TOUCHTONE PHONE ANSWERS CALL FOR EASY SIGN-UPS

A record breaking 88 percent of registered students for the Spring semester enrolled via Touchtone telephone registration.

When general registrations closed on Saturday, Jan.18, a total of 21,190

students were recorded in the college computer, with a whopping 12,458 coming from telephone registration.

The current total for this year is a 1,130 increase from the total of the Spring 1991 semester.

For at least the fourth consecutive semester, the figure of registered students at Cerritos College has crept to new heights.

The increase in full-time and part-time attendees was basically even under both classifications.

The full-time students total saw an increase of 505 new full-timers from 4,923 last year to 5,428 this year.

According to Mary Iwami, Asst.

Director of Admissions and Records,

fully dispelled any myths about this registration process."

Officials say much of the hike is attributed to increased fees and tougher admissions at four year schools.

Student Senate elections slated Jan. 29-30 for 32 Spring seats

Deadline Friday for turning in petitions with 25 names

Some 32 students, interested in enhancing student life, are being sought by the student body to lend some of their time and effort to what has proved to be a controversial and chal-lenging political experience.

A GPA of 2.0 or better, a ten unit load, and beating tomorrow's 4 p.m. deadline are the basic qualifications of eligibility for a position on Student Senate.

The Senate duties include; representing the student body, making rules and precedents for student government, and overseeing a half million dollar student budget.

However, Senate's responsibilities expand to cover a wide range of items. Last semester's topics varied from questioning parking fee increases, to giving recommendations on plans for remodeling the Student Center and LRC.

One of the primary tasks of this spring's Legislature will be to aid Student Body President Mazen Nabulsi in fulfilling his promise to circulate a petition, formulated to request a halt to Governor Wilson's educational cutbacks.

Jan. 29-30 elections will be held from 8:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., then again from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. Polling booths will be located near the Health Sciences and Social Sciences buildings. Another booth will be located in front of the Coffee shop.

As of press time, 20 applications have been turned in, with a majority coming from reps of campus organizations. - DON JERGLER

The plays are entirely produced and directed by students. Admission is a \$2 donation which goes to the Theatre Arts Scholarship Fund. -PHIL MILLER




CHARLOTTE'S WEB' SHOWING

TEAM SURPRISES EVERY BODY Men's basketball (21-2) sizzling as 1st in state; host Mt. SAC Saturday

The No.1 junior college basketball team in the state has dazzled spectators, bowled over their opponents by an average of 15 points a game, and have won 16 in a row.

Last Wednesday night Cerritos (21-2) didn't let down as they bested preseason No.1 pick in state, Imperial Valley 112-79.

The last time a Falcon team fared as well, they won 22 in a row and went on to capture the state title in 1989-90.

Asst. Coach Dean Ackland said, "To be honest I thought we would have success this year, but to have a long winning streak has been very surprising.

"We're a better defensive team than I expected and the chemistry has been there for our us."

Guard Bill Mazurie was on fire against Imperial Valley as he scored 29 points connecting on 12-of-17 shots, including 4-of-5 three-point bombs.

Mazurie also led the team with eight assists, and hauled in five rebounds.

Paul White, a 6-foot-8 center, is having a superb season as he pulled down 12 rebounds along with his 14 points in the frontline.

Starting Point Guard Javier Zavala registered eight assists, 11 rebounds and five points.

"Javier is the best point guard, since I've been here," stated Coach Ackland.

Zavala leads the team in assists, averaging six a contest, while Mazurie directs the offense at 18 points a game.

Sophomore Matt Mitchell and White bring the authority up front recording eight rebounds a game respectively. Last night the Falcons gave El

Camino the finishing rinse as they robbed them 89-86 in overtime.

This Saturday night at 7:30 the Falcons will host their first conference game at home against ever-rival Mt. San Antonio.

This Wednesday night Cerritos travels to Long Beach City, the defending champions of the South Coast Conference. They are ranked 5th in the state. Tip-off is set for 8 p.m..

"Our conference is real tough, there is really no one team to beat. We might be number one, but anybody could beat anybody on any given night," remarked Coach Ackland.

Over the holidays the Falcons kept three tournanament titles under their wings: the Cypress College Mini-tournament, Modesto, and the Allan Hancock Championship.

Mitchell was the MVP in the Cypress and Allan Hancock tournaments, while Mazurie captured an MVP honor at the Modesto tourney.

Mitchell made the all-tournament squad while White made the all-tournament team in both the Cypress and Modesto competitions.

El Camino came up on top to give the Falcons another loss 62-69.

Jennifer Zylstra and Rochelle Coatney were the top scorers for the evening with 19 and 16 respectively.

"Our team has a lot of heart and will

not quit. They will always try to improve," said Coach Karen Peterson.

Cerritos whopped L.A. Southwest City 66-29 last Friday night behind Claudia Guillen (13 points) and Lisa Chacon (15 rebounds).

Sophomore Rochelle Coatney added 12 points and four rebounds, while teammates Erica Nelson and Colette Vazquez chipped in with five apiece.

A tenacious Falcon defense did not allow Southwest to score for the first 8:24 of the game.

On the other hand Cerritos scored the game's first 14 points and really never looked back.

The Lady Falcons' ripped Compton 75-29 as five players were in double figures.

Coatney led the charge with 14 points, while the starting guard duo of Glenda Navarro and Nelson poured in 13 apiece.

Doctors say he suffered from a congenital disease that caused inflammation of the arteries.


Two of Killium's relatives died of a similar complications.


