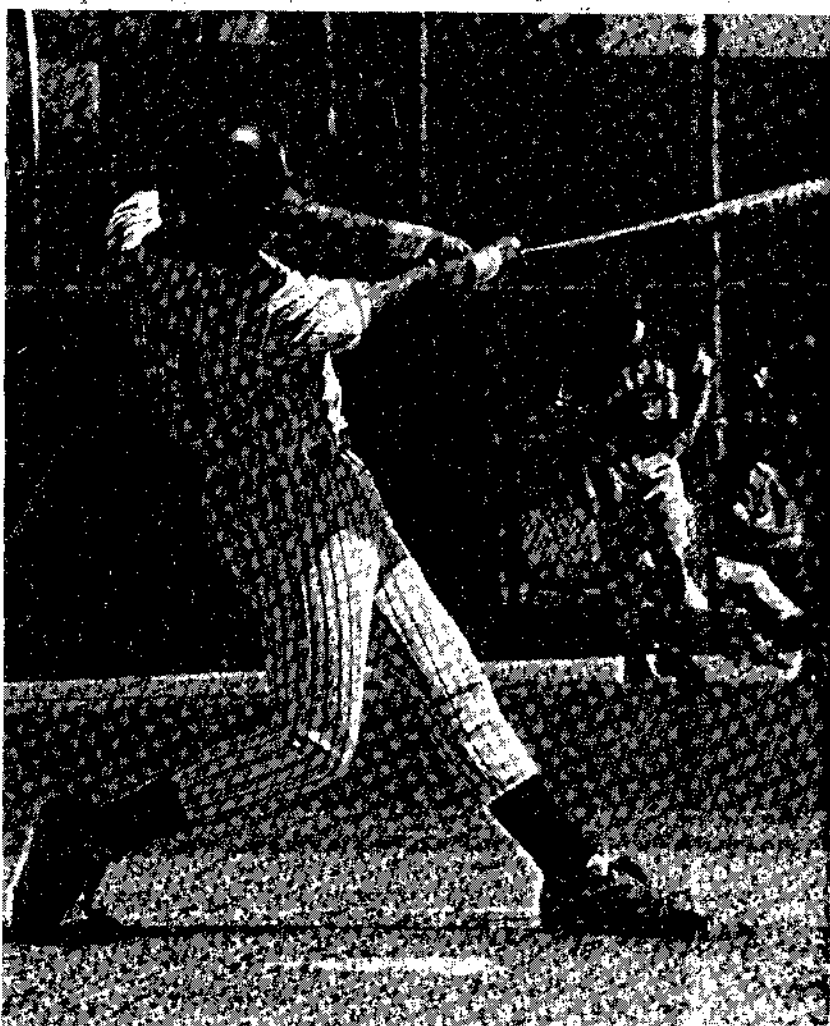

Rocky/Angie II pull off stunner

Hard campaigning catapults pair into top ASCC offices; busy agenda slated

It was a real life case of Rocky and Angie II.

The initial underdogs romped. An inauguration ceremony will take place during today's Student Senate meeting at 2 p.m. when Rocky Pavone and Angie Villanueva are sworn in as President and Vice President of the Associated Students of Cerritos College.

The two won last week's runoff

election when they captured 705 votes, out-tallying Samuel Osakue and Diana Schmitt who brought in 545 votes in one of the most exciting races in recent history.

Of 1,252 votes cast, only two were declared void.

The ultimate winners only missed a first round win by 26 votes shy with a majority count.

Pavone and Villanueva will officially take over their respective offices May 29. Pavone will become a Board of Trustee student member June 5.

A Cabinet with commissioners will be appointed by Pavone to help while, Villanueva will take over the Student Senate.

Pavone and Villanueva will begin work immediately on their agenda for the ensuing term.

Included on the agenda are working toward a positive interaction between the faculty and students, which will begin with a student/faculty luncheon introducing clubs and programs.

Another hot topic is encouraging

Famed pilot Rutan to speak during May 20 graduation

Renowned pilot Dick Rutan, famous for his flight around the world in the small fuel-efficient Voyager, will speak at the 33rd Annual Cerritos College Commencement Sunday, May 20, at 5:30 p.m.

Graduates must report to the gym, where complete ceremony instructions will be given, no later than 4:30 p.m.

There will be no prior rehearsals. Having led a distinguished career as an Air Force pilot, Rutan successfully completed 325 Vietnam combat missions.

Prior to his retirement from the Air Force in 1978, he was awarded the Silver Star, five Distinguished

Flying Crosses, 16 Air medals and a Purple Heart.

