## Ax may cut one 6-week summer session

In a surprise announcement, the Board of Trustees is apparently seriously considering having only one six week summer school session as compared to the regular two sessions.

We don't need two six week sessions; maybe one six week session will satisfy

the faculty's need to teach and bring the transfer-prepared students to the campus," Vice President of Instruction Robert Silverman recently told the Faculty Senate.

Some of the options discussed included eliminating the second 15 week session.

These suggestions came out most plainly by Trustees in the last meeting.

approach to the unfunded ADA (average daily attendance) and CAP situation.

In recent weeks, the CAP (set amount of students the state will pay for, no matter how many pass) has garnered a lot of attention, and with good reason.

Enrollment was up this fall semester and all indications seem to point to no relief in sight. With no funding from the state for as many as 5% of the students attending here, the Board and faculty are looking for ways to trim the budget without sacrificing the quality of education.

"What we need to come up with together— with the deans and everyone else— is some plan as proof that we are trying to reduce this doubling of the ADA each year," stated Silverman when asked how Cerritos College hopes to solve the situation. While Cerritos is keeping company with other schools in trying to resolve the situation, Silverman assured faculty members that "we are in good shape and we just want to hold the line for three years."

"It's a real tough question on how to manage the schedule, so that we meet our needs and fiscal responsibility while providing every student with a quality education," Silverman added when Senators expressed concern that the two options the Board was considering did indeed seem like a meat ax approach.



The Board of Trustees is invited to next week's Student Senate meeting. No major items on today's agenda.


The success of last year's touchtone registration and continuation of the program, academic renewal policies, and the possibility of an honors program highlighted discussion last week.

Funeral services were held Monday, Sept. 24 at Rose Hills Mortuary, Whittier.

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