Rutan has received two honorary doctorate degrees, is a strong supporter of education, and a top-notch choice to speak at the upcoming graduation ceremony, officials said.

Mid-year and summer school grads are encouraged to participate.

Graduation announcements, caps, gowns, and tassels are on sale in the Bookstore.

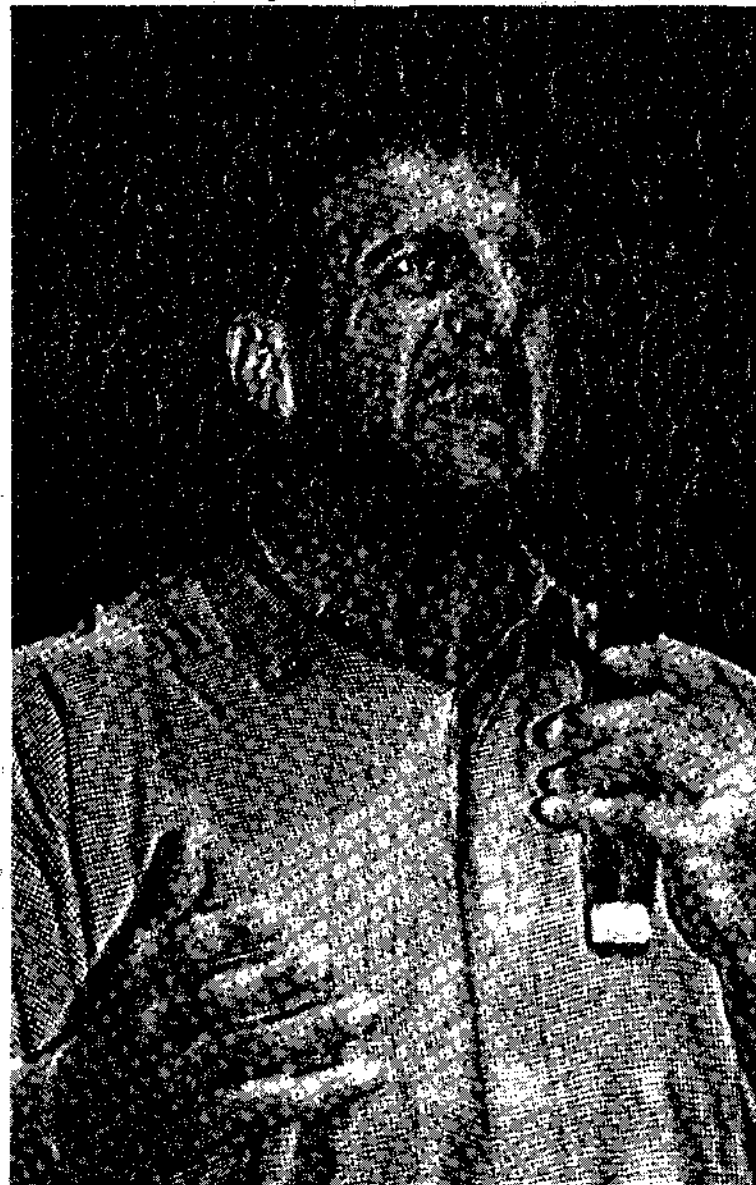
For last minute purchases, the Bookstore will be open May 20 from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m.

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Falcons begin playoffs today here vs. Pirates

Cerritos at (10-5 SCC, and 27-11 overall) and seeded No. 6, host the No. 11 Ventura Pirates today at 3 p.m. in the opening round of the Southern California Regionals.

This young team, which has only two sophomores on the roster, has surprised everyone in the South Coast Conference.

The league-leading Lady Falcons are paced by conference Most Valuable Player Vickie Davis.

Freshman Davis, third baseman,

batted .444, highest on the team.

Falcon pitching was exceptional all through the SCC season. They are led on the mound by Freshman Denelle Drulias whose conference mark of 8-1 and a miniscule 0.83 ERA gave her a convincing 17-4 record.

Down the stretch drive, the women won 10 out of their last 13, which includes nine victories in a row heading into the playoffs.

Baseball opens at home Friday at 2

Perfect record ruined 12-11 by El Camino in last game

With the All-Star game out of the way, it's time to get down to the business at hand.

The Falcon baseballers are looking to win their first back-to-back State Championship since 1975.

The first round of their journey starts Friday here versus the No. 13 seeded Roadrunners of Rio Hondo College. Game time is set for 2 p.m.

Game 2 of the 2 out of 3 series is Saturday at 11 a.m.

Bringing a conference best (19-1 SCC and 34-5 overall) into action, the sluggers are looking to grab a fourth state title for Cerritos. It'll be the fourth in the past six years.

The Falcons bring the conference Player of the Year and one of the top pitching staffs in the South Coast Conference into Friday's contest.

Third baseman Joe Arredondo is hitting at a blazing .452 in SCC and six home runs on the season.

Outfielder Chris Powell's speed on the basepaths, resulted in his swiping of 20 bases in conference, and batting an astounding .354.

Dan Naulty (9-2 overall, 6-0 in SCC) with a nice 2.33 will probably start the first game.

Naulty pitched 86 innings and in those frames he struck out 79, while giving up only 59 hits, opponents hit only .192 against him.

If the Falcons can run the Roadrunners out of town, they'll move on to the next step of the ladder, Round 2, next weekend.

Two swimmers finish on highs

Highlighting last weekend's State Championships, the Falcon men's swim team had two swimmers finish high in the state.

Mike Reyes finished the 100 meter butterfly, sixth in the state, with a time of 51.97 breaking his school record set previously in the South Coast Conference Championships April 26-28.

Reyes' comrade Rod Snyder finished in the sixth position in the 500 meter freestyle, while also recording a seventh place tally in the 200 freestyle.

Overall, the Falcons placed 21st in the championships.

Track in finals Saturday here five qualify

The Cerritos College track and field team is off and running, hosting the Southern California Finals Saturday at 2 p.m.

Five athletes and a relay team qualified, with 100 meter hurdler Patrice Hall leading the way. Hall outdid the school record she set last week, running a 14.66 placing seventh in the event. Hall set the old record of 14.93 in the South Coast Conference finals last week.

David Zavala, a last minute entry finished fourth overall with a time of 15:59.90 in the men's 5000, a personal best.

John Anthony advanced to the finals after placing fifth overall in the long jump with a leap of 23' 6". Anthony set a school record last week jumping 24' 6 1/2".

In the men's 400 intermediate hurdles Kirk Ayers bested himself with 53.02, placing him sixth overall with a shot at advancing to the State Championships.

Men's coach Doug Wells commented, "I think Patrice, John and Kirk have a very good chance to reach state. If they continue to work hard, they should be in good shape."

Tiffany South also advancing to the So Cal Finals, threw 116' 9" in the javelin throw, placing sixth overall. The men's 400 relay team qualified 7th and was clocked at 41.93 seconds.

With the Falcon's defeat of Conference leader El Camino in the

Janet Tamango qualified for singles play along with Janelle Ohm both of which qualified for first team doubles.

Qualifying for second team doubles were Vickie Montes and Terri Agopian while Delores Andelon and Nicole Blackmer qualified in as third team.

Andelon and Blackmer defeated El Camino's No. 2 team to make it into the championships.

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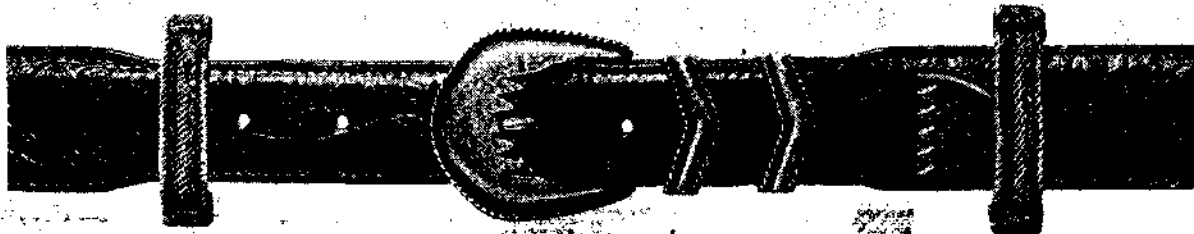
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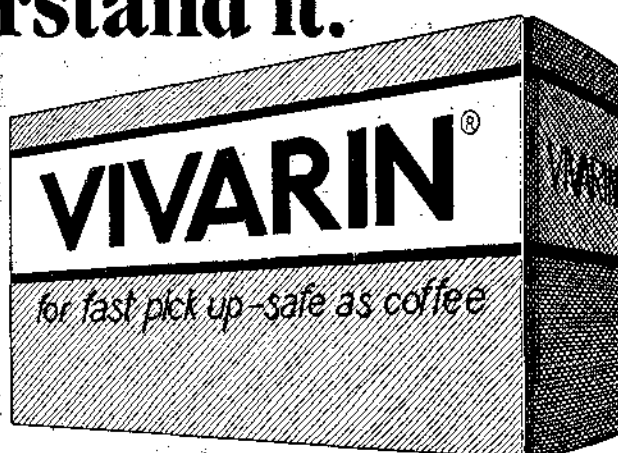
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PARTING editorial
